We must recall that there were no automobiles or modern highways at this time. Many people owned horses and buggies of some kind and two or three liver stables did quite a business of hiring outrigs for pleasure driving or for going for short distances. The Norman livery barn was on North Bridge Street and the other two barns were on South Bridge Street east of the C & M tracks; one was the Fleming Barn. Across the street from our store also was the M. Yingling & Sons (Will & Manuel) Grocery Store which to give service to outlying districts conducted one or two huckster wagons which when filled with groceries would start out in a certain direction, make a circuit, and be back in several days or a week bringing back produce (butter and eggs) from the farmers; a Mr. Thompson drove one of the wagons. Next to the Yingling Store east was Zack Thalheimer's Clothing Store in front of which town loafers in nice weather would daily gather and swap stories or discuss and settle town, state and national problems. Possibly the ablest authority and certainly the best well read man in such leisure time groups was Mr. Robert Lyons who owned a farm in the Wolf Station district. Mr. Lyons could answer any question and could discourse on a subject for hours at a time; he had a fine library of classic and scientific books. Mose Kennedy, member of the Grand Army of the Republic had his law office upstairs.

Next door east still on the south side of the street was the Wilgus Hardware Store with Billy Lee as tinner and service man and further on was the barbershop of Joe Keiser who possibly stayed in business as long as anyone in town. At times he moved to different locations but ended only recently his career in the shop just across the street. When Mr. <sup>Lloyd</sup> Murphy rebuilt on the corner lot a two story brick structure Thalheimer moved his clothing store to the new location and it has been occupied by a clothing store ever since and known as the Baltimore Corner. Just west of the Central Hotel was the property owned by Sam L. Dougl <sup>and to open</sup> the "most respectable" saloon in the village <sup>ware Co.</sup> with the big five foot <sup>de of the</sup>

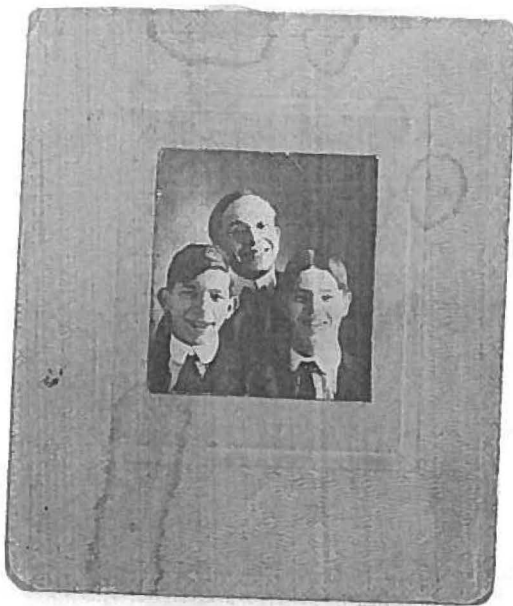

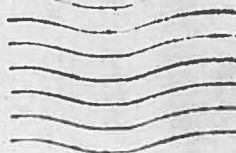

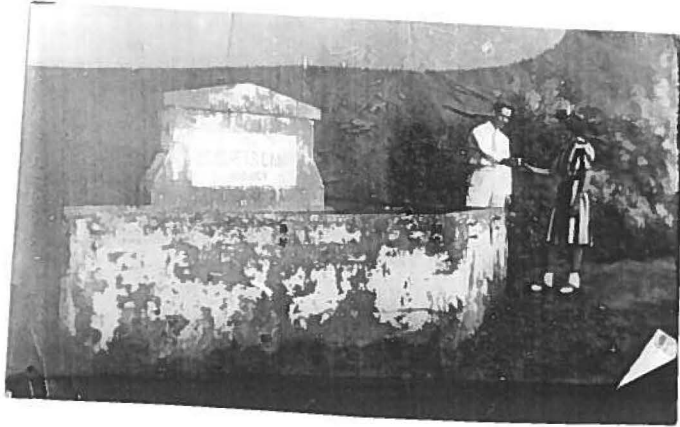

Dear Sir:—

I do not know if you recall me, but I played in your band at Newcomerstown in 1950 and was formerly from Plainfield.

When I was in your area, you showed me a cavalry style horn of the type used in the Civil War, and an old Ophicleide which as I recall were both in need of much repair, and which you said you hoped to use as a nucleus of a musical museum at some future date.

I am told now by my half-brother, Robert Davis who is a policeman in Newcomerstown and is also active in music, that you are disposing of your business and interests, and if so, I wonder if you would care to sell me those two instruments.

As you may know, I have been collecting for a number of years and each time I get an instrument I have it restored to as near its original condition as possible; for I, too, have given some thought to establishing a museum in the old home area and I have now one hundred and eighty-three instruments, many of which are rare, to put in a good place. When Robert was here visiting me

a short time ago we discussed the subject and I commissioned him to see about acquiring a suitable place for me to buy for that purpose.

Meanwhile I am using my collection locally as educational exhibits at schools, etc., and have appeared on television lecturing on musical history, of which I have made an extensive study.

As all of my collections will eventually return to the vicinity of Plainfield, West Lafayette or Newcometown, my purpose and yours somewhat coincide and I would like the opportunity of restoring those instruments and using them in my work before then, if possible.

Another reason I would like to get them which may interest you, is that as a part of the events of the Civil War celebrations for the next four years, a band has been formed in this area which is trying to locate instruments of that period to use; we dress in Civil War uniforms and are trying to be as authentic as possible. We are sponsored by the Ohio State Civil War Centennial Commission and are at present travelling extensively with too many modern instruments in among our old ones to look right and if we cannot get enough old ones to fix up we would like to at least study their con.

## THOUSANDS CHEER BOY SCOUTS

Newcomerstown Laddies Meet With Ovation at Big Grand Army Gathering at Marion. Assigned Prominent Positions In Immense Parades

Aside from the grizzled old soldiers themselves, no feature of the great department encampment of the Ohio veterans of the Civil War at Marion last week attracted more attention than the Boy-Scout Band of Newcomerstown. It was the golden jubilee of the Grand Army of the Republic, and neither time nor expense in the preparation therefor had been omitted by city of Marion to make it a splendid memory. The weather was perfect, the crowd came from everywhere, and by the thousands. Beautiful decora-

were afterwards accorded an informal reception by the State officials.

At Marion the lads were accorded a reception by the Elks of the city, and upon the conclusion of the concert and refreshments that followed, they were formally invited to head the Elks in the great Civic parade given on Tuesday evening. This they did, receiving the plaudits of the 30,000 people who crowded the line of march.

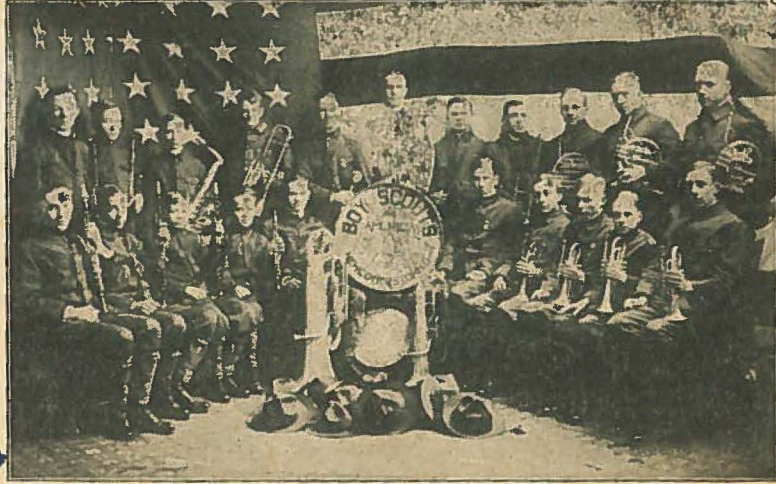
On Wednesday they gave two concerts at High School Park, thousands availing themselves of the opportunity to
