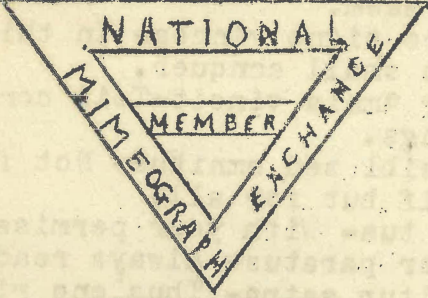

In historic Boston, Mass. the seventeenth of March has more than an Irish significance. Boston calls it Evacuation Day, recalling the momentous occasion in 1776.

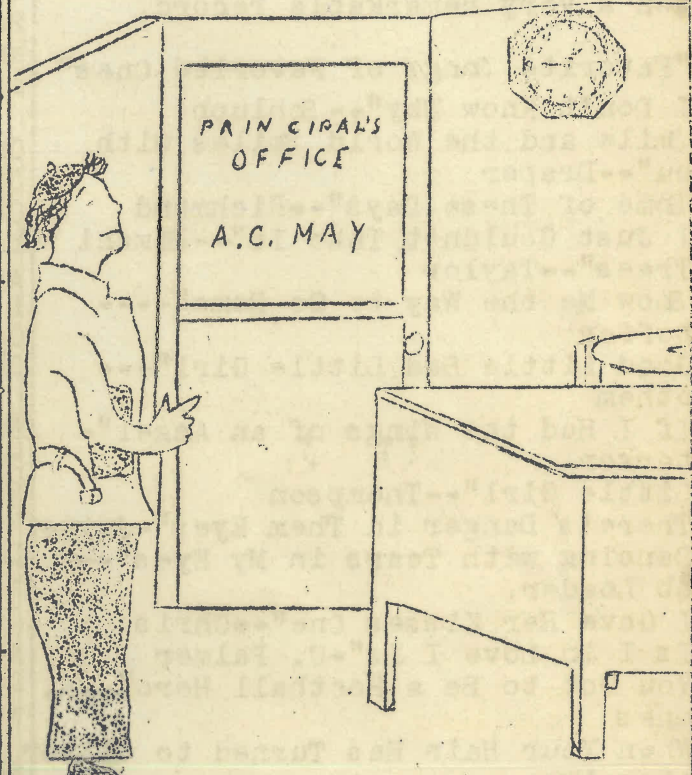


ALUMNI

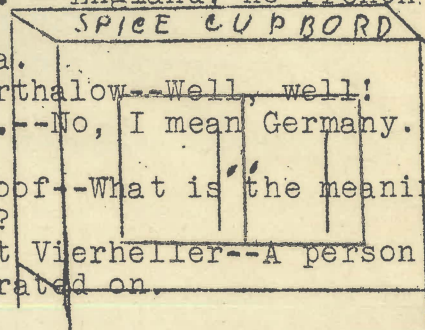
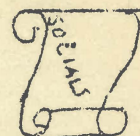
