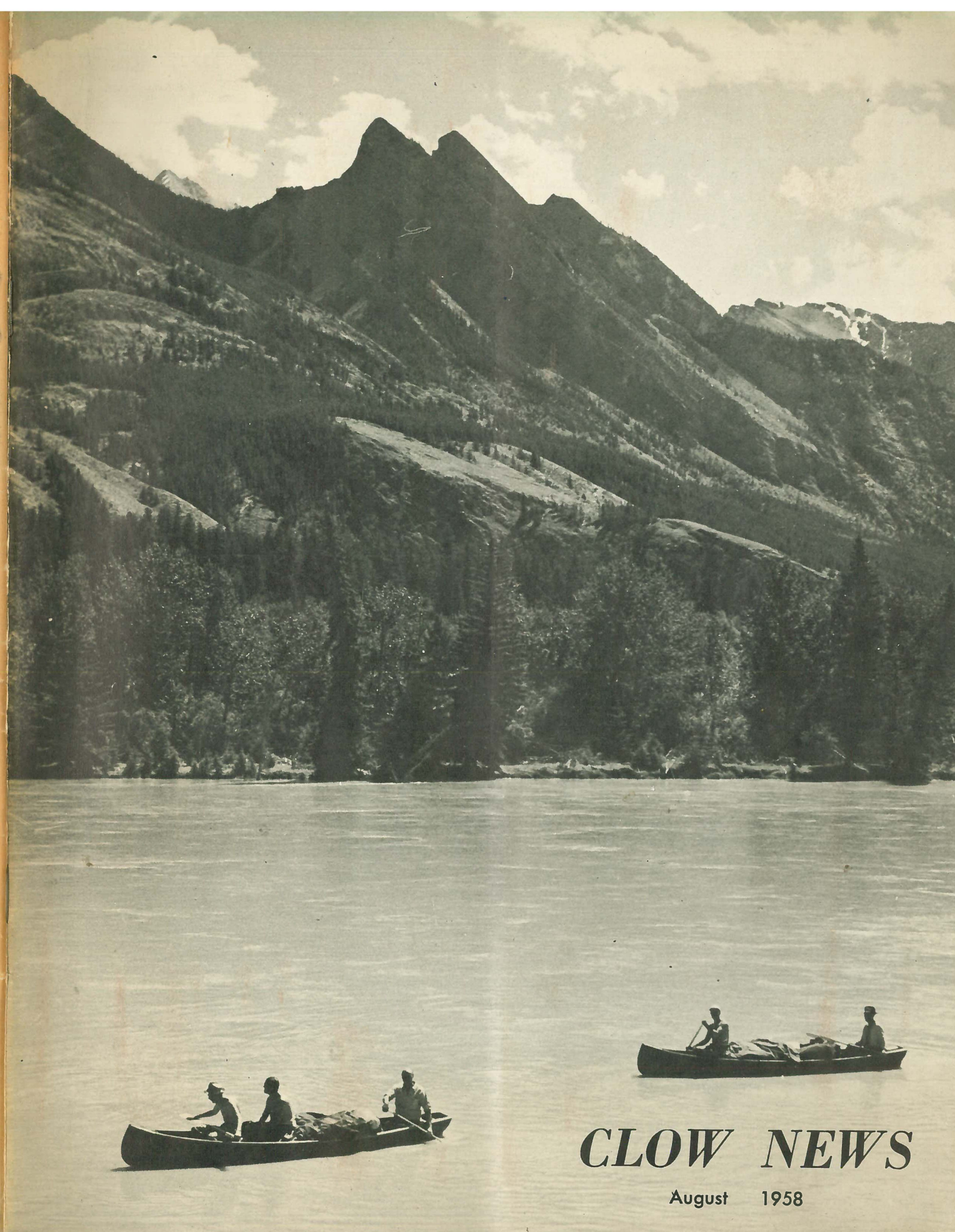

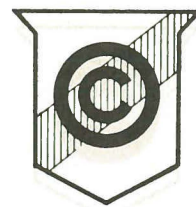

The President's Page

We have reached the halfway mark for the year 1958 and along with a lot of other companies, we find it a good time to pause a bit and take a look-see at "How we're doin'!" I'm sure you would like to know, too, so here are some of the "vital statistics" on James B. Clow & Sons.

For years and years, one of the important yardsticks measuring the progress of a company has been a comparison of total sales of one year to the corresponding period of another year. Well, so far this year (the first 6 months of 1958) we have sold 8.8% less products (measured in dollars) than we did in the first 6 months of 1957. When one stops and thinks that during the same period the output of the giant steel industry declined 40% we have not done too badly! Housing starts (the number of new houses or homes that have been started) increased in May to a rate of one million per year. This is very encouraging and, with credit made more easily available, should mean a decided pickup in our orders during the remainder of 1958.

As might be expected in times of declining sales, we find an increase in costs and a further reduction in our profits because of intense price competition from other manufacturers in our industry. Because our competitors are just as hungry for orders as we are - some indeed seem desperate, judging by the prices at which they offer their goods - our profit, before taxes, is 17% less than last year.

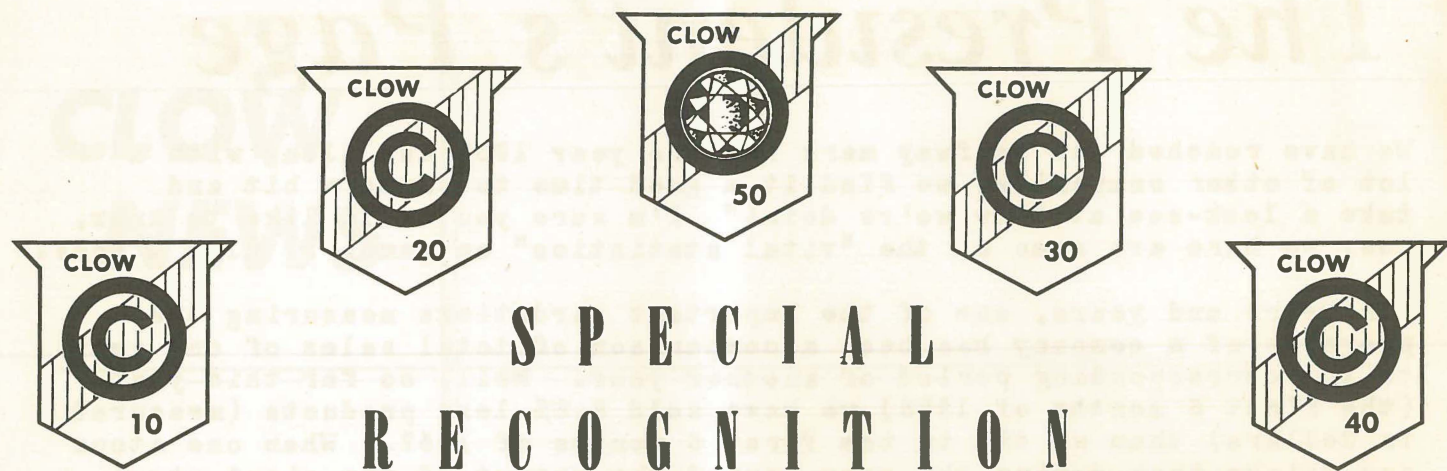

" Iowa " " less " 1957 " 362,000.00

What does it mean? Well, I feel that the decline in sales and profits has, to borrow a newspaper phrase, leveled out. At least each succeeding month seems to be a little better. The demand for our products has picked up; there are more inquiries; more jobs to bid on. With more people able to buy our products our industry should get more orders. With more orders at better prices we can better meet our increased costs and by so doing improve our profit picture. The economists and forecasters in our industry feel that we are now on the upturn - not sharply so but slowly rising, a little better in 1959, better still in 1960, and most favorable conditions from 1962 through 1970.

I am confident that by working together in the way we always have - we, the Clow gang - sales, production, hourly paid and salaried - can and will, in the trying months ahead, bring success to our efforts out of whatever job might be ours to do.

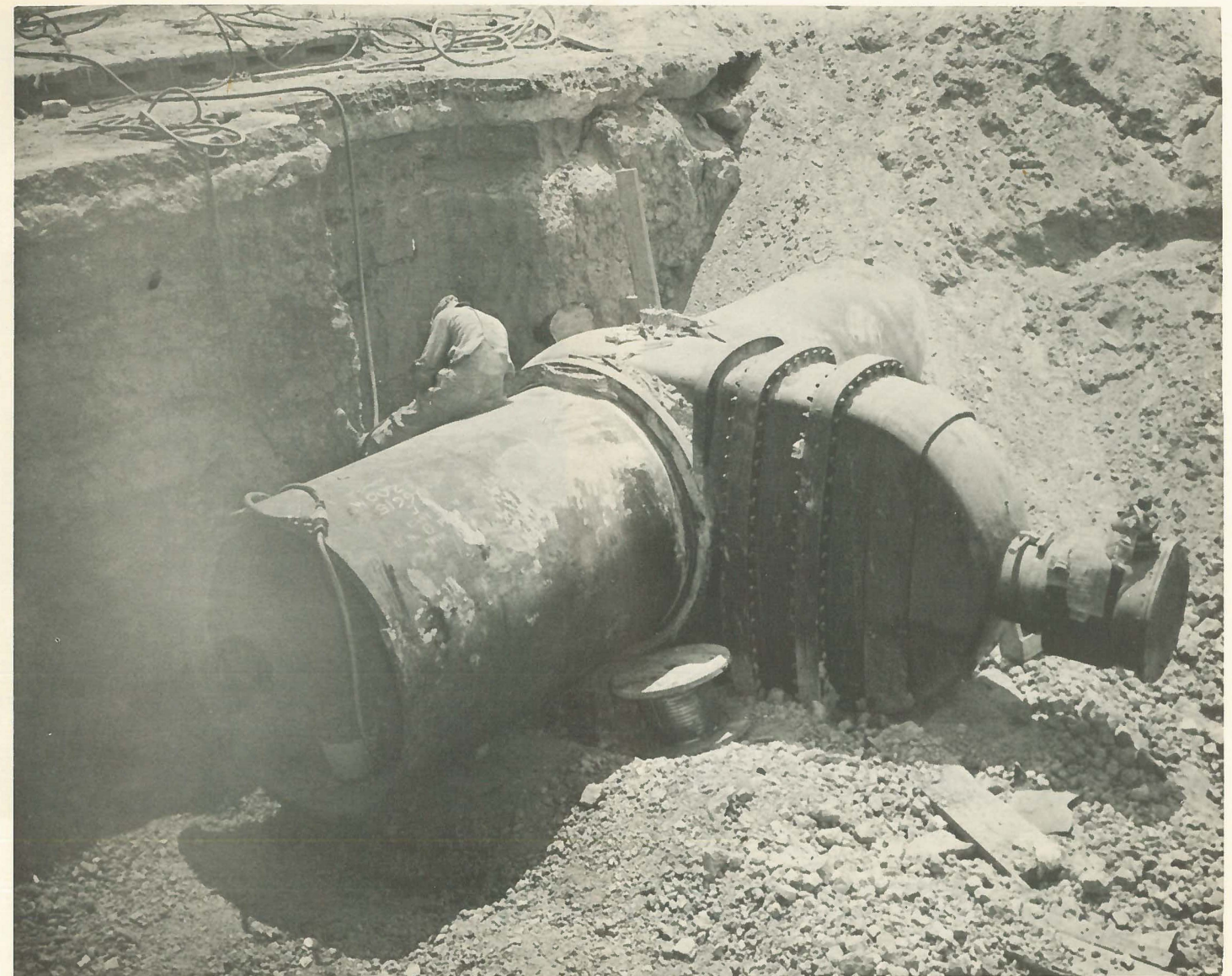

PLANT OCCUPIES NEW OFFICES

Also pictured above is WALTER LOEW, Assistant Works Manager and Works Engineer. Both photos show the general appearance of the office which is already well organized for business.

In the plant itself, construction moves ahead impatiently. From the photos on the opposite page it can be seen that pouring of concrete bases for pipe rail supports and tar tank construction moves ahead full steam, as the final major project in the construction phase of building the plant.

At the same time further progress has been made in running electrical, plumbing and other service lines. The air compressor and motor generator set has been checked out. Core floor equipment is in position, and the Dielectric baking oven has been tested out. Casting Machine Controls are being wired in. The cupola is lined, and as further tangible evidence that casting pipe is not too far away, the plant has received its first rail shipments of pig and scrap iron.

FARRELL SCOTT vacationed at Colorado Springs where he visited with his daughter who resides there.

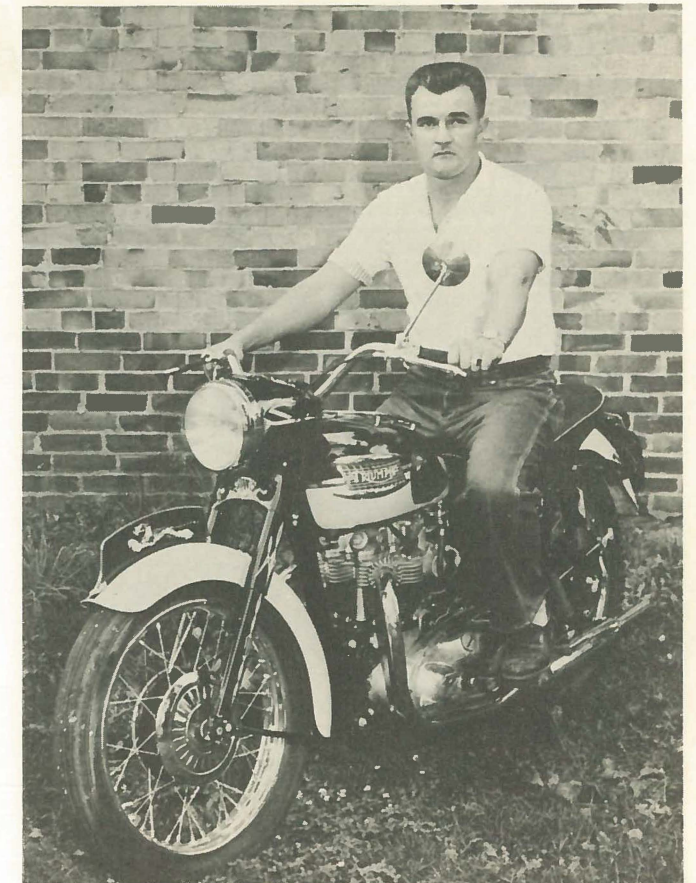

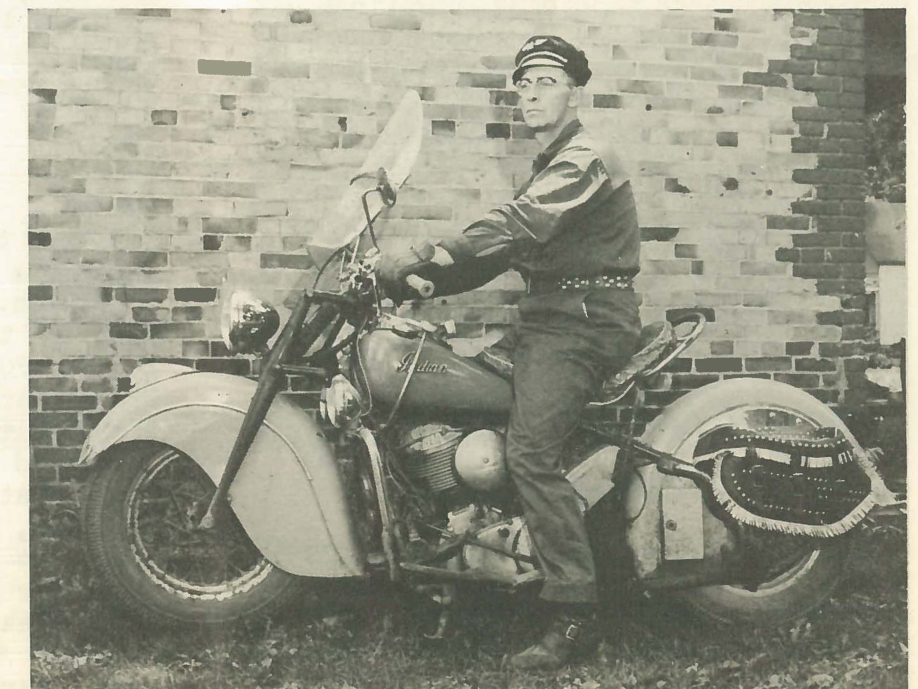

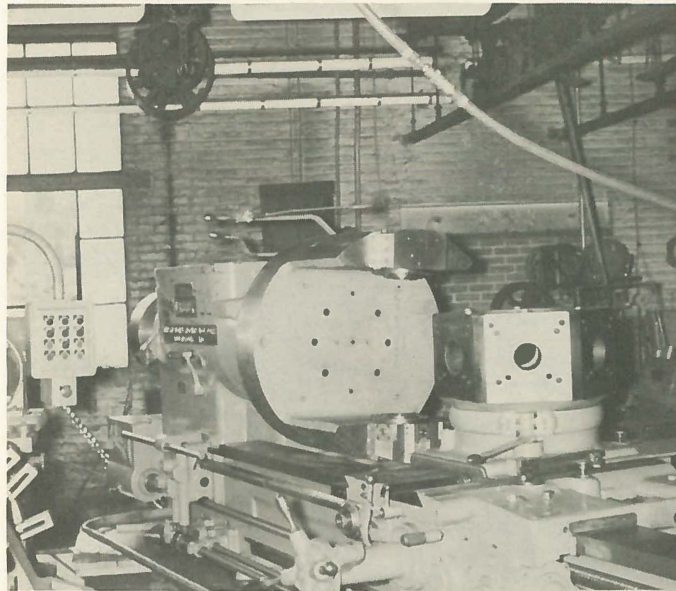

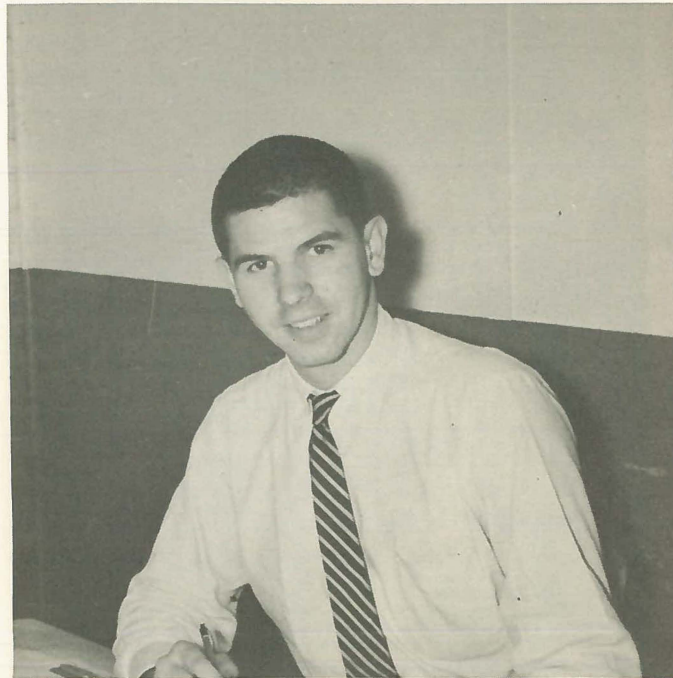
WHATS NEW IN DESIGN

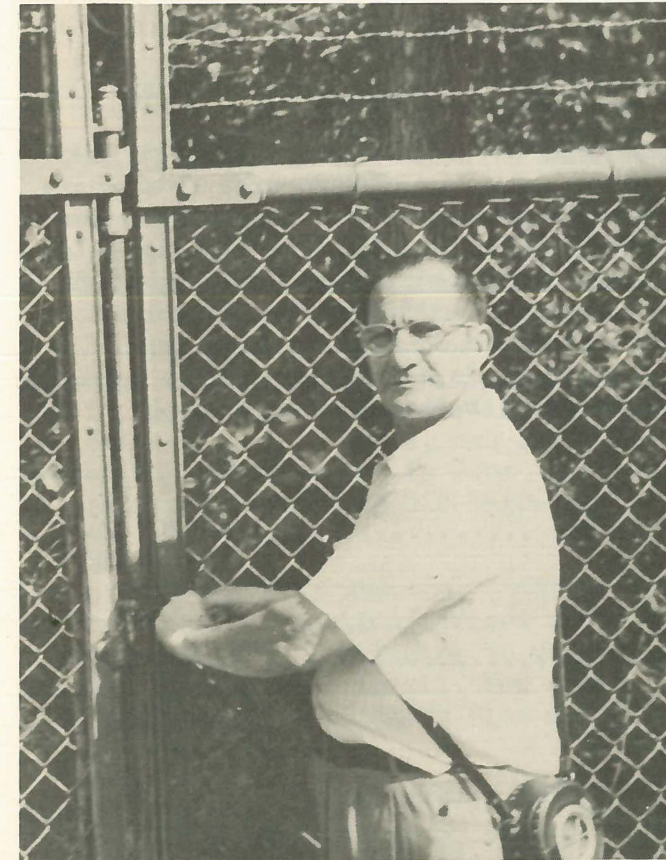
SERVICE PIN AWARD

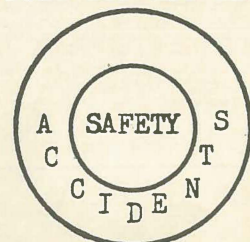

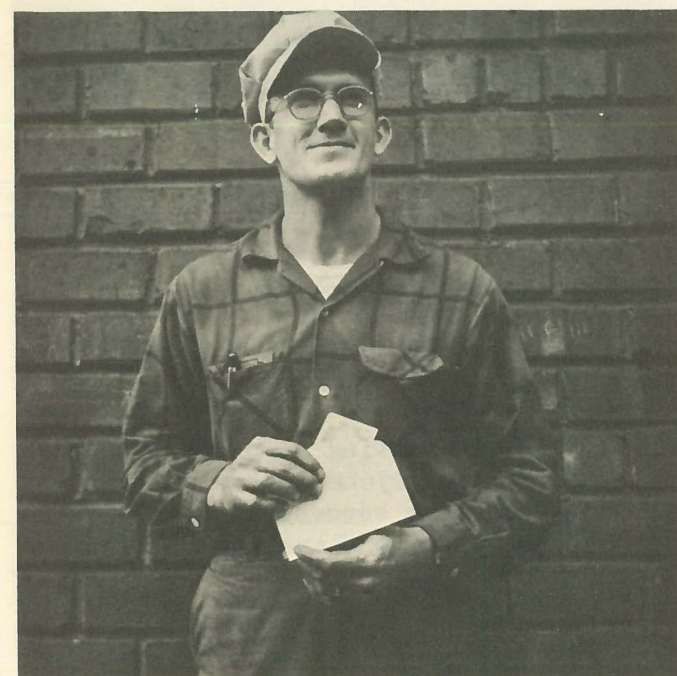

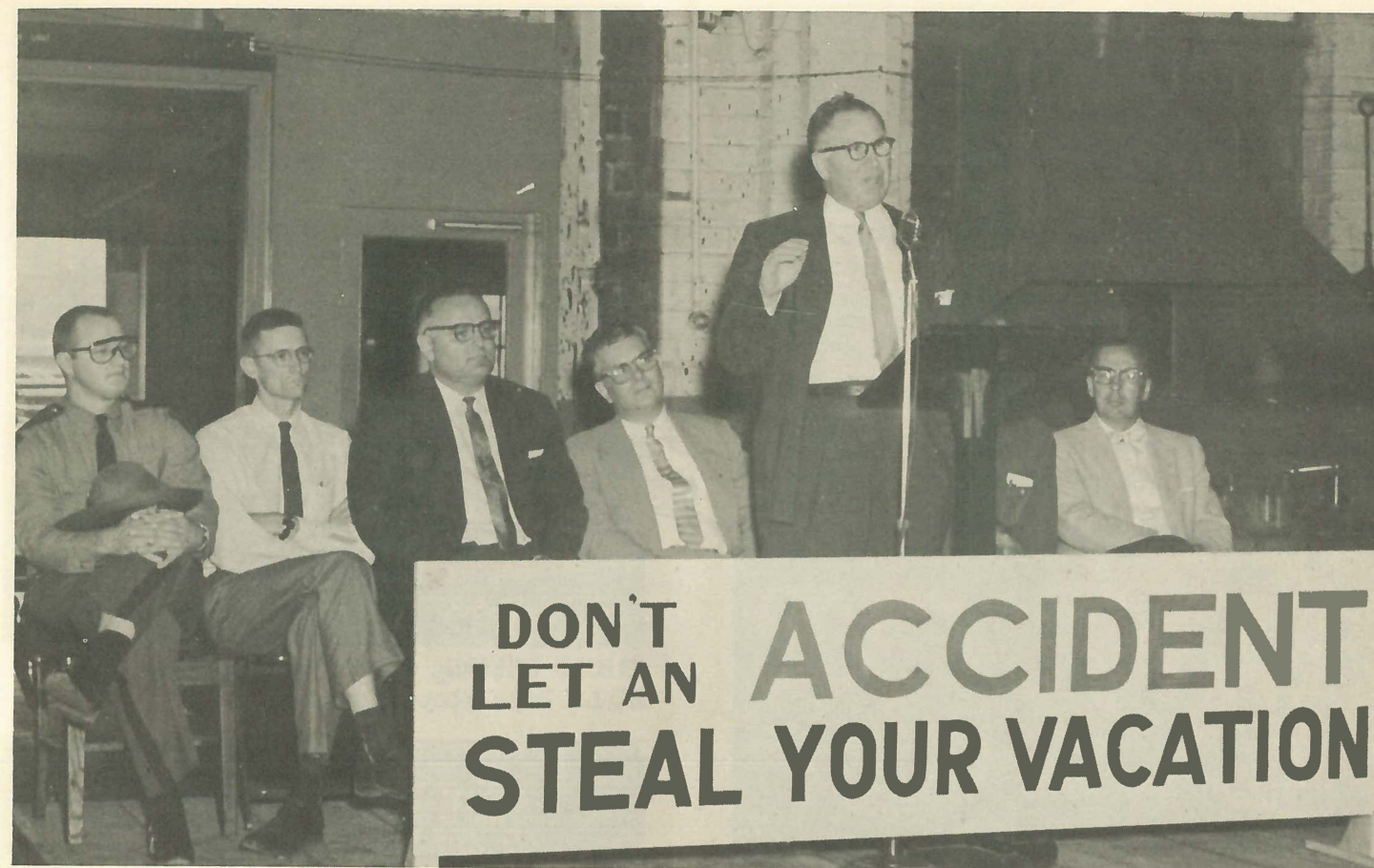

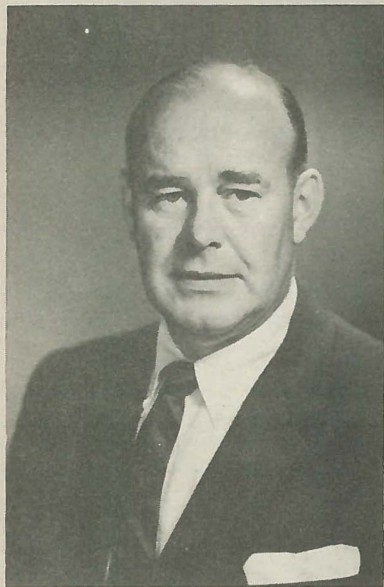

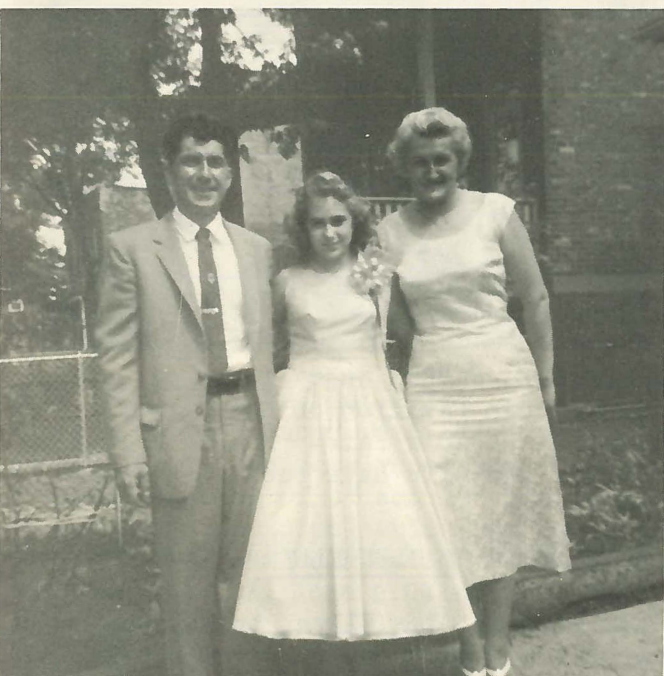
GERRY became General Manager of the Jobbing Division in January, 1953.

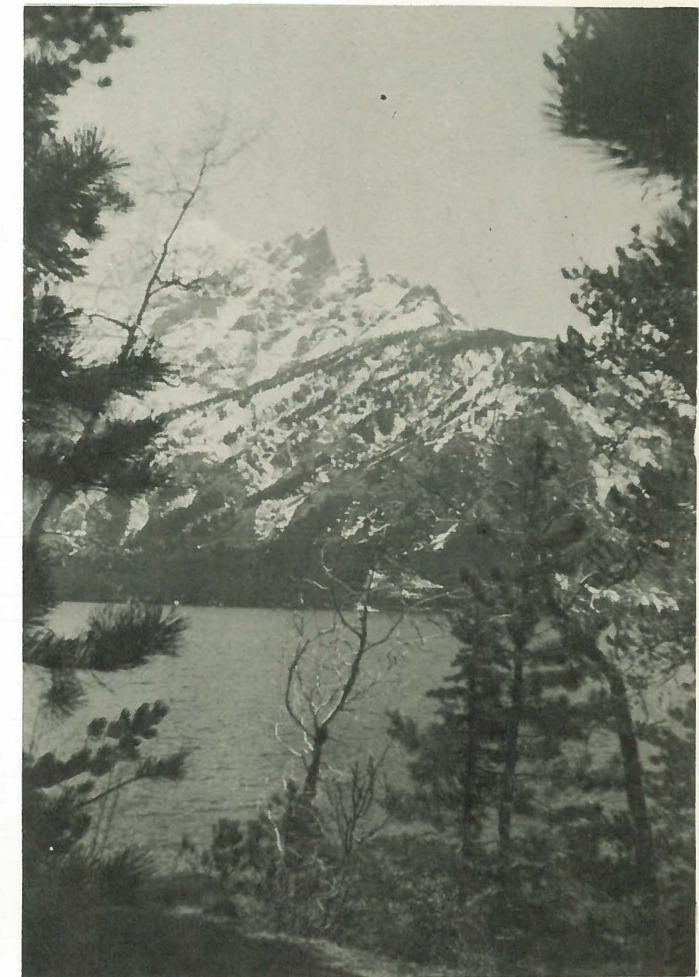
