Brothers killed in

separate accidents

Tragedy rocked an area family last week with the deaths of two brothers in separate incidents almost exactly one week apart. Dead are Stacey Koran, 14, and John Koran, 21, sons of Mr. and Mrs. John R. (Phyllis Mackie) Koran, Johnson Run Road (Guernsey R.D. 1).

Stacey D. Koran died early Saturday morning, June 30, as the result of an accidental shooting, according to the Guernsey County Sheriff's De-

partment. His brother, John A. Koran, died early Saturday morning, July 7, as a result of an automobile accident in the 700 block of Cross Street in Newcomerstown.


In the death of Stacey Koran, a 13-year-old Newcomerstown boy has admitted to Guernsey County deputies that he accidentally fired the gun that caused the death.

According to reports, Koran, the 13-year-old boy and a 34-year-old adult had returned at about midnight

(Friday) from raccoon hunting to the home of Koran's aunt and uncle, Charles and Audrey (Koran) Fieldson on Johnson Run Road.

While the man was putting the dogs away, the boys heard a noise in the woods. Koran reportedly took a revolver into the woods by himself to check on the noise while the other boy stayed behind with a rifle.

Capt. Arnold Van Horn of the Guernsey County Sheriff's Depart-

ment said the 13-year-old told authorities he was trying to get the safety off on the rifle when it fired. The boy reportedly didn't know Koran had been shot until he returned with a chest wound.

When deputies arrived, the only weapon found at the scene was a .22 caliber revolver and an autopsy confirmed Koran was shot with a .22 caliber weapon. But in laboratory examinations, it was determined the revolver wasn't used in the shooting after experts compared the slug removed from the body with the gun. Deputies returned and were given the second gun, a Daisy rifle, which experts at the Bureau of Criminal Investigation in London, Ohio, confirmed as the gun which fired the shot.

Guernsey County Sheriff James "Peanut" Carpenter said that when all reports were in, the file would be forwarded to Guernsey County prosecutor C. Keith Plummer for review.

JOHN A. KORAN died when his car went off the right side of the road in the 700 block of Cross Street, sheared off a utility pole and landed with the driver's side against a tree. A passenger, Michael Allen, was taken to Guernsey Memorial Hospital in Cambridge, where he was listed in guarded condition.

Emergency personnel worked on Koran at the scene, with a LifeFlight helicopter standing by in a field at Newcomerstown High School to transport him to Grant Hospital in Columbus. However, medical personnel pronounced him dead at the scene before he could be transported.

Authorities were still investigating the accident.

In addition to their parents, the two brothers are survived by a sister, Cheryl R. Koran, of Guernsey R.D. 1; maternal grandparents, John and Delores Mackie of Belle Valley; an aunt and uncle, Charles and Audrey (Koran) Fieldson, Guernsey R.D. 1; and several other aunts, uncles and cousins. Their paternal grandparents, Andrew and Mary (Stos) Koran, are deceased.


