troyed by the sword, by famine and intestine dissensions? In His memorable prayer to His heavenly father a short time before His apprehension as recorded by the beloved disciple John, Jesus says I have glorified thee in the earth, I have finished the work which thou gavest me to do. What work? The abrogation of the old covenant or law and the introduction of the new covenant or Gospel dispensation. Here ended His commission but not His suffering. He had incurred the hatred of His bigoted and intolerant countrymen by denouncing their hypocrisy and uprooting their institutions, and there remained no way for Him to save His natural life in that wicked and perverse generation but to renounce the testimonies which He had been commissioned to bear to the truth. When therefore He bowed His head and died on the cross with the declaration upon His lips "It is finished", the measure of their iniquity was full, their last prophet had been rejected and slain, their last tragedy acted, their dynasty closed and their glory departed from them. The veil of the temple was rent in twain, the Urim and Thummim of the high priest ceased its oracular responses, and through the spirit of an omnipresent God the holy place became thenceforth accessible to all of every nation and of every clime. Henceforth, saith the apostle the Jews were no more under the curse of the law and the handwriting or ordinances against them was blotted out being nailed to the cross.

Now if we take a retrospect of what has passed in review before us we are taught by testimony positive and unequivocal that all the powers of Jesus are derived from the spirit of God. For, "I will raise them up a prophet from among their brethren; I have put my spirit upon Him; Jesus of Nazareth, a man approved of God by miracles and wonders and signs which God did by Him; God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the holy spirit and with power; the spirit of the Lord is upon me; He saw the spirit of God descending like a dove and lighting upon Him; if I cast out devils by the spirit of God then the kingdom of God is come unto you." Thus we learn that Jesus was the blessed and holy instrument in the hands of His heavenly father to proclaim to mankind that the spirit of God is the saviour of the world. This accords with the declaration of the prophet; "I, even I, am the Lord and beside me there is no saviour;" and also with that of the apostle, "For therefore we both labour and suffer reproach because we trust in the living God who is the saviour of all men." Now the manifestation of the spirit which hath appeared to all men is Christ in you, the hope of glory, not a personality but a principle, the wisdom and power of a God ever present and merciful. Therefore, the anointing which ye have received of Him abideth in you and ye need not that any man teach you; but as the same anointing teacheth you of all things and is truth and is no lie.

## PATIENTS, PRESCRIPTIONS & OTHER THINGS

Dr. William Schooley practiced medicine at Somerton, Belmont County, Ohio, from 1826 until his death in 1860. It was there that he and Agnes Dillon Schooley built their home and reared the best known family of medical doctors of the nineteenth century in Eastern Ohio.

When their sons Clarkson and Lindley completed their medical studies they each assisted their father until they located in other places to establish themselves. Dr. Clarkson located at Mt. Pleasant, in Jefferson County, Ohio. Dr. Lindley located at Belmont, Ohio, and Dr. Addison remained at Somerton, where he had a drug store and practiced medicine until his death in 1890. Their only daughter, Mary Elizabeth, married Dr. Robert Barclay Hodgkin of Somerton.

In the ledgers that have been found are the names of hundreds of Dr. William Schooley's patients. They came to him for everything having to do with their physical, mental and spiritual well-being and paid their bills with a variety of things from apples and turnips to oats and hay for his horses.

The names of the following people and the years they were treated were carefully written in those ledgers. If a baby was born the exact date was recorded but it was seldom noted whether it was a boy or a girl or whether it lived or died.

A SHORT BIOGRAPHY  
of  
DR. WILLIAM SCHOOLEY

WILLIAM SCHOOLEY, M. D., was born July 24, 1794, at Sandy Spring, Maryland. When quite small his parents moved to Loudoun County, Virginia, where he received the best education the place afforded. His parents were Friends and young William was reared strictly in that faith. In 1815 he left Virginia and came to Belmont, Belmont County, Ohio, and engaged in teaching school at that place which he continued for eight years.

In the meantime, April 23, 1818, he married Agnes Dillon of Belmont, and in 1823 he commenced preaching in the Friends Meetings. About the same time, January 1823, he began the study of medicine which he continued for three years. He located at Somerton, Ohio, in 1826, and commenced the practice of medicine.

In the year 1828 there arose a division in the Society of Friends and William Schooley joined his fortune with the body known as "Hicksites". Dr. Schooley continued to practice medicine and preach equally acceptable to his patrons and brethren until the 11th of September, 1860, when he died, having exercised an influence for good on society not easily effaced. His children are named as follows: Clarkson, Lindley, Addison and Mary E. Among the physicians who have studied medicine with Dr. Schooley were: Drs. Strahl, Dillon, Waters, Berry, McNichols, Sharp, Plumly, Steele, Wilson, Sawyer, Stanton, Sweeney, Hodgin and his three sons. Dr. Schooley's daughter, Mary E., married Dr. Robert Barclay Hodgin.

(The above short biography is taken from the History of Belmont and Jefferson Counties, by J. A. Caldwell, 1880, page 408)

For more than fifty years a number of people have been trying, more or less successfully, to trace their Schooley ancestry. The amount of information, some of it conflicting and some of it impossible to interpret correctly, is beyond the imagination.

Fortunately, most of the early Schooleys and the families with whom they intermarried were members of the Society of Friends, or Quakers, who kept excellent records of their members, who they married and when, where they are buried, when they moved from one Monthly Meeting to another, etc., so by searching these records it is possible to learn much of this family. Other sources such as church records, state and county histories, census reports, records of Wills, deeds, marriages, and the many writers who have done extensive research on this family, have been studied.

My concern has been entirely with the family of Dr. William Schooley, his ancestors and his descendants. I donot claim to have all of them and it is my hope that someone will finish the job someday. A partial bibliography of sources is given at the close of this book.

The following material on the name of Scholey-Schooley in England is partly from the excellent little book by the late Mrs. May Schooley Ivey, entitled "A Pioneer Schooley Family" which was printed by the Franklin Press, Inc., Miami, Florida, 1941.

THE NAME OF SCHOLEY-SCHOOLEY IN ENGLAND

Numerous instances have been found in authentic records, such as parish church registers and military rolls and court decrees and decisions relating to estates which establish the great antiquity of the name of Scholey-Schooley in England. More frequent mention of the name may be found in the various records or documents pertaining to religious or commercial life in Yorkshire, though the name often appears in other counties of England in ancient as well as modern times.

The one immigrant from England who is of great interest to all the Schooleys in America is John Scholey, Senior, the father of Robert, Thomas, Mary and John, Junior, who with their descendants make up the Schooley family in America.

John Scholey, Senior, was born or baptised in the year 1609 in Northamptonshire in England. His father was Richard Scholey, whose residence was at Easton-on-the-Hill, in the Barony of Stamford near the city of Stamford. This Richard had three sons, Richard, John and Anthony. Richard was the oldest and Anthony was the youngest.

Richard and John, while young men at home with their father's family, had received the usuary from leases and tenements owned by their father at Collewston and Stewkeley. About the year 1631 these two brothers went northward into Yorkshire, and apparently among relatives. Both remained for many years, it appears, and had their homes at times in the

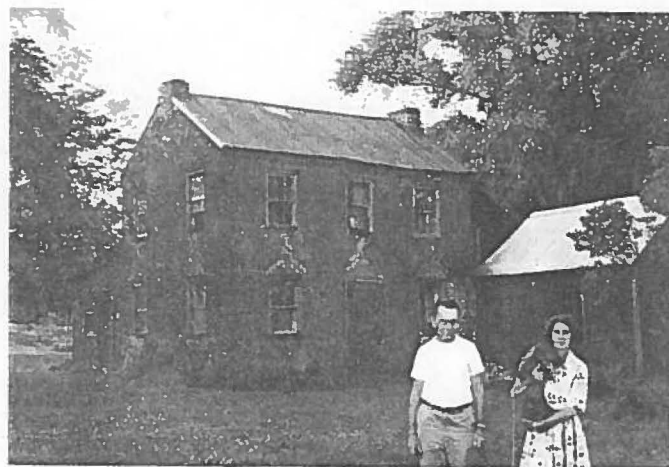


Harriett Josephine Jarvis

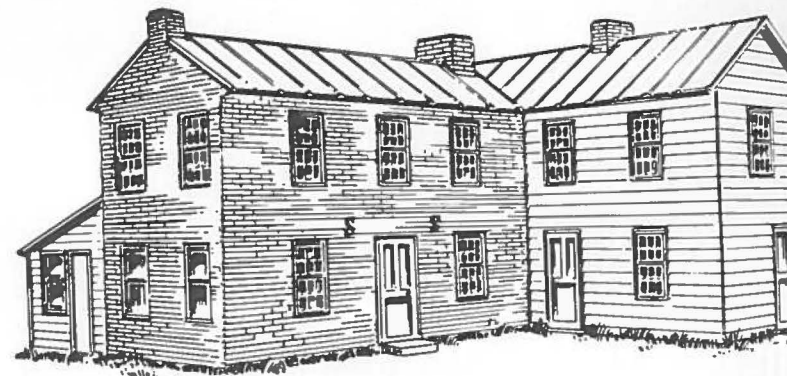

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This genealogy of one branch of the Schooley family has been compiled from public records, court records, the William Wade Hinshaw Encyclopedia of Quaker Genealogy, other Quaker records, printed sources and from members of the family over the past forty-five years. It is hoped that eventually all errors can be corrected and all blanks can be filled. Several people are now researching every available source in the hope that more can be learned.

However, there are approximately four thousand Schooley descendants in the United States and Canada, so the task is enormous. That is why this work has been narrowed to Dr. William Schooley (1794-1860) his ancestors and his descendants. It is not an attempt to write a complete genealogy of the family.

I wish to express my sincere thanks and everlasting gratitude to all those who have been so patient and helpful for so long.



This house was built at Somerton, Ohio by Dr. William Schooley in 1826, and was his home until his death in 1860. The main part of the house was built of brick; made on the property. To this was added a large frame addition constructed of walnut and yellow poplar, making a total of twelve rooms. There was a secret attic where fugitive slaves were hidden, and an escape tunnel to a ravine back of the house. As a station on the Underground Railroad this house was closely linked with other stations at Woodsfield, Summerfield, Belmont, Quaker City and Flat Rock, which was then a black settlement known as Guinea.

After the death of Agnes Dillon Schooley in 1872 the house was sold and fell into disrepair. The frame part was torn down in 1948 and the brick part was demolished in August 1965. It had stood as a historic landmark for almost one hundred and forty years.
