That project is now available for viewing in volumes at the Newcomerstown Public Library.

Little was born in Coshocton County, "But my parents, Andrew Clifton Little and Alice May Fletcher, were both raised in the Newcomerstown area. Part of my early years were spent working on the Fletcher farm in Shady Bend where my Uncle Roy David Fletcher was doing the farming. A lot of people may remember he later went to work at the Oxford Bank in Newcomerstown.

"After graduating from West Lafayette High School in 1957, I worked in this area until 1963 and decided to go to California to seek better employment. I was hearing from people I knew in California that jobs were easy to find. I found that to be true, so I stayed there until I retired in 1993 from the Southern California Gas Co. By then, I found that California was not where I wanted to spend my retirement years. I had remained in contact with the relatives I had in the Newcomerstown area and some old school friends that I saw when I came back to Ohio to visit.

"I decided to move back to Newcomerstown for my retirement as I was tired of living in a big city environment. I wanted to live in a small area again. I took up a couple of hobbies that I had but the first thing I had to do was repair and update an older home. As time went by and I got older, I thought it might be better to do something that wasn't quite as physical. Since I had been collecting pictures from The Newcomerstown News about history-related buildings and other items, I thought it would be good to organize them into a notebook."

That decision took Little down a path that was well-populated with other people more than willing to help him achieve his dream.

"In 2017, I started this project and am still looking for more pictures to add to what I already have. I now have over 1,000 pictures," he said. "Most of them are in notebooks according to street address. Many others are in notebooks according to category. Then I thought it would be good to make a list of who had been in busi-

ness in these buildings. This led to trying to find the different business people who had been in all of these business buildings. I thought this would be good information to put together for future use by others who might have a similar interest, or were just trying to find some information on a particular building or business name. There were directories for various years, but nobody had put them all together in one notebook.

"It began with a friend of mine, Wayne Schworm, who had lived here his entire life and who had a very good memory. He gave me a very good start on what I had in mind to do. I then went to the Temperance Tavern Museum where Dick Mathias was very helpful in locating what they had for me to see. Next was the Newcomerstown Public Library, where I met Elaine Mayenschein, who was looking after the history department there. She and I started sharing information and pictures with each other. She has a lot of pictures that can be seen at the Library, as well as a lot of other research material.

"Then I met William Casteel, who comes into the library on a regular basis. He was a big help in that he had a lot of pictures and news items of historical interest that I wanted. I had decided to add a lot of history news articles written by others, who, in the past, had written on this subject. He was very generous and shared a lot with me. Other people who were willing to share what they had began to come into the library to show us what they had. Chris Kincaid and the staff at the library were also very good at helping me. My thanks goes out to all of them. I guess I will always be looking for more pictures and news articles."

Mayenschien, in particular, has been instrumental in developing the Newcomerstown history department at the library, which includes Little's volumes. In addition to his contribution, she has collected articles and photographs about businesses, industries and more that are available for review at the library. Little said one of the challenges in compiling information was when different writers didn't agree on certain facts.

"That happened quite often in writing about early history," Little said. "I tried to present both views. Some differences I think I have figured out and other ones I'm still working on. Some were stories that were handed down for many generations and others were

legends with no historical facts to back them. Some writers copy earlier writings, carrying on the same errors."

Among the sources for Little were writings by Charles Lieser, David Burress (D.B.) Moore, Erwin C. Johns, Lois Zimmer (Craig) and newspaper articles by a host of different writers. He also referenced advertisements in old newspapers and Newcomerstown school yearbooks, The Newcosean; Wiggins & McKillop's 1878 Newcomerstown Directory; Business Directory of Tuscarawas County 1887 and History of Tuscarawas County 1884; The Newcomerstown News; Newcomerstown directories, from 1926, 1939, 1942, 1949-50-51, 1953 and 1970; and the Sunburn and Perris Newcomerstown fire maps for 1895 1901, 1907, 1915, 1924, 1933 and 1942.

"Many of these businesses were in buildings that are no longer there," Little said. "Some sites are now vacant lots or have been replaced with newer buildings. Most of the older buildings were not marked with numbers, they were known by building names, which changed over time. Some were known by the builder's name; some were known by the name of the current owner of the building and also by the name of the tenant at that time. Some of the buildings used different numbers with different occupants. A lot of the stores changed building locations, some several times over the years."

Little said one of the most rewarding things about the project has been working with "all of the great people who were willing to help me, as I would not have gotten very far without them. My thanks goes out to all of them. All of the reactions I get are very positive."

Six notebooks exist with with those at the library and museum being the most accessible. Little said that when he finds an occasional error or something that needs to be added, he updates all six copies to be current with those changes. The project also includes pages on the history of Newcomerstown itself and the surrounding area. The articles were written in books and newspapers many years ago, with conflicting "facts," Little said. "I have compiled information from all of the people who wrote about the history, to show what some of these differences are.

"I am still finding new things to add. This may turn out to be an endless job."

History group researching our past

Are you looking for your roots, and don't know where to find them? I know spring has finally here, but I am not referring to the roots of your perennial plants! I am talking about your family roots (family history). Well, if you already knew what I was referring to and answered yes, look no further! Help is here.

Local historian Elaine (Patterson) Mayenschein is available to get you started in pursuing your family history, also familiarly known as genealogy. Mayenschein, assists with the local history department at the Newcomerstown Public Library, and is holding genealogy sessions at the library on the second and third Saturday each month, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. She is also generally at the library on Wednesdays working on the local history binders, and files that the library has available for patrons to view, and assist them with their local history research.

Gerry Little, a resident of Newcomerstown, and a local history enthusiast, has spent many hours compiling several extensive binders of pictures, clippings and information concerning Newcomerstown's past, mainly focusing on the businesses that once lined the streets of the business district. Little has donated copies of his binders to the library which can be viewed in the local history department. While none of the local history binders can be checked out of the library, patrons can view and copy items of interest. The library has a copier on the premises, with the cost of the copies being very minimal.

Mayenschein said the interest in local history, and genealogy has increased in the past several years, and she has several regular persons who assist her in working on the binders on Wednesdays. Danny Gay and Linda Quillen are two of the individuals who have been instrumental in helping Mayenschein while working on their own family genealogy.

The history group is planning sev-

eral local history "field trips" around the streets of Newcomerstown within the next few months to study some a the buildings, and sites of former structures that were once located in town. The field trips will be announced in the near future.

Mayenschein is looking for individ uals who may have old pictures, scrapbooks, maps, land plots, deeds, or anything pertaining to Newcomer stown. While the history departmen would be grateful to have the origin: pictures or documents, they will gladly accept copies. The items can be brought into the library on Wednesdays or Saturdays, or Mayenschein will arrange to pick up the items, copy, and return them to the owner within the same week, unharmed. Mayenshcein also welcomes copies of family genealogy to add to the genealogy binder collection. Mayenschein can be reached at the l brary at 740-498-8228. 





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List Of Newcomerstown Businesses & Their Location: 1870 to 1980

These pages contain the results of my research into the history of Newcomerstown's older businesses. I was looking for both business names and owners names. I was also looking for their locations. I'm sure this is only a small part of the total amount that were here. The information came from a number of different sources. Some of them were the writings of Charles Lieser, David Burress (D. B.) Moore, Erwin C. Johns, Lois Zimmer and newspaper articles written by many different writers. Also from advertising in the newspaper. Other sources were from the Wiggins & McKillop's Newcomerstown Directory 1878, Business Directory of Tuscarawas County 1887 Newcomerstown, History of Tuscarawas County 1884. Business adds in the Newcomerstown High School Year Book called the Newcosean were also used for information, along with ads from a 1940s and 1964 Newcomerstown Newspaper. The 1939, 1942, 1949-50-51, 1953 and 1970 Newcomerstown Directories were also used. Another source was the 1895, 1901, 1907, 1915, 1924, 1933 and 1942 Sanborn and Perris Newcomerstown Fire Maps. Wayne Schworm, a long time resident of Newcomerstown, helped a lot with places he could remember during his life here. Elaine Mayenschein and Chris Kincaid at the Newcomerstown Library, Dick Mathias at the Newcomerstown Museum and Newcomerstown Historian William Casteel were also very helpful. Many of these businesses were in buildings that are no longer there. Some sites are now vacant lots or have been replaced by newer buildings. Most of the older buildings were not marked with numbers. They were known by building names, which changed over time. Some were known by the builder's name, some known by the name of the current owner of the building and also by the name of the tennant at that time. Some of buildings used different numbers with different occupants. A lot of the stores changed building locations, some several times over the years. The business list and their location on these pages only comes up to about 1980.

Also included are pages that contain information on the history of the Newcomerstown and the surrounding area written by many different writers.

Most of them wrote their articles in several books and newspapers many years ago.

There are a lot of differences in what all of these people have written about the early history

of this area.

I have compiled information taken from all of the people who wrote about this history that I could find, to show what some of these differences are.

I also put in information on the history of Oxford Township in Coshocton County.




