
Sarah Shull or Mrs. Daniel Shull died in Dover, Ohio on

SCHOLL/SHULL FAMILY HISTORY

Passed down by: Jud Murphy, father-in-law to Chester Shull

Frederick Scholl, first ancestor of the SHULL family in America, came from Germany in 1728, which was the same year in which Peter Murphy, ancestor of the Murphy's in Belmont and Tuscarawas counties, came from Ireland and settled near Baltimore, Maryland.

Frederick Shull, who was a son of Peter Scholl in Germany, settled at Hellerstown, Lower Saucon Twp., Northampton Co., Pa., in the William Penn settlement. His land was purchased from the William Penn family.

He arrived at the port of Philadelphia on the ship "Goodwill". He died at his plantation called "Athens" in March of 1754. The family name was first known as Scholl, then Sholl and finally known as Shull.

Through historical records, it is known perfectly well the region in which its ancient history lies. It is the middle and upper Rhine valley from Cologne to Switzerland, from Alsace to Bavaria with the Rhine Palatinate, the Black Forest of Baden and Wurttemberg as the center. Over this area are scattered great numbers of families of the Scholl name, not merely now, but throughout the last four or five centuries at least.

It is from this reservoir that the constant stream of immigrants of this name has flowed to America.

Johann von Scholl, a Knight Crusader of the First Crusade, A.D. 1096.

The 'coat of arms' of the family was in use by Benedict Scholl, City Secretary of Boblingen, in the first quarter of the 17th century between 1620 and 1625. Benedict Scholl was son of Caspar Scholl, Doctor of Laws in Strasbourg, Alsace, who took a Master's degree at the University of Tubugen, August 16th, 1581. Caspar Scholl was son of Andreas Scholl L.L.D. and syndic of the Chamber of Accounts in Hagman, an important city of Alsace, ten miles north of Strasbourg, earlier the residence of the Hohenzollern Emperors.

The Scholl's were men of substance, learning, and influence at their first appearances, is apparent.

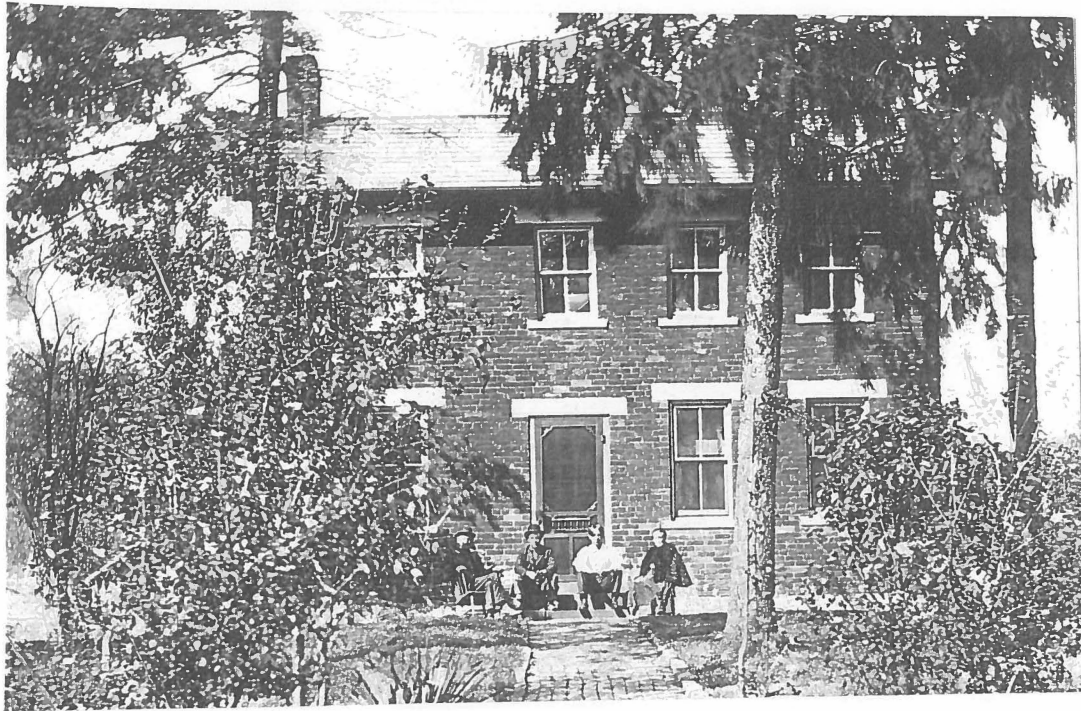
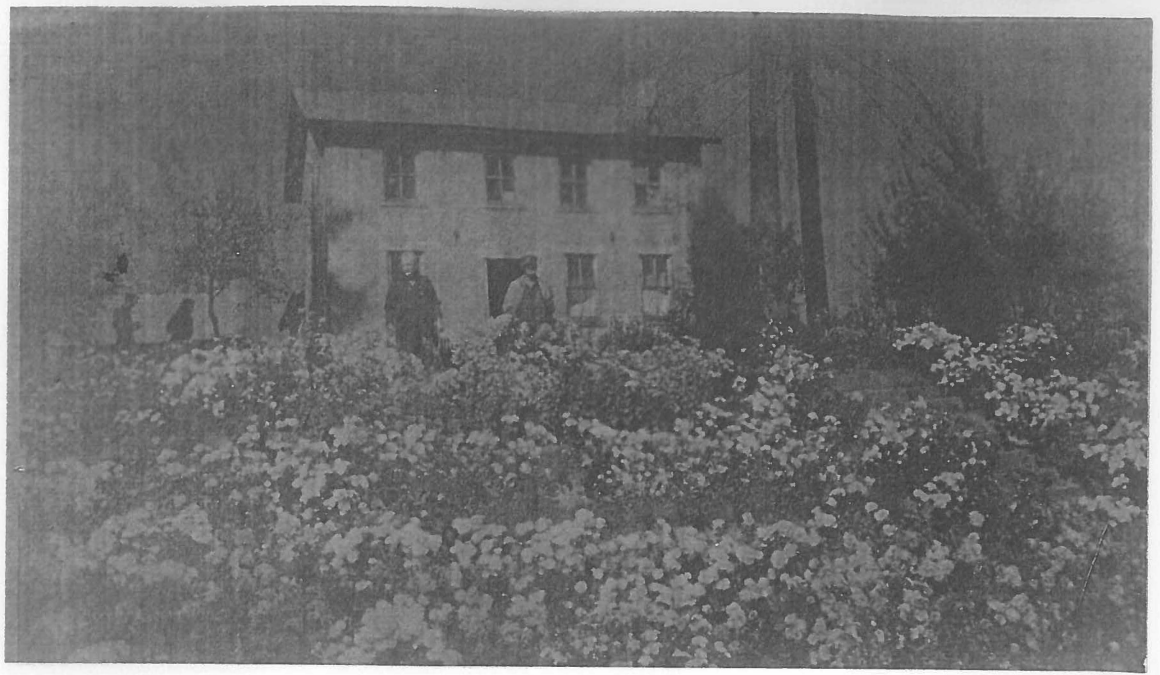

YORK TOWNSHIP.

York completes the list of townships. Her earlier official business was performed through Salem and Goshen Townships, of which she formed portions till her organization in 1828.

Among the early residents of York who came in or before 1808 were Francis Garnet, Philip Coon, John Shull, George Gimlitz, and Samuel Deardroff, all of whom settled on the lands adjacent to Stone Creek.

Harmon Pratt arrived in 1813, as did also William Barton. Henry Ackney coming in 1815, bought land off Shull. Henry Shaffer, an old bachelor, came out in 1808, and boarded and worked around with the settlers. Edward Wolf and William Hummul were also settlers of 1808.

The earliest marriages occurred in 1810, between George Coon and Margaret Gimlitz, Henry Falkner and Barbara Gimlitz, and Frederick Shull and Catharine Fathler.

Jacob Shull died in 1813, and was buried in the grave-yard of the Jerusalem Church. This old weather-worn building was erected in 1813, George Romuel being the carpenter. It was a union church, built by the Lutherans and Presbyterians. Revs. Snyder and Rider were the early preachers. Prior to the erection of a church, Shull's barn was used for religious assembly.

Margaret Coon, daughter to Philip, was born in December, 1809. The next birth was that of Joseph Shull, in March, 1810.

School was taught at Shull's till 1813, when the church was used for educational purposes. The first school in York was German, taught by Daniel Von Bramer; the second teacher was George Bucher, who taught in both English and German. He was patronized by families residing on Crooked Run and Oldtown, several miles distant.

John Shull made York's first clearing and put up the first house. Plows were home-made. Flax-spinning was a ceaseless domestic labor. Jacob Weltz was a notable tanner of buckskins, and made garments of them. He tanned during his continuance at the business over two thousand skins. Shull brought with him some apple-seeds, and these planted grew to be an orchard of natural fruit,—prized although inferior. Francis Garnet was the first distiller; he stilled in 1810, for himself and neighbors. His distillery had a capacity of sixty gallons.

George Bucher, a school-teacher, was the first Justice of the Peace in York. Coon and Garnet had a water-mill on Stone Creek in 1814. George Gilmore built the second. An oil mill started in 1835, near Phillipsburg, built by Deardroff, was run by John Bentfert. Aneky tells of seeing fifteen wolves in a drove. Deardroff, Garnet, and Coon built a pen to trap them and caught a panther; they prodded their formidable game to death with forks before opening the pen. The Myers brothers were Nimrods of the times. The sketches of the American pioneer find in York an ample illustration.

Township, from York County, Penn. Each had married the sister of the other, and for a few years both, with their families, lived in the same cabin, erected near the site of Frank Ankney's brick residence. Gernand had entered the northwest quarter of Section 25, and Kuhn the northeast quarter of the same section and the southeast quarter of Section 16. Each of these pioneers died on the farm he had founded, and their descendants are still represented in the township.

Henry Ankney emigrated from Somerset County, Penn., in 1815, and settled on the southeast quarter of Section 25, which had been entered by Frederick Shull. In 1826, he died on this farm, which is now occupied by his grandson, Francis Ankney. About the same time, or a little earlier, Eli Barton, an Englishman, settled on a 100-acre lot in the western part of the township. He raised a large family and afterward removed to Old Town Valley, where he died at the residence of his son.

Samuel Deardorff, in 1811, became a settler on Lot 2 of the fourth quarter of Township 8, Range 3, situated near the center of York Township. Formerly of Virginia, he had lived in York County, Penn., and made his first trip to Stone Creek on horseback, leading a second horse laden with a few simple agricultural implements. He made a clearing of several acres, plowed and planted it with corn, and in September brought his family to the pioneer home. Mr. Deardorff also owned Lot 11, on the southern line of York Township, which his descendants still own and occupy. He was a Lutheran, raised a large family, and died at a ripe old age on his farm.

John Benfer emigrated from Westphalia, Germany, to Maryland in 1797, and to Tuscarawas County in 1808. He resided for a number of years in Clay Township, and about 1820 removed to the southern part of York. He was a member of the German Reformed Church, reared a large family and passed the remainder of his life in this township. George Bucher, prior to 1820, emigrated from Pennsylvania to York Township, married Sarah Shull and settled on Lot 15, where he died many years later. Henry Pence, a brother-in-law to John Shull, came at an early date from Somerset County, Penn., and entered and settled upon the southwest quarter of Section 15. He was a Lutheran, and removed to Hummel Creek, where he died. George H. Putt, a German, owned a small amount of land in the western part of the township, and moved to it earlier than the year 1820. He was a member of the German Reformed Church, and died on his farm.

John Humrickhouse entered the southwest quarter of Section 25, on Stone Creek, about 1815, but died while making preparations to remove to it. His widow and children, however, settled on the place, and Mrs. Humrickhouse afterward married John George Kuhn. On Old Town Creek the earliest settlers were John Grim, Jacob Howe, William Wolf, Henry Shaffer, John Rice and Jacob Fribley. Of these John Grim came first. He hailed from York County, Penn., and entered and settled upon the northeast quarter of Section 3 some time after the Shulls had arrived on Stone Creek. He brought with him to York Township his wife Elizabeth and several children. His family, in all, numbered eleven children. Mr. Grim remained a lifelong resident of this township, and attained a ripe old age. Jacob Howe accompanied Grim from Pennsylvania, but tarried for a short time in New Philadelphia. He then entered the northwest quarter of Section 3, and settled there with his wife, Elizabeth, and children, who were eleven in number and are now scattered. William Wolf was the third settler in the valley. He came from Bedford County, Penn., with his family, and stopping with Jacob Howe, that settler offered to help Wolf locate a farm in return for one or two days' work. The proposition was accepted, and Mr. Wolf, after exploring the valley for

York Township was organized on December 1, 1828. The first election for township officers was held in 1829 at the cabin of Samuel Deardorf. George Bugher was chosen as the first Justice of the Peace.

The first pioneer on Stone Creek and in the territory that now constitutes York Township was John Shull. He came to Ohio with his wife and six children from Somerset County, Pennsylvania in 1806 and settled on Congress Land which he had purchased for \$2.00 per acre. Mr. Shull was a German by descent and belonged to the Lutheran Church. Mr. Shull died in 1833. He was the father of twelve children.

John Philip Kuhn, another early settler and of German origin, came to York Township from York County, Penn. in 1809. He had acquired two quarter sections of land which he operated as a farm and on which he resided until the time of his death in 1840. He was the father of six children. One of his sons, Daniel Kuhn, born in 1831, was a carpenter by trade and a prominent citizen of York Township. He held the offices of Township Treasurer, Assessor and Clerk, and was elected twice to the office of County Commissioner of Tuscarawas County. He was affiliated with the German Reformed Church.

Other early pioneers included Jacob Gimlin, Francis Germand, Henry Ankney, Samuel Deardorff, John Benfer, John Humrichouse, Henry Shaffer, John Rice, Jacob Fribley, William Butt, Jr. and Frederick Hummel.

The first school was held in John Shull's cabin in 1813 but before the term ended it was removed to the Lutheran log church which had just been erected. It was a German school and the first teacher was Daniel Von Bramer. George Bugher was the second teacher and he taught subjects in both the German and English languages. At that time a teacher received \$9.00 per month and his board. John Rice, a native of Somerset County, Penn. was the first teacher in the Old Town Valley. He taught in a rude cabin on Henry Shaffer's farm.

In 1815 the German Reformed and Lutheran sects united to build a church to be used for religious and school purposes. Philip Kuhn, John Germand and John Shull donated land upon which a hewed log structure was erected at the cost of \$287.00. In 1842 a frame structure was erected at a cost of \$694.00. A brick edifice was erected in 1877 and since then another brick structure has replaced it. The

church is now known as the Jerusalem United Church of Christ and is one of Tuscarawas County's most beautiful religious sanctuaries. Rev. Abraham Schneider was the first Lutheran minister and Rev. M. Schmidt was the first German Reformed minister.

St. Peter's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Old Town Valley was organized before 1838 at which time a log meeting house was erected on land donated by Philip Grim. Rev. E. Greenwald was the first minister.

The Methodists also established a church in Old Town as early as 1822. It has since gone out of existence.

Following the construction of the Marietta and Pittsburgh Railroad down Stone Creek Valley in 1874, two railroad stations were located within the limits of York Township. One was known as Black Band on the extreme southern line of the Township and the other was called Yorktown near its center. Both have long since been abandoned. A general store and postoffice was in existence at Black Band at one time. At Yorktown there were a few scattered buildings, including a grocery, a jewelry store, a blacksmith shop and a shoe shop. A post-office was also established at Yorktown. These spots have lost their individual identity and the post offices are not now in existence.

York Township in times past was noted for its mineral resources. Large quantities of coal were mined and shipped. Black Band iron ore was found and for several years was extensively mined and delivered to Glasgow and other places. (See Chapter X). The deposit of iron ore on "Shull's Hill" netted its owners over \$100,000.00.

A court of Common Pleas for the County of Tuscarawas in the fifth circuit of the State of Ohio began and held at the court house in New Philadelphia on Tuesday the tenth day of August in the year of Our Lord 1819 by the Honorable Benj'n Lappen, Pres. Henry Laffer, Christian Deardorff, and Nicholas Neighbor, Esq., Associate Judges of Said County.
The Grand Jury, to wit: Moses Ayers, foreman, George Richardson, John Maxwell, Henry Baker, Jr., Lewis Laubaugh, Joseph Brown, William Knappenberger, Samuel Stough, and John Shull, good and lawful men of the county were empaneled, sworn and charged to inquire for the state.

Grand Jury, Tuesday 23 of November, 1819

"Blicktown" is a hamlet of greater notoriety than size. It consists of four or five dwelling houses, a grist-mill and a lime kiln; and is situated on the canal about one and a half miles south of Dover.

In the extreme northwestern part of Dover Township, on the southeast quarter of Section 13, stands a little village now called Winfield, having a population in 1870 of 126, and in 1880, of 115. The village was formerly known as Mechanicsburg, and under that name William Haverstock, in 1849, laid out eleven lots, all situated on the south side of Main street. An addition of seventeen lots north of Main street was made the same year by Eli Booth. In November, 1853, James Delany platted eight lots in the same locality and gave to them the title of Winfield. Eli Booth in the following March, made an addition of nine lots on the north, Michael T. Kohr built the first house in the place. It was a small log cabin, and is still standing. The village is

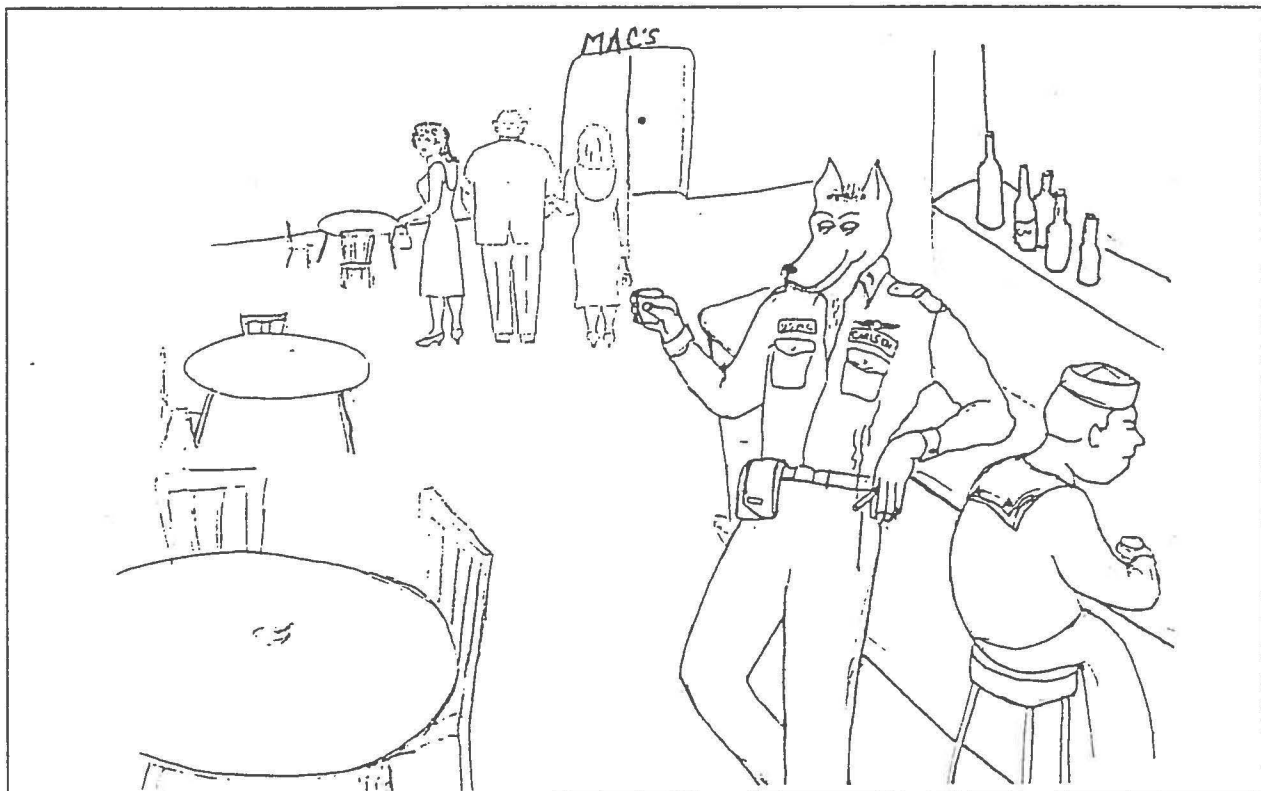
Preface

For the descendants of Richard Carlsen and Wally McLees, that time and place was a spring evening at Mac's nightclub in Vero Beach, Florida in 1946.

Lieutenant Richard Carlsen was a twenty-two year old Marine Corps pilot who had survived World War II and was learning, to his chagrin, that the Marine Corps didn't need him now that the Japanese had been vanquished. NeWaTa was a nineteen year old student nurse on vacation from Columbus, Ohio with her father and sister.

Richard was sitting at the bar in Mac's with a fellow officer, when in walked an "old guy with two nice-looking dames." The old guy was Marion McLees and the dames were his daughters Wally and Rachel. Richard was immediately attracted to Wally. He went over to their table to ask her to dance but found himself dancing with her sister instead because his friend had asked Wally first. When his turn to dance with the dark-haired beauty came, he saw to it that she stayed with him for the rest of the evening.

Wally remembers that he was rather sloppily dressed in wrinkled khaki's and combat boots but that she liked his "gift of gab." She felt comfortable around him because she didn't have to think of anything to say. He seemed happy to talk for both of them. She didn't think he was particularly handsome. Before the evening ended, the four made plans to meet at the beach the next day.

Wally and Rachel were sunning themselves on the beach the next day when the two pilots drove up. Wally remembers looking down as they came by "so that he wouldn't be able to walk on by and reject me." Richard had no intention of walking by. He had told his friend that he intended to marry this girl if she would have him. The four sat and talked for a couple of hours. They made a date for that night at Mac's.

If we voyeurs from the present did not already know how things eventually turned out, we might have been alarmed that evening. Rachel was not feeling well and told Wally she wouldn't be going to Mac's. Wally did not feel confident enough to go to a nightclub by herself, so she stayed home with Rachel. Richard was very disappointed when she didn't show.

The next evening Rachel felt better and father and daughters went to Mac's. Richard was there. But when Wally saw that he was sitting at a table with several nurses, her heart sank. She needn't have worried. As soon as he saw her, he came over to her table and started in where he had left off the day before. They talked the night away. When it was time to go home, Richard asked Marion if he could drive Wally home. Wally thought she knew the way. She didn't. They somehow found their way to a secluded parking spot and spent a little time getting to know each other better. When they finally found the house and Richard had said goodbye, Marion accused Wally of chasing after Richard just because he drove a Buick! "A Buick?" thought Wally. If Marion had known his daughter better, he would have known that she didn't know a Buick from a brick.

Like the Cinderella she had suddenly become, Wally had to leave after one magical night and return to Columbus. The lovers promised to write. For the next two months they did. Marriage was discussed. Several times Richard called to say that he would be coming, but each time the flight didn't materialize. Wally had started to wonder about his sincerity when he called to say that he had arrived in Columbus and was staying in the downtown Deshler Wallick Hotel.

Looking back, Richard remembers that he had come to Columbus to "pop the question" but one thing was worrying him. He had courted Wally as a Marine Corps officer but he had recently learned that the shrinking Corps had more pilots than it needed and would be demoting many of the junior officers. Richard was one of those chosen for demotion. Would Wally still want to marry him when she found out he would soon be an enlisted man?

She would. What Richard had perceived as a major obstacle was a non-issue to this carpenter's daughter. He liked that about her. A deal was struck and the couple made arrangements to travel to nearby Covington, Kentucky the next day - May 29, 1946. Unlike Ohio, Kentucky allowed marriages on the same day the license was obtained. Once in Covington, they located a taxicab driver who specialized in "package deal" marriages. For \$35 he arranged for blood tests, a

minister to perform the ceremony, a meal, and transportation.

The newlyweds returned to Columbus. When they and Wally's mother, Irene, drove to Rachel's house to meet Marion, both women were anxious. Each expected the protective Marion might not approve of Richard. Richard's attitude was "what's not to like?" Marion surprised them both by being pleased. Apparently, as long as this guy was willing to marry his daughter, he was OK by her.

After a few days in Columbus during which Richard was introduced to everyone, it was off to Richard's parents' summer cabin on Lake Raponda, Vermont for a honeymoon. The saga had begun.

NeWaTa McLees is the daughter of Marion McLees and Alverda Irene Shull, the husband of Richard Carlsen, and the mother of Lars, Lief, Alf, Kurt, Hans, and Ingrid Carlsen. She was born September 15, 1927 in Ormond Florida. Of her childhood, she writes.....

1926

1927 - Lindbergh is first to fly across the Atlantic and NeWaTa is born

"I remember my early childhood as a real nice, happy time. We left Florida when I was very young and moved to Danbury, Connecticut where my paternal grandfather was the superintendent of the fair grounds. When I was 4-5 we moved to Columbus. I played after school with dolls, skates, and a tricycle. When I was old enough, I got my own bicycle and played baseball (monkey-move-up) in a vacant lot. I listened some to the radio but not as much as a lot of the other kids who were into music and pop tunes.

1936 - Hitler hosts Olympics in Berlin

I loved to swim during the summer. I read quite a lot - visited the library often for books. In high school I did the required homework in the evenings and went to football games on the weekend with a group of girls. I belonged to the Tawanka Sorority in high school and held several offices. In summer the sorority went to Buckeye Lake where we rented a big cottage. We did a lot of swimming there, rowing boats and exploring. At night we went to dances at the pavilion. It was a great time of life.

1939 - 1945: World War II

I worked when in high school at Mill's Cafeteria as a waitress. When the customers were seated, we would remove their food and beverages from trays. Later, I worked for the same restaurant in the bake shop where I helped make pies and cakes. Toward the end of high school a bunch of my girlfriends and I worked as information operators for the telephone company.

1950 - Television sets become popular in U.S. homes

I took piano lessons but I hated them. Rachel practiced - I didn't. Many times my dad would take off his belt and lay it on my back side because I hadn't practiced. We had a recital and everyone had their turn performing. When my turn came, they called my name but I remained glued to my seat. So much for the piano.

1961 - "The Twist" dance craze

Then we took Hawaiian guitar lessons. Again Rachel did very well. I did it but not very well.

1969 - Man walks on the moon

When we went places as a family, the four of us, we would often sing in the car with my dad leading old-time favorites like "The Old Gray Mare" and "She'll Be Coming 'Round the Mountain."

1986 - Space shuttle "Challenger" explodes

My mother bought an old grand piano when we lived on 17th Avenue. It took up the whole end of the living room. She played hymns. When she was a kid she took piano lessons but, not having a piano, she had practiced on a paper keyboard.

I wasn't really that interested in music but I did listen to Guy Lombardo. When I told my cousin Melba's boyfriend Bob Swisher that I listened to it he acted horrified. I guess it wasn't

"in thing" to do.

I don't remember having magazines in our home. They were probably an unnecessary expense on our limited income. As for books, I had one Bobsy Twins book. Oh, how I wished to have the whole set! We had a Lincoln Library Encyclopedia from which we did all of our reports. I think it cost \$17. I read fiction from the library and I relished the romantic parts. Elsie Dinsmore I think was my favorite. How I admired her faith and trust in God!

The family dog was a Keeshound named Poochy. She slept at my dad's job site so he brought her home. We had a wire in the backyard from house to garage which she was attached to so that she could get exercise. She had fleas and they bit my ankles and no one else's (which proves that I was either the only sweet one in the family or that I tasted most like a dog). When she was in heat, she would get out and get impregnated. This happened several times as she was always having pups. Once she was with a male and my mother went and pulled him off her!

Sometimes my dad would take the whole family to the movies "downtown." That was high-class! But on Saturday afternoon we rode the city bus to Linden and went to the neighborhood movie. It cost ten cents. They always had a serial on which brought us all back the next week. Seems as though they were always cowboy movies on Saturday.

Later on we got a neighborhood movie within three or four blocks of our house so that we could easily walk. I would have gone to see each and every one of them if I could have. Every preview looked interesting. As for favorites, I'm not sure I had favorites but I know my film stars and still do when I watch Turner Classic Movies on TV.

I spent most of my summers in our neighborhood as a small

child. I remember endless hours spent riding the tricycle I shared with Rachel up and down the street. When we were older, we each had a bicycle and we rode those a lot too. We played house, dolls, and paper dolls. One summer we played with miniature cars in our driveway. It was cool in the shade and the driveway was two strips of concrete with dirt in between where we made roads for our cars.

When we were older, we went on day-long rides on our bicycles to the river and other places. Several summers we got season tickets to Morningside Pool. We were there when it opened and stayed until around 5:00 P.M.. We were often burned red as lobsters. Sometime in there we were at the farm in Marengo and one summer I stayed at Uncle Chuck's for a time for maybe two weeks or a month.

The only time I can remember us going on a true vacation was once when I was in elementary school. We drove back to Connecticut at Christmas - seven in a Chevy - my parents, Rachel and I, Aunt Jane and Uncle Wiley, and my cousin Melda.

My Mom

I am about seven or eight years old. Mom and I are walking through the Spangdahlem housing area on our way to the Cub Scout pack meeting at the elementary school. She is dressed in her Sunday suit and I wear my uniform. I walk proudly at her side. My bright blue uniform already sports a Bobcat pin and a Wolf badge. At the pack meeting I will be awarded the Bear badge. I relish this brief walk with my mother because time alone with her is exceedingly rare.

At the meeting, parents sit separately from the Scouts. My fellow Scouts and I sit in a row of folding chairs near the front of the gym. The boy beside me whispers "Is that your mom?" pointing to her. I tell him it is. "Boy, she's pretty!" he says. I look over my shoulder at her. I consider her appearance, then look around the room at the other mothers. She is, indeed, prettier.

We sit in a row on the hard, wooden pew near the back of the First Christian Church - my mother and her six children. The minister drones on from the pulpit. I scan the congregation in a vain effort to see something that will take my mind off my restlessness. It seems that today's sermon is even longer and more boring than usual. If only there were some way to convince my mother that church is not necessary for a ten-year-old boy. I look down the long row of my siblings to where my mother sits. Her eyes are intent on the minister. Her face beams with satisfaction as she drinks deeply of his words. My shoulders slump; my head droops; my hope dies. I know that any thought of escape from this Sunday tedium is pointless. I will never change her mind.

We went to several McLees family reunions. There were loads of people I didn't know and of course my dad's siblings and other close relatives. They had lots of food and big Thermos jugs of iced tea and lemonade.

Then there was Aunt Etta's farm. She had lots of grown kids. I remember they were nice to us little kids. It was fun with all of us cousins playing and the men playing horseshoes and baseball in the summer. There were barbecues in the summer and feasts at Thanksgiving and Christmas.

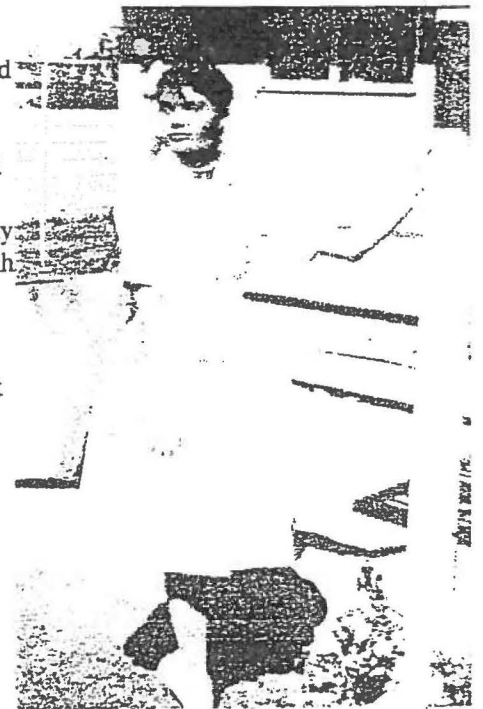
When Grandpa and Grandma McLees moved to Marengo, we always went there. I was comfortable because I knew my cousins, uncles, and grandparents. It was great - I wish my kids would like such gatherings at least once in awhile.

My parents were Methodists although I only remember them going to church about three or four times. My mother did play hymns at the piano. She was very superstitious and even visited an American Indian spiritualist for about once a week. The purpose was to communicate with the dead although I can't remember exactly who. Rachel and I went along. I remember several people sitting around the room meditating.

Once a picture spontaneously fell from the wall in our house and both my father and mother were certain it signaled that a relative had just died. They later learned that a distant relative had died about that time.

Rachel and I were sent to Sunday school when we lived at Grandma Bowen's. On 17th Ave. our next-door neighbor, Mrs. Wendell, took us to the Lutheran Sunday school. Later, we went to Methodist Sunday school with friends where I was really "touched" by God.

I don't like the word "religion." I am a Christian and it is the most important part of my life. I believe that I, like all Christians, was drawn to my beliefs by the Holy Spirit through the word of God.

Marion McLees was the son of Thomas Howard McLees and Anna Mae Phillip, the husband of Alverda Irene Shull, and the father of Freida Rachel McLees and NeWaTa (Wally) Irene McLees. He was born in Columbus, Ohio - the third of six children (Howard, Mary Olive, Helen, Hazel, and James). His father was a carpenter and money was, at times, tight for the family. Marion once talked about having to wear his older sister's hand-me-down shoes to school because the family could not afford a new pair. He worked as a milk delivery boy for a time. Like many children of his day, he left school after eighth grade. His daughter Wally remembers him this way....

"My dad was a carpenter. During the Depression, after we had moved to Columbus, he always seemed to have work repairing people's homes, etc. He finally went to work for Heckart Construction. His special talents were bidding jobs and reading blueprints - which he could do better than anyone else. He was construction foreman of the company and did many notable places in Columbus including Isaly's Dairy on High Street. Other jobs I remember are one where he tore out the interior of a theater where he built Walgreens drug store as well as some very expensive homes. He often took Mother, Rachel, and me to see his work.

He got a new car every two years. He was very faithful to Chevrolet until after the war when he got a Ford. He loved to be with his relatives. As kids we spent a lot of time at Aunt Jane's and Uncle Wiley's who lived on the West Side of Columbus. We visited Aunt Hazel and her family. In the summer we went to Aunt Etta's (maternal) farm. When Grandma and Grandpa

McLees moved to Marengo (Ohio), seems we were there most every weekend in the summer and often in the winter too.

He loved food. He loved to eat it and he loved to cook it. My mother always said he dirtied every pan in the house when he cooked.

I don't know just when the booze really got hold of him but we were still in grammar school when he would come home drunk. He was mean to my mother when he was drunk - I don't mean he ever hit her but he said cruel things to her. He was a handsome man and he exploited that gift by womanizing. He couldn't handle money. When he bought clothes (for himself) he would really outfit himself - a dozen pairs of socks, underwear, white shirts and a couple of suits.

He took a bath every night when he came home from work. After supper he would sit in his easy chair with his feet on his foot stool and read the paper. We always got two daily papers - the Columbus Dispatch and The Citizen. I remember him chuckling over the comics. I'm sure he was interested in current events but I don't remember him ever discussing them. Perhaps it is just that I didn't pay attention.

He built us a nice house north of Linden on Melrose Avenue in Columbus. Then he went to South America and North Africa on construction jobs. Evidently he left many bills behind (I think on just the house) as people would call my mother and be very ugly about the unpaid bills. She couldn't pay the bills because he hadn't sent money home.

After he came back from North Africa, they got a divorce. It was his idea I think but he let my mother file for it as that was the gentlemanly thing to do. He dated a very nice lady who had a lovely apartment which he took my sister and me to see. Later he married another woman named Sarah. She told me she was pretty sure that he had married her because she wouldn't sleep with him otherwise. Even though he was a rake with the women, he wanted a Puritan for himself.

They lived in Xenia, Ohio where he was constructing a building for Wilberforce University when he had a heart attack and died - on his forty-third birthday. We (Rich, baby Lars, Sarah, and I) were with him when he died. He was lying in bed after suffering an earlier heart attack and bouncing baby Lars on his chest when he suddenly began to turn blue and gasp for air. We called his doctor and described the symptoms. The doctor told us he was about to leave for vacation and refused to come over as there was nothing he could do for Dad. Richard jumped in the car and raced to a nearby hospital where he got a syringe of adrenalin. By the time he returned, Dad was dead.

There were loads of people at his funeral. I guess a lot of people liked him. I loved him very much but was always a little afraid of him."

Alverda Irene Shull was the daughter of Edward Shull and Alverda Irene Stone, the wife of Marion McLees, and the mother of Frieda Rachel McLees and NeWaTa Irene McLees. She was born on Halloween day in 1901 in Tuscarawus County, Ohio. She was known by her middle name or simply "Renie." Her daughter Wally (NeWaTa) remembers....

"Her father died when she was five years old. He loved her very much. She was their only daughter. She had four brothers. She remembered her dad calling her "Babe" and sitting on his knee. Her mother died when she was only ten years old. She never told me, but her oldest brother, Chuck, told me their mother took in wash for a living.

When her mother died, Chuck was to go live with a family and he refused to go unless he could take his baby brother Craig with him (which he did). Herb and Dan were each taken by separate families and my mother was raised by an elderly couple - the Bowens.

Grandpa Bowen must have been well-to-do as he did a lot of traveling. The way I understand it, Mother was taken in as a companion to Grandma Bowen. I'm sure she was an obedient, helpful child as she was that kind of person.

She went to business school and learned typing and shorthand.

She worked for the gas company as a young woman. There she met my grandfather McLees who was doing some kind of construction work for the gas company. He was taken with her and introduced my dad to her. I don't know how long they went together before they got married.

fore they got married.

Dad continued to give the biggest part of his paycheck to his mother. Mother made a fuss about it. I guess this did not endear her to Dad's mother.

My parents moved to Florida. My sister was born in Daytona Beach and when she was baptized, (the famous millionaire) John D. Rockefeller was present in the church. My mother said that when he shook hands with people he always left a dime in their hands. I was born in Ormond, Florida. I always wished I'd been born in Daytona. Whoever heard of Ormond? Our house burned down in Florida and my parents lost all of their belongings.

My mother had asthma. It used to really frighten me as a child to hear her gasp for breath. I was afraid she would die. She always assured us "no one ever died of asthma." (Of course, they do and I'm sure she told us just for assurance as she knew how frightened I was and probably my sister too of her dying.)

I remember being sick and vomiting when we lived in Danbury (Connecticut). She was so gentle and kind with me. Also, in Columbus, we were staying at Grandma Bowens and I had either chicken pox or measles and, again, she was so gentle - putting cold wet wash cloths on my brow to take down the fever.

She was the greatest mother ever. Always she in the middle and Rachel and I on either side. But she wasn't a very good housekeeper. She couldn't get herself moving. I'm sure a lot of it was because she wasn't feeling well. The dust would trigger her asthma. When she did do a job, it was really thorough whether it was doing dishes or whatever. She was a good cook. She was easy to be around and all our friends were comfortable around her and hung around our house a lot.

To help pay the bills she went to work as a court reporter while I was in junior high or high school. I remember her typing up notes when we lived on 17th Avenue (our home before we moved to the Melrose Avenue house). She first did it in shorthand and then took a course in how to operate the court reporting machine. Later she went to work for a lawyer at \$15/week. She soon switched to another lawyer in the same building and got \$25/week. She went to work for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers which had offices in Huntington Bank Building in Columbus. That was when I was in high school. I remember Norma (my friend) and I cutting school and stopping in to see her. I could tell she didn't approve but she didn't say anything to us.

She was anything but critical. She accepted everyone for what they were and where they were at in life. After we were married, she was never interfering or critical in any way.

She left Columbus after I married and for a time worked in Cincinnati, Ohio and later moved to Huntington, WVa, still working for the Corps of Engineers which was a civil service job. She had a very low rating which certainly wasn't fair as she was a good worker, an excellent typist, etc. but she would never push to get ahead and no one pushed for her.

I know her life with my dad was very hard for her as she had to contend with his drinking, his foolish spending of money and his womanizing.

After she went to work, she was a different person - much happier and more content. I can never find fault with women who work outside of the home as it was a Godsend for my mother. She wasn't home when we got home from school but I never felt neglected and I loved seeing her happier and more involved in life.

When she was in Huntington she met Fred Catlett. They used to eat in the same restaurant and became acquainted. He was a very good friend to her. His wife had left him and turned his kids against him. I think he was divorced but as far as I know they didn't want to get married. When he died, he left his entire estate to her.

She died July 19, 1972 in Huntington. She had only been retired a short time. When we went to the funeral her boss told us she kept coming into the office after her retirement

and he finally had to tell her to stop as they didn't have insurance to cover her. Her land-ladies (sisters) said she was planning on coming out to Victorville to see us about the time she died. They were the ones who found her body. When they hadn't seen her around for a couple of days, they had gone looking for her.

She had artistic talent. She made a beautiful charcoal picture of a lighthouse in a storm (wish I knew where it is).

Her main attribute was her acceptance of people. I loved her very much."

Lief remembers Grandma 'Renie.....

Grandma 'Renie was my "other" grandma. My dad's parents were the grandparents who were most around as I was growing up. Our family never lived near Renie and she was not one to force herself on others. I can only remember seeing her two or three times in my life. Her most memorable trait to my child's mind was her appearance. She had a skin condition that caused her arms to be red and swollen and she was constantly scratching her forearms with her long nails. Because she always wore several silver bracelets on each wrist, this scratching produced a jangling noise that served as a locator beacon. She had dark rings around her eyes and black hair streaked with grey. Her breathing was the raspy, labored breathing of an asthmatic. The total effect was rather alarming to me as a child and I avoided physical contact with her. God forgive me, I remember thinking she looked like nothing so much as a witch.

Despite our abominable treatment of her, she sometimes sent us money at Christmas and birthdays. My mother saw to it that we thanked her - which we did with obligatory letters. The last time I saw her was, I think, when she came to our house in Victorville when I was about twelve years old. I remember being very curious about the atomizer she used to relieve her asthma. All her possessions and clothes seemed to be from a bygone era to me. During that visit the family took her on a drive to the mountains and I got stuck sitting next to her in the car. I'm afraid I wasn't too gracious about it. She took my rudeness in stride and calmly watched the passing scenery. She died while Alf and I were hiking through Baja California and out of touch with the civilized world for several months. When we returned, Mom and Dad were in West Virginia at the funeral. Being

twenty-two at the time, I realized too late that I had squandered my opportunity to get to know her."

Grandaughter Dona Jean Wood remembers 'Renie:

"I remember her jangling bracelets (she wore several on each wrist) that I would hide when it was time for her leave. She would get so angry that I would have to give up and let her have them; it was as though she were incomplete without them.

Her skin condition was inherited from the Stoffer line. She was allergic to just about all fabrics except 100% cotton.

She took me on vacation trips with her when I was about ten to thirteen years old. Then I got too involved with teen things to worry about a grandmother - what a snot I must have been! She was a very isolated person. In my heart I think she was hurt so many times by being deserted by the people she loved - in losing her parents as a child, being separated

from her brothers. abandoned in all ways by Pop Marion - that she walled up her emotions to protect herself. She didn't talk about the hurt. I remember her telling me "If you can't say something good about a person, say nothing at all." She lived by that motto.

Fred Catlett loved 'Renie very much and wanted to marry her. They dated for as long as I can remember. She told me once that she told him she would marry him if she didn't have to sleep with him. So, they never married. He was a barber in Huntington, West Virginia.

Thomas McLees III was the son of Joseph McLees and Hannah Morrison and the grandson of Thomas McLees I and Sarah Hunter. He was born in a log cabin on his parents' farm (later known as Blossom Farm) in newly-settled Muskingum County, Ohio. His parents, both Scottish immigrants, had met in Pennsylvania and moved to Ohio in 1818.

He was the oldest of eight children - one brother and six sisters. His father was a farmer and sometime stone mason who built the first stone house in Muskingum County on Blossom Farm. He attended a small "subscription" school in the nearby Baptist church for which his parents paid a tuition of \$1.50 per month. Even in those times, these subscriptions did not add up to much money, so to supplement his salary, the teacher boarded with a different family each month. Schools often were in session for only a few months each year. Thomas seems to have been fond of school. He attended until he was seventeen and reported that he was always first in his class with mathematics being his favorite subject. When he was twenty-three, he moved to nearby Perry County and taught school for four years. During this time, he also married one of his former schoolmates - Miss Elizabeth Starrett. Elizabeth was a first cousin on his mother's side. Their nine children were: Josiah (1845), Annie (1847), Joseph (1848), Hannah (1850), Samuel (1852), James (1853), Sarah (1856), John (1858), Harriet (1860).

After the death of his father in 1848, Thomas acquired Blossom Farm and made his living as a farmer. He was one of the first farmers in the county to have a commercial fruit orchard. Thomas raised his family in the stone house his father had built, but he was himself a talented builder. In the 1860's he built a two-story log home for his son Samuel of such quality that it still stands today - as a permanent historical display on the Ohio State Fairgrounds in Columbus. The Ohio Department of Natural Resources moved it there from Blossom Farm in 1979 as an outstanding example of pioneer construction techniques.

Thomas was something of a social activist. Among his strongly held political convictions was his opposition to slavery (he named his youngest daughter Harriet Beecher Stowe McLees after the author of the famous anti-slavery novel "Uncle Tom's Cabin."). He was a delegate to the presidential convention of 1856 in which the new anti-slavery Republican party nominated their first presidential candidate - the dashing soldier/explorer John C. Fremont. Thomas was such a fervent Fremont supporter that he shaved his face smooth at the convention and vowed never to shave again until Fremont was elected. Fremont never was and Thomas' beard grew to Rip Van Winkle proportions by the time he died fifty years later.

Thomas backed up his political convictions with action. When Confederate cavalry general John Hunt Morgan and his Raiders broke through Union lines in 1863 and went on a rampage

of destruction through Ohio. Thomas was one of the volunteers who chased down and captured Morgan. In 1864, he and son Josiah joined the 116th Ohio Volunteers as privates. The unit served under General Hunter's Army of West Virginia which was deployed in the Shenandoah Valley. In the summer of 1864, Confederate commanding general Robert E. Lee sent 10,000 soldiers under General Jubal Early to push Hunter's troops out of the Shenandoah Valley. At 10 A.M. on July 7, in a skirmish near the Potomac River, Josiah was mortally wounded. He died ten days later. Whether Thomas was also wounded in the skirmish, the record does not show, but one month later he was still in a hospital in Frederick, Maryland as the following letter attests:

"If the death of his son....took some of the fire out of Thomas, it had returned by 1866."

If the death of his son or his own hospitalization took some of the fire out of Thomas, it had returned by 1866. That year he was elected county assessor and later boasted that he had completed his duties in only twenty-six days. Voters must have been impressed because they re-elected him

twice. He served that year as the first commander of the the local chapter of the Grand Army of the Republic which was an organization for Union Civil War veterans.

Thomas was a joiner. Some of the other organizations he belonged to were the Ancient Order of United Workmen, the P.O.S. of A. (?), and the Muskingum County Historical Society - serving as the first president of the latter.

His first wife, Elizabeth Starrett died in 1869. He then married Sarah Goldrick on 6/9/1870. After selling his farm to his son, he moved to nearby Zanesville to live out his years.

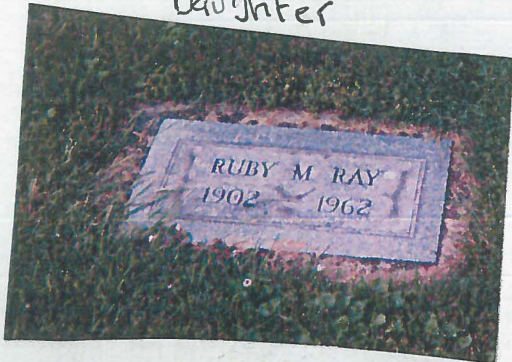
