

#### OXFORD TOWNSHIP,

JOHN E. WOOD, section foreman Marietta Railway, Newcomerstown, was born in the county of Sussex, England, September 17, 1850, and is a son of Anthony and Ann (Halsey) Wood, residents of Sussex, England. The former was born in 1826, the latter in 1820. He emigrated to Ohio in 1871, and married in Newcomerstown February 12, 1882. Mr. Wood has been a resident of Newcomerstown about two years, and is a member of the Knights of Pythias, Newcomerstown. He is the second in a family of four children. His wife's parents were early settlers in this county. Her father, who is deceased, was a miller, and was the father of four children, Mrs. Wood being the eldest child.

WICK W. WOOD, editor and proprietor of *The Index*, Newcomerstown, was born in Greenville, Mercer Co., Penn., December 1, 1858, and is a son of Capt. W. W. W. Wood, of Company G. One Hundreth and Forty-fifth Regiment Pennsylvania Volunteers, and Nancy (George) Wood, the former a banker and the latter a daughter of Clinton George, of Scotch and English extraction. Wick W. Wood was married, September 5, 1880, to Tade Clinefelter, a grand-daughter of Gen. Robert Kile, of Mercer, Penn., and a daughter of George and Elizabeth Clinefelter, of Newcastle, Penn. To this union two children were born, both deceased. Mr. Wood was formerly connected with the New Castle Daily and Weekly News, as advertising representative and solicitor.

CHRISTIAN ZIMMER, farmer and stock-raiser, P. O. Newcomerstown, is a native of Bavaria, Germany, born October 8, 1818. He emigrated to this county with his parents when he was eighteen years old. His parents were Philip and Catherine (Cline) Zimmer. The former was born January 14, 1785, died June 10, 1877, aged ninety-two years seven months and fourteen days. The latter died in 1866, aged seventy-six years. They are buried in Buck Township, this county. Our subject was married, April 17, 1845, to Catherine Showalter, deceased, born April 16, 1826, in Sugar Creek Township, this county and State, and a daughter of John and Elizabeth Showalter. She died November 18, 1838. Her father was a native of Pennsylvania, and her mother of this county. Marrying a second time, in 1840; Mr. Zimmer chose Christina Smelzy, born August 5, 1823, died December 6, 1853. To this union four children were born, viz.: Lucinda, Amelia, Henry and John. The latter died January 19, 1873, aged seventeen years four months and twenty-eight days. Mr. Zimmer was married a third time ; on this occasion, April 25, 1860, to Eliza Fisher, born in this county, January 3, 1835, and a daughter of Jonathan and Hester (Levean) Fisher. To this union have been born eight children, seven living, viz.: Susan E., Albert, Clara A., Manetta, Wilmina May, Francis H., Laura and Artha. Two of the children are married-Lucinda, wife of William Regula, they have three children-Fred, Eda and Albert; and Henry, married to Elizabeth Hammond, by whom he has one child, Arthur. Mr. Zimmer owns 100 acres of land in Oxford Township.

Albert Zimmer, 1862-1937, was the only son of Christian Zimmer, 1818-1893, and Eliza Fisher, 1835-1911. Christian, a stonemason, was a son of Philip Zimmer, 1785-1877, and Katrina Cline, 1790-1866.

mer, 1785-1877, and Katrina Cline, 1790-1866. The entire Zimmer family migrated from Rockenhausen Bavaria to Tuscarawas County about 1835. Both parents died in Bucks Twp. Eliza was a daughter of Jonathan Fisher, 1802-1877, and Esther Levan, 1799-1873, of Somerset, Pennsylvania. The Fishers were in Sugarcreek Twp. by 1830 and he operated a woolen mill there.

The Christian Zimmer farm was a mile north of Newcomerstown in Buckhorn Valley. First engaged in farming and dairying, Albert later became a partner with his half-brother, Henry, in the Zimmer Lumber Co. but withdrew when his health failed. A leader in community affairs, he was a charter member of both Newcomerstown Chamber of Commerce and Rotary Club and a 50year member of the Masonic Lodge.

Married January 3, 1900, his wife was Anna Myrtle Moore, 1876-1973, younger daughter of David Burress Moore, 1842-1904, and Maria Pilling, 1847-1929, both Tuscarawas County natives.

Her father enlisted in 1862 in Co. K, 98th O.V.I., was wounded in the battle of Perryville, but served until the end of the war.

Anna's paternal grandparents were Alexander Moore, 1802-1882, and Jane Martin, 1817-1888, both natives of Pennsylvania. Alexander's parents were Burris Moore, 1769-1862, and Mary White, who died in Salem Township in 1828. First settling in Guernsey County, they had moved to Salem Township in Tusc. County in the 1820's. Jane's parents were David Martin, 1780-1854, and Esther Miller.

Anna's maternal grandparents, James Pilling, 1803-1879, who came to America about 1820 and Sarah Cunard, 1808-1853, a New Jersey native, came to Oxford Township in 1841. He operated a sawmill and woolen mill on property still in the family and built the house in 1860 now occupied by a great-granddaughter.

House in 1860 now occupied by a great-granddaughter. His parents were Richard Pilling, 1782-1858, and Anne Lord, 1782-1859, of Lancashire, England. Sarah's parents were Anthony Cunard, 1748-1819, a greatgrandson of Thones Kunders, one of the founders of Germantown, Pennsylvania, and Anne (Nancy) Wheatley, 1868-1850, of Red Bank, N.J. Anthony died and was buried at Red Stone, Pennsylvania, after returning from a trip back east to inquire about property in downtown Philadelphia which he and his sister, Elizabeth, had owned jointly.


David and Maria Moore bought the Pilling farm in 1880. Albert and Anna Zimmer resided with them. Their children, Frederic 1901, Lois 1903, David 1905-1980 and Marian 1913 were born there. All four are Ohio State University graduates.

Frederic's family history is published elsewhere in this volume. David, a ceramic engineer, and Christine Laughlin, 1908, of East Liverpool were married in 1937 and their children are: David 1939 of St. Louis and Albert 1940 of Chicago. Christine's parents were Hugh Laughlin, 1869-1942, of Lore City and Sylvia Pike, 1877-1955, of Lisbon.

David Jr. and Rosemary Beckett, 1940, of Baltimore, Ohio were married in 1961 and have two daughters, Celeste, 1963 (Mrs. Gerald Hoerner) of Dayton and Cecilia, 1966, of St. Louis.



# Demolition is a fitting end

Demolition of the sheds and office buildings of the Zimmer Lumber Company on East Main Street, Newcomerstown, brings a fitting end to one of the oldest business enterprises in Newcomerstown.

First operating in the 1890's as the partnership of Henry Zimmer and Harrison Howell as a contracting and building supply business, it was located on West Canal Street on land now used as the American Legion's parking lot.

My father, Albert Zimmer, a halfbrother of Henry, entered the partnership in 1901, purchasing Howell's interest. At that time, the firm had just concluded its most important contract, the construction of the First National Bank building.

It is with the Canal Street location of the lumberyard that my brother, Frederic, our late brother, David, and I gained most of our recollections. Our sister, Marian, was too young to have had much participation during that time.

We like to hear about the summer when the annual street fair was scheduled, with the Zimmer Lumber Co. posting its usual prize for the boy who won the tub race on the canal. But that summer, the weather turned dry and there wasn't enough water left in the canal to stage the race. That probably occurred before the 1913 flood, which wiped out what was left of the once-bustling waterway.

Shortly after that a walkway was built, scarely more than a plank or two wide with a hand-rail on each side, spanning the muddy ditch. Then, it was possible for anyone on the south side of the canal to walk through the opening between the lumberyard's office and the sheds to the west, cross on the bridge and reach the open square facing the end of Cross Street. A driveway circling the main building separated it on the east from the property of Mrs. Vane Scott's great-Sultzer, grandmother.

The pump, standing in the southwest corner of Mrs. Sultzer's yard, was of inestimable value to the whole community. With a tin cup, usually hanging from a wire, it formed an oasis not only for thirsty children but for tired farmers who came to buy lumber and other building supplies. And day laborers who were hired as extrahelp when cars of lumber or slate had to be unloaded and hauled from the "house track," a public railroad siding located behind the Produce Company on West Church Street, visited it often. By the time my brothers and I reached high school, we were parttime employees, with the boys helping with hauling and I learning to do simple bookkeeping. In the early days hauling was done with a wagon pulled by a white horse named Frank, who dwelt in a stable on a back lot near the Globe Hotel. This stood facing the railroad on the southeast corner of Bridge and Canal streets.

But Frank was put out to pasture about 1916, when the company acquired its first truck. This was a Ford Form-A-Truck, with chain drive and hard rubber tires on ts rear wheels.

At this time, the company bought the lumberyard on East Main Street (still identified on maps as Basin Street) from G.W. Mulvane but operated by James Cole. But for the next decade this property was used only for storage and for greater ease in receiving rail shipments, since a siding off the C&M Railroad already was there.

Frederic's most vivid and painful memories deal with his slate punching. Slate came from the New England quarries in single pieces but without any nailholes. It was his duty to insert the separate pieces into the machine and then, stamping on a pedal, drive the metal punch through the slate. We have long referred to one large barn on a farm between Newcomerstown and Bakersville as "Frederic's barn," for he never forgot the summer he punched all the slate for its very expensive roof. He was especially happy when his machine was moved to the new location on East Main Street for there he could work all day while listening to the rag-time tunes coming from the mechanical piano at Abe Davis's Candyland. Abe's establishment became the site of the Huntington Bank.

The entire company, after much remodeling of the Main Street property, moved there in the late 1902's, abandoning the Canal Street site. Prior to his death in 1937, my father had sold his interest in the company to Henry's son Arthur. As the years passed, the management and entire ownership moved from Henry to Arthur, to Arthur's son, Robert, and finally to Robert's son, Henry.

Faced with competition from major corporations, this little business (like many once-owner-operated small business endeavors, failed, and the building has remained empty for several years.

As yet, there has been no public announcement has been made concerning further use of this valuable location in the heart of Newcomerstown's business district.
