

TO ALL CLOW EMPLOYEES:


Just the other day I happened to hear the broadcast of a speech made by one of the candidates for President of the United States. It was a masterful speech, clearly and forcefully given, but a real shocker! To any person not familiar with the usual procedures of otherwise loyal Americans when they are running for office, one would be forced to the conclusion that the United States of America and its people had sunk to the lowest level among the nations of the world. The speech covered nearly all the facets of our lives today - the armament race, guided missiles, space satellites, the farmer, the workingman, the manufacturer, labor and management, imports and exports, the young, the aged, the sick, and all the rest of us, and believe me, we were in terrible shape and those in office now were responsible for it. They also were responsible for the situation in Cuba, in Central and South America, in Russia, in Egypt, and in Africa. In short, we are now in the process of being BRAINWASHED! And I don't mean that this policy is restricted to any particular political party. It's part of the American scene at election time. I sincerely hope that none of us will be fooled by it.

For many, many years (and not only at election time) it has been part of the character of we Americans to indulge in critical self-analysis. As a young, upstart nation, less than 200 years old and a colossus among all other nations - the strongest of all, with the highest living standards on earth - it has been good for us to examine ourselves -- to search and to find how we can do our job, as world leaders, better. However, we should be careful lest by constant exposure to speeches and newspaper articles, such as I have described, we convince ourselves that we are a decadent nation. Just a few weeks ago, two young men turned up in Russia and asked for political asylum because their former nation - the U.S.A. - were warmongers and spies! They had been employed in an intelligence agency of the U.S. Government! Traitors, yes, but they got that way by failing to see the real U.S.A., its people, its principles, and its purposes. By believing all the wild things and doubts that they read and heard. By not rejecting the things which they knew were just not true.

This is the danger that lies in the exercise of our right of free speech and in our habit of self-analysis even though we must continue to cherish both. Too many people are too concerned in finding inadequacies in America. They either refuse to recognize or lose sight of the many factors that together make us stronger than ever. Unscrupulous enemies at home and abroad deny, twist, and obscure the facts about our achievements as a people. In addition, bad news affecting us always gets bigger headlines than good news and that is why there is a real danger of our forgetting how sound our country is; how great its accomplishments; and how dynamic is our future!

I sincerely hope that each Clow employee will always think through for himself when he or she hears or reads that we are less than the great nation of people that he or she has always known us to be. I hope that each Clow employee will inform himself or herself on the facts that make our country what it is and be able to discuss these matters with their fellow employees. I hope that each Clow employee will be able to separate the "political propaganda" that will be fired at them in the heat of the campaign between now and November and the more deadly, more vicious brainwashing that we are subjected to by our enemies. Let's remember that America is still the greatest nation on earth and it is our responsibility and sacred duty to keep it so.











The Village Art Fair

In the midst of cement and mortar, trees and bushes, beneath sunny fall skies, the Village Art Fair had its day on Sunday, September 11, in the sedate and overgrown suburban Village of Oak Park (p.60,000). It was the Art Fair's Sixth Annual Exhibit held on Marion Street, between Lake and Ontario and in the adjacent parking lets.

Displayed before thousands of visitors
were some 300 entries, chiefly of Chicagoland artists, but also works from our
neighboring states and far away places.
Many of the local artists are members of the
Austin, Oak Park and River ForestArt League.

There were fascinating paintings and drawings of every description, sculpture, museum-like ceramics, colorful mosaics, gorgeous hand blown glassware, and exquisite jewelry. Phil White, of River Forest, showed his prize winning painting, an expression of warmth and beauty, "Young Girl Seated Before Large Window" and many other fine works. Artists were sketching heads of charming children and even a dewy-eyed grandma. The "Sculpture in the Round" exhibited abstract and classical forms, frozen with human emotions, by famous sculptors Abbott Pattison, of Chicago, Ossi Czinner, of Milan, and several others from New York, California and Minnesota. Two sculptors, Rudy Seno of Chicago and Luis Ortiz of Mexico actually worked on their pieces all day before interested crowds. The jewelry counters were particularly intriguing, luring the ladies a la Bargain Day. Many gold and silver peices were imbedded with semi-precious stones.

The recent revival in the art of colorful mosaics showed itself in many arrangements of useful and decorative articles. Marie Brundige, of LaGrange Park, had a fine exhibit, displaying a real flair for the geometric pattern. The mosaics brought to mind this ancient art practiced in Italy for hundreds of years, which in St. Peter's Cathedral at Rome had reached its highest form in marble.

There was a children's corner called "Art by the Yard" where youngsters tried their hand at art with palette colors and large strokes. Another feature was "Fence by the Foot." Here frustrated, would-be artists could dabble in paint in the winsome style of "Huck Finn." And like any fair, food, coffee, soft drinks and pink cotton candy were supplied by the concessionaires. It was a gala, yet serious event.

The Village Art Fair Board, a non-profit organization, has a certain sum allocated for the purchase of prize works of art, which are loaned out to schools and libraries. Both the artist and the public benefit from the Fair's efforts. Many pictures and objects d'art were sold, thus bringing art into the home and encouraging talented people to create, advance and widen the horizons of contemporary American Art. And who knows what seeds of genius may begin to sprout!
