A fee of \$2 may be paid for consulatation but it is not necessary if the the patient is not able to pay, Dr. Smith said.

Women Want More Responsibility

They're Seen Seeking Bigger Say on Policy-Making Levels

WASHINGTON-(NEA)-Civic-minded women are becoming miffed at the idea that the only thing they can do is raise money.

They're also anxious to do more than attend card parties, sit in on cultural programs or listen to scholarly men deliver book reviews.

That is the opinion of a top member of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs. The organization met here recently for executive sessions.

"If women are the ones who have to go out and raise money," says Judge Libby E. Sachar, "then they ought to have more say as to how it is spent,"

Mrs. Sachar is judge of the juvenile and domestic relations court of Union County, New Jersey, and chairman of the National Federation's Finance Committee.

"We want to make ourselves known in policy matters," she explains. "Women should not be dealt with in terms of sex but judged on the basis of their ability."

Agreeing with that is Miss Marguerite Rawalt, president of the BPWC and an attorney for the Internal Revenue Service. She notes that a recently approved by-law of the organization advises members who cooperate in outside civic activities to make sure they are properly recognized at the policy level.

"Women have plenty of opportunities to keep records and collect money," she says, "but there are very few of them serving as members of a board of directors."

Nineteen million women are employed in the U. S., according to Miss Rawalt. Over half of them are married and nearly half have children over 18 years.

These women don't take jobs just for the fun of it, or so they can buy expensive clothes, she stresses. In practically all cases they need the additional income to support themselves or a fam-

The National Federation's president thinks working women should not adopt masculine tactics but should rely on the feminine approach just so long as it is done in an impersonal manner.
