

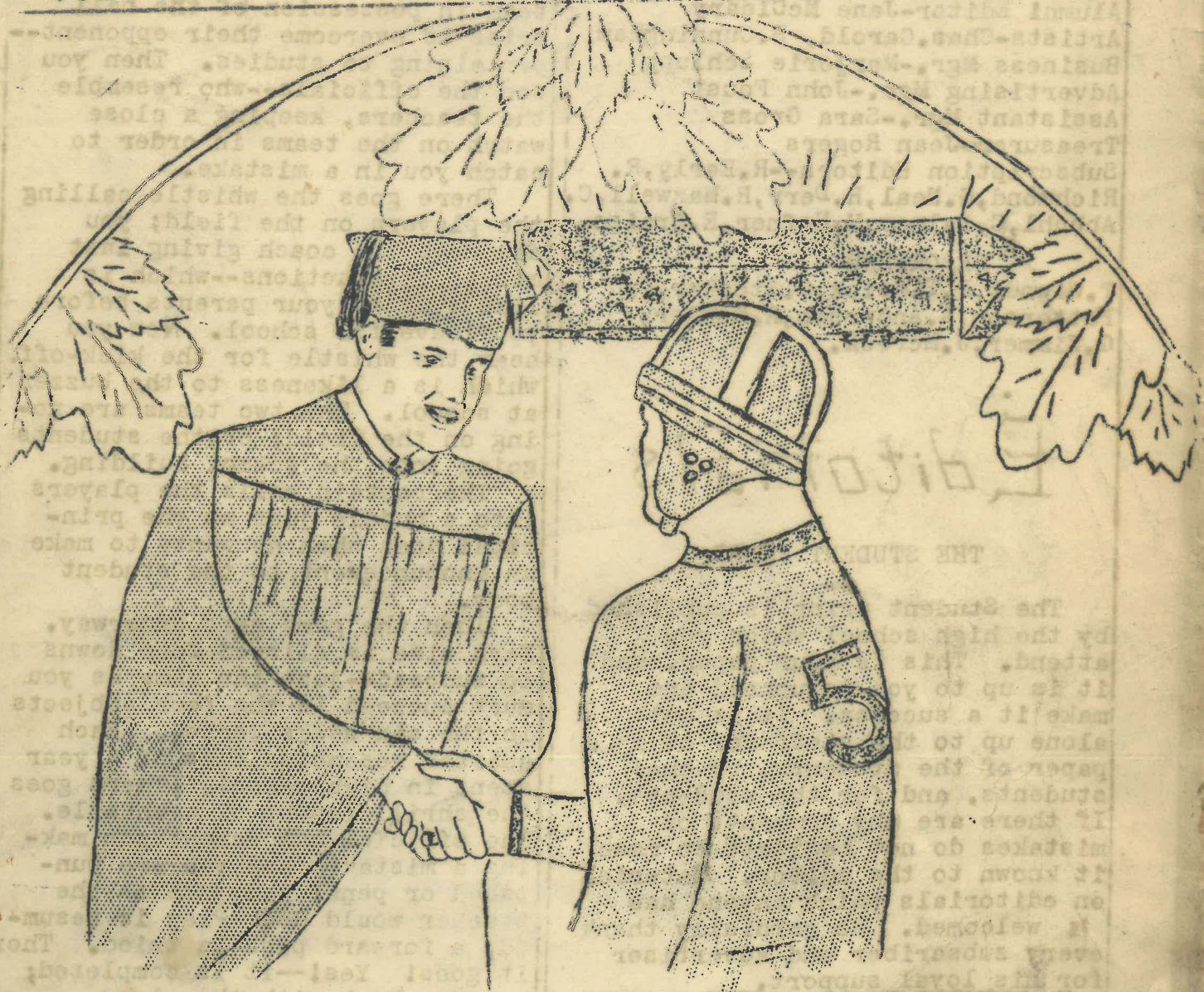

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COMPARING HIGH SCHOOL TO A FOOTBALL GAME

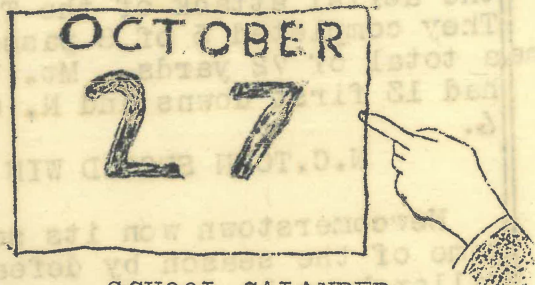

Newcomerstown's first homecoming football game in the history of the High School will be held October 27, when Carrollton comes to Newcomerstown. This game should make history in the records of our high school.

Not only do we expect a record breaking crowd but a victory for our team. The faculty committee for homecoming are Mr. Cliffton, Miss Macmillan and Miss Swigert. They are doing everything in their power to make this event a success and the student body should be 100% back of them.

Homecoming tags for admittance to the game will be sold to all students, (Junior and Senior High) for 10¢. With such a low cost the student body should respond 100% at the game. If the student body is well represented, we cannot see how the team can do anything but win. The student body will meet at the High School at 1:45 P.M. and march to the Athletic field at 2:00 P.M.

The committee has sent a post card to each graduate of the high school announcing the fact that we are having a homecoming game and we are sure that they will respond by attending the game. At the game the alumni will see many they have not seen since their school days and will talk over old times.

Our high school enrollment in 1922 was 128, now it is 376, an increase of 248 students. We want to impress this fact upon the alumni by having a large attendance at the game. So until October 27, let our motto be, "100% ATTENDANCE AT THE HOME-COMING GAME."



TROJANS LOSE TO DOVER



Newcomerstown High School opened their 1934 football season by losing to Dover 26-0 on Sept. 15. Although on the losing end, the Trojans demonstrated they have a flashy running backfield and a fighting line.

The game was very slow, both teams suffering from frequent penalties. Dover made most of their gains through the center of the line. Palmer and Swinderman scored the touchdowns for Dover.

Capt. Gadd playing right tackle was the star lineman of the game. Koker and Dansby were a pair of backs hard to stop. Ask Dover.

TROJANS TROUNCE CALDWELL

The Trojans won their first win in two starts and ended a Caldwell ten-game winning streak Saturday, Oct. 21 by defeating Caldwell 18-6.

Outplaying Caldwell in every department the Trojans showed great form marred only by fumbles.

Halfback Neff was the star of the afternoon. He scored Newcomerstown's first touchdown with a 54 yard run around his right end. Coker, Dansby and Neff carried the ball to the 2 yard line where Coutsbucked the line for the second touchdown.

Neff's second long run came when he intercepted a Caldwell pass to run 46 yards for another touchdown. Caldwell's only score came in the first quarter as result of a N. C. Town fumble.

Another feature of the game was the punting of Sidney Jones. He averaged 53 yards on two punts. Gadd, Derr and McCall were the outstanding lineman.

MT. VERNON DEFEATS TROJANS

Lacking scoring punch, the Trojans were defeated by Mount Vernon 13-0. Mr. Vernon was the more powerful on offense. They scored their first touchdown on a drive from the 35 yard line. Amicon converted with a place kick. The second touchdown came as Bennington circled his right end to score after gaining on passes.

A good point of the game was the aerial attack of the Trojans. They completed 5 of 8 passes for a total of 72 yards. Mt. Vernon had 13 first downs and N. C. Town. 6.

N.C. TOWN SECOND WIN

Newcomerstown won its second game of the season by defeating Millersburg 14-0. The Trojans were masters of the ceremony all through the game. Their first touchdown came when a pass to McCall put the ball in scoring position and Coutspunched it over. The second came when Koker, fullback, kept the ball hid after a fake and raced 32 yards to score standing up. The Trojans again put forth a classy aerial attack. Completing 4 out of 5 passes. The ball was kept in Millerburg territory most of the game by the amazing punting of Sidney Jones. Capt. Gadd, Derr and McCall again were the stalwarts of the line.

TROJANS DEFEATED BY DENNISON

The Trojans journeyed to Denn. Friday afternoon where they were defeated 24-0. After making a good start and marching to the six-yard line, but to have fumble prevent a touchdown, the Trojans were humbled by Dennison. The Dennison touchdowns came as result of intercepting 3 passes. Dennison's first victory of the year.

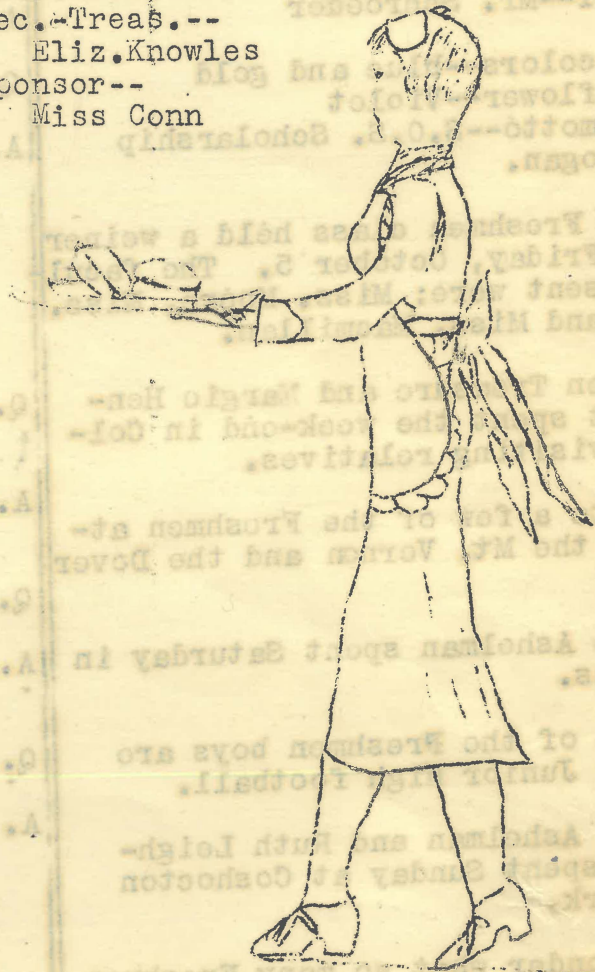

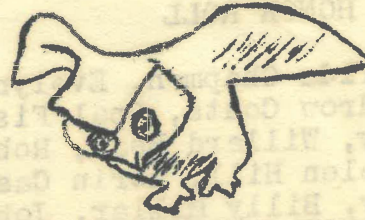

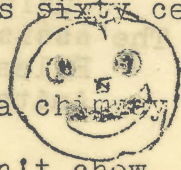
