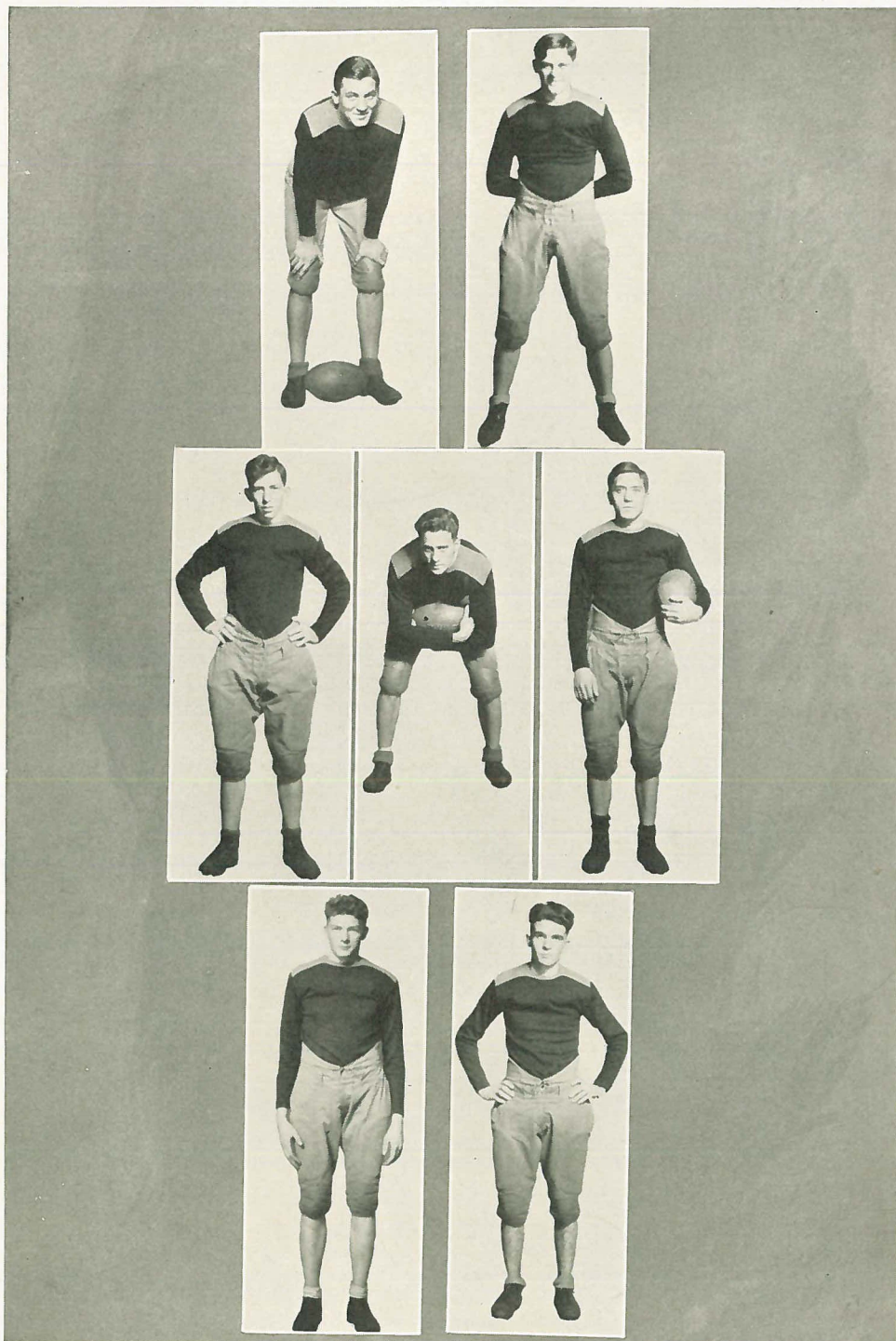
RAY C. COLEMAN

On November 15 the locals went to New Concord where they received another defeat, 24-0. R. Dennis's line plunging was the important factor of this game.

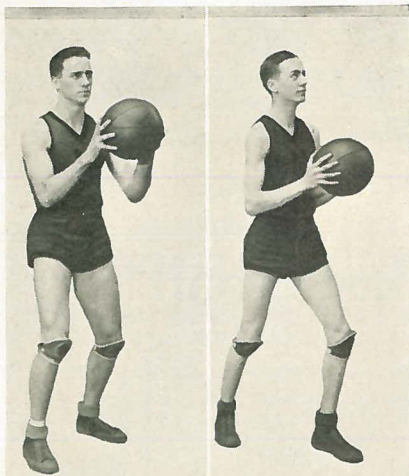
Playing their last high team—Dover, the Trojans were trimmed 19-0. The game was lost by the costly fumbles of the Trojans.

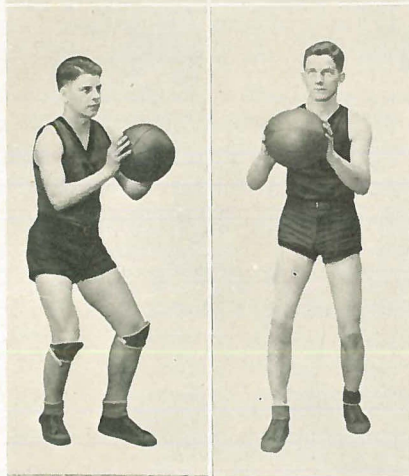

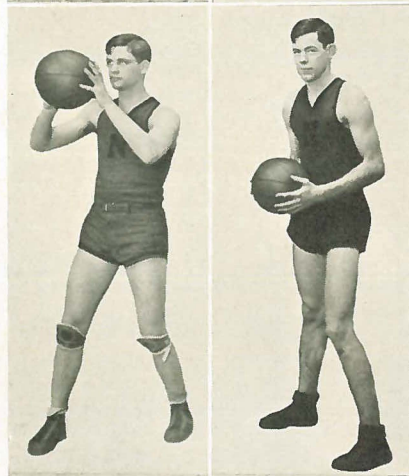

WOODROW HAYES: "Woody" playing first base for the Trojans did a neat job at handling this sack. Woody has one more year with N. H. S.

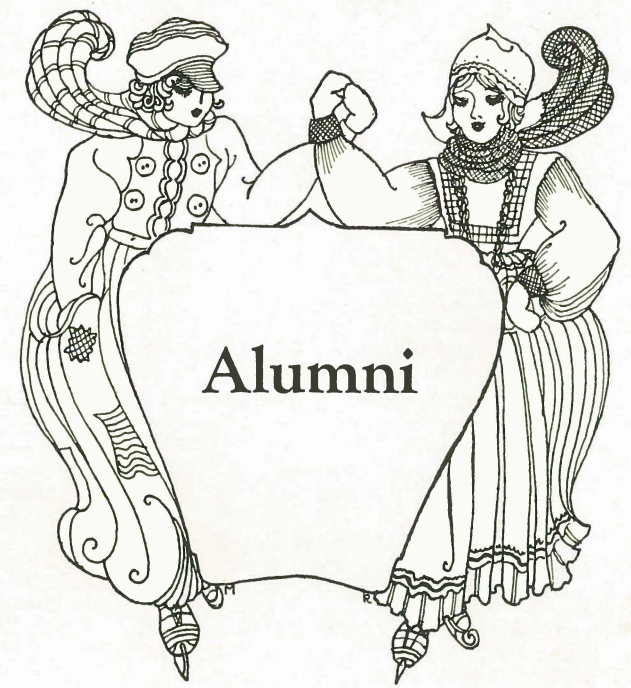
