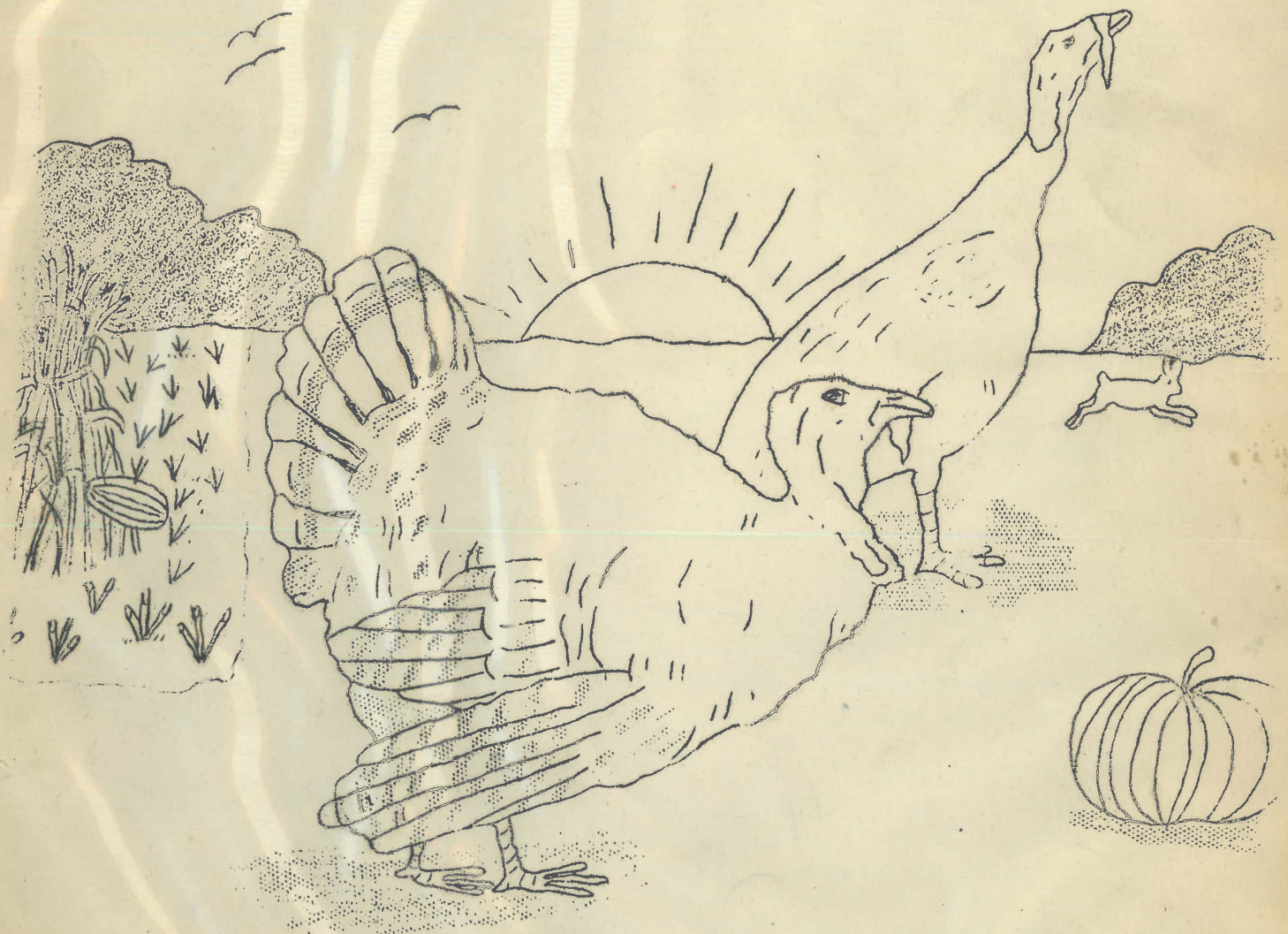

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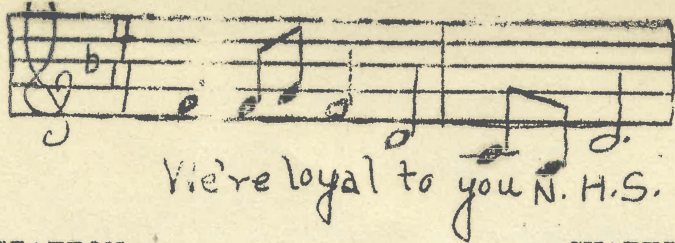

EIGHT MONTHS OF SCHOOL

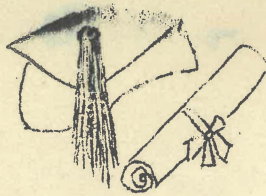
An assembly was held in the study hall Thursday morning.

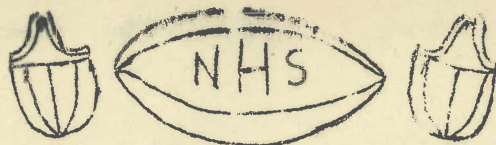
