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

## The President's Page

#### TO ALL CLOW EMPLOYEES:

It will be March before this issue of Clow News will be distributed throughout our company - yet we haven't, as yet, in the middle of February received our final figures showing the results of our efforts for 1957. We have, however, the preliminary figures and they are about as we expected.

To be sure, results are nothing to brag about but "by the same token" they are nothing to be ashamed of either. Our combined sales dropped from a near all-time high of \$44,000,000 to \$37,000,000,or a decline of 16%. Our pre-tax earnings in Clow & Sons were less than they were in 1956 by 29%, and our total company profit before taxes was down 27% from the high mark reached in 1956. At the same time, our expenses for selling, administrative, and Jobbing warehouse declined 3% and our basic wage rates increased 8.6% in '57 over '56.

What of 1958? That indeed is the \$64,000 question. Depending on which newspaper you read, whose business forecasting service you subscribe to, you can get almost any kind of a forecast for 1958 you desire. There is, however, one idea which is just about common to all reporting services and that is that the new year (1958) will not be as good as 1957.

Well, I don't believe that any of us thought that we could just go on indefinitely - each year setting new highs - as we have done every year since the end of World War II. We did that up until last year when we started to slow down - sort of catch our breath as it were. It looks as though we still are taking a breather and it may go on for some time. But there are lots of encouraging signs if we stop and think about it.

They tell us that there are from  $h\frac{1}{4}$  to 5 million men and women out of work. For us at Clow who feel so badly because so many of our fellow workers are - temporarily we hope - now laid off, this is indeed serious. We should also realize that over 50 million are still reporting for work every day! Retail and department store sales are still booming along at a merry clip showing that most of us still have money to spend. The municipal bond market is very strong - much better than it has been in many months. As most of our orders for cast iron pipe, valves and hydrants are paid for by the sale of municipal bonds by the cities who buy our products, this is a most helpful sign. There is a national election scheduled for the fall of 1958. Traditionally, before a national election the Federal Government does all in its power to see that "full employment" exists. It will do so this year I am sure. President Eisenhower has already announced a steppedup armament program and full speed ahead in the building of highways. The F.W. Dodge Corporation, the leading reporters on the construction industry, tell us that total construction for 1958 will be better than in 1957; that the value of contracts for housing, schools, and highways, along with other categories, are going up and should do much to offset other weaker segments of our economy.

Let's not be "taken in" by those forecasters of doom and depression. This is still the best land, inhabited by the most fortunate people on earth, a free people constituting the largest free market in the world, where we have 7 out of 10 of all the automobiles in the world, where 3 out of 4 families have a car, and where 13% of the families have 2 cars!

It may be tougher going this year, but I am confident that our company will continue to make good products, at low costs, sell these same products at fair profits to satisfied customers, and still be the best place on earth to work.




#### CHUCK DYAS LOCATES IN HARRISBURG AREA


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#### A GIRL FOR BOB JOHNSON

### "IMPROVEMENT-IN-SALES" COMPETITION NOW UNDERWAY

Nineteen Clow cast iron pipe salesmen are now competing with one another for the prizes that have been offered for improvement in sales of specials, valves, hydrants and river crossing pipe. Increased activity has been noted by those close to the order books, and intense competition for the grand prizes has started with a bang.

The rules of the contest have been offically dispatched to all the salesmen, delayed in an effort to make the rules as equitable as possible to all territories, keeping in mind that changes in territory, changes in individuals in the territories, and other complicating factors, required special consideration in drawing up concise rules by which the prizes will be awarded. The rules reprinted below, were issued recently to all Salesmen by sales manager, Harry Bower.

We have, therefore, taken the total sales of the company for 1957 for these categories and then taken above mentioned categories. We then divided the territory sales by the total company sales to arrive at the percentage of contribution each territory has made. At the end of each quarter and at the end of the year 1958, we will again total the company sales and the territory sales and arrive at each territory's percentage of contribution to overall sales. This figure will then be compared with the salesman's percentage of contribution in 1957 for each quarterly contest and then finally for the winners of the yearly contest. Those salesmen who show the greatest improvement in percentage of contribution for 1958 over their contribution in 1957 will be the winners."

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### MORTON ARBORETUM uses the Two-Main Method of installing water mains

Morton Arboretum is an internationally known institution dedicated to public appreciation of shrubbery, trees, landscaping and forest life. Located 25 miles southwest of Chicago, in Lisle Illinois, the Arboretum is building a large area of new homes for its management and employees. It is to be a model of correct design, and designed to illustrate various ways of proper landscaping in keeping with various types of architecture.

To provide water, more than 7,000 feet of Clow mechanical joint pipe, fittings and Eddy Valves and hydrants are being installed, using the two main system.


The two main system involves laying watermain down both sides of the street or roadway, thereby shortening the length of service connections, and minimizing future pavement repairs due to any maintenance or repairs to the underground piping.

This method for this installation had the added feature of providing greater safety to workmen and public using the roadway, since part of the piping was in conjunction with the widening of Highway (Route) 53, where uninterrupted traffic during construction was important, - and made possible by laying mains on both sides of the highway.

The photos on this and the page opposite, show construction work in progress. ROD O'CONNOR, Chicago, gets credit for this fine sale.


Below: View showing pipe strung out on both sides of the boulevard, in preparation for installation, using two-main system.


### BENSENVILLE


CLOW GIRLS IN CHICAGO AMERICAN BOWLING TOURNAMENT





We wish the best of health, happiness, and many years of retirement to JOE, BILLY, and FLOYD. They join 58 living retirees from the Coshocton Plant.





#### I.C.S. GRADUATE:




#### PERSONNEL CHANGES:

Within a few miles of the Coshocton Plant, the largest earth moving machine in the United States is in operation. This is "The Big Chief", the stripping shovel of Simco-Peabody Coal Company. This machine's dipper moves 70 yards of overburden at a bite of 250 tons. It was erected at the site by the Coal Company and was constructed by the Marion Power Shovel Co. The top of the boom is 15 stories in the air and the operators are taken to their stations by elevator. The total weight is 5.200.000 pounds and it moves on 8 huge treads. A description given by a representative of the Company is that if you piled 166 automobiles on a platform, picked them up, swung them a city block and placed the platform on top of a ten story building, you would be describing "The Big Chief". This machine is part of the coal operation that will furnish 15.000 tons of coal each day to a large power generating station located in Conesville. a few miles from Coshocton.





### SUGGESTION WINNERS

We are happy to announce more suggestion award winners in this month's issue of the Clow News. Employees turning their ideas into cash were FRANK STOLARSKI. JOE SHORES and IRA HALLMARK.

FRANK STOLARSKI'S suggestion has to do with the weld-on flanges added to the 4" cooling system lines on the delavaud pipe machines. These flanges change the method of repair to swing joints by simply removing the bolts from the flanges, and lowering the swing joints to the floor for easier and faster repairs. FRANK believed this idea would improve service. methods and reduce costs.

JOE SHORES' suggestion involves an electric interlock installed in the Specials Foundry circuit, that enables the shakeout roll-over to operate without danger of rolling over, until the drag ram or cope ram has fully retracted to a safe position. JOE'S idea improves service and reduces costs.

IRA HALIMARK suggested straightening the 2" rollers that get bent on the flask run in the Specials Foundry instead of replacing with new ones. This suggestion also reduces costs.






