On July 1, 1950, the William M. Brode residence at 407 E. Canal St. was purchased. After initial remodeling, the Ourant Funeral Home moved to that address on Oct. 1, 1950, where it has remained.

Since that time, there have been three additions to make the funeral

home more accessible to the people of Newcomerstown and the surrounding communities. A parking lot was also added to the facility and is currently located on the north side of E. Canal Street, across the street from the funeral home.

Services currently provided by Ourant Funeral Home, in addition to providing funeral services, include funeral planning arrangements, living wills, medical alert cards, assistance with military, government and human services applications, insurance forms assistance, funeral prepayment plans, installment plans, etc.

The nature of the funeral profession has changed dramatically during the past two decades. No longer do the services provided by funeral directors end with the burial on the day of the service. Many aftercare

programs and funeral postcounseling programs have been created to assist families with the many details which are now involved with the settlement of estates, property appraisals, funeral planning procedures, etc. Funeral directors are now being taught many psychological skills, as well as the traditional scientific skills in order to serve people and assist them with the acceptance of death and seeking help in putting their lives together after the death of a spouse, parent or close relative. It is estimated that there are between 60 to 80 details or decisions which have to be made at the time a death occurs. Many families are beginning to realize that the collection of vital statistics, family records, military records, gathering of life insurance papers and many other details of funeral planning is

made much easier when details are discussed and transacted before the need arises. Working with the county departments of human services and area nursing home administrators and staffs have also become areas where today's funeral directors have been able to provide their assistance and skills to the various families which they serve.

William Ourant was a 1939 graduate of Scio High School and attended the Ohio State University during World War II. He is a veteran of the U.S. Army Air Corps, becoming a pilot and being a prisoner of war. He graduated from the Cincinnati College of Mortuary Science in 1948. He has been active in many activities in Newcomerstown during his career, including the American Legion (past commander), Veterans of Foreign Wars, Newcomerstown Library Board, AAA Board of Directors for Tuscarawas County, Lions Club, Community Improvement Corp., Newcomerstown Business and Professional Men's Club, Chamber of Commerce, Board of Directors for the Riverside Manor Nursing and Rehabilitation Center, Ohio and Tri-County Funeral Directors Associations, Newcomerstown Elks Lodge, Newcomerstown Moose Lodge, the First Presbyterian Church and the Board of Directors of the First Federal Savings Bank.

John C. Ourant, a 1965 graduate of Newcomerstown High School and a 1969 graduate of Westminster College, New Wilmington, Pa., served in the U.S. Navy during the early 1970's and is a 1983 graduate of the Cincinnati College of Mortuary Science. He entered the funeral profession as a licensed director with his father and Robert Parks in 1984. He is active in the Lions Club, Hospice of Tuscarawas County, Library Board, First Presbyterian Church, Newcomerstown Youth League Board, Ohio and Tri-County

Funeral Directors, Business and Professional Men's Club, Dollars for Scholars, Elks Lodge, and the American Legion.

John Ourant married Bonnie Spengler in May of 1984, and she assists with the administrative operations of the funeral home. Kenneth L. Ourant is a 1975 graduate of Newcomerstown High School and assists with the maintenance, landscaping and staff details of the funeral home. He is active with the Sons of the American Legion, Newcomerstown Moose Club and the bowling leagues at Cy

Young Lanes.

William Ourant is still active with the funeral home. He and his wife also spend time at their winter home in Winter Haven, Florida. John Ourant currently serves as president of the company while his wife, Bonnie, serves as secretary/treasurer.
