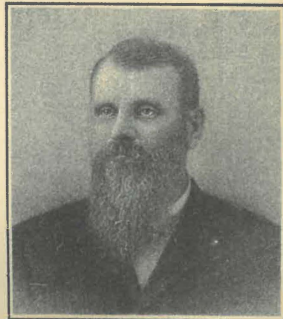

Machinery on First Steamboat

THE first American to achieve universal fame as an inventor was **ROBERT FULTON**, born in Little Britain, Pa., Nov. 14, 1765. He was the first to propel a ship by steam. The idea came to him when, as a young man, he moved to New York and saw the rapidly-growing city struggling with sail and oar for water transportation. He made a trial of his steamboat, the "Clermont", on the Hudson River from New York to Albany, August 17, 1807, and though it only made 5 miles an hour it was considered a great success. Fulton died Feb. 23, 1815, without much profit from his invention.



The First Cotton Gin

ELI WHITNEY was born in Westboro, Mass., Dec. 8, 1765, of very poor parents. After working his way through Yale he went to Savannah, Ga., to teach school. One evening at the boarding house a man said that cotton would make the whole South wealthy if a machine could be invented to divide the lint from the seed, as it was then taking a slave ten hours to part one pound. Whitney set to work, and gave the cotton gin to the world. His was the first monopoly. He enriched the South and made the modern textile industry possible. He died Jan. 8, 1825.

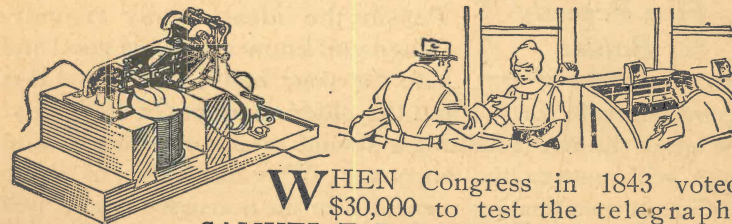

WHEN THOMAS BLANCHARD was ten years old he whittled a mill from cedar shingles that ran by breeze or water-power on his father's farm in Mass., where he was born June 24, 1788. At 15 he built a complete blacksmith's shop. At 20, to help his brother's business, he invented a machine for making tacks, one for counting tacks and another for bending wood. His crowning invention, which made him famous and rich, was the lathe. It made modern tool making and wood carving possible. Blanchard was the friend of Clay, Calhoun and Webster. He died April 16, 1864.



WHEN Congress in 1843 voted \$30,000 to test the telegraph, **SAMUEL F. B. MORSE**, its inventor, was near death from starvation. He had come from a wealthy family of Charlestown, Mass., where he was born April 27, 1791, and started life as a portrait painter. He was interested in the then new science of electricity and believed intelligence, written words, could be transmitted instantaneously. That thought was the beginning of his great invention. The first telegraph line was between Washington and Baltimore. The first words ever telegraphed were "What God hath wrought". Morse died, honored and rewarded, April 2, 1872.

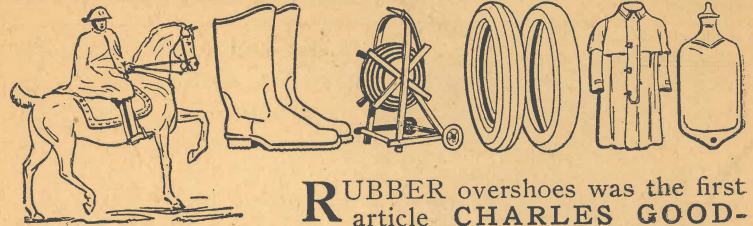

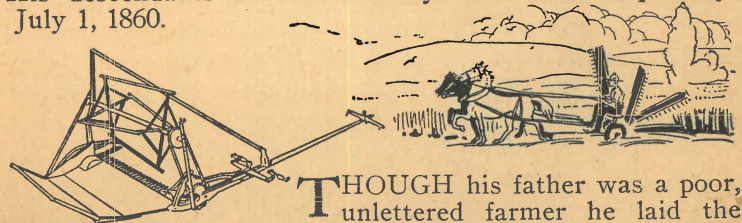

He died in poverty, July 1, 1860.

McCormick, whose reaper is now universally used, left a tremendous fortune to his family and to charity when he died, May 13, 1884.

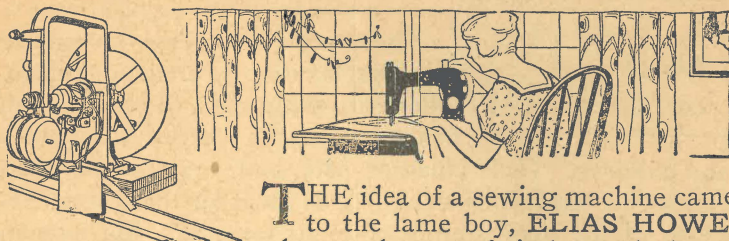

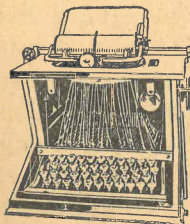

THE idea of a sewing machine came to the lame boy, **ELIAS HOWE**, when at the age of six he worked as a stitcher in a cotton mill in Spencer, Mass., where he was born July 9, 1819.

His parents were poor farmers, and there were eight children. Fifteen years later he brought his invention to New York, but capital laughed at him. He went to England, and returned in steerage with 60c in his pocket. During his absence, infringements were being sold. The father mortgaged his farm to enable Elias to fight in the courts, where he won all suits. He died very rich, Oct. 6, 1867.

WHILE working as a printer in Mooresburg, Pa., where he was born Feb. 14, 1819, **CHRISTOPHER**

LATHAM SHOLES often had to take a metal stamp and number the pages of account books by hand. It occurred to him that a metal finger striking the numbers would be better. Later, while working as an editor in Milwaukee, he developed the idea into the modern typewriter. Lack of capital forced him to go for help to a firm that put its own name on his invention. Sholes sold for \$12,000; the partner, on royalty, made over a million. Sholes died of consumption Feb. 19, 1890.

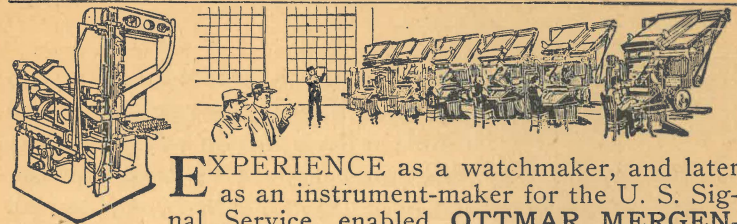

EXPERIENCE as a watchmaker, and later as an instrument-maker for the U. S. Signal Service, enabled **OTTMAR MERGENTHALER** to perfect the machine that casts and sets type in one operation. Mergenthaler cast his type line by line, from which the machine later derived its name. His backer was Whitelaw Reid, former ambassador to Great Britain and owner of the New York Tribune, the first newspaper to use the Linotype. Mergenthaler died of consumption in Baltimore, Oct. 28, 1899.



**The First
Electric Light**

THE American who has the greatest number of important inventions to his credit is **THOMAS ALVA EDISON**. He was born in Milan, O., Feb. 11, 1847. At 12 he was a "news butcher" on trains. Then he taught himself telegraphy and became interested in electricity. His first inventions were improvements for the telegraph. His first money was made by his invention of the stock-market "ticker". Then came the incandescent electric light, the megaphone, phonograph, electric storage battery and motion-picture machine. He has patented more than 900 articles. His factories are in Orange, N. J., where he employs 20,000 men.

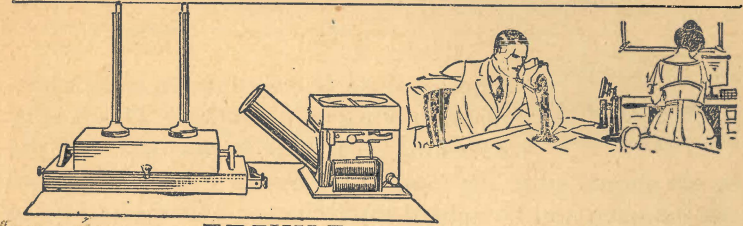

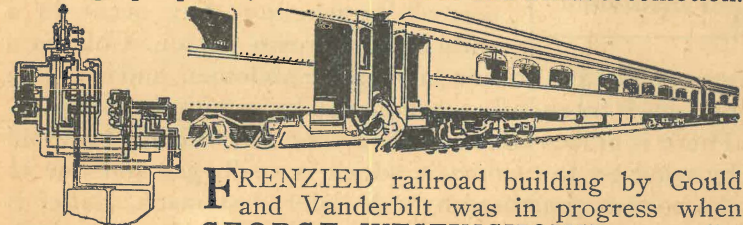

Coupled with the telegraph it changed business methods everywhere. Today a New York business man can phone his representative in San Francisco, over 3,000 miles away. Prof. Bell is joint inventor of the graphophone, flat disc records and aerial locomotion.



The First Airbrake

FRENZIED railroad building by Gould and Vanderbilt was in progress when GEORGE WESTINGHOUSE was discharged as engineer in the Navy at the close of the Civil War. Returning to his home in Central Bridge, N. Y., where he was born Oct. 6, 1846, he noticed the slowness and jerkiness of the train. The idea of the airbrake came to him, and in 1869 he patented it. It made modern railroading, with its great speed and safety, possible. The airbrake has had more imitators than any other invention. Westinghouse died in New York City March 12, 1914, a very rich man.

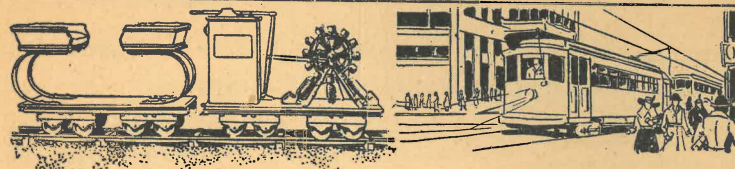

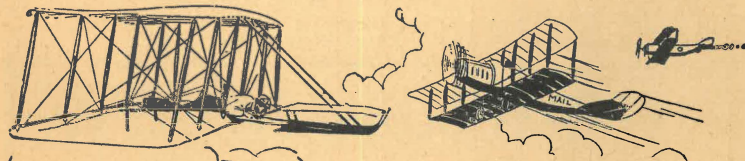

WILBUR AND ORVILLE WRIGHT ran a bicycle repair shop in Dayton, O., where Wilbur was born in 1867 and Orville in 1871. They foresaw the decline of the bicycle and yet visualized something faster than the automobile, which was just coming in. They experimented jointly with a flying machine—and people laughed! Dec. 17, 1903, they had it perfected and gave an exhibition at Kitty Hawk, N. C. Our government promised them big contracts if they could demonstrate successfully before officials, which they did at Fort Myer, Va., 1908. Their patents are now universally used. Wilbur died of typhoid. Orville lives in Dayton.

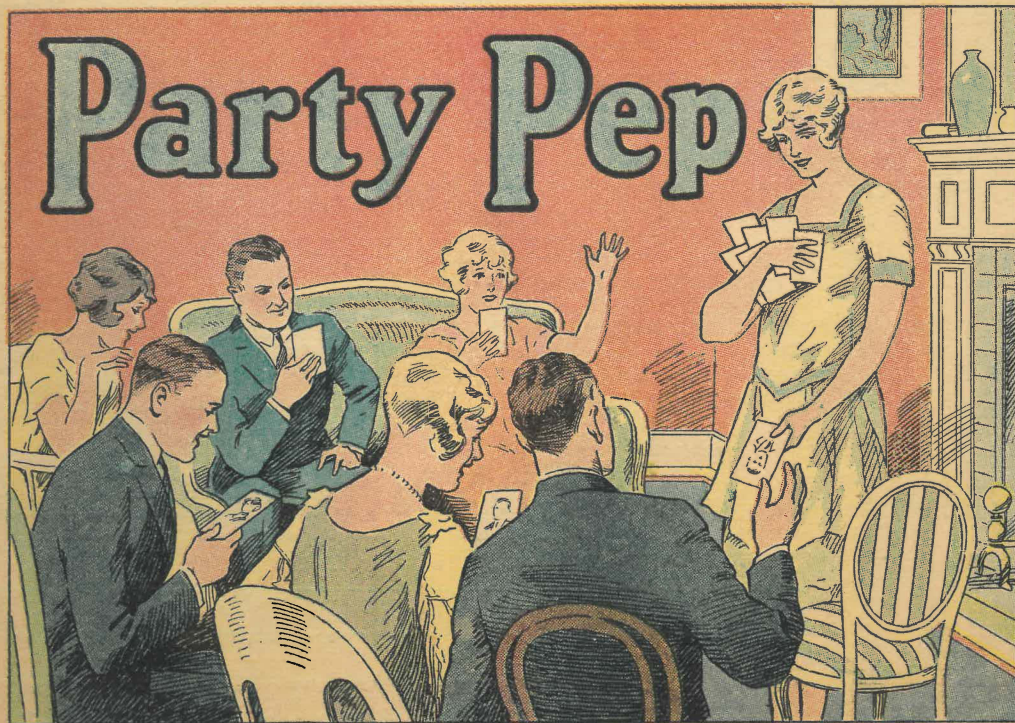

Jones Family. If his answer is anything but YES or NO, what he says is repeated by his questioners and he is asked the same question again until he finally gives the correct answer, after

which another candidate is sent for and the question is repeated.

It makes the game more interesting if the person who asks the question gives a little talk describing the Jones Family and telling the advantages of belonging to such a family.

Buzz.

Any number of people may play. Each one calls out a number in turn, starting at one and going on until all are out of the game. The word Buzz must be used whenever the number is seven, a multiple of seven, or is written with a seven. Thus, seven, fourteen, seventeen, twenty-one, twenty-seven, twenty-eight, etc. are Buzz numbers. The

seventies are counted Buzz 1, Buzz 2, Buzz 3, etc.

Any player who calls a number when he should say Buzz or says Buzz when he should say a number is out of the game. The player who stays longest is the winner.

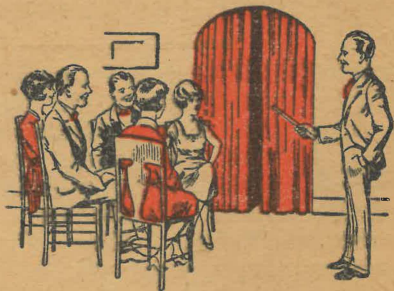

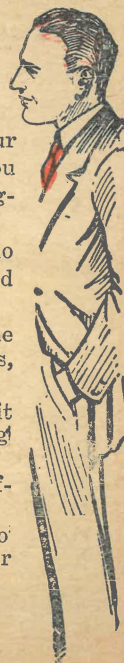

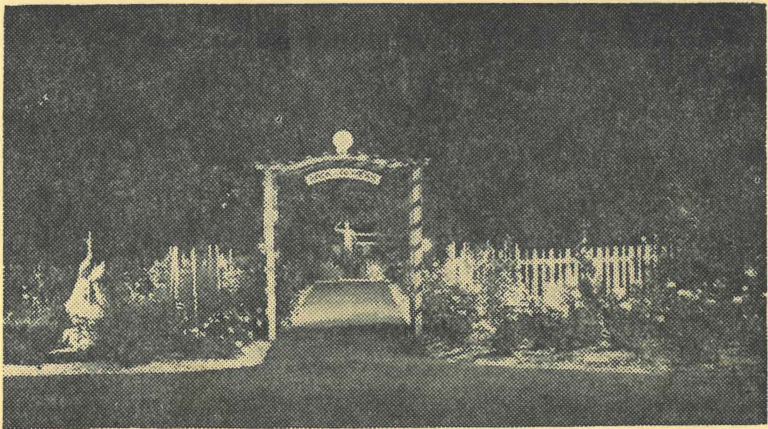
