

Obituary

Audrey Rickey Wayne of Willow Lane, Wheeling, a noted Wheeling historian, died Thursday, May 27, 1999, in Reston, Va. She was 71. She was born January 26, 1928, in Pennboro, W.Va., the daughter of the late Howard and Margaret Jameson Rickey.

She was considered the leading city genealogist and former president of the Wheeling Area Genealogical Society. She compiled and indexed more than 62 books at the Ohio County Public Library, where she was a volunteer in the Wheeling Room; an active member of the Daughters of the American Revolution, serving as registrar and as the organizer of the DAR program at the Madonna of the Trail for the yearly National Road celebration. She was organizer of the Greenwood Cemetery tour and the Oglebay Owners Tour, and was a researcher of the original land grant maps of Ohio County. She was a member of the Bethlehem United Presbyterian Church.

Surviving are her husband, Curtis N. Wayne; a daughter, Barbara E. Wayne of Sterling, Va.; two sisters, Juanita Delancey of Parkersburg, W.Va., Luella Morgan of Point Pleasant, W.Va., a grandson, William Thomas Wayne Justice of Sterling.

Friends received noon-3 and 7-9 p.m. Sunday at the Altmeyer Funeral Home, 154 Kruger St., Elm Grove, Wheeling. Services will be held at 2 p.m. Monday at the Bethlehem United Presbyterian Church, 45 Chapel Road, Wheeling, with Rev. Homer D. Harden officiating. Interment will be held at 11:30 a.m. Tuesday in the Sunset Cemetery, Parkersburg, W.Va.

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Rickey Family

The surname Rickey is believed to be associated with the English and German's, meaning, "descendant of Richard (rule, hard)." Different spellings of the surname of Rickey are Richard, Ricky, Ricks, Ricke, Rickes and Rickeys. The English spelling was Ricky and the German was Rickey. The New Jersey family are English and spelled their name Ricky when they first came to this country. This is the family from which we are descended.

This Rickey family was Presbyterian when they came to this country. They helped start numerous Presbyterian churches. There were at least six Rickey's who are descendants of Brice and John Rickey, who fought in the Revolutionary War. The Civil War soldiers by this name number in the hundreds.

The censuses which are available in the United States show that the Rickey families, which were less than ten in 1790, grew to over sixty in the state of Ohio not counting the ones in Iowa, Kentucky, Pennsylvania and many other states in the 1850 census. The number of Rickey households in the latest census has only grown to around seven hundred and fifty which tends to prove that the Rickey family was not as prolific as other families in this country. The Rickey family had emigrated from Ohio to California by 1852 which makes them a part of settling the far west.



Coat of Arms



Rickey

The Rickey Coat of Arms illustrated left was drawn by an heraldic artist from information officially recorded in ancient heraldic archives. Documentation for the Rickey Coat of Arms design can be found in Rietstap Armorial General. Heraldic artists of old developed their own unique language to describe an individual Coat of Arms. In their language, the Arms (shield) is as follows:

"D'or a deux roses de gu., tigees et feuilles de sin., accostees Cq. cour."

When translated the Arms description is:

"Gold, two red roses leaves and stems of green, side by side." Above the shield and helmet is the Crest which is described as:

"Trois pl. d'aut, une d'or entre deux de gu."

A translation of the Crest description is:

"Three ostrich plumes one gold between two red."

Family mottos are believed to have originated as battle cries in medieval times. A Motto was not recorded with the Rickey Coat of Arms.

Brice Rickey was in Morris County, New Jersey by 1750. He was a witness to a number of wills in Morris and Somerset counties with his son-in-Law John Durham, Elijah Ayers and others. He died around 1776 in Mendon township, Morris County, New Jersey.

John Rickey, Sr. was living in Basking Ridge in 1737 when Arron Langada brought suit against him for 16 pounds and 17 shillings and 3 pence. A Lean was put on 100 acres of land that he owned. John Rickey, Jr. paid Mr. Langada and received a clear deed to the 100 acres after his father's death in 1751. received

The New York Mercury reported on December 28, 1755 that a Rickey Lad of 8 years had accidentally shot and killed a Leonard boy of the same age in Basking Ridge, New Jersey.
(This was probably the son of Brice or John Rickey, Jr.)



Second Generation

John, Jacob and Benjamin Rickey all came to Pennsylvania but at different times. Benjamin was the first to come and settled in Washington, County where he lived the rest of his long life dying in 1852 at the age of 100. Before coming to Pennsylvania he was a soldier of the Revolutionary War from New Jersey. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church in Amwell Township, Washington County for many years. He was living with his son-in-law Usual Dilley in 1850.

Jacob was a member of the Basking Ridge Presbyterian Church and was a member of the session in 1795, when the Rev. Robert Finley became the pastor. Rev. Finley was installed June 17, 1795 when the church membership was 74 and by 1804 the membership had grown to 227. April 22, 1817 after serving the church for 21 years he left so he might accept the presidency of the University of Georgia. Jacob was witness to a will of John Peppard with his son Jacob Jr., David Swezey and John Ayers in Somerset County, New Jersey in April 1787. He sold his property in September of 1811 in New Jersey and came to Green County, Pennsylvania where his son Jacob Jr. had settled earlier. Jacob was a soldier of the Revolution under Capt. Jno. Parker from Bernards Township, Somerset County.

John Lived in Bernard Township, Somerset County, New Jersey till 1778. He then moved to Northlumberland County (later Center), Pennsylvania and lived there till around 1800. John stopped in Washington County, Pennsylvania, for about a year before finally making his way across the Ohio River to Steubenville, Jefferson County, Ohio. John was a Captain serving in the Continental French War under General Abbercombe and afterwards in the War of the Revolution. He was finally killed in his 98th year by being thrown from a spirited horse. He was an old Royal Arch Mason and a Presbyterian - being one of the three first elders in the organization of the old First Presbyterian Church of Steubenville, Ohio.

Jacob, John and Benjamin all spent a short time in Washington County, Pennsylvania. Jacob came in 1807, bought and sold property, then moved on to Green County, Pennsylvania. He was appointed Justice of the Peace in Franklin and Morris townships in Green County, March 14, 1814. He paid taxes on property that contained two houses and an office till his death. Jacob was on the first board of Elders of Unity Presbyterian Church of Graysville, Pennsylvania. The church was organized on August 27, 1814. In his will he left his property to his son Abraham. His wife Parnell married after his death to Dennis Drake and lived in Athens County, Ohio. Her first marriage took place in Morristown, New Jersey and the second one in Washington County, Pennsylvania.

John and Benjamin moved to Jefferson County, Ohio where Benjamin was married. John was already married by this time and had two children. John and Nancy were married by Rev. Robert Finley at the Basking Ridge Presbyterian Church in New Jersey. Benjamin was drafted for the War of 1812 and, just being newly married, his brother, John, took his place. John moved his family to Belmont County, Ohio about 1815, and died there from a cold contracted while in the service. Benjamin was named guardian of his children. Nancy drew a pension for his service in the War of 1812. Around 1840 Benjamin moved to Athens County, Ohio where he spent the rest of his life.

William Rickey moved from Belmont County to Monroe County, Ohio, then to Pleasants and Ritchie counties in West Virginia where he spent his last days. All the other children went to Noble County, Ohio with their parents. Elizabeth and her husband ran a successful store there and she was buried at the Crum Ridge Church of Christ Cemetery. John spent most of his life there but in later life he went to Walker, West Virginia and stayed with his daughter. Jacob went to Ritchie County, West Virginia to teach school. Jacob was a very learned man and once finding a mistake in Mr. McGuffey's Reader wrote and told him about it. Mr. McGuffey quickly replied thanking him and assuring him it would be corrected in the next addition. He was listed as a carpenter in the 1850 census. He also worked this trade and had one of the best orchards in Ritchie County.

Benjamin J. entered the Civil War at Camp Chase, Columbus, Ohio on June 26, 1861 and received a gunshot wound in the right leg at the battle of Bull Run August 20, 1862. He was discharged and lived for a short while in Washington County, Ohio. Then in 1867 he moved to Butler County, Kansas, where he lived the rest of his life.

Virginia lived with her husband on Brush Run, Tyler County, West Virginia for a short while after they were married but later they moved to Beatrice, Ritchie County, West Virginia where they raised their family. John Lamp was a farmer and a tiner. Louisa lived in Ritchie County for a while but later moved to Washington and Jefferson counties, Ohio.

Albert decided he would go west to seek his fortune. He worked his way across the country to his Uncle Benjamin in Butler County, Kansas. While he was there the Oklahoma Land was opened up to new settlers (1893). The morning that the land was opened he lined up at the Kansas Oklahoma border and rode in about fifty miles and took up land for a family who had paid him to do so. He returned to West Virginia because of ill health and bought his father-in-Law's farm in Tyler County and was a farmer for the rest of his life. Clark went to Wheeling, West Virginia and was a foreman for the Wheeling Steel Corporation. He raised his family there but after his wife died he returned to Ritchie County where he lived with his sisters Virginia and Mary. Mary lived with her parents until they died then she lived with the Lamp and Hood families in her later years.





Thomas B. Rickey (cattle King of Nevada)

Thomas B. Rickey did more than any other one man to develop the state of Nevada. Born in Highland County, Ohio, August 23, 1836, he came with his parents to California in 1852. He began mining in Amador County, California, but soon turned his attention to stock raising and took a drove of cattle into Antelope Valley, Douglas County, Nevada, driving them over the hills from California. He did not have any capital, and the only assets on which to build a fortune were his youth, energy and ambitions. Mr. Rickey owned very large herds of cattle, sheep and horses and is said to have owned 200,000 acres of land in Nevada and California at one time. He prospered in the cattle business by supplying beef to the mining camps when they were taking gold and silver from the Comstock.

Thomas Rickey was educated in the public schools of Ohio and Iowa. His father and mother, William and Eliza Jane (Brinly) Rickey, crossed the plains from Iowa with their eleven children and located in Amador County, California. Thomas' brothers and sisters were Sarah (1839), David (1842), Joseph Frank (1846), Francis Vearam (1848), Josephine (1850), Matilda (1852), Clara (1854), and Annetta (1858). His father was born in Pennsylvania in 1811, and mother in New Jersey in 1817. Mr. Rickey came from Scotch-Irish ancestry and is said to be a descendant of Thomas Rickey who emigrated from the north of Ireland to Pennsylvania. Another Thomas Rickey, his grandfather, was a farmer by occupation and spent his entire life in the Keystone state.

Mr. Rickey founded the State Bank and Trust Company which had banks at Carson City, Tonopah, Goldfield, Manhattan and Blair. He owned extensive water rights, irrigation systems, extensive mining interests, and was the owner of the Nevada-California Power Company.

When the panic of 1907 hit Nevada, the State Bank and Trust Company failed and Mr. Rickey was indicted and arrested for mismanagement of the Company. Mr. Rickey moved to Berkeley, California, in 1908 and all of his holdings were in the courts of Nevada and California for many years. He died in Oakland, California, January 1920 at the age of 84.

Branch Rickey the Brain of Baseball

Branch Wesley Rickey has left a deep impression on the game of baseball by devising a method whereby the poorer clubs could cope on equal terms with the more opulent ones; he invented the farm system for developing players, and in October 1945 made baseball history with the signing of Jackie Robinson. This ended the traditional discrimination against Negro players in the big Leagues.

Young Rickey was a good athlete. He paid his way through Ohio Wesleyan University as a professional athlete, playing baseball in summer and football in the fall and winter. After he completed collage he coached at Allegheny and Delaware Colleges. He played for many of the major League teams before becoming a scout for the St. Louis Browns. Mr. Rickey was president of the St. Louis Cardinals from 1917 - 1942 and the Brooklyn Dodgers from 1942 - 1950 taking time out to become a Major in the army during World War I. In 1950 he was appointed general manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates from which he retired in 1959.

- * Branch Rickey was born in Stockdale, Ohio, December 29, 1881, the son of Jacob Franklin and Emily (Brown) Rickey. Jacob Franklin was born March 18, 1854 and lived his entire life in Scioto County, Ohio, where he died December 12, 1939. His father and mother, Ephriam Wanzer (1821) and Anne (Rockwell) (1821) Rickey, were also born in the Buckeye State. Jacob's brothers and sisters were Rosetta (1843), James (1851), Ella, Thelma, and Nathan (1859). Jacob and Tryhina (Strong) Rickey, great-grandparents of Branch, came to Scioto County, Ohio, in 1817 from New York. He was a Baptist Minister for 45 years and died at the age of 72.

Lamp Family

The Lamp (Lampp) family came from Germany around the time of the Revolutionary War. John Lamp was in the Frederick County, Virginia 1782 census and George was in the 1810 census. George and Elizabeth Lamp came to Belmont County, Goshen Township, Captina Creek, Ohio between 1810 and 1820, with their family. Their sons were Jacob, George, Joseph and Henry.

Joseph (1796-1874) and Martha (1795-1868) Lamp settled at the mouth of Cave Run, Pleasants County, West Virginia, where he built a saw and grist mill. His wife was the daughter of John and Jane Hessen and is said to have descended from the Hessians who had been brought from Germany to aid King George in the Revolution. Their children were Abram (1825), married to Mary Hanes; David (1828), to Hannah Moore; Isaac, to Martha Ward; Sevra (1834), to Greenberry Jones; Jane (1826), to John Morgan; Rebecca (1832), to Daniel Jetty; Elizabeth (1828), to Simeon Jones; Christina (1830) to Ralph Hanes, and Jacob (1837), to Nancy Odell. Joseph's second wife was Lucinda McCullough, a widow.

Jacob's first wife Susanna Snyder, who was born near Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, March 27, 1794, brought her family to McKim Creek, Pleasants County in 1835. She and her husband parted and Jacob married again to a Katherine Stacher and moved to Licking County, Ohio where he raised another family. Susanna lived in Tyler and Pleasants counties the rest of her long life raising her nine children. The youngest was just a baby when she came to this wilderness country. She died January 1, 1891 at the age of 97 and was buried in the cemetery of the Pine Grove Church of Christ in Pleasants County, West Virginia with a large number of her family and her brother-in-law, Joseph's, family. Jacob's and Susanna's children were John (1816), married to Sarah Hanes; Henry, to a Miss Ward; Joshua (1835), to Lottie Virden; Abram (1823), to Elizabeth Varner; Sarah, to a Milhoan; Margaret (1828), to Joseph Varner; Catherine, to Seth Ward; Leah (1832), to William Wilson, and Caroline (1829), to Eli Wilson.

Abram's wife Elizabeth was the daughter of William and Letitia Varner. William was born in Delaware (1808) and his wife was born in Pennsylvania (1806). Their older children were also born in Pennsylvania and the younger ones in West Virginia. Abram's and Elizabeth's children were Letitia, married to Carlton Hanlon; George, to Sarah Little; John, to Virginia Rickey; Mary, to Alexander Jewell; William, to Jane Givens and Sarah. After Abram's death on August 9, 1862 Elizabeth married twice. First she wed John Hanlon, a widower, and had three children, Levira, Clifford and Oliver. Then she married David Jones. 435 words

The first William Mobbery came on the Ship Friendship, to Annapolis, Maryland, from Belfast, Ireland August 20, 1716. This ship had eighty Jacobites who were sent over after the defeat of Mar and Derwentwater's rising in 1715-16 and sold as servants. The rebels were mostly Scotsmen. Henry Tripp purchased William Mobbery for a term of seven years. After this time was served he became a free man.

This Mobbery family stayed in Maryland till after the Revolutionary War.* Then like all other colonists they started to move west. William, Levi and Eli Mobbery all settled in Belmont County, Ohio around 1811. They came from Montgomery, Prince Georges, and Frederick counties, Maryland. Reason Mobbery, a Revolutionary War soldier, settled in Highland County, Ohio around 1800. From these families their children moved on to the western states and by 1850 the name of Mobbery is included in the census of every state in the union.

William and Catharine our ancestors came to Smith Township, Belmont County, Ohio when it still was a wilderness. In Catharine's will dated September 10, 1838 she named all her children. Dorcas Rickey was not named as a daughter but according to the family records she was their daughter. - Dorcas (Mobley) Rickey,

The Swasey Family

The book Genealogy of the Swasey Family by Benjamin Franklin Swasey was used in abstracting this family.

First Generation

John Swasey was a planter. Little is known of his early life. He was an Englishman for he wrote and spoke the English language. He was probably born in Suffolk County on the eastern borders of the British Islands where many of the early settlers of Southold, Long Island, New York, came from, his ancestors having crossed the English Channel from France or Germany.

John came to America with two sons, Joseph and John, Jr. as early as 1632, when Joseph took the Freeman's Oath in Boston. They settled in Salem, Massachusetts, where in 1640, John Swasey, Sr. had four acres of land allotted to him on what is now Essex Street. John was obliged to leave Salem because of his connection with the Quaker Church. He moved to Setauket, Long Island, and finally to Southold on the extreme end of Long Island, where he bought land. Later he was joined by his son John, Jr., but to Joseph, who preferred Salem to moving on, he left his Salem estate, amounting 200 pounds. He was appointed one of the Commissioners to fix the boundary line between Southold and Smithtown, Long Island. He was one of six employed by the New Haven Assembly to purchase from the Indians the town of Brookhaven, Long Island. He acquired large tracts of land and water privileges in this new territory.

Second Generation

John Swayze, Jr., planter or husbandman married Katherine King daughter of William King, of Salem. William King sailed with his family from Weymouth, Dorsetshire, England, in March, 1635-6, bound for New England. Mr. King settled in Salem, Massachusetts, where he was made Freeman on May 26, 1636. He received two land grants. One was for forty acres at Jeffreys Creek, now "Manchester by the Sea," and one for 30 acres at "Royall Side" at the head of Bess River, now Beverly, where he established his homestead. Mr. King was a member of the First church at Salem, and took an active part in the religious controversies of the time. In 1637 he identified himself with the Antinomians, and in consequence came under the ban of the Salem authorities. He was admonished to sever his connections with the sect and he was directed to leave his arms with Lieutenant Danforth.

John Swayze, his wife and his father moved from Salem to Southold, Long Island, as early as 1658, having previously sold his holdings in Salem to his wife's widowed mother, January 14, 1652. The younger John and his wife became members of the first church founded in Southold in 1650, by Rev. John Younge. They lived with John's father on the farm until 1667, when they exchanged a part of their woodland and meadow with Barnabas Horton for similar land. In 1669 they moved to Aquebogue, in Suffolk County, upon a large farm. In 1675 he was taxed for land and cattle fifty eight pounds and ten shillings. Five years later his children consisted of three males and four females. Being the sole heir of his father's landed property in Southold and Brookhaven he was classed among the wealthy men in that part of the country.

Fourth Generation

Samuel Swayze, husbandman, moved with his family from Southold to German Valley in New Jersey, and settled in Roxbury, now Chester, New Jersey in 1737. He had scarcely got settled when he became one of the first Justices of the Peace of Roxbury Township, holding the office as early as 1747. His name appears among the list of the first county Judges which met as a Court, March 25, 1740. During the years immediately preceding the Revolution, New Jersey was the third Colony in order to declare for Independence, but most of the family of Judge Swayze remained Loyalists as long as possible and consequently suffered all of the privations incident thereto.

In 1743 Judge Swayze bought for his sons Barnabas and Israel eight hundred acres of land in the town of Hope. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church at Morristown, New Jersey. At his death, Judge Swayze left a will dated May 10, 1759, leaving nearly one thousand acres of land to his family. As the Revolution approached, his sons Richard and (Samuel), who was the first minister of the Congregational Church of Chester, bought 19,000 acres of land, from Amos Ogden in Western Florida now Mississippi and with their families and a number of their friends settled there. Caleb went to Canada with his family where a large number of them remained but he returned. Mary Swayze married John Seward and became the grandmother of William Henry Seward who was the Secretary of State in the Lincoln Administration. Barnabas and Israel remained in New Jersey.

Barnabas Sweezy, farmer, was baptized in Southold, Long Island, New York, January 15, 1715. He lived with his father in the Chester, New Jersey homestead, until he was 28 years of age. He moved to Hope, Warren County in 1743 and two years later he divided this land with his brother Israel and the second Sweezy Settlement in New Jersey was established. On his tombstone that stood for many years in the Swayze cemetery in the village of Hope, Warren County, New Jersey was the word "Wales" which has led some of the family to believe the Sweezies might have been from Wales.

Nancy Swazey (Rickey) was married to John Rickey on September 3, 1795, by Robert Finley, minister of the Basking Ridge Presbyterian Church in Somerset County, New Jersey. Mr. Finley was installed on the 17th of June, 1795 and served for twenty one years. After leaving the church he became the President of the University of Georgia. Her father-in-Law was a member of the session of the church at the time of her marriage. Shortly after her marriage she moved to Center County, Pennsylvania then to Jefferson County, Ohio where her husband was a soldier in Capt. Stokes Company in the War of 1812. Nancy moved to Belmont County, Ohio before 1815 where her husband died. She was still in Belmont County, Ohio in 1822 when her daughter Ann was married to William Beard. When she applied for Bounty Land she was in Coshocton County, Ohio in the year 1851. Nancy was in Athens County, Ohio when she applied for her widow's pension, October 21, 1856. The 1860 census of United States show her living with her son John in Athens County, Ohio at the age of ninety. There is no record of her death in her son Jacob Rickey's Bible, but only that of her husband. She probably died at the home of her son John in Athens County, Ohio.

First Generation

John Carmichael was a soldier of the Revolutionary War. He enlisted in 1775, in the second regiment of the Pennsylvania lines under Captain Wood and Colonel Wood, for six years. He was wounded in the shoulder and leg and also lost the sight in his right eye.

John first came to what is now Brooke County, West Virginia and bought property, February 6, 1797, on Short Creek. John and Elizabeth sold part of this property to John Jr. and his wife Mary on December 6, 1798. On June 26, 1809 he turned over all his property to John Jr. for services and one dollar. This transaction was made so that he could apply for his invalid pension for his service in the Revolutionary War. He was awarded a pension in the amount of \$60.00 per year in December 1808. April 24, 1816 it was raised to \$96.00 per year.

John went with his family around 1810 to what is now Marshall county, West Virginia. The Carmichael family took up 600 acres of land, but they lost all but 140 acres of it because of an old pattern called a squatters lease. If the family had had the money, they could have held the whole six hundred acres by a law suit. The Bains and other families in the area took their case to court and won. A story is told that the Carmichael men came first and struck a path to this land. They built a cabin and went back for their wives. When they returned they could not find the cabin. They had to build another one. Two years later they found it on the other side of the creek. The second cabin they built was near the Carmichael Cemetery. One of Johns' sons, Herman, did not have a good mind. He was the first one buried in the old Carmichael Cemetery. A week before he killed himself he picked out the place and said he would be buried there in a week and he was.

David Carmichael's heirs sold 105 acres of this land on April 10, 1871

Marshall
County, W. Va

for \$1953.00 (Deed Book 19, page 320, Marshall County, West Virginia). The other 40 acres had been sold by other members of the family earlier.

On December 22, 1831, John applied to have his pension changed to Monroe County, Ohio, "because his wife has lately deceased and himself infirm came to reside with his son." In April 1842 James (Carmichael administrator of John Carmichael estate went into court (Monroe County, Ohio) and proved that John Carmichael late pensioner Revolutionary War, died August 3, 1841. The only living heirs are John Jr. Samuel and James Carmichael.

John's wife Elizabeth was probably buried in the Carmichael Cemetery Marshall County, West Virginia. John was laid to rest in the Stafford Cemetery, Monroe County, Ohio beside his son James. He died in his 96th year. The Daughters of the American Revolution have erected a marker at his grave.

The Carmichael Homestead


ABOUT a mile from U. S. Route 250, southeast of Beeler Station on the banks of Wolf Run in Marshall County, stands one of the most interesting old pioneer structures in our State. This old log house built by the great grandfather of T. M. Carmichael, its present owner, has undergone but few changes despite the fact that it was erected over a century and a quarter ago. The old oak and sugar logs of which the house was built have been weatherboarded on the north side. The south half is the same as originally built except the clapboard roof. It was replaced some few years ago with a galvanized metal.

The land on which the house was built was secured by a patent from the king of England and Patrick Henry, governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia. It is interesting to know that it has remained throughout the years in the Carmichael family. It was here in the old log structure that Mr. and Mrs. T. M. Carmichael began housekeeping. Although it is now unoccupied and is used by the Carmichaels as a place of storage, it still holds a deep interest for the searchers of pioneer tales.

Inside the house on the first floor are

two large open fireplaces, one in each large room. Hooks can still be found on which the old ovens were fastened to do the cooking. Above the mantel are the hooks on which the pioneer flintlock used to hang. T. M. Carmichael still possesses the powder horn and the old flintlock gun that his great-great grandfather used in the Revolutionary War. It was this powder horn and long barrelled flintlock, sixty-six inches long from the stock to the end of the barrel, that T. M. Carmichael's great-grand grandfather carried on his back for protection against wild animals and Indians when he walked home from the Revolutionary War. A careful examination of the gun reveals that the wooden parts are worm-eaten and that the powder pan is partly broken. The name Marlborough engraved on the lock and on the long ramrod inserted under the barrel is still legible.

The pegs in the wall leading to the attic have been re-

placed by steps. Entering the attic is like entering a museum. The first thing which interests the visitor is an old-fashioned spinning wheel about 175 years old, which was brought from Scotland and which Emily Brown traded to Jane Carmichael, great grandmother of T. M. Carmichael.

A flax comber used to strip flax grown on the farm is still in the attic. Two wool combers used to prepare the wool for spinning are lying by the spinning wheel. There is also a spinning jenny, an improvement over the spinning wheel for speed. It is about 125 years old. Several dozen handmade large wooden spools that were used to wind the yarn on are scattered about on the attic floor. Close by the spinning jenny is a large homemade wooden loom on which the manufactured flax and wool were woven into cloth by Jane Carmichael and her ancestors and descendants. The loom is over 125 years old.

Other antiques in the attic are an old-fashioned homemade clothes rack over a century old; a bootjack that the Carmichael boys used to remove their stiff leather

boots at night; and two wooden pitchers carved over a hundred years ago from walnut wood by the pioneer, John Carmichael.

About three hundred feet east of the house is the old log barn with its dilapidated roof of clapboards. It, too, contains relics of a by-gone day. Along the walls are the old homemade harness pegs, on one of which hangs an aged ox yoke. Close by is an old-fashioned packsaddle which was made by Mr. Carmichael's grandfather from oak and dogwood cut on the farm. The pioneers used to put similar saddlepacks on their horses and fasten to them bags of grain or even their belongings when they moved.

It would be worth any West Virginian's time to visit this old Carmichael homestead, for, indeed, the old log house and barn are veritable treasure chests of antiques which tell the story of life on the frontier.

John and Jane Carmichael, the pioneers, lived in the heroic age in West Virginia, when each family was very largely dependent upon itself for the necessities and comforts of life. The home they built, a large and commodious one for its day, became not only a place of habitation but a manufacturing plant in a small way. There

the father, the mother and all the children turned their hands to some useful work.

Household furnishings in these primitive establishments were few and simple. Perhaps the splendidly carved wooden pitchers still kept in the pioneer Carmichael home are but two items that have been preserved of a full set of home-made wooden ware for table and kitchen use, a set that included "trenchers," or wooden plates, "noggins," cups made from knots of wood, bowls and "piggins," or milking pails.

The spinning equipment and the old loom are remains of another phase of domestic manufacturing that was essential in each home.

Second Generation

John Carmichael Jr. was a soldier of the War of 1812. He served with the Ohio County, Virginia Company under Captain John Bonnet. John came to Brooke County with his father then went to Marshall County with the other members of the family. In 1827 he sold his property in Marshall County and went to Monroe County, Ohio, where he served as Justice of the Peace. His estate was settled in Noble County, Ohio in 1845.

Samuel Carmichael lived on Wolf Run in Marshall County until 1835 when he sold his property and moved to Washington County, Ohio where he died between 1840-50.

David Carmichael was the only son that stayed on the land that the family had settled on and cleared in Marshall County. He was a fairly large man and hard worker. He was preparing to build a new house for his family and lifted too hard on a saw log which caused hemorrhaging of the lung from which he never recovered. His home was near the Carmichael Cemetery. David was buried in the cemetery with other members of the family.

James Carmichael helped his family make a home out of the wilderness in Marshall County but soon moved on to a new frontier in Monroe County, Ohio with his young family. He was a prominent citizen of this county, a Justice of the Peace and Local preacher of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He cared for his father until his death.

Maryland Records, Frederick County Index to Land Records:

Abram Earleway bought a lot in Jerusalem, a town in Frederick County, Maryland, from Jacob Funk, October 31, 1768, recorded April 3, 1769.

Abraham Earlewine came to what is now Marshall County, West Virginia around 1780. He came from Maryland making the journey in a wagon. When descending the mountain for a lock for the wagon, they cut a tree and lashed the top end to the hind axle. They said it was surprising the amount of trees that lay at the foot of the mountain.

The Earlewine family settled on Wolf Run near the John Wetzel family. The Carmichael, Wetzel, Jameson and Earlewine children grew up together. John Wetzel, Jr. was taken prisoner twice by the Indians. The first time was with his brother, Lewis. The second occurred some years later, when he, in company with a lad by the name of Frederick Earlewine, were sent to get some cows that were in the woods. The boys were captured by the Indians, who were lying in wait for them. The Earlewine lad was killed by the Indians when he refused to go with them. John was rescued and taken back to his home. The Earlewine family had not been apprised of the death of Frederick and going to the spot where he had been struck down, his body was found and was given a decent burial. The farm on which this capture took place is still owned by descendants of the Earlewine Family.

Abraham Earlewine's estate was settled in Ohio County, Virginia, January 15, 1820. His children sold the property that he had bought from Martin Wetzel and moved on west to help settle more wilderness country.

Some of Abraham Earlewine's descendants are buried in the Earlewine Cemetery on the Earlewine farm but there is no indication that Abraham or his wife were buried there.
