

known as Camp Sheridan. We were here five weeks, during which time the measles infected the camp and many died in the hospital with them, also many had fatal pneumonia.

We drilled six hours a day, when not on other duty. Quite a number of old regiments were in the division, among the number the 8th Wisconsin, composed mostly of "lumbermen," and they were the cleanliest set of men in the service. In the 14th Michigan were two companies of half-breed Indians, who were famous for their drill as skirmishers.

A foot race was arranged between the 8th Wisconsin, 14th Michigan, 85th Illinois and 52nd Ohio, the prize being a silk guidon or marker. It was placed on a hill, half a mile away. The soldier who touched the flag first, was to bear it away as the prize of his regiment. The race was very exciting. Down into the valley and up the slopes we went, yelling at every step. Little Phil leading the charge with his hat on the point of his sword, riding the same horse that was shot from under him at Stone Riversix weeks later. The flag was reached by Billy Armstrong of Company H, of our regiment, and he was placed upon the shoulders of his comrades and borne into camp in triumph.

Camp life was not conducive to contentment in our army experience. We were busy drilling and policing our camp, but thoughts of home and friends grew more intense. Letters came. They spoke of Thanksgiving. There was to be song and sermon in the old church. The table spread and all the children home but the loyal soldier boys. And the loyal land would send up a song and psalm for the blessings it had numbered. Some grew homesick and died of the terrible longing for home. The symptoms were, languor, debility, low fever, loss of appetite—death. But he who died thus, gave his life as truly as if a bullet had found his

heart. Loved ones at home had something to answer for. Many a boy died, just because his dearest friends did not send him a prescription twice a week—price three cents.

But it was not all dull and dreary in camp. The only thing was, that it was so unlike home. Not a familiar sound in it all. No sweet Sabbath bells, no lowing herds, no chanticleer's shrill crow, no rattling pavements, no shutting

doors—what was there to cheer the heart and revive the spirits? Hark! At break of day from field and wood and hill, come the sweet notes of the reveille. Bugle answers to bugle, fifes warble, and through the roaring of the drum you catch the soul stirring swell of a full band, playing in an unseen camp. There is music everywhere. When the martial strains have ceased, the contrast begins in the hideous

delphia, and Carrollton, Ohio, where he now lives and fills the position.

Company D lost more men than any company in the regiment. Nineteen were killed or died from wounds. twenty-six were wounded, fourteen died of disease in the hospital, and thirty-four were mustered out with the company. The company is before me today, and most of their faces are familiar. There is Lowmiller, who was a recruit. and fell at Dallas. There is Johnny Sill, how his poor mother used to come to our reunions, while she lived, and listen to stories of her brave boy's death, as he went up Kenesaw, hat in one hand, and gun in the other. And I see poor Francis Grace, who fell on the breast works, and James Beard, so young and loyal. Then Armstrong and Daugherty and Shackle, all of whom lay in the sun that afternoon mortally wounded. I then turn to the living, whose foreheads are wrinkled and locks are gray. There are the two Neighbor boys, George and Theodore. George was a priosner at Peach Tree, and in Andersonville six months, and "Dode," as we called him, came out with as vivid a recollection of what he saw, as any man in the army. He is a well-to do merchant of New Comerstown, O. He never misses a reunion. He has two excellent qualities, he loves home, has an excellent family, and he loves the boys who saved our country. Jehu Peck came home, settled down as a shoe merchant in New Comerstown, Ohio, and is a clean, christian gentleman, the kind of a man that makes a good citizen. There is Gilbert L. Patterson, with the best of a record as a soldier and citizen, as well. John Smith, a cheerful, whole-souled companion, who, because of his smooth, boyish face, was known as "Kate." There was John Kirk with his big knapsack, and Anthony Hartley the great forager. The rebs captured him at Fenn's bridge, loaded with chickens and forage of all kinds. I re-

the hand-scratched earthworks less than 100 yards from the Confederates. It also was painfully apparent to the young private that his regiment was greatly reduced in size. Eighteen were dead and 126 wounded. Most of them remained lying unattended between the lines.²³

* * *

There were very few soldiers in his brigade who did not respect and admire Daniel McCook. "Colonel Dan," his men universally called him, was a scion of Ohio's "Fighting McCooks" — two families that furnished 14 sons to the United States army and navy, all but one becoming commissioned offi-

cers. Thus far the war had claimed two of his eight brothers as well as their father, Daniel McCook Sr., who was mortally wounded in a skirmish during Confederate Brigadier General John Hunt Morgan's Ohio raid of July 1863. 24

As an attorney in partnership with William T. Sherman at Leavenworth, Kansas, in 1860, McCook organized a volunteer militia company, tendering its services to the Federal government in February 1861. The company, with McCook as its captain, became part of the 1st Kansas Infantry which received a bloody baptism that August at Wilson's Creek, Missouri, suffering 284 casualties. In July 1862 he was commissioned colonel of the 52nd Ohio, and subsequently promoted to brigade command. One of McCook's subalterns, First Lieutenant Lansing J. Dawdy of the 86th Illinois, fondly remembered: "Dan was proud of his brigade, and perhaps no brigade commander tried harder to have the best drilled brigade in the service. He never missed an opportunity to drill and instruct both officers and men. In fact, he went so far as to have only one commissioned officer drill the regiments, and sergeants command the companies. This for instruction. All were taught that no matter what happened in battle, they must hang together - that their greatest strength was in unity of action."25

The morning of June 27 brought McCook to the apogee of his military career. Perhaps sensing impending doom, he strolled through the brigade's prone ranks, mouthing the words of Macauley's poem and admonishing everyone to lie low. "Bullets whistled over us from the enemy's skirmishers," observed Private Theodore Neighbor of Company D, 52nd Ohio. "Colonel Dan did not seem to think there was any danger of himself being shot, and when he told Jonathan Sills of Co. D to lie down -Sills having raised up to look over into the woods from whence the bullets came - 'You will get your head shot off,' Sills replied: 'You might get your head shot off.' Colonel Dan replied: 'Tis an easy matter to fill my place and a very hard matter to fill yours, now lie down.' Fifteen or twenty minutes later Sills was killed." 26

Major James T. Holmes noticed an ominous stillness pervade the regiment. "All knew that many must fall and each heart communed with itself in these few brief moments of rest. Some were gazing upon a sun that would only shine in after days to


