
The first permanent settlement was made on the Congress land in the northeast portion of the township. No one known to have preceded Aaron Patterson in the occupancy of the soil. He was a New Jersey farmer, entered the southeast quarter of Section 25 about one mile east of Dundee, settled there in 1808 and remained through life. He is said to have married five times in succession. His children were John, who died in early manhood; William, who was a methodist, and attained a ripe old age in this township; Uriah and Aaron, who removed to Pittsburgh, Pa.; Obadiah, who went west; Jesse, a resident of Sandusky; Rachel (Hoagland), who returned to New Jersey; Hannah (Jennings) who moved to the West; and Mary (Kint) who became a resident of Sugarcreek Township. Obadiah served in the War of 1812.







Ferguson moved an office from Cadiz and commenced the publication of the Eye. This paper, having become the property of A. W. Johns October 18, 1879, it was regularly issued as the Newcomerstown Eye until August 20, 1881, when the paper suspended. It was purchased, in March, 1882, by A. C. Hursey, who re-christened it the Newcomerstown Index. Mr. Hursey, during his proprietorship, associated with him upon the editorial staff C. W. Knisely and afterward Cliff Sultzer. The present proprietor and editor, Wick W. Wood, took charge of the paper March 1, 1883.

Newcomerstown has had its full complement of the various industrial shops which usually flourish in villages and towns. The first pottery was established by Harmon and Gustavus Fox, about forty years ago. It was situated on Main street near the W. & L. E. Railroad. About 1870, another pottery was erected and put in operation on State street, between River and Goodrich, by George Bagnall, but it is now a relic of the past. The first tannery was owned by Anron Schenck. It was built about 1827, and stood on the southwest corner of Canal and River streets. About 1850 it became the property of Elias Patterson, and a few years later, of George R. Little. 1871, Horace Little and C. F. Hicks took possession and held it for two years, and in 1880 it was purchased by Lowis Carhart, who has carried on the business to the present time. Five or six years after the first tannery was set in operation, David Mulvane built one on West Main street, where the business was continued until within a few years. The first saw mill was built by Edmund Smith about 1833, directly north of the canal on Buckhorn Creek. The Eureka Planing Mill was erected by John Wilson, George Benton and J. R. Mulvane in 1875, and continued in operation seven years.

William Gardner and Paul Roberts were the first millers. As early as 1836 they erected the mill which stands at the west end of Main street. Their successors have been Elias Patterson and Isaac Hamersley, William Gaskill, Mr. Patterson; then in 1866, W. J. Patterson and William Marlatt, succeeded by Jesse A. Wiandt, the present proprietor, who does an extensive commercial business. A second mill was built by William H. Craig in 1853, on the south side of the canal, opposite the former mill. The subsequent owners and operators of the mill have been Abraham Dean, William Marlatt, Marlatt & Patterson, Wilkin & Ayers and A. J. Wilkin, the present owner. It is a

custom mill and does a good business.

James Pilling started a woolen mill in 1838, on the banks of the Tuscarawas, about a mile east of town. In 1845, Thomas Benton joined him as a partner. James Pilling rebuilt the mill on a larger scale in 1870, and it was

operated for ten years. Since 1880, the mill has been lying idle.

A foundry was built in 1870, by Kenyon & Ferguson, but was shortly afterward destroyed by fire. A second one began operations in 1880, under the management and ownership of Elliott & Clark, who in the spring of 1883 disposed of it to Carbart & Williams. By them it was removed from the banks of the canal to new and commodious buildings near the Pittsburgh, Cinciunati & St. Louis Railroad. It is now known as the Peerless Bell and Machine Works.



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

About 1850 it became the property of Elias Patterson, and a few years later, of George R. Little. In 1871, Horace Little and C. F. Hicks took possession and held it for two years, and in 1880 it was purchased by Lewis Carhart, who has carried on the business to the present time. Five or six years after the first tannery was set in operation, David Mulvane built one on West Main street, where the business was continued until within a few years. The first saw mill was built by Edmund Smith about 1833, directly north of the canal on Buckhorn Creek. The Eureka Planing Mill was erected by John Wilson, George Benton and J. R. Mulvane in 1875, and continued in operation seven years.

William Gardner and Paul Roberts were the first millers. 1836 they erected the mill which stands at the west end of Main street. Their successors have been Elias Patterson and Isaac Hamersley, William Gaskill, Mr. Patterson; then in 1866, W. J. Patterson and William Marlatt, succeeded by Jesse A. Wiandt, the present proprietor, who does an extensive commercial business. A second mi'l was built by William H. Craig in 1853, on the south side of the canal, opp site the former mill. The subsequent owners and operators of the mill ha e been Abraham Dean, William Marlatt, Marlatt & Patterson, Wilkin & Ayers and A. J. Wilkin, the present owner. It is a

custom mill and does a good business.

James Pilling started a woolen mill in 1838, on the banks of the Tuscarawas, about a mile east of town. In 1845, Thomas Benton joined him as a partner. James Pilling rebuilt the mill on a larger scale in 1870, and it was operated for ten years. Since 1880, the mill has been lying idle.

A foundry was built in 1879, by Kenyon & Ferguson, but was shortly afterward destroyed by fire. A second one began operations in 1880, under the management and ownership of Elliott & Clark, who in the spring of 1883 disposed of it to Carhart & Williams. By them it was removed from the banks of the canal to new and commodious buildings near the Pittsburgh, Cinciunati & St. Louis Railroad. It is now known as the Peerless Bell and Ma-

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

Item first: I give and devise to my daughter Clara Shaw now residing at Newcomerstown, County and State aforesaid, my farm in Coshocton County, Ohio, during her lifetime, which tract of land is known as part of the First Quarter of Township 5 and Range 4 of the U.S. Military lands bounded and described as follows, viz: Begin- at a stone on the towing path of the Ohio Canal on the line and to this date belonging to heirs of Elias Patterson, deceased, on the last, thence North 1°, 10 minutes East 78 25/100 chainsto a stake on the Sp(?) line at the North East corner of lands owned by William Smith, thence 88° East on the Township line 18 50/100 chains to a stake on the line dividing Township 5 & 6, thence South 1 3/4 $^{\circ}$ West 7 9 22/100 chains to a stake on the towing path of the Ohio Canal at Lock 23, thence along said towing path North 85° West 18.78 Chains to the place of beginning, containing 144 and 76/100 of an acre more or less, being the same property conveyed to me by Gilbert L. 

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AUNT ELLEN CRETER DIES OF PNEUMONIA

Wednesday July 9, 1919

The death of Mrs. Mary Ellen Creter which occurred at her home, corner of Church and Bridge Streets, Thursday, July 3, following a brief illness of pneumonia, marks a passing of a woman beloved, especially by the younger folks, and respected by all.

In years past the home of "Uncle Jack" and "Aunt Ell" Creter was the mecca of young folks of this city, where royal good times were enjoyed. Any time, day or night, this hospitable pair were ready to give over their commodious home to the young folks for parties or any wholesome amusement. In the latter years of their life they took much delight in reminisences of the many happy occasions which were held in their home. Since the death of her husband several years ago, Mrs. Creter has lived alone practically all the time, with the exception of occasional visits with relatives and friends.

Mary Ellen Patterson was born in Guernsey county September 18, 1844, and died July 3, 1919, aged 74y, 9m, and 15 days. She was the daughter of Elias and Sarah Weirick Patterson, and was the last of a family of eleven children. Nearly all her life was spent in Newcomerstown. She was married to Andrew Jackson Creter which union there were no children.

Mrs. Creter was of a deeply religious nature and had been a member of the Presbyterian Church for many years, manifesting unusual interest in the work of her local church during the last years of her life. While never of rugged health, she lived to a ripe old age. Her last illness was brief and her passing peaceful.

Funeral services were held at the home Sunday at 4 p.m., conducted by her pastor, Dr. Glenroie McQueen, assisted by Rev. L. Bowman, former pastor of the local M.E. Church and close friend of the deceased. A mixed quartet from the Presbyterian Church furnished music for the occasion. Interment was made in the local cemetery.

What is the connection between a vacant lot in Newcomerstown, two rge monuments in the East State Street Cemetery, Union Hospital at Dover id Newcomerstown Ordinance 11-92, passed recently into law by the Newmerstown village council?

The involved answer recently uncovered by former cemetery superintenent, Terry Jurin, should interest many local history lovers. His curiosity was oused when he began wondering about the source of approximately 10,000 which has become the nest-egg for the newly established expendble trust fund for the "perpetual care and enlargement of the cemeteries of e village of Newcomerstown."

What he sought in a trip to the Tuscarawas County Courthouse was the ill of Mary Ellen Creter, written shortly before her death in 1919. His conusion was that Mrs. Creter was a very public-spirited woman for her time. Quite amazing now is the fact that in 1919 the village of Newcomerstown ad, but relinquished, the opportunity to establish its own hospital.

Most local residents will easily recall the large white house, torn down ally a few years ago, which stood on the southwest corner of S. Bridge and hurch streets. Originally this was the spacious residence of a childless coule — Andrew Jackson Creter and his wife, Mary Ellen.

Their attractive front porch was a popular stopping place to rest and visit hen walking was the usual means of travel. In the pre-1913 flood days, I equently was a visitor there when I accompanied a neighbor on shopping ips downtown, none of which would have seemed complete without a stop t "El-Jack's." Unfortunately, I never inquired why Mrs. Creter bore that ickname. But I remember the luxury of sitting on that porch on a hot summer day watching the C&M trains go by.

Andrew Jackson Creter (1829-1913) was a son of Andrew Creter, who ame here from New Jersey in 1817 and in 1841 established what is now nown as the Old Temperance Tavern Museum. The whole Creter family ackground can be found in the 1884 History of Tuscarawas County at our cal library. It contains the biographies of Morris Creter and Sarah P. Creter, ne elder Andrew's brother and sister who came to Newcomerstown from lew Jersey in 1830.

Mary Ellen Creter, born in 1844, was a daughter of Elias and Sarah Patteron. When she died in 1919 the area surrounding her home was still bustling ith plenty of rail traffic on both the C&M and the Pennsylvania, only a lock to the south. Across Bridge Street was the Fountain Hotel, also a busy lace.

Mrs. Creter's will covered many pages, meticulously prepared by her atmey, John Hance of New Philadelphia. She left cash bequests to known eirs of both the Creter and Patterson families and \$300 each to both St. aul's Lutheran and First Presbyterian churches. One thousand dollars was iven to the trustees of the Newcomerstown Cemetery to be held in trust and sed for the perpetual care of plots in the East State Street Cemetery where he and her husband and both sets of parents were, or would be, buried. Aparently, the monument marking her and Andrew's graves, the large stone ppped by a female figure which is easily seeen from West Street, had already

been erected. But Mrs. Creter directed that an imposing monument of Barre granite was to be placed at the other burial sites where grime from the rail-road adjoining the northeast and oldest section of the cemetery already had eroded the earlier marble stones until they were illegible.

After all these instructions had been carried out, she directed that her "house and lot with all appurtenances thereto belonging" be given to New-comerstown to convert into a hospital. With the gift was a bequest of \$1,000 to be used in helping provide equipment. But all this depended upon the town's ability to provide at least \$3,000 annually to maintain and operate the hospital. Should the village at any time fail to fulfill its annual obligation, the entire bequest was to go to Union Hospital.


Obviously the prospect of finding \$3,000 every year in a small struggling village like Newcomerstown proved insurmountable to local officials and the offer was rejected. In that case Union Hospital was instructed to sell the property, with the proceeds "for the purpose of equipping and maintaining

one or more free beds for the benefit of indigent patients."

Meanwhile, the \$1,000 bequest provided for perpetual cemetery care was put in a bank and drew modest interest which now has accrued to approximately \$10,000, with very few expenditures from the fund having been made to the present time.

- P-6 **DAVID CRATER** (Moritz, Philip, Moritz) b. Jan. 17, 1790; d. May 10, 1848; m. about 1808 Maria Schenkel (dau. of Adam and Elizabeth Euler Schenkel) b. Sept. 12, 1789; d. Aug. 29, 1861; both buried in East State Street Cemetery at Newcomerstown; David was a tavern keeper in German Valley; he may have subsequently been a blacksmith at Andover, Sussex County and on the council of the Newton Baptist Church when it was organized in 1835 before emigrating to Ohio in 1840.
 - O-1 **Sarah** b. 1810 in New Jersey; d. after 1880; she may have married Oct. 14, 1838 Nathaniel Walton.
- O-2 David b. March 17, 1814; d. June 17, 1883.
- O-3 Isaiah G. b. Sept. 29, 1815; d. Nov. 29, 1882.
 - O-4 Elizabeth b. 1824 in New Jersey; d. July 22, 1898; m. Feb. 20, 1845 at Newcomerstown Jesse Dickinson (son of Seth) b. 1824 in Connecticut; children: Henrietta b. Feb. 20, 1845, Sheldon b. July 20, 1848, Isaiah G. b. Sept. 1, 1850, and Clinton C. b. Nov. 11, 1853.
- P-7 ANDREW CREATER (Moritz, Philip, Moritz) b. Nov. 15, 1791; d. Nov. 26, 1861; he migrated to Newcomerstown, Ohio in the fall of 1817 and married May 18, 1818 Elizabeth Neighbor (dau. of Nicholas and Catherine Sharp Neighbor) b. Dec. 28, 1787 at German Valley; d. Nov. 22, 1829, a week after the birth of her fifth child; both buried in East State Street Cemetery; Andrew was an innkeeper and served as postmaster of Newcomerstown in 1833; he built a stage stop/inn in 1841 that still stands as the Temperance House Museum and headquarters of the Newcomerstown Historical Society.
 - O-5 Clark b. April 16, 1819; d. Aug. 21, 1873 and buried in East State Street Cemetery; Clark was a Justice of the Peace and served as Clerk of the Court at New Philadelphia; remained single.
 - O-6 Catherine b. April 24, 1821; d. March 28, 1890 at Van Wert, Ohio; m. Jan. 9, 1842 in her parents' house Daniel W. Burt (son of Daniel and Sarah Foght Burt of Warwick, NY) b. Dec. 11, 1816; d. Feb. 3, 1892; both buried in Woodlawn Cemetery at Van Wert; Daniel was a farmer, real estate dealer and operated a ferry over the Tuscarawas River; children: Andrew Shannon b. Oct. 11, 1842, Allen b. July 26, 1844, Emeline b. Aug. 27, 1846, Augusta b. Jan. 4, 1849, Edgar

- b. March 28, 1851, Daniel b. Jan. 18, 1854, infant daughter b/d July 28, 18546, Catharine b. June 24, 1858, infant son b/d Sept. 8, 1861, and Harry B. Aug. 5, 1864. Note: Sarah Foght Burt was the daughter of a Revolutionary War Soldier.
- O-7 Ann C. b. Dec. 31, 1822; d. March 20, 1887; in 1878 she and her sister, Elizabeth, donated land on West Canal Street for building the First Presbyterian Church; they also held title to "Crater's Hill" which is now owned by the Village of Newcomerstown and called "Park Hill"; remained single.
- O-8 **Elizabeth** b. Jan. 26, 1824; d. Feb. 22, 1893; Lizzie and her sister, Ann, are both buried in East State Street Cemetery; in 1880 the sisters lived with their brother, Jack; County death records show that Clark, Ann, and Elizabeth all died of "brain fever;" remained single.
- O-9 Andrew Jackson "Jack" b. Nov. 15, 1829; d. Sept. 18, 1913 at his home in Newcomerstown; m. June 4, 1868 Mary Ellen "Ella" Patterson (dau. of Elias and Sarah Weirick Patterson) b. Sept. 18, 1844 in Guernsey County, Ohio; d. July 3, 1919; both buried in East State Street Cemetery; the couple was noted for their generosity and hospitality, particularly to young people, and were respectfully called "Uncle Jack" and "Aunt El"; no children.
- P-11 SARAH PLUM CRETER (Moritz, Philip, Moritz) b. June 25, 1800 near Chester; d. June 6, 1883 and buried in East State Street Cemetery; Sarah moved to Ohio in Séptember, 1830 to care for the motherless children of her brother, Andrew; on his deathbed Andrew arranged for her to be financially secure; Sarah made her home with her nephew, Andrew J., and was active in preserving the local history of Newcomerstown.
- P-15 MORRIS CRETER (Moritz, Philip, Moritz) b. Dec. 16, 1808; d. March 19, 1891 and buried in East State Street Cemetery; m. 1st Sept. 8, 1829 Helena Voorhees (dau. of John Peter and Catherine Tyne Voorhees) b. Feb. 14, 1808 in Middlesex County, NJ; d. June 7, 1838 at Newcomerstown; m. 2nd May 19, 1839 Mrs. Jane Clark (widow of Dr. H.G. Clark and dau. of James Abraham) b. 1812 in England; the 1850 census included Jane's father and two step-children, Andrew C. age 16 and Emma A. Clark, age 14, in the household; m. 3rd Jan. 17, 1860 Eliza A. (Preston) Wolfe (widow of Perry C.) b. March 2, 1823 in Coshocton County; d. May 31, 1901; Aunt Liza, as she was called, was buried with her first husband in the Fairfield Cemetery at West Lafayette, OH; Morris migrated to Ohio in November, 1830 where he became a grain merchant and grocer and operated a freight business; he served as justice of the peace for 12 years and one term as an associate judge; 5 children by first marriage and 6 by second.

DIES OF PNEUMONI

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Mary Ellen Patterson was born in Guernsey county Sept. 18, 1844, and died July 3, 1919, aged 74 years, She was the 9 mo. and 15 days. daughter of Elias and Sarah Weirick Patterson, and was the last of a family of eleven children. Nearly all of her life was spent in Newcomerstown. She was married in 1869 to Andrew Jackson Creter from which union there were no children.

Mrs. Creter was of a deeply religious nature and had been a member of the Presbyterian church for many years, manifesting unusual interest in the work of her local church during the last years of her life. While never of rugged health, she lived to a ripe old age. Her last illness was brief and her passing

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AGED PIONEER DEPARTS THIS

After an illness of several months duration, Andrew Jackson Creter, one of the oldest pioneer residents of Newcomerstown, died at hishome on Bridge st. early last Thursday morning, Sept. 18, in his 85th year. For several weeks past, his condition was considered hopeless. and each passing day left him a little weaker. The end came peacefully, in the nature of a deep sleep. without a perceptible sign of pain

or suffering.

"Uncle Jack," as he was familiarly called, delighted in the society of young yolks, and in years past when both enjoyed better health. "Uncle Jack" and "Aunt Eli" Creter threw open their doors to the young people for parties of every description. In those days each succeeding generation of young folks was received into the home and hearts of this hospitable conple, who chaparoned them safely through the party and picnic stage of life. Most of those young folks are middle-aged now, with children of their own to demand their attention, but they all still retain 'a place in their hearts for "Uncle Jack" and "Aunt Ell."

The deceased's parents, Andrew and Elizabeth Creter, came to this locality from New Jersey in 1818, and to them were born five children-Clark, Catharine, Ann, Elizabeth and Andrew Jackson. . The mother died when A. J. was but 7 days old. His aunt, Sarah Creter, then came here from New Jersey and took charge of the 5 children, remaining in the household sixty years. They were then living in a log house near the intersection of State and Carlisle ets. Aunt Sarah

died at the age of 90. A. J. Creter, the subject of this sketch, was united in marriage to Mary Ellen Patterson, daughter of Elias and Sarah Patterson, early settlers, June 4, 1868, establishing their first home in the old Carhart property, central Canal st., and later built on their present location, where they have resided ever since. Mr. Creter is survived only by his

AN AGED PIONEER DEPARTS THIS LIFE

Anderson, who is deceased; Nancy M., the wife of John Alliway, making her home in New Philadelphia; Thomas D., deceased; Margaret J. married to William White, of Liberty; James M., working at his trade of a painter in that place, which is also the home of Milton; and one who died in infancy. The town of Liberty, now known as Kimbolton, was founded by the father of our subject.

Mr. Gibson is a devoted member of the United Presbyterian Church, to the support of which he is a willing and liberal contributor. In politics he has been a straightforward Republican ever since the formation of the party, and on that ticket has served in the responsible offices of Township Clerk, Constable and Supervisor. He is widely known throughout the county, and although now ninety years of age, bids fair to see the dawn of nineteen hundred.



ENSON L. GRIMM, a well known citizen of New Philadelphia, is one of her practical business men, and for nearly his entire life has resided within her limits. He conducts a good livery, which is well supplied with a fine line of coaches, carriages and buggies. In connection with this, he runs a horse-shoeing shop, and has all repair work done under his personal supervision.

The parents of our subject were John and Harriet (Gants) Grimm. The father was a native of Pennsylvania, but came to Ohio with his parents in childhood. He was reared on a farm on the line of the Old Town Valley Road. On arriving at man's estate, he followed farming, and also occasionally did carpenter work. For a number of years he was a preacher in the Methodist denomination, and while holding a protracted meeting at Blakes Mills he was suddenly stricken with congestion of the brain, which resulted in his death. In politics he was a Republican. His wife is still living, her home being in New Philadelphia. She was born and reared in Carroll County, Ohio, and

her parents were also natives of the Buckeye State. John and Harriet Grimm had a family comprising six children: Sarah E., now the wife of George W. Bowers, of this city; Hiram A. and George M., whose homes are in West Virginia; Mary, Mrs. John Hammond, of Blakes Mills; Benson L.; and Hattie E., wife of C. M. Law, of this place.

The birth of our subject occurred November 1, 1854. He was reared under the parental roof, and received his elementary education in the district school. When nineteen years of age he began learning the blacksmith's trade of Charles Haupt, and served a three-years apprenticeship. After completing his term of service, he continued for a year as a journeyman, after which he embarked in business for himself on East Front Street. In connection with his blacksmith shop, he carried on a livery business for about nine years, and made a specialty of furnishing carriages and hearses for funerals, coaches for parties, etc. In his wagon shop he has been engaged in manufacturing and general repairing. In 1890 he removed from his old stand to his present place of business, selling out everything except the livery. This he has since conducted with success.

Our subject carries a fine and well selected line of various kinds of carriages, and among others has four coaches, which he purchased at a cost of \$1,000 each. The arrangement of his livery stable is very complete; the carriages are kept in one department, and separate places are devoted to horses, harness, hay, feed, etc. The livery is lighted with electricity, and is modern in all its appointments. Mr. Grimm owns about half of the business block in which his livery is located, and has erected several fine dwelling-houses in other parts of the city, which are attractive in appearance and built on the most approved plans. The kindness and benevolence of our subject are well known in this locality, and when death has entered the family of some poor person he has frequently supplied coaches free, and those, too, of the very best in his possession. November 15, 1876, Mr. Grimm married Hannah B. Patterson, who was born in this county. The parents of Mrs. Grimm were W. J. and Amanda (Pierce) Patterson, old settlers of this county. The former was for years connected

with Blakes Mills, but is now deceased. To our worthy subject and his wife have been born six children, namely: William, Pearl, Myrtle, Oscar, Ambrose and Ivey. Myrtle and Ambrose have both been called to their final rest. Mr. and Mrs. Grimm are faithful workers and members of the Lutheran Church.

Our subject affords a strong illustration of what application, industry and energy can accomplish. He is self-made in every sense of the word, having carved out his own fortune, and has prospered in his various undertakings. In disposition he is upright and honorable, and he is fortunate in possessing the esteem and confidence of the entire community. Fraternally he belongs to Schoenbrun Lodge No. 107, I. O. O. F., and has passed through all the chairs of Equity Lodge No. 75, K. of P. In politics he uses his ballot in favor of the Republican party, and takes great pride in the success of the organization.



years a leading business man of Uhrichsville, but is now living retired from active cares. While living in New Cumberland he served as Postmaster of the place, under Lincoln's administration, but with that exception has never held public office. He has made his home in Tuscarawas County for nearly sixty years, and has always been greatly interested in its improvement and development.

The parents of our subject were Alexander and Gertrude (Kerr) Scott, the former a native of Ireland, and the latter of New Jersey. With his parents, Alexander Scott emigrated to America in 1784, when he was nine years of age, came to this county in 1835, and died on his farm in 1853, when in his seventy-eighth year. His father, William H., also a native of Ireland, emigrated to the United States with his son, and died in Washington County, Pa., when in his eighty-ninth year.

Mrs. Gertrude Scott was born in 1786, and died April 5, 1865. By her marriage she had become the mother of eleven children, as follows: William, a retired business man of Scio, Ohio; Samuel, next in order of birth; Eliza, Mrs. Joseph Meeks, of Washington County, Iowa; Maria, now deceased, formerly the wife of Rev. Mr. Bartholomew, of Goshen, Ind.; Albert, who is engaged in farming in Tuscarawas County; Robert and Sarah, both deceased, the latter formerly the wife of John Ralston, of Bowling Green, Ind.; Caroline, widow of Dr. John McGreggor, of Indiana; Louis, a resident of Waynesburg, Ohio; Margaret, wife of Galen Smith, a retired carpenter of this place; and Walter, who died in infancy.

Samuel Scott is a native of Washington County, Pa., and his birth occurred October 20, 1815. He was reared to farm work, and was also employed in a mill. With his father he came to Tuscarawas County in 1835, and in February, 1838, located on a farm in Sandusky County. There he remained for sixteen years, engaged in raising cattle and other enterprises. For six years he derived a good income from the manufacture of potash, and for a like period of time kept a public house. In 1854 he returned to Tuscarawas County, and for about six years ran a gristmill near Zoar. In 1860 he traded this place for a stock of dry goods which he removed to New Cumberland, where he was located for the next six years. In 1865 he came to Uhrichsville, and while here he has managed a grocery and meat-market the main part of the time, but gave up active business in 1887.



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
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MONUMENT AT WEST LAWN CEMETERY

They were married at the home of the bride's parents, John M. and Ann Wallace Lacey, (who then resided on Neighbor st.,) on the 11th day of May, 1857, by Rev. Marquis, a Presbyterian minister of Plainfield, Coshocton county. Mr. Bassett was a wagon-maker by trade and had his shop in the rear end of the building at the corner of River and Canal sts, now occupied by J. S. Barnett & Co. In 1864 he enlisted in Co. H, 178th Ohio Reg't and was promoted to sergeant. In 1884 he was appointed postmaster at Newcomerstown by President Cleveland, serving four years, and was again given the same position during Cleveland's second term and served five years. Mr. and Mrs. Bassett have long been residents of the town and have always enjoyed the confidence and esteem of a host of friends. Creter family helped establish the museum

In 1841, Andrew Creter saw the need for a place for bed and breakfast accommodations so he purchased a tract of land bordering on the old Erie Canal here in Newcomerstown. That spot is known as the Old Temperance House Museum.

Creter rounded up a crew of workers and constructed the Temperance Tavern. The building was made of native timbers. The woodwork in the home is made of walnut and the bricks were all handmade on the

property.

Not only were the canal boats going by the property, but it was also near the stagecoach route to Scio. It wasn't long after that until the C & M and the Pennsylvania railroads were going through Newcomerstown. The Erie Canal was finished in 1828 and the railroads were completed in 1858.

Shortly after the Temperance Tavern was built, Creter's wife passed away and he had his two sisters come from New Jersey to help with the cooking and other household duties.

When you visit the museum, one of the most interesting items in the home is the large original fireplace in the basement (tavern room). You will also see the original walnut table where the early guests ate their

meals which were cooked at the fireplace. Several of the original iron pots are still on display. You will also see the oven where the bread and other goodies were baked.

To the left of the fireplace, you will see the opening to the underground railway where a number of slaves took refuge. It was arranged so that at a moment's notice they could travel up through this passageway to the third floor and stay until the "all clear" signal was given.

It is noted that Ohio had more underground railroads than any other state. It is believed that Newcomerstown had four of them.

The third floor of the museum is now used for storage, but in the 1840's it was a place where people of questionable character were assigned and as previously stated, it was a harbor of safety for the runaway slaves.

There are many other items of interest at your local museum.
