

Explanatory Notes for this folder:

The Draft Poster is dated November 25, 1863. Many of the names on the poster appear in Joseph Fletcher's day books for the period when he was in the War.

The clipping itself is unsourced and undated, however the letter to Jacob is dated May 29, 1863, and is from Murfreesboro, TN. Abel Peoples was married to Jemima Meek, daughter of Joshua Meek and granddaughter of Jacob Meek. Jacob Meek was the father of Jemima Meek Beal (Auntie Beal) and Elizabeth Meek Wolfe as well as Joshua, Aaron, and others. He was a Methodist minister. He and his wife are buried in Wesley Chapel Cemetery, Washington Twp, Tuscarawas Co, Ohio.

Looking For a Fight Soon

Interesting Letter from Union Soldier Who
Never Came Back. "Cheering
News From Grant."

The following letter from a soldier in the trenches at Murfreesboro, Tenn., has been an heirloom in the Meek family from the days of the Civil War. The fact that the writer who so longed to see his family and tried "to keep in good spirits until the war was over" died without ever getting to see his loved ones, and was buried at Murfreesboro, adds pathos to the letter. The writer was the husband of

Jemima Peoples of this city. The letter was written to the Rev. Jacob Meek one of the most popular of Tuscarawas's early pioneer preachers. —
[Editor.]

Murfreesboro, Tenn., May 29, 1863.
Dear and much respected grandfather:

After a long delay I seat myself to answer your very kind letter. I was much pleased to hear from one for whom I have so much respect. I am only in reasonable health at present. The troops are in good health, well fed and well clothed. We are under marching orders and expect a fight soon.

We are making preparations to receive wounded; are sending today for a large amount of dressings. We have very cheering news from Grant's army. I think if we succeed as well as we have, the war will soon close. We are still picking up some prisoners occasionally. This place is strongly fortified; all the rebels in the south could hardly take this place.

There has been quite a revival here among the soldiers. Between three and four hundred joined church the last week. The meetings are still going on and I believe it will make better soldiers. I think the time long to see my family, yet I try to keep in good spirits, and trust the war will soon be over.

The country through here looks quite desolate, fences and houses burned and farms thrown out to the commons and growing up with weeds; the wheat here is heading and the clover is in blossom, cherries and mulberries are getting ripe. Some corn in the lots about town is knee high.

I believe I have written all the particulars at present.

I. As complaints have been made that errors have occurred in the enrollment, by omission of persons whose names should have been enrolled, and by the addition of names of persons who ought not to be enrolled, this public notice is given, for the purpose of correcting the lists and that any person enrolled may appear before the Board and claim to have his name stricken off the list, if he can show to the satisfaction of the Board that he is not, and will not be at the time fixed for next day, made to military duty on account of

- 1st. Alienage.
- 2d. Non-Residence.
- 3d. Unsuitableness of Age.
- 4th. MANIFEST PERMANENT Physical Disability.

II. Persons who may know of any other persons liable to military duty, whose names do not appear above, residing in this sub-district, are requested to notify the Board of Enrollment, that their names may be enrolled.

III. The Board of Enrollment will hear cases as provided in paragraph I, at Newark, Ohio, until the 20th of December, 1863, after which no cases will be heard.

Explanatory Notes for this folder:

Joseph Fletcher was a record keeper. He kept six day books with numerous daily entries about a variety of subjects that give a lot of insight about his own, his family life, and the community life of the times. He mentions his relatives and neighbors, schools, churches, temperance groups, travels, political groups and many other contemporary items of interest.

Books 4 & 5 detail many of the activities and personnel of Co E, 142nd Regt, Ohio Voluntary Infantry during the Civil War, in 1864. He was 1st Sergeant for this Company and his aptitude for record keeping is apparent.

Transcribed in the early 1990's by Eleanor Fletcher (Mrs. Roy David Fletcher) and Alice Fletcher Little and in 1996 and 2002 by John C. Little

Book #1 Daily entries and notations (The book also contains many apparently random numerical notations and calculations that have not been transcribed.)

INTRODUCTORY NOTES: At the time this was written, Joseph was 28-29 years old and a recent widower. He married Violet Mitchell, of Birds Run, Wheeling Township, Guernsey County, March 18, 1851. Her parents were George and Margaret Mitchell. Joseph and Violet had a son, George M., born April 22, 1852. Violet died June 3, 1852 and the baby died August 13, 1852. They are buried in Forney Cemetery, Birds Run. Other family members mentioned are Henry and Elizabeth (Liz) Wolf, his sister and brother-in-law who were married in November of 1852; Susan, his sister who married George Current in 1843; Lewis is a brother; Mrs. Halsey is his father's sister, Nancy; G. Aunspaugh is Gideon, who married his first cousin, Mary, Aunt Halsey's daughter; A. Walker may be the son of his Aunt Nancy by her third husband, William Walker, hence his first cousin also. Later, in 1866, his brother David would marry another Wolf, Jemima.

It is not known for sure where Joseph lived at the time he recorded these events in his day books. His widowed mother, Catharine Trimmer Fletcher lived on the family farm with his younger brothers, Lewis, David, Adam and Samuel. His sisters were married. His mother apparently kept boarders for additional income. Some of these were working on the railroad as the line was being laid through the family farm. Joseph, as the oldest son, was probably responsible for running the family farm. Uncle Joe did not build his own house on the east half of the farm until he returned from the Civil War, several years after the events cited in this record.

INTRODUCTORY NOTE: An attempt has been to transcribe the day book as Joseph Fletcher wrote it. Grammar, spelling, capitalization and punctuation are variable. Commas have been added in order to separate phrases for easier reading.

The entries start from both ends of the book. Starting from one end, there are miscellaneous entries with the earliest entries dating from September 23, 1853 to October 16, 1853 that describe his trip to Illinois. When the book is inverted, the daily entries start with February 14, 1854 after a number of pages of miscellaneous notations.

172d REGIMENT—NATIONAL GUARD.

THIS regiment, brought out by the hundred days' call, did not leave the State. It was sent from Columbus to Gallipolis, Ohio, with a strength of eight hundred and fifty-four, rank and file, and performed guard-duty at that important depot of Government stores during the whole of its service.

On several occasions the enemy made demonstrations on Gallipolis, but never ventured near enough to involve an engagement.

This claim was submitted for special investigation "to determine whether the claimant has been disabled since discharge by rupture incurred in service. Investigation is deemed necessary as to origin only"

The special notice was duly served upon the claimant, and he was advised of his privileges in the premises.

Claimant's statement was taken in which he states that he was ruptured about May 15/64 at Gallipolis Ohio while lifting in building Co. quarters of poles, that he had no medical treatment in the service, and only two men, Orderly Sergt John Adair, now dead, and William Seal saw the rupture in the service, and he does not know that any one else

knew of it there: George Kimble saw it the day after his return from the army: Dr. Brown, now dead, saw it and helped put it in place about five years, has had no other medical treatment for it: has been able to do considerable light work since discharge, but not heavy and lifting work. Reputation Fair

Brief

Geo. Kimble P.O. Wilneroville O. testifies to prior soundness: saw rupture, thinks some day clmt came home: clmt has been unfit to do heavy work since discharge. Reputation Fair

Wm. Beal (Comrade) P.O. Wilneroville O. testifies to prior soundness: states in May 1864 at Gallipolis O. clmt was ruptured while lifting in building Co. quarters of poles, witness was lifting with him, saw rupture a few days after it was incurred, saw it again time clmt made application for pension, was then much larger, thinks he was 1/2 disabled for heavy work, light work not so much. Reputation Good

Wm. J. Burnworth (Com) P.O. Wilneroville O. thinks clmt was sound at enlistment, did not see rupture in service and not till ten

or twelve years ago, Capt. Allen told him it was incurred at Gallipoli O. while building Co. quarters. Reputation Good.

John Neel (Com.) P.O. Milnersville O. testifies to prior soundness: did not know in the service of Capt. Allen being ruptured, but heard of it from Capt. Allen and neighbors soon after discharge, and saw it within a few years, and Capt. Allen has always told him that it was incurred at Gallipoli O. in building Co. quarters, and witness has no reason to doubt it: thinks his disability has been 1/2.

Reputation Good.

Capt. Allen's final statement was taken in which he says that there are no witnesses to be examined elsewhere: that Capt. Allen has no complaint to make as to the manner and fairness of the examination; and that he has no more testimony to introduce.

From the circumstances of the case the above is the best evidence Capt. Allen can furnish as to the origin and continuance of his alleged disability. We do not think it necessary, nor do I, to take the deposition of Lieut. Bell, as he evidently knows nothing as to the origin of the

disability. I am satisfied from my examination of the case that the club was ruptured as alleged, and I would place his disability at $\frac{1}{4}$ up to the time of the examination by the Board at New Philadelphia, since then at $\frac{1}{2}$.

Madam:

The first section of the Act of Congress, approved by the President September 8, 1916, reads as follows:

" * * * That from and after the passage of this Act the rate of pension for a widow, now on the roll or hereafter to be placed on the pension roll and entitled to receive a less rate than hereinafter provided, who was the lawful wife of any officer or enlisted man in the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States, during the period of his service in the Civil War, shall be twenty dollars per month, and the rate of pension for a widow of an officer or enlisted man of the Army, Navy or Marine Corps of the United States who served in the Civil War, the War with Mexico, or the War of 1812, now on the roll or hereafter to be placed on the pension roll and entitled to receive a less rate than hereafter provided, who has reached or shall hereafter reach the age of seventy years, shall be twenty dollars per month; * * * "

If you are pensioned as the widow of a soldier, sailor, or marine, who served in the Civil War, the War with Mexico, or the War of 1812, and if you have reached the age of seventy years, you should fill out the blank on the back of this communication and return same to the Commissioner of Pensions, Washington, D. C., being careful to state correctly your pension certificate number, the name and service of the soldier, sailor, or marine, the exact date of your birth, the place of your birth, your name as it appears in your pension certificate, and your present postoffice address in full.

If the evidence in your pension case shows that you are entitled to the increase of pension provided by this legislation, the Bureau will, as soon as possible, grant the increase. If further evidence be necessary, a call for same will issue.

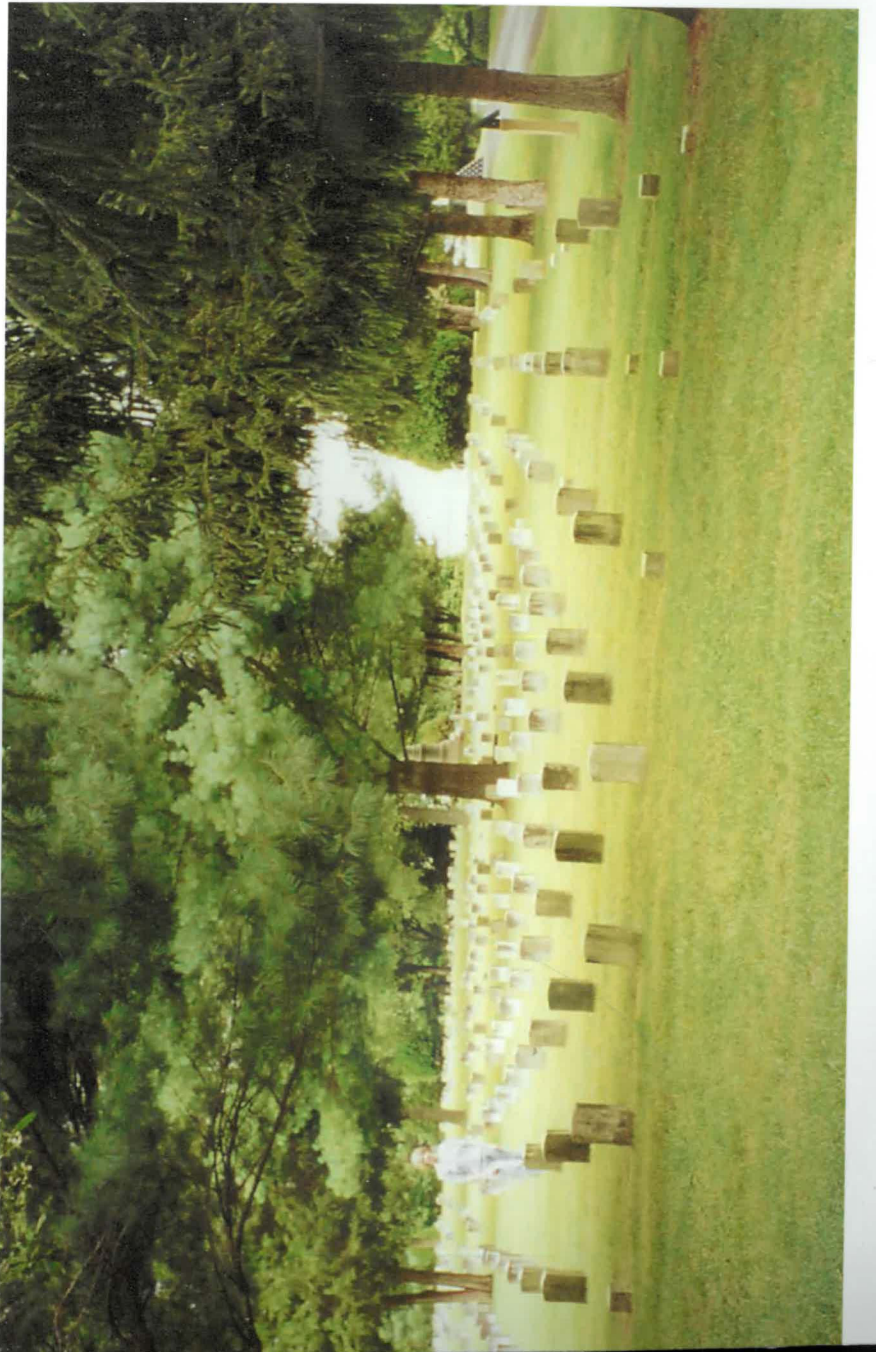

As the good news came just now that we are now able to send letters. I hasten with my pay roll to write you a few lines to give you a history of our Campaign. We battled at Blue Springs the 5th of May. 11 o'clock A.M. We took possession of Summit Hill. The 8th commenced shelling the enemy on Rocky face hill. Continued skirmishing till the 15th. The enemy left their position the night of the 15th. We pursued about 14 miles on the 15th of which we went through Dalton. Camped on the road. 14th in line of battle still pursuing the enemy. 11 o'clock A.M. fighting commenced about 6¹/₂ o'clock P.M. The enemy made an effort to flank us but were driven back with heavy loss of which fighting ceased. Monday morning we were in pursuit of our front. at 10 o'clock P.M. we camped 2¹/₂ miles north of Calhoun Ga. Came through before there we crossed a river of which the bridge was burned. 17th Some skirmishing ahead. 10 o'clock A.M. lagging in Calhoun Ga. We are now close Cassville Ga. We have a nice line of marching through the brush. I will not undertake to give you a full history of it for time will not permit.

I must change my subject. I received a letter from Jennina this morning it pleased me to hear from home once more. Well Willie Turner just came and told me if I wanted to send this to him. I want you all to keep writing as I can receive letters at all times. we cannot send any more after that for so long. Tell Lebbie wolf. I have not got time to write her today. I thought I would write you small family letter today. I will tell you the only fault I have to soldiering, and that is all which

Dear Uncle

When I wrote you last
it was at Cassville, the report was that
that we could not send any more
letters for so days so I wrote a family
letter, I was hurried so that I did
not get to write as much as I wanted
to. but it was all a humbug, for I
wrote one or 2 the next day which
was on Sunday we laid there in the
woods till Monday about 11 o'clock.

Then some of them drawd Shoes
& Socks. Then we started in pur-
suit of the enemy. It was very warm
& dusty. And I had not had a good
appetite for a day or so, and I was getting
weak. My appetite was poor, all along
the march, and I was still growing
weaker, but still I packed my load.

We marched that afternoon the next day & the next day, all three days we would march till about 11 o'clock at night. The second night we had to march on the Mt. & it rained on but it just poured it ~~off~~ down and it was that dark we could not see our hands 1 inch before us. We marched that was about 1 hour & a half I reckon. The next night reached Artona Mt. which was the 25th of May. And the 27th we was marched out on the second line.

And at 9 o'clock P.M. we relieved the front line. I will not give you much about the fighting, for you get the news of all the fighting, which is generally good. Wash Bradshaw was killed the 27th about 8 o'clock P.M. he was laying about 5 feet from a large log, laying on his back with his

head on his knapsack and hands locked across his forehead, the piece hit him and cut off his two fore fingers knocked the top of his head off for the day. I did not see ^{him} I think he lived about ten minutes. He could talk some. David Wolfe laid with his legs against wash and I laid next to Dave. My appetite was still poor and I grew weaker, but still I followed the Regiment where they would relieve each other, kept it up till the morning of the 5th of June. When it was reported that the Rebels left that night. I was taken to the Division Hospital that morning. Colonel Melain returned to his command at 8 o'clock the 31st of May. And several other boys. John had not come yet while I was with the Regiment we ~~understood~~ understood that he was exchanged.

Jack Hostetter was shot through
the head while he was cooking dinner,
the 29th of May. He was Sergeant
at Co. F. We moved the Hospital
the 6th and I was in one of the
Government wagons from day light
till way after night which made me
very sore, and I felt pretty bad.

The next day they fixed up their
Hospital and I soon got some better.
Our Hospital was right close the
Railroad. The Trains soon got to
running through to our army.
I had the Diarrhea pretty bad. We re-
mained here till the 16th, then we was
put on board of old dirty Stock Cars
about 11 o'clock at night all but what
was able to go to their regiments.
It was awful rough riding, made us
all as sore as could be. we arrived at
Chattanooga Friday night we laid at
the rest of the night. Saturday I was
sent to Convalescent Camp, I could not
stand it there.

Sunday evening I was sent to
his Hospital. My Diareah is about
well now. Our Lieutenant has not
got my descriptive Roll yet and
I can not draw pay till they get
it and I dont think there is any pros-
pect of getting it either. I have
not heard from the Company since
I left it. You need not write
me till I write again for they think
they will send us to Nashville. but
I dont know where they will send
me. I wish to go well and
with the Regiment. I feel pretty
well orll & I feel were not
weak I did not beat very much
for it was not good for my diareah

As it is getting late I must
bring my letter to a close. Give you
selves no uneasiness about me
for I am getting along fine.

Give my love to all.

I thought I would seat
myself to let you know how I am getting along
I am at the Hospital at Nashville,
and I feel about as bad as I did there at
Chattanooga. The reason of it is I had
to ride from Chattanooga here on an
old Box Car, the distance being 130 mi.
and nearly every Soldier say it is the long-
est they ever rode on. We arrived
yesterday about half past 10 o'clock a.m.

send me \$5. or in answer to this Let-
ter, tell him I would send to Miller
for it, but I dont know where he is, nor
havent known since they left their homes.
Money would be a great help to a sick
fellow, or any person that does not feel
well. now if I had money I could have milk

for my dinner in the place of poor water,
and could have milk for my supper in
the place of their sweetened coffee, of which
good for my complaint (with ^{is not} sweetened eggs)
Would you send it, and \$1.00 worth of postage
stamps. ^{and} keep an account of it, and I will make
it all right with you if God permits me to
return home to those which are dear to me.

I understood he was drafted in Oxford T. P.
