

Follies preparation is underway

A bit of courtesy to the people to the north and a plea for area sidents to get tickets early to avoid confusion have highlighted the first Il week of preparation for the Sweet Hearts Follies, scheduled for Feb. -15-16.

The director, Bob Smith, opened an intense two weeks of rehearsals th the "meet the director" party on Tuesday at St. Francis deSales nurch parish hall. Well over 100 area residents have been cast in the ries of songs and skits which will make up the 1985 Follies.

The promotions surrounding the Follies also gave the local 100 Club a ance to help out another county-wide organization. The 100 Club, rough the help of the Tuscarawas County Convention and Visitors reau, had received permission to use a 6x20 foot display area at a cently opened Buehler's Market in New Philadelphia Feb. 4-11.

Because the Tuscarawas County Philharmonic is holding a Follies of ir own in that area Feb. 7-8-9, it was decided to share the display area i promote both Follies. With the cooperation of Terry Veselenak, protion chairman at Newcomerstown, and help from Mabel Little of wcomerstown, a member of the Philharmonic board, arrangements re made to share the space.

A new reserved seating system has been instituted this year. Area idents can buy a receipt which entitles them to a ticket for a permance of the Follies. That receipt can then be turned in at Baker's AG or to the performance for a reserved seat. The earlier the receipt is ned in, the better the selection of seats will be. The receipts will be on e at Baker's AG, Thompson's IGA, First Federal, Huntington Bank, ik One, the Newcomerstown News, and "Your" Pizza Shop. The eipts can be turned in at the Middle School auditorium on the night ed on the receipt, but the holders must then take whatever seats are Both receipts and tickets are on sale at Baker's AG.

At the director's party Tuesday, Smith reviewed the 1985 Follies, sayit would be a "very funny show. You'll get a lot of laughs with this w. He said the Follies would contain a lot of "burlesque type humor." Stanley Fish, president of the Newcomerstówn 100 Club, welcomed guests to the director's party, noting the group was looking forward to another successful year and inviting those attending to attend other meetings of the 100 Club.

Carol Boucha, chairman of the Follies, explained the ticket procedure and talked about the "leg and muscle" contest being sponsored by the 100 Club as a promotion for the Sweet Hearts Follies.

She introduced the chairmen of the various committees involved with the Follies and noted babysitting will again be available for area residents participating in the Follies at a cost of \$1 per child.

Smith's background may best be explained through a "resume" given by Smith, "Mr. Smith was born of humble parents who lived in a humble house in a humbled town in New Jersey 31 years ago. He humbly earned a B.A. in theatre arts from humble Monmouth College in 1975.

"He went to Ringling Brothers Clown College and humbly toured for a year with "The Greatest Show on Earth.' Among his other credits are performing and directing at the Jazz Festival in New Orleans, performing and winning on the Gong Show, narrating the Royal Lippezzan Stallion Show during its international tour in 1983, and performing many roles in summer stock and dinner theatre in the East.

"His short range ambitions are to win an Oscar, a Tony, an Emmy and an Obie this year.

"When asked the secret of his success, Mr. Smith humbly replies that it's his humility."

The Middle School auditorium also has benefited from Follies fever this year.

The Newcomerstown Lions Club, along with faculty members, school personnel, and Mike Pierce, helped to paint the gymnasium and auditorium at the Newcomerstown Middle School in preparation for the Follies.

Another improvement for the stage has been the purchase of a new curtain earlier this year. The board of education was also checking on the installation of new lights in the auditorium.

One of the contests planned to help romote the 1985 Sweet Hearts ollies is this little escapade known 3 a muscle and leg contest.


Area residents will have a chance vote for the women's muscle, or e men's leg of their choice.

As evidenced by the pictures on is page, the contestants were iminative, although a bit silly at nes.


Canisters will be placed at various cations around the community and residents will be asked to vote for the candidate of their choice by putting a quarter in the proper place.

Leg, muscle contests 12/5/84 to promote 'Follies'

Those old knobby knees may be considered sexy after all.

The Newcomerstown 100 Club will be sponsoring a "sexy legs" contest for men and a "muscle" contest for women, all in fun, as part of the promotion for the Sweet Heart Follies.

The Follies, a community musical variety revue, is scheduled for Feb. 14-15-16 at the Newcomerstown Middle School auditorium. The contests will be held during January to help promote the event, which raises funds for community projects.

Here's how it works.

The "Mr. Legs and Ms. Muscle" contests are open to anyone 18years-old or over. The registration fee is \$3. The contestant may be sponsored by a club, organization, business or by the individual.

The name of the contestant will not be used in any advertising, so each contestant must have an alias. The sponsor may campaign for their candidate through newspaper advertisements, posters, or other promotions.

Voting boxes will be set up throughout the town, with votes being solicited at 25 cents each in what is called a "spirited" campaign. Sponsors may also solicit votes at their meetings or places of business.

The candidates must agree to have their legs or arm photographed to be published in the Newcomerstown News the first week in January. Contestants must also appear on stage during intermission of the Sweet Heart Follies performances. Deadline for entries will be Dec. 21. Sponsors must send their name, the registration fee, the candidate's name, the alias, address, and telephone number to Deb Haver, secretary of the 100 Club, at 617 Wood Ave., Newcomerstown, Ohio 43822

Winners of the contest will receive \$25.

Carol Boucha, co-chairman of the Follies, said use of a car and a motel room have already been secured for the director for the Follies. The director is a professional from the Jerome Cargill Production Organization of New York, New York. With him, the director brings the script, costumes, music and staging directions. Local residents then fill in the roles. Last year, over 230 area residents appeared on stage in the extravaganza. Approximately \$8,000 was raised for community projects. Funds from the Follies purchased fireworks for the Cv Young Celebration, helped the Senior Citizens Club pay for part of the work on the Senior Citizens Center on Bridge Street, and has also been set aside for Cy Young Park

Boucha said chairmen are still needed for three committees: Talent, promotion, and clean-up.

The club changed the ticket procedure for the Follies, with Gary and Terrie Baker in charge of tickets this year. All seats will be reserved this year, Baker said. Tentative plans include selling ticket stubs for specific performances with customers than required to turn in the stubs at a central ticket office in order to reserve their seat. This will allow those residents who buy their tickets early to exchange them for the best seats in the auditorium. Because of the change in ticket sales, members voted to make the ticket price \$6 for each seat during the three performances. There will also be a student and senior citizen night on Wednesday, Feb. 13, with half-price tickets for the Follies dress rehearsal.


The "Meet the Director" Party will be Tuesday, Jan. 29, at 7:30 p.m. at St. Francis deSales Church parish hall.


In other items, the club heard a request for funds from the Junior Mothers Club for its Santa's Helpers for Tots project, and heard an idea for a film travelogue series.

Nc'town Follies director's party set for Tuesday



The third annual Follies, a theatrical fund-raising production for charity, will be presented Feb. 14-16 in Newcomerstown Middle School.



The director, Bob Smith, wasn't immune as he was hit with a pie on stage following the final performance on Saturday.



There are probably some groups we have missed but it was not intentional. The help of all contributes to the success of the Follies and to the success of the community.


Follies' profit hits over \$5,500


Members of the club discussed the ticket selling procedure, which is different this year. Because the 1984 resulted in three sell-outs, all seats are reserved this year so that area residents will know exactly which seat they will have when they get their ticket.

At various locations in the village, area residents will purchase a receipt which can then be turned in at Baker's AG, where they will receive tickets marking their specific seat in the auditorium. Both receipts and tickets will be on sale at Baker's. The receipt is enough to gain admission at the auditorium on the night of the performances but those waiting until show night may not have their choices for the best seats in the house. By getting tickets early, area residents will be able to choose good seats.



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

Don't miss the Dallas Cowboy cheerleader number in the 1985 Sweet Hearts Follies. I'll be one of them.

The Follies, scheduled for Feb. 14-15-16, with a dress rehearsal performance on Feb. 13, brings friends and neighbors on stage in a community variety show that benefits this area. From bankers to other bread-winners, including newspaper editors, the third annual Follies will join the community together towards a common purpose.

At last report, over half the seats for the three main performances had already been sold. Carol Boucha, chairman of the Follies, said tickets will only be available at the door if there are any left and urged area residents to get their tickets as guickly as possible.

A change in ticket procedures hasn't seemed to affect their selling. This year, because all seats are reserved, area residents must buy a receipt which entitles them to a ticket for a performance of the Follies. That receipt can then be turned in at Baker's AG for a reserved seat. The earlier the receipt is turned in, the better the selection will be. The receipts can be turned in at the door on the night of the performance listed, but the holder must then take whatever seats are left.

There will be a Wednesday night dress rehearsal performance with special rates for senior citizens and students. Tickets for senior citizens and students on Wednesday night will be \$3 each with regular ticket prices (\$6) applying for all others who attend.


All performances begin at 8 p.m. The Knights of Columbus and the Rotary Club are providing ushers to help ticket holders find their seats. The seats at the Middle School auditorium were recently numbered as part of the project towards reserved seating.

Another change for the better this year includes a coupon page in the Follies program. The program, which costs 50 cents, has an insert listing eight area businesses with over \$20 worth of savings in coupons. The program also includes pictures from the 1983 and 1984 Sweet Hearts Follies and some pictures of the preparation of the 1985 Follies.

In addition to a microwave oven (donated by Haver Supply) being given away as a prize, the Senior Citizens Club of Newcomerstown has added a lap robe made by members as a second prize in the promotion.

A second promotion for the 1985 Follies includes a legs contest for men and an arm muscle contest for women. Posters are on display throughout Newcomerstown with votes being taken (25 cents each) on the best looking men's legs and the best looking arm muscle for the women.

As has been the case in previous years, the Follies has brought nearly every club in the village together in order to produce the Follies and has included tremendous support from local merchants. Carol Boucha is chairman of the Follies with Melba Guy and Alma Reed as co-chairmen. Stanley Fish is president of the 100 Club, which is the sponsoring club behind the Follies.





Requests for funds for new projects are to be submitted by club representatives within 30 days after the Follies.








With the time for the Sweet Hearts Follies drawing near I thought I would answer the BIG question that so many people ask: How do I audition for the Sweet Hearts Follies? In the list that follows I will reveal the secret way to be assured a part in the follies:

1) SHOW UP.

Well, that's it. Plain and simple. Come to the "Meet the Director's Party" on Jan. 26 at 7:30 p.m. at the St. Francis DeSales Church Hall to find out what the show will be like. But, even if you can't be there that night, don't despair; auditions (so to speak) begin the next evening.

Please do not be intimidated by the word "audition"-they are not conducted in the manner to which you are accustomed.

The only time that you need to audition alone is if you want a solo part. Otherwise, there is always a group of people, most with the same level of talent you have, to try out with.

Usually, the director gets up front and does a few dance steps. The group is asked to repeat the steps a dozen times. He then turns to watch and says "OK, you are all in this number." If there are too many trying out for one number, he'll choose a few that he needs for that dance and then places the rest of the group into another number. Again, plain and simple.

Most of the time the audition happens so fast that it is difficult to keep track of who is in what number. More importantly, I will proceed to list reasons why you should try out for the Follies:

1) Just for fun. No explanation necessary.

2) To meet people. Even if you have lived in this area for all of your life, there are people who have "moved in" from other areas. I may still be out there in Guernsey not knowing that there are some wonderful people here in Newcomerstown had I not been involved in the Follies.

3) Something to tell your grandchildren. Since the beginning of the Follies I have heard many amusing stories of fond memories held by people who were involved in the minstrel shows held years ago. Now I have stories of my own to pass on to my children and their children.

4) Football season is over. So what else is there—it's time to be an example to your children by becoming more well-rounded.

5) An inexpensive weight-loss program. Every year hundreds of pounds are lost during and because of the Follies. The incentive, combined with the FREE aerobic affects of the rehearsals, provides the exercise many of us promise to consider after the holidays. No guarantee those pounds will stay off after the Follies.

6) Make spring come more quickly. February flies by so fast that before you know it, March is here with the promise of spring.

7) Cure for cabin fever. Most everyone sits around in February moaning about the cold and how boring mid-winter can be. Some people are even tempted to begin spring cleaning, heaven forbid.

8) Community involvement. Be a part of those who have donated in excess of \$25,000 without so much as pulling out your checkbook.

9) This may be your only chance. Unless you are an aspiring young actor or actress, where will you ever get a chance at doing something like this again?

10) Why not? You can probably come up with some excuses, but it all boils down to "Oh, why not."

Well there you have it-10 good reasons to come to the "Meet the Director" party on Jan, 26. If you should happen to have a legitimate excuse for not showing up, then consider buying a ticket to see the performance. You may not lose weight doing that, but it'll be fun.

Requests should be submitted in writing to the 100 Club president, Carol Buckey, 620 Beaver St., Newcomerstown, OH 43832, listing the purpose and cost of the request. If a group is making the request, it must come from an authorized representative of that group. Any request for physical improvements will exclude labor and any continuing maintenance. All requests must be received before the March 30 meeting.

The disbursement of the funds will be based on merit, community betterment or the number of persons served. The decision should be made at the 100 Club meeting in April.

It was reported the 100 Club raffle netted \$2,620. Attendance at the 1988 Sweet Hearts performances were: 236 at dress rehearsal, 435 on Friday night and 536 on Saturday night.

The 100 Club also thanked all area residents who helped with the Follies, both on stage or behind the scenes and those residents who attended any of the performances.


If you didn't do any of these things but you bought a ticket to the show, a great big thank you for your support!
