The first settler known here was John Mulvane, who had an account at a store in Gnadenhutten. Several squatter's families lived in cabins dotted about the surrounding hills. The pioneers feared malaria and as a usual thing built their cabins not on the fertile valley land, but upon the heavily wooded and often rocky hills.

David Johnson, a Mr. Sills, Daniel Harris and Joseph and William Mulvane were among the very earliest pioneers. George Bible, Barney Riley and John Pierce, were hunters and since they had not obtained a legal right to the land on which they were living when the owners came, were known as squatters. One squatter, whose name may sound familiar, was Nicholas Funston. He was living on the Stark Patent prior to 1816.

In 1814, Nicholas Neighbor came from Morris County, N. J. and, impressed with the location, purchasrd 1900 acres of the original Beaver Patent for himself and others. The following year a colony of about 60 emigrants came from New Jersey. No shelter was available exopt the abandoned Indian cabins of the former Newcomer's Town, they moved from them nearly 40 years ago.

In these they lived until their own cabins could be built. In 1816 and 1817, other settlers from New Jersey followed, among them being the Miller, Tufford, Creter, Gardner, Stouffer and Booth families.

According to one history of the township, the first school was taught by Jacob Miller in his cabin, situated north of the river and near the county line. Another school is said to have been taught by Seth Hart in the Stouffer cabin, farther east along the river. The village of Newcomerstown was formally laid out in 1827 when the Ohio Canal was built. The original plat contained 34 lots, 2 tiers north and one south of the canal. Basin and Canal streets ran east and west, dividing the lots in those directions, while Bridge and Cross streets separated the lots in the north and south lines.

Names of many streets laid out since that time have served to preserve the names of some of the early settlers. They were Neighbor, Mulvane, Goodrich, West, Nugen and Pilling.

The village contained one building at the time it was laid out. Located immediately south of the present depot. It was several years old and occupied by Nicholas Neighbor. He erected the first store building, and with Jacob Overholt, operated the first store, which was located on the site of Britten's Grocery.

In 1830 the village contained four buildings. Ten years later, Newcomerstown had a population of 270, showing the influence of the canal upon its growth.

A sawmill was built by Edmund Smith about 1833, directly north of the canal on Buckhorn Creek. A flour mill was built about 1836 at the west end of Basin st. Before that farmers had to grind their own corn and wheat or drive considerable distance to other mills.

In the early days of the settlement, the closest market for farm products was Pittsburgh.

All manner of goods was shipped by way of the canal and it also was a good source for news. One bit of exciting news for Newcomerstown residents appeared in the Steubenville Messenger May 31, 1851.

The route of the Steubenville & Indiana Railroad, after careful surveys, has been determined. Its location was decided at the last meeting of the Board of Directors. It leaves Steubenville through the Cross Creek Valley, then by way of Urichsville to Coshocton.

The road from Steubenville to Newark was opened for traffic in April 1855. But as it had no connection further east or west, it did not prosper and before 1860 passed into receivership.

It finally was merged with the Pennsylvania Railroad in 1867, by which time direct connections had been established both to the east and to the west.

Few stories seem to have been handed down concerning the building of the railroad, but various incidents during the Civil War made mention of it. President Lincoln passed through here on his way to Washington in 1861.

In 1860, Newcomerstown had a population of 577, which included many young men who joined the Union Army. At first no company was mustered right in Newcomerstown, but several were raised in surrounding towns which the men joined.

In the autumn of 1861, Camp Meigs was established at the Dover fairgrounds and most of the enlisted troops from the county got some early training there. The 51st Regiment was organized at this place and Co. C of that regiment was composed of Newcomerstown men.

Newcomerstown made a steady growth in population even during Civil War days and the period following the war brought many inventions to add to the comfort and prosperity of the inhabitants.

The canal was still the most popular throughfare and many returning soldier found employment along its banks.

The C. and M. Railroad was built in 1873 and many stories came from the camps of Irish laborers employed to build it. One was that the Irishmen came down with the smallpox and it spread to a local farmer's sheep, killing the whole flock.

During the 1880s the present town hall was built and, with the completion of the opera house, real progress was made in the way of entertainment. Not only did home talent shows prosper, but various groups of actors, musicians, magicians and minstrels, some of whom were already prominent in their particular fields, made stops here.

Newcomerstown, in the latter part of the 19th Century had a thriving fair each fall. Although the fairgrounds were really situated in Coshocton County. The land was directly west of corporation line. The fair still belonged to Newcomerstown.

It was called the Central Ohio District Fair and as its name implies, was really larger than any of those sponsored by the surrounding counties. The days of the fair were the high point of the year for Newcomerstown citizens and people came from miles around, bringing the family lunch in large picnic baskets.

In 1895, the Clow plant was moved here, and contributed to the growth of the population, in fact the census figures show that it doubled in that decade. At the same time the industrial life of the community took on a new phase, for products manufactured before that time had been largely absorbed by local demand, and no active part had been taken in interstate and foreign trade.

From that time on, shipping of manufactured products from Newcomerstown steadily increased.

Newcomerstown Municipal Building / Opera House

In 1884 Newcomerstown village Officials approved the construction of the Municipal Building / Opera House at a cost of \$12,000. The original floor plan included the village fire department, police station, jail and a banquet hall on the first level. The Mayor's office, Council Chambers and the Opera House would occupy the second level. The building contained a front and back staircase, as well as an outside fire escape leading from the second level to an alley-way on the east side of the building. A cupola was located above the second level, and was used for seating special VIP guests attending events at the Opera House. The cupola seating contained the best seats in the house. The price of tickets for the cupola seats was considerably higher than the cost of seating on the second level. The Opera House boasted a 22 x 44 foot stage, and seating capacity for 500 persons. The original Municipal Building / Opera House was constructed on Church Street at the site of the present Newcomerstown Municipal Building.

Heating was provided by kerosine, the lighting by oil lamps. The oil lamps had to be refilled before each performance with their wicks trimmed and their chimneys cleaned. The footlights consisted of 12 oil lamps. There was an enormous chandelier overhead with 36 oil lamps.

The Opera House quickly brought many exciting popular shows, music recitals and plays, both comedy and drama, to Newcomerstown shortly after opening to the public. The John Phillip Sousa Band played at the dedication when the Opera House opened. The cost to the Opera House management, for the Sousa Band to appear at the Opera House was \$ 2000. The event was reported as spectacular, and seats were sold out. All attractions at the Opera House were booked by Redpath Lycetum Bureau, a national booking agency with offices located in Chicago and Boston. The last show at the Opera House was booked in 1917.

Many patrons came from neighboring towns, even bigger cities, to attend some of the shows and plays as the events were highly publicized and were sought after by the public at that time.

In July 1907, a large scale musical performance was held titled, College Festival. The show featured over one hundred- fifty of Newcomerstown's own citizens as the players. The Hyperion Orchestra provided the music. The cost of admission was 25 cents and 35 cents was required for reserved seating. Tickets were available at the H. H. Eagon Drug Store on Main St. located next door to the Newcomerstown News office.

For many years the high school graduation ceremonies took place in the Opera House as the high school building, located at the site of the current East Elementary School, at that time had no auditorium. In 1924, a new high school building, now the Middle School, was constructed, and the new auditorium was used from that time until 1968 for the Newcomerstown High School graduation ceremonies. From the mid 1920s to the early 1940s, the Opera House was utilized less and less, and eventually fell into disrepair by 1945.

In November 1946, the village approved for the Municipal Building to have a complete overhaul. The Wendling Brothers, a construction contractor from Dover, Ohio began the \$32,000 project financed from village bonds. The original Opera House roof was removed, and the building's second level height was reduced. Rooms inside the structure were added and some walls removed. New walls, new staircase, new windows, doors and a buff colored brick exterior was added. On May 12, 1948 village officials and employees moved into the new Municipal Building.

Newcomerstown Saloon Visited by Carrie Nation

Sam Douglas had a Saloon on Main St. Sam ran an orderly place, no swearing, no loud talk and if you had too much to drink when you came in Sam would refuse to sell you anything and politely escort you out of the front door.

Sam's saloon was the only place visited by Carrie Nation of hatchet-welding fame. She was notorious for walking into a saloon, berating the saloon keeper, and with a few swipes of her trusty hatchet, being aided by some her followers, destroy anything in sight; bottles, glasses, etc. and always taking a few swips at the large glass mirror behind the back bar. Following the singing of a hymn, giving the bartender a thorough dressing down, and warning him to repent, she and her followers would depart, leaving behind plenty of wreckage.

During this performance, Sam Stood at the far end of the bar and never said a word. After the female wreckers had departed, he proceeded to clean the debris up. No doubt he thought aplenty.

This was the only saloon raided, as the word had got around, and the rest of the saloon keepers had very quickly locked the front doors to their establishments and departed.

Early Industries - Tuscarawas County History 1884

The first Distillery was built in 1805 by David Johnson and Mr. Sills

The first pottery was established by Harmon and Gustavus Fox, about 40 years ago. It was situated on Main street near the Wheeling and Lake Erie Railroad. About 1870 another pottery was erected and put in operation on State street, between River & Goodrich St. by George Bagnall, but is now a relic of the past. The first tannery was owned by Aaron Schenck. It was built about 1827, and stood on the southwest corner of Canal & River St. About 1850 it became the property of Elias Patterson, and a few years later, of George R. Little. In 1871, Horace Little and C. F. Hicks took possession and held it for two years, and in 1880 it was purchased by Lewis Carhart, who has carried on the business to the present time. Five or six years after the first tannery was set in operation, David Mulvane built one on West Main street between River & Goodrich St. where the business was continued until a few years ago. The first saw mill was built by Edmund Smith about 1833, directly north of the canal on Buckhorn Ck. 1837 a saw mill and in 1849, a mill and grain elevator was added to it, N. W. cor. of Canal & River St. The Eureka Planing mill was erected by John Wilson, George Benton and J. R. Mulvane in 1875, and continued in operation 7 years, Chestnut St.

William Gardner and Paul Roberts were the first millers. As early as 1836 they erected the mill which stands at the west end of Main street. Their successors have been Elias Patterson and Isaac Hamersley, William Gaskill, Mr. Patterson; then in 1866, W. J. Patterson and William Marlatt, succeeded by Jesse A. Wiandt, the present proprietor who does an extensive commercial business. A second mill was built by William H. Craig in 1853, on the south side of the canal, opposite the former mill. The subsequent owner and operators of the mill have been Abraham Dean, William Marlatt, Marlatt & Patterson, Wilkin & Ayers and A. J. Wilkin, the present owner, It is a custom mill and does a good business.

James Pilling started a woolen mill in 1838, on the banks of the Tuscarawas, about a mile east of town. in 1845, Thomas Benton joined him as a partner. James Pilling rebuilt the mill on a larger scale in 1870, and it was operated for ten years. He also had a Saw Mill. Since 1880, the mill has been lying idle.

A foundry was was built in 1879, by Kenyon & Ferguson, but was shortly afterward destroyed by fire. A second one began operation in 1880, under the management and ownership of Elliott & Clark, who in the spring of 1883 disposed of it to Carhart & Williams. By them it was removed from the banks of the canal to a new and commodious building near the Pittsburgh, Cincinnati & St. Louis Railroad. It was known as the Peerless Bell and Machine Works.

The Enterprise Manufactory, built a few years ago and now owned and operated by R. L. Shoemaker, is one of the most thriving industrial works of the town. Beside an extensive planing mill business, large quantities of cigar boxes, churns and bee hives are manufactured. It was located on the northwest corner of Canal and Bridge St.

There was a Carriage Works owned by Henry Moore in 1870, H. Mimirk Blacksmith and Waggon Shop in 1872, Daniel Laub Blacksmith in 1878, Charles Schneider Carriage Shop in 1883, all at N. W. cor. of Main and River St. Three blacksmith shops, two meat markets, three harness shops, three boot and shoe shops two barber shops, two lumber yards, a bakery, two livery stables, two billiard halls, five saloons and four good hotels. The Commercial, Fountain, Globe and Central Houses. The mercantile trade is represented by six general stores, three queensware and grocery stores, two groceries, four hardware and tin stores, two drug stores, one millinery store, two furniture stores, one boot and shoe store, one clothing and gents' furnishing establishment, one book store, one jewelry and one music store. A bank has been recently opened. One or two previous attempts in banking have proved failures.

Patterson Ice House

Patterson's ice house was long a familiar landmark here to boatmen on the old Ohio Canal near the turn of the century.

The 40-by-60-foot barnlike building stood near the old canal wasteway, which was about 100 yards west of the canal lock at the west end of Canal St.. For years it was used for the storage of ice, cut from the canal during the winter months for use during the summer. It was abandoned shortly after 1900 and finally disappeared entirely one day when a group of boys, who were playing in it, accidentally set it afire.

A smaller structure, used for the same purpose and owned by G. L. Patterson was situated east of the lock at the west end of Canal St. It was torn down later.

Employed at the time as an ice cutter, Bert Sells, who is the village's special policeman, recalls that the men used a saw with extra long teeth. The cakes of ice were towed to the ice house chutes, down which they were slid into the ice room. Here they were packed in sawdust and stored until summer.

Bert also served as wagon man, driving the ice wagon about the streets and selling chunks to residents. Today's iceman has a relatively easy job, according to Mr. Sells, who explained that the canal ice could not be chipped to split it, but had to be sawed into smaller pieces.

The proprietors of the 13 village saloons and of a number of meat markets were customers of Mr. Patterson's ice houses. They were favored with a special commercial rate of 20 cents per hundred pounds. The house rate was 35 cents per hundred.

Dual walls were built and sawdust packed in between in constructing the ice houses. A two foot space was left between the outside wall and the ice. More sawdust was packed in this opening. The insulation proved sufficient to protect the ice from melting during the hot summer months.

A small charge was made by the state for cutting the ice from the canal. At times, especially after a long freezing spell, the ice would be frozen to a thickness of 14 to 18 inches.

The introduction of mechanically produced ice did not immediately sound the ice house's death. Several times the mechanical equipment broke down, throwing the trade to Mr. Patterson, who once again harnessed the team to the old ice wagon and traversed the village streets selling his nature produced ice.

Baltimore Clothing Co.

The Baltimore Clothing Co. has been in existence since 1884. It was one of several stores, others were in Cambridge and Uhrichsville. It was operated by the Thalheimer family, which manufactured men's clothing in Baltimore, Maryland. This is how the store got its name. The first location was the building on the east side of the M. Yingling Grocery Store. This building was removed in 1900 and a three story brick building was built on this site by Howard Adamson. In 1896 the store moved to the S. W. corner of Main and Bridge St. After the accidental death of Zack Thalheimer, the store was sold to J. M. Kaden in 1913. He bought the building in 1915. After ten years his son-in-law, J. R. Bean bought the store. After he retired in 1957, his daughter and son-in-law Dale Johnson operated it. It was moved to 121 W. Main St. in 1966 where they kept it until 1978. Greg and Cheryl then bought the store.

Beers Drug Store 1942

Mr. Beers has managed the firm known as George A. Beers and Co. continually since December of 1891. He was associated in the business with his father, Dr. A. M. Beers, until Dr. Beers' death in 1912.

Dr. Beers established Newcomerstown's first drug store in 1868 with his partner, Mr. Roof then pastor of the Lutheran Church. In 1870 W. A. Johns came here from Coshocton to operate the store for Dr. Beers and Mr. Roof. It was located in a building, long since moved away, on the Beers lot at the N. E. corner of Bridge and Main St.

The firm of Beers and Roof continued until about 1871 when it was sold to W.R. Shields. A year later Mr. Shields built a building where the Swigert Meat Market is now located on Main St. and opened a pharmacy there.

A. J. Wilkin had started a drug store where the Jones-Lydick building is now situated which was operated by his son, Dr. Charles Wilkin and his son-in-law, C. C. Dickinson. Later, W. A. Johns became a partner. In the early 1880s this establishment was moved to the Beers building at the corner of Main and Bridge St. and in 1887 Mr. Johns bought out the Wilkin interests.

Mr. Beers actually began his pharmacist's career in January of 1888 when he started working for Mr. Johns. Two years later he went to pharmacy school at Scio College under Prof. J. H. Beal.

Then, in 1891, he and his father established the present drug firm. They continued to operate in the original location until 1897 when they constructed the present Beers building on Bridge St. After Dr. Beers' death on Sept. 9, 1912, Mr. Beers became the sole owner.

Miss Christine Macmillan was on the first Board of Trustees that established the library in 1935, she was the Secretary. From 1954 to 1970 she was the Librarian.

The Newcomerstown Public Library was organized in 1935 the result of a long careful planning by citizens interested in securing a library for their community. Interest in this worthy project was first aroused by the members of the Women's Club who had hoped for many years for a public library, and by The Heller Brothers Company who had a small library in their factory for the use of their employees.

Enthusiasm for starting the library was shown by the generous response that was given to requests for help in launching this endeavor. Contributions to a library fund were made by many individuals and by local industries, merchants, lodges and civic and social organizations. The proceeds from two Tag Days and sponsoring a movie at the Ritz Theater added revenue to the treasury. An allotment of \$800.00 was received from county tax funds. Even the sum of \$5.00 the prize in a liars contest held at a Heller Brother Company picnic, was donated to the library.

Gifts of time, labor, and materials were given to help build tables and shelves for the library. Rooms were rented in the Kaden building at 119 1/2 Main Street. After the rooms were decorated and furnished, donations of books were received from people in the community and from the public libraries of Dover and New Philadelphia. When the new library was opened on the first of June, there was a collection of two thousand books on its shelves.

From a beginning of 2,000 books, the number has steadily increased until now, in 1964, it has reached a total of 14,000 volumes. In addition to those books, the library also offers its readers the use of fifty magazines and four newspapers.

The first librarian was Miss Mary Alice Justus. She held this position for six months, then was succeeded by Mrs. Doris Beauregard. Librarians who followed Mrs. Beauregard were: Mrs. William Beers, and Mrs. Arlie Wiandt. Those who have been employed as assistants are: Marguerite Burge, Florence Steffen, Jane Addy, Mrs. Elizabeth Collins, Carl Gray, Mrs. Cecil Norman, and Nancy Brown. Miss Christina Macmillan is the present librarian, having been appointed to that position in 1954. Mrs. Russell Glazer has been assistant librarian since 1956.

The library remained in its first location for three years, then in October, 1938, was moved to the Vogenitz building at 145 1/2 Main Street where it remained until a permanent location was secured in 1960.

At this time a great step forward was made for the library and for the town when the building at 123 N. Bridge Street, appraised at a market value of \$22,500.00 was purchased by the Library Board from Reeves Banking and Trust Company for \$10,000.00. This building would fill the need for more space for the library and especially for quarters on the ground floor. For a second time the community responded with generosity and enthusiasm to meet the needs of the library. Donations for buying the building and for remodeling and equipping it for library purposes soon reached a total of \$9,112.90. This amount, added to a building fund established by bequests from the estates of Mrs. Manuel Yingling, Mrs. Florence Yeagley, and Mrs. C. B. Vogenitz provided the necessary funds for purchasing the building and changing it from a bank to a library.

Moving the library from its second floor rooms was accomplished by the combined efforts of many people. High School students carried the tables, chairs, and shelving up Main Street to the new location. The books were moved by members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Jaycee Wives, the High School Library Club, the Girl Scouts and other willing workers.

Baskets borrowed from the Hackenbracht Apple Orchards were filled with books and the baskets numbered to correspond with numbers on the shelves on which they would be placed. The baskets were then lowered to a truck by a conveyor in reverse, delivered by the truck to the new library, empty baskets brought back and elevated by the conveyor to be filled with more books.

On April 15, 1961, Open House was observed in the new library with 900 visitors admiring the beautifully decorated rooms and the neat shelves of books.

The change of location caused an increase in the use of library materials, as had been anticipated. In the three years since April, 1961, an average of 37,000 books and magazines a year have been borrowed for home use. This is an increase of 4,000 a year over the yearly circulation for the three precedings years.

The library started with an allocation of \$800.00 is now operating on a yearly budget of \$13,000.00 allocated by the Budget Commission of Tuscarawas County from intangible taxes colleted in the county.

The membes of the first Board of Trustees that established the library in 1935 were: Wm. E. Thomas, President; Mrs. Manuel Yingling, Vice President; Miss Christina Macmillan, Secretary; Rev. R. A. Morris, Treasurer; Mrs. C. B. Vogenitz; Charles Edwards; and Warren Prosser. Other residents who also received appointments as trustes were: Mrs. Charles Phillips, Chester Best, Archie Fletcher Sr., Miss Neva Tidrick, Mrs. Kenneth Beall, Mrs. John Ross, Mrs. C. E. Ashelman, Rev. Charles Foust, Rev. Henry Holyoak, and Rev. Donald Doss. The members of the board now serving are: W. E. Ourant, President; Ralph Robinson, Vice President; Mrs. Vernon Lee, Secretary; C. Dale Johnson; Mrs. Max Julien; Mrs. Ray Cramlet; and Rev. E. F. Eshelmam. Miss Christina Macmillan, librarian, also serves as Clerk-Treasurer for the board.

The public library, organized with enthusiasm in 1935 has developed as a valuable part of the community, giving extensive library service to the residents of Newcomerstown and the surrounding areas.

The Public Library, created in 1906 was moved to the Shannon Building in 1909. Later the Shannon Building was numbered 211 N. Bridge St.

The Adamson Block, Main St. 1901

A little over one year ago Howard Adamson of Independence, Pa., visited Newcomerstown for the purpose of making an investment. He saw that the place had a bright future, and he at once determined to identify himself with the town. There were two frame dwellings on Main Street which he thought should be supplanted by a business block, and he decided to purchase them. One was the property of J. R. Mulvane, Esq., and the other belonged to Mrs. Ellen Baxter. The purchase was made, the buildings removed, and the work of excavating for a huge cellar began and was pushed to a speedy completion. The foundation for the new building measured 57 x 60 feet, and was up in a most substantial manner. The design, specifications, etc., for the massive structure were prepared by John Kline, architect of Steubenville. The erection of the building, which is constructed of brick, was commenced on the 14th of November, 1900. It is three stories high, Surmounted by a deck which contained two large compartments. The front of the building, with its grey sandstone trimmings and rich-colored pressed brick, is a model of symmetry, beauty and durability. The entire front of the structure is of modern design, tasty in point of architecture, and is a compliment to those who superintended the work. The inside finish throughout is in keeping with the exterior, and reflects credit on carpenters Koelsch and Sargent who had charge of that portion of the work. The plastering, which is an excellent specimen of work, was executed by James Hiller and his able assistants. The stone-work was in charge of Gadd & Barthalow, and the brick-work under the supervision of James Rusk and Mac Shaw, each being performed in a skillful and artistic manner.

Work progressed; and on the 10th of August last, one of the lower rooms was finished and ready for occupancy, and was immediately occupied by Hissong & Co., proprietors of the Kandy Kitchen. About four weeks latter the second ground-floor room was completed and was occupied by I. Grossman proprietor of the Boston Clothing Store. The second floor contains handsome, airy office-rooms, and all except one are occupied. On this floor are the dental parlors of Dr. Ross, the law office of E. E. Lindsay, the Home Building and Loan headquarters, the Public Reading Room, and G. A. Carsons tailor shop. The third story is equally divided into two spacious rooms; the one on the east side was fitted up for a lodge-room and is occupied by the Junior Order of American Mechanics, the Federation of Labor, and the Baptist church society. The room on the west side is to be used as a Banquet Hall. The fourth story, or deck, may be used for Sleeping apartments. The entire building is heated by hot-air furnaces, and is wired complete so as to be lighted by electricity as soon as a current can be procured. Everything from start to finish is neat, handsome, convenient and up-to-date. It was somewhat of a venture on Mr. Adamson's part to come here and invest several thousand dollars in a single building, and trust to the town developing sufficient to justify the investment, but he made a happy hit, and the block will yield a good income besides being a grace to the town. Mr. Adamson is to be congratulated on his excellent foresight and subsequent success.

Warren Jones started the first movie picture show in the building that had been used by Porter Mitchell's Saloon about 1906. It was on Main St. It was the second building from the S. E. corner of Main and River St. It had benches for seats with no backs. A Mr. Charles stood on stage with a pointer and explained the picture. In Aug. 1907 Warren Jones sells Electric Theatre to Charles Wilgus and Robert Hall of Coshocton. Building was later numbered 221 W. Main St.

The Majic Theatre on Main St. purchased by Mayor Ackey of New Philadelphia and renamed The Family Theatre in July 1907. The Family Theatre was purchased by Swan and Brown of Caldwell in Oct. 1907. Mr. the Baker leases moving picture plant in the Vogenitz Building and will operate during the Holidays, Dec 1907. The Vogenitz building was located on the S. W. corner of Main St. and Cross St. Square. The building was later numbered 201 W. Main St.

S. L. Douglas has constructed an electric theatre on his business block at the N. W. corner of Canal and Bridge St. in 1909., it became the Grand Theatre. It was in the north side of the building. That part of the building was later numbered 104 N. Bridge Street. Mr. Roy Wiley becomes sole owner and manager of the Grand Theatre in Oct, 1912. Also in Oct. 1912, L. G. Riggs and A. F. Warner purchased the Grand Theatre and Leo Dover will continue as operator. The Grand Theatre remained there for several years. Brooks and Roe purchased the Reel Theatre in the Douglas Building, dismantled it and moved it to main St. in 1916. They will operate the Grand Theatre in the east side of the Ortt Building which was built by the Ortt Brothers in 1914-15 on the Hartshorn Building property they bought from Marion Davis in 1914. It was a two-story building. This is the second building from the S. W. corner of Main St. and Cross St. Square. The building was later numbered 209 W. Main Street. Brooks and Roe were the proprietors. Ortt Bros. purchases the Grand Theatre from Brooks and Roe in 1916. A piano was used to emphasize drama or emotion for each scene in the movie. It moved out in 1927 and went to West Lafayette.

The Ritz Theatre was built on the old Ohio Erie Canal bed. The use of the canal was discontinued, and the canal bed filled in around 1916. The Twin City Theater Company later purchased the vacant lot and began construction of the theater in the fall of 1926. The construction was completed by the Jacobs Construction Company. Interestingly, the building materials were purchased from some of the local businesses at that time. The building materials were purchased from Eureka Hardware and Zimmer Lumber Company. The brick for the exterior was purchased at the Canton Brick & Fireproofing Company. The wiring and electrical fixtures from Beiter Brothers Electric and Crater Hardware. The theater seating and accessories were purchased through Rose Brothers Company.

Just prior to the grand opening the owners, Jordan & Wheland announced a contest for the community to participate in by helping to give the new theater a name. In quick succession, many suggestions poured in for various names. The owners pondered over the responses and finally agreed that the name, Ritz Theatre, suggested by local resident, Howard Stocker, was most fitting to reflect the image of the sophisticated design of the new theater. Stocker won a prize of a \$20 gold piece.

Another local resident Mrs. Elizabeth Stein suggested the name of Jordan and Wheland, in honor of the owners. She won second place with an award of \$20 worth of admission tickets to the theater.

On Monday evening, February 14, 1927, the Ritz Theatre welcomed the public to its grand opening. The Steel and brick structure measured fifty feet width by one hundred seventy feet in length. The theater featured a spacious lobby, a men's smoking room, a lady's retiring room with toilet area connected. The theater also offered its patrons a mothers room, which had a child's play area.

Mothers could take crying infants and fidgety youngsters to the room and yet still be able to watch the movie through a viewing window and listening via a special speaker in the room. The theater auditorium had seating for six hundred patrons. At the front of the auditorium were a stage and the large silver screen. The stage was fully equipped with foot and border lights. A Hilgren-Lane three-manual organ was located on the right side of the stage in an orchestra pit. The lobby and auditorium featured beautifully crafted chandeliers, as well as complementary lighting fixtures throughout the building.

The price of admission to the Ritz in 1927 was ten cents for a daily matinee, and thirty cents for the evening feature, Wednesday-Sunday, and forty cents on Monday, Tuesday evenings (the first two nights of the newest featured movie that was showing that week).

The Ritz Theater was owned by the Ortt family for many years, before being sold to the Manus Entertainment Inc. of Toronto, Ohio in 1950. Business at the Ritz began to dwindle in the early 1970s and business ceased completely in 1974. The structure was later sold to Don and Doris Best who have converted the theater into a private residence. The Bests manage two rental spaces on the first level and several rental apartments on the second level of the building.

On July 4, 1949, the Starlite Drive-In had its grand opening. It was located on State Route 16 - 36 between Newcomerstown and Isleta. It had been built by owners, Oliver and Ida Mae Ortt. of Newcomerstown. The Ortt family also owned the Ritz Theatre in Newcomerstown. In 1950, They sold both the Ritz Theatre and Starlite Drive-In to the Manus Entertainment Inc. of Toronto, Ohio.

The Starlite was situated on 33 acres, on the south side of State Route 16 - 36. Its' original screen, constructed of wood and canvas, was destroyed by fire several months later. The screen was replaced in 1950 with concrete blocks. The construction was completed by Albert Construction Co. Of Coshocton. George Underwood also of Coshocton painted the large Starlite drive-In logo on the front side of the structure.

The Starlite ceased operation in the fall of 1986 and the structure was razed in January 1987. The property was purchased by the late Ken and Rosalie Porcher, and was developed for private residential housing. The road where the Starlite Drive-In was built is now Coshocton County Road 9.

Land Added by Sheet Mill Boom After Big Lottery - By Charles Lieser

Back about the turn of the century there was a strong desire, as there is in most small towns to greatly expand in size and importance, in fact, to become a city if possible or near a city in size.

As a result a group of citizens worked out a plan to double the town's size and bring in some new industries. A large tract of land just west of the corporation was secured and that was the beginning of the Sheet Mill Boom which was a failure as far as new industries were concerned but rather successful in adding to the town's area.

So although the committee in charge was unable to back up their guarantee that new industries would be provided on condition of the purchase of lots we never heard of much complaint or dissatisfaction about the deal, especially since there was a general rise in land values at that time and since no persons profitted much in the deal and those additional lots were needed for the town's natural growth.

The particulars of the whole deal can best be made clear by quoting from the large handbill and map of the area distributed at that time. The officers and promoters were some of the town's most prominent citizens - bankers, business men, lawyers, etc.

The Citizens Committee of Newcomerstown have accepted the option on the South Side Land Company Farm of 97 acres as per their offer to wit: \$10,000 cash, and \$5,000 in lots, said lots to be sold to the Land Company on same terms as prescribed for all lot-buyers.

We have had said land platted by competent surveyors as follows: Twenty acres set off along the P. C. C. & St. L. Railway for the proposed Manufacturing plants.

The remainder of said farm, excepting 17 acres of low land adjoining the Tuscarawas River, is divided into 324 town lots, all equally desirable for building purposes, and all equally valuable save in the matter of location.

In order to equalize the value of the lots in the rear of said farm, we have divided the 17 acres of low land into 24 squares of about 3-4 acres each. These squares we have designated by the numbers as are given to the lots above named. Persons drawing said lots will also draw the corresponding squares of land without extra cost.

The price of each and every lot is to be \$150, payable as follows: \$15 cash; a note for \$135 payable in 9 monthly installments of \$15 each. All notes to mature in October, 1901. All cash sales as follows: Sales during January, discount of 5 percent on \$150; during February, 5 percent on \$120; during; March, 5 percent on \$105; during April, 5 percent on \$90, and so on. All lots must be paid in full to receive discount.

Any purchaser having failed to make payments for two successive months shall forfeit his right to the drawing of a lot, payments already made shall be forfeited to committee.

Any person selling his interest, must notify the secretary, stating to whom and when sold, and all arrearages must be paid, otherwise his interest shall be forfeited.

All lots to be drawn as designated by the lot purchasers at the Newcomerstown Opera House, May 15, 1901, at 1 o'clock pm. Lottery Concluded.

Sheet Mill was built in 1901 at the west end of town, north side of Mill St. next to the south side of the Penn. Railroad. It was sold to E. Cooper Shopley of New Philadelphia in 1907. In Oct. 1907 a U. S. Marshall from Cincinnati prevents new owner of Sheet Mill from tearing down plant until payments have been made to local residents who hold judgements against the plant.

Andrew Creter came to the Newcomerstown area sometime between 1815 and 1818 and built a log house on the north side of the old road. Later it was called State Road. He kept the first Tavern and Inn there from about 1825 to 1838. He became postmaster in 1823. He later in 1841, built the Temperance Tavern on South Canal St. Later owners were; Lellan Shoemaker, Titus Weaver and Harold Rivers. Newcomerstown Historical Society Museum opens in 1971. It is now numbered 221 W. Canal St.

Globe Hotel

The Mansion House was a Tavern and Inn built by Jacob J. Miller about 1835. Fire destroyed the second story in the 1840s. The Globe Hotel and Saloon repaired this building and a third story was added. Joseph Hall took charge of the Globe Hotel in 1857. In 1873 the hotel was called the Exchange Hotel with Wm. Williams as the Proprietor. W. H. Phillips was the Proprietor of the Globe Hotel in 1878. In 1895 it was called the Worden Hotel. Bill Mayberry had the Globe Hotel and Saloon in the early 1900s. Mrs. Ella Mercer has taken charge of the Globe Hotel in 1908. A. J. Snavely owned and operated the Hotel in 1912. Mr. and Norman Norman Day and Wooster buy the Snavely Hotel in 1931. The Hotel closed in the early 1930s. The building fell into disrepair and was torn down. The Globe Hotel was located on the S. E. corner of Canal and Bridge St. The site was bought by Harvey Reger in 1942.

The Fountain Hotel

The Fountain Hotel and Saloon was built by M. Mayberry in 1876. William H. Mayberry was the Proprietor in 1878 and it was called the Big Shield House. J. M. Sondles was the Proprietor in 1887. John Cooley bought it from Mayberry in 1895 and opened a restaurant in the Fountain Hotel in 1911. D. C. Whiting leased the Fountain Hotel in 1912. The Hotel Building was then purchased by the VFW in 1946 and used until the mid 1950s. The Hotel Building was torn down in 1957.

There were several barber shops in the Fountain Hotel Building while it was there. Some of them were; S. S. Mugrage, F. W. Wise with Howard Wise as Manager, Clarence Bean, W. C. McKim and J. W. Barnhouse. The Fountain Hotel was located on the N. E. corner of Bridge St. and the railroad tracks. It was later numbered 225 S. Bridge St.

Sargent House

The Sargent House was established by L. S. Sargent in 1875. The Commercial was operated by Mr. Swan, Thompson Lybarder, Willam Wrenfrew and William Swaw, who took over the establishment in 1883. It was the Porter Mitchel Hotel and Saloon in 1895. The Crescent Hotel and Saloon which was operated by Elmer Sells was here in the early 1900s. W. W. Stamm opens Crescent Hotel in 1917, Restaurant in 1922. Later it was The Maurer Hotel and Restaurant. Herbert Keith bought the establishment in 1947 and it was known as the Keith Hotel up until it closed in the late 1960s. Keith Bar, Western Store and Saddle Shop was in rear of building in the late 1960s. Brown's Bar was here in 1970. Building was located on the N. W. corner of Bridge St. and railroad tracks. It was later numbered 222 S. Bridge St. Building was torn down in 1977.

Central Hotel

The Central Hotel was here in 1895

Mrs. Margaret Wier's Hotel (The Central House) to sell hotel in 1900'

Central Hotel, J. A. Guthrie Prop. George H. Phillips Mgr. Guthrie died in 1914

The Central Hotel was opened by G. W. Rice (1918_ML) Hotel closed in the late 1930s

Central Hotel Restaurant

Stamms Restaurant in 1928

E. M. Carr's Restaurant, Central Hotel

Lloyd Ley leased the Hotel Building to Lester Ellwood in 1938

for a Restaurant and Confectionery

Central Luncheonette opened in 1940, it had several owners while it was open. It closed in the mid 1970s. Skip and Ruth Hurst had the Luncheonette in 1955 until about 1970.

Don's Steak and Egg House in 1976.

Beasley's Restaurant in 1977. It closed for good in the mid 1980s.

Some of the Jewelry Stores in the Hotel Building were; William Moore, C. E. Brothers, C. E. Gardner and L. O. Curtiss.

Some of the Barber Shop in the Hotel Building were; Lewis A. Stricker, Lawrence Tidrick, R. C. Moore and Paul Ford.

There were a variety of other businesses that used the Hotel Building throughout its history. One of the first ones was Wilkin, Ayer s & Dryden, general store, dry goods, lumber and undertaking in the lower rooms in 1871. Joseph Sutizer, Tailor, was upstairs in 1873. Theodore D. Neighbor had a Mercantile Business here. Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Ley had the Vanity Fair Tea Room here in 1926. Lloyd Ley had Insurance Business in 1926. Postal Telegraph Service in 1939. Lion's Club in 1970 and Business & Professional Men's Club in 1970 and 1977. The building was numbered 131 W. Main St. Bulding now Gone

Cooley Hotel

John Cooley built a new building at 237 W. Canal St. in 1929 to be used as a Hotel. It was never finished as a Hotel as Cooley lacked the money to finish the building. The unfinished hotel was purchased by Charles Loader in 1931. Several others owned the building since then. Some of the businesses that used it were; Mr. Smith had a Restaurant and Saloon; Clyde Schumaker had Implement, John Deere Sales and Service, Globe Specialties who moved here in 1960 and moved out in 1975. Then came Mid Ohio Canvas.

Small Hotels

Hotel for canal passengers S. E. corner of Canal and Goodrich St. Became 103 S. Goodrich

Mr. Lowry had the South Side Hotel and Saloon on Clow Ave.

The Blue Jacket Inn was at 487 Clow Ave. in 1942. Now Gone

Taylor Hotel S. W. corner of Bridge and Church St. Now Gone

Boarding Houses

John Junkins kept a Public House at his home in 1808

Saloon and Boarding on South Canal St. in 1895 - 1901. It is now numbered 109 W. Canal St.

Boarding House on Liberty St. in 1901. It was later numbered 202 Liberty St. Now Gone

Sterling Specialty Co.

Sterling Faucet Co. was founded in Newcomerstown in 1913 by John and Clark Beggs. A building addition was built in 1924. The products manufactured were brass gas cocks, water faucets, bronze bushings, automobile brass parts, a general line of plumber's brass goods, screw machine works and sink legs. The Sterling Faucet Co, was dissolved and assets liquidated in 1939. The Plant was destroyed by fire in 1940. Sterling was offered a plan to refinance by the Chamber of Commerce. In 1940 the Chamber of Commerce closes drive for Sterling Faucet Co. with \$21,000. Sterling Faucet Plant will move to Morgantown, West Virginia. Plans are being made to return money collected in drive to rebuild the plant here. Sterling Faucet Co. completes move to Morgantown, West Virginia in 1940, together with the machinery and equipment when an offer of a vacant plant and other advantages were made to move Sterling Faucet to Morgantown by a group of Business men in Morgantown, West Virginia. In 1943, John Beggs, upon his retirement, sold Sterling Faucet to Mr. Wes Ruby and later Sterling Products Co. in Morgantown was to become a very large and successful company.

Alchrome Products Company

Alchrome Products Company was founded by Mr. F. Herbert Smith in 1946, when a new building was constructed on the site of the old Sterling Faucet Company. The start up of the company was financed through the sale of Preferred Stock (later recalled) and savings of Herb and Dorris Smith. Herb (1914 - 1991), was the stepson of Clark Beggs, who was part owner of Sterling Faucet Company. Herb first worked for the Sterling Faucet Company prior to enlisting in the Army in 1942.

In the beginning, Alchrome manufactured water faucets and soon added a foundry, machinery, and finishing facilities to make other brass products.

In 1956, Alchrome purchased the Lineburgh Manufacturing Company in Uniontown, Pennsylvania, whose products were rough brass faucets and shower drain fitting. The Lineburgh name was changed to Victor Brass and continued to operate in Uniontown, Pennsylvania, until 1962, when the operation was combined with the Alchrome facility in Newcomerstown, which is now known as Accurate Products.
