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## THE ELSONS IN EUROPE AND SCANDINAVIA

The 16th and early 17th centuries saw a religious struggle in Europe. The massive Roman Catholic Church had become complacent and failed to deploy its wealth adequately enough to satisfy the 'spiritual hunger' of the people under its rule. This situation gave birth to to the Protestant Reformation under such leaders as Martin Luther, Huldreich Zwingli, and John Calvin.

## 1550

By 1550, Scandinavia, Baltic Europe, and England were entirely Protestant; eastern Europe including Germany was divided, while France, Spain, Italy, and the Netherlands were largely Catholic.

#### 1600

By 1600, the Catholic Church had reclaimed much of the divided land with the help of a succession of Catholic kings in Poland, the largest country in eastern Europe.

## 1318

The decisive phase of the conflict between Protestants and Catholics began in 1618. The Holy Roman Emperor, Ferdinand II, with military assistance from Spain, the German Catholics, and the Papacy, defeated the Bohemian Protestants. With this success under it's belt, the Emperor tried to reduce the power of the Protestant princes in Germany. Despite the aid sent to the princes by England, Denmark, and the Dutch, in 1629 the Emperor's forces were victorious and an 'Edict of Restitution' was issued which reclaimed large areas of church land held by the Protestants. The German would-be revolutionaries were only saved from collapse by the arrival of substantial military aid from King Gustavus Adolphus of Sweden.

## 1630

Family legend says that a young man named Elson from near the Norway-Sweden border was among King Adolphus' troops departing Stockholm and heading across the Baltic Sea in 1630. Their victories over the Emperor's forces at Breitenfeld in 1631 and Lutzen in 1632 prevented religous oppression but led to a fragmented and economically unstable Germany. The Peace of Westphalia in 1648 ended the fighting, which became known as the Thirty Years War. It is estimated that half the German population of 25 million was lost during this war; it took more than 100 years to build it back.

Supposedly, Elson stayed in Germany after the war (he must have fallen in love with the country... or a German maiden!). Several generations later, in 1732, Peter Elson was born. Peter was likely the great-grandson of the Swedish Elson and would later carry the family name across the Atlantic, planting the seed in new and exciting Amerika.

## THE ELSONS IN AMERICA

#### 1752

Peter Elson and Elizabeth Sale landed in Philadelphia from Germany in 1752, before Braddocks defeat.

[Braddocks defeat at the hands of the French and Indians at Fort Dusquene, now Pittsburg, on July 9, 1755, essentially closed the frontier to expansion for many years to come.]

[Could this be the "Petter Elser" found in <u>Pennsylvania German Pioneers</u>, 1727-1775, Strassburger, 1934, p.416? The entry was recorded 9/28/1749 in the Philadelphia Court House. He arrived on Ship Ann, with John Spurrier as Master, from Rotterdam (&Cowes), from Basil, Wirtemburg, Zweybrecht, Darmstad.]

[Could Elizabeth be daughter of "Johan Paulus Seehl", found in <u>Immigrants in Pennsylvania, 1727-1776</u>, Rupp, 1965, p. 2717 The entry was recorded 9/15/1752, Ship Two Brothers, Thomas Arnst as Master, from Rotterdam (&Cowes).]

The Account' (1827) says that Peter and Elizabeth moved to Penn's Valley, "Sentry" County. Assuming he meant Centre County, it wasn't created until 1800]

On 27 JUN 1798, Peter Elson Jr. made an agreement with Wilhelm Willink, Heindrick Vollenhoven, & Rutger Jan Schimmelpenninck to purchase a tract of land of about 159 acres in district #9, Crawford Co. Fa.

## 1805

EFrom Ohio & Pa Census records for 1810-1830, it was deduced that Gusannah Leffler was born between 1784 and 1790. Since Jacob & Susannah were married in 1805, it seems unlikely that she was born as late as 1790 (only 15 at marriage). It seems more likely that she was born 1784-1785.1

## 1807

Adam Elson was born to Jacob & Susannah.

It is copied here exactly as it appears (with the exception of shorthand characters for the words 'of', 'was', and 'they')]

## A Copy

"An account of Peter Elson Sr., Jacob Elson's father & mother when they came to North Am. fr Germany before Braddocks defeat in 1752 "Wrote May 29, 1827,"

Peter Elson Sr. b. in Ger. 1732, d. in Crawford C., Pa. May 8,1802. Elizabeth Sale b. Oct. 15, 1727 mear Niewit, Ger. & d. June 1, 1802, Crawford Co., Pa.

Peter Elson & Eliz. Sale landed at Phila. In 1752, "went northwest to Jersey to Pottersown", and were married some years later. Thence they went to Northampton Co., Pa, thence to Penn's Valley "Sentry" Co, thence to Crawford Co., Fairfield Tp., French Creek.

Jacob Flson, son of above, was married to Susanna Leffler, Feb. 12, 1805 at (arrow to French Creek in above paragraph).

Peter, son of Jacob & father of Mike was b. Wed'July 24, 1805; married to Catharine Best 1829, d. of typhoid 1833. Mike b. 1831.

Adam Elson son of Jacob was b 1807, probably in Morgan Co., Obio, York Tp. where the family had removed & where Peter and his brother were married in 1829.

Adam my grandfather (arrow to 'son of Jacob' above) was more likely b. in Pa. He was 2nd son of Jacob. There were '7 sons, Pet., Ad., Henry, Jno., Mike, Jacob & David. When Peter d. Jacob also d. of same fever & Adam took it but recovered.

Adam married Susannah Smith, 1829 (?). & Jacob my father was b. Oct 1, 1830 in a little house down the hollow near Turkey run below the old well on the Smith farm. Susannah Smith's mother was a Bear whose bro. Geo. was in the Rev. or War of '12. Her father "Grandad" Smith came fr Md. lived in Zanesville about 4-yrs. then "entered" the Smith fame. He shot deer where the market house now stands in Z. & helped to build the court house, 1807.

When my father was 3 wks old his parents took him & went to visit his grandfather Jacob Elson who had moved fr Morgan Co. to Blue rock, Brushcreek Tp Musk. Co. & he died that day- fell fr his shoe bench.

Susannah, my grandmother d. Dec 12,1845-Confinement.

My grandfather Elson d. of dropsy at 50 in 1857 when I was about 6 mg. old.

## 1831

Peter Elson, Jr. died 11 OCT 1891, 67 years old

#### ELSON AND CRAWFORD CO., PA INFO

Virginia and I went to Meadville, PA July 16, 1996 to research the Elson line. We also searched Dill and Vencil/ Vensil/Vensel/Wensel/Wentzel and other spellings. The following info was gleaned from records at the Meadville Public Library in the Crawford Co. Historical Society Room.

Our main focus was to find Tunis Elson's parents. The evidence we found shows that Tunis was probably not the son of Richard but maybe the son of John. Richard's brother. We also tried to find if Christina was Tunis' second wife. She possibly could be and maybe the first wife was a Dill, since the Dills seemed to follow them to Muskingum Co., OH.

Crawford Co. was formed from Allegheny Co. in 1800. The earlier records are in Pittsburg for all of Allegheny Co.

The Pennsylvania Farmer is a semi-monthly sheet devoted to the interests of the farming community. It was established at Mercer, Penn., in January, 1881, and in August, 1883, the office was removed to Meadville by R. H. Odell, its present editor and proprietor. The Farmer was a monthly until January, 1884, when it was changed to a semi-monthly. It claims a circulation of about 5,000 copies, and its office is located in the Corinthian Block, on Water Street.

The Meadville Tribune, daily and weekly, W. R. Andrews, editor, is the latest journalistic enterprise in this city. The daily is a twenty-eight-column sheet, 24x38 inches in size, was first issued August 11, 1884, and is published seven days a week. The Sunday issue is double the usual size, and the weekly is the same size as the Sunday edition. The Tribune is Republican in politics and has a large circulation throughout northwestern Pennsylvania. It is an enterprising, well edited newspaper, and exhibits a spirit of pluck and determination that the average reader is bound to admire. Under the management and caustic pen of Mr. Andrews it has assumed a foremost place among the newspapers of this section of the State.

Past and Present Manufacturing Interests of Meadville.—In 1789 Matthew Wilson began the erection of a log saw-mill on French Creek for David Mead, which was completed early in the following year. It stood just south of the "Red Mill" site in Meadville and began operations as soon as it was finished. The few pioneers then residing at "Mead's Settlement," with characteristic enterprise assumed the importance of an exporting community, and the first raft of lumber that ever descended French Creek and the Allegheny River went from this mill in the spring of 1790. Together with a raft of logs it was taken to Pittsburgh, and sold to Maj. Isaac Craig, Quartermaster in the army, for \$1.50 per hundred feet. The hands in charge of the raft were: Edward Fitz Randolph, James Fitz Randolph, Frederick Baum, William Wilson, John Ray, Tunis Elson and John Gregg.

In the fall of that year a grist-mill was attached to the saw-mill. It was, however, a primitive affair of simple construction, viz.: an upright shaft with a tub-wheel at the bottom bearing the upper mill-stone on its apex. The meal or flour was roughly bolted through a wire sieve stretched over a wide hoop. An overshot wheel was afterward substituted and a water supply brought by a race from a point on Mill Run, near the site of Lindley's mill, which stood on the northwest corner of Liberty and North Streets, to a mill-pond formed by a timber dam on what is now the east line of Water Street. The pond extended east to Park Avenue and north to Randolph Street, and the office of Dr. Ellis is now near its northwest corner. A portion of the embankment which enclosed this pond as well as its bed are still plainly visible. A deep ravine into which the overflow poured extended to French Creek and was spanned at Water Street by a wooden bridge.

A distillery was added to the mill in 1805-06. It was the old copper boiler and worm still process and made a good brand of whisky, but stills soon became common all over the county, and whisky was a very cheap article. In 1824 this old log structure contained a grist-mill, saw-mill, fulling-mill, carding and cloth-dressing machines, also an oil-mill, and was operated by William A. V. Magaw until about 1829, when the building was torn down.

The Red Mill was erected by William A. V. Magaw about 1830 or 1831, immediately north of the site of the old log structure built by Gen. Mead. The foundation was laid on piles twenty feet long driven through the quicksand underlying the upper crust in the ravine then existing there. Mr. Magaw placed machinery in the building and opened the first

time of the class organization is unknown, but it was about 1850, by Rev. T. Benn, in the Bromley Schoolhouse. Meetings were subsequently held in the East Troy Schoolhouse, adjacent to the present church building. Mr. Guild was leader until the erection of the church. He was followed by B. F. Brown and Samuel Aiken, the present leaders. Since 1877, this class has been a part of Hydetown Circuit. As a result of a revival held in the winter of 1883-84, by Rev. J. E. Roberts, about twenty-five members were added to the society, which now numbers about sixty-five.

The above are the only two religious societies of the township. Nor are any others known to have existed here formerly, except a Methodist class, which had been organized about 1812, at the cabin of Henry Kinneer, in Venango County, and the place of worship for which was removed about 1816 to the cabin of Jonathan Benn, where they were continued until about 1836, then held for a few years in the Armstrong Schoolhouse, in the southern part of Troy, and afterward removed to Chapmanville, Venango County, where the society still flourishes.

# CHAPTER XXVIII.

## UNION TOWNSHIP.

PETITION—PROPOSED BOUNDS—ELECTION—PHYSICAL FEATURES—POPULATION—EARLY SETTLEMENTS—KILLING BY INDIANS—EARLY DEEDS—OTHER PIONEERS—RELIGIOUS ORGANIZATION—MILLS.

IN accordance with a petition to lay out a new township from portions of Vernon, Greenwood and Fairfield, the Court of Quarter Sessions, April 24, 1867, appointed H. B. Beatty, Artist, and Barrett Brown and Charles Drake, Viewers, who reported May 16 following, favorably to the establishment of a new township, with the following bounds: "Beginning on the bank of French Creek, on what is known as the southerly of the Kennedy Tract; thence by said tract line to the southwest corner thereof and the northwest corner of D. Haman; thence south by the division line of land 195 perches to the southwest corner of Amborger, also the corner of Smith, Kebert et al.; thence west by the north line of said Smith to the center of a public road; thence south by said road and the west line of Smith to the northeast corner of the land of James Johnson's heirs; thence west by the division line of land to a point opposite the dividing line between Tracts 405 and 406; thence south by said dividing line to the center of the channel of Conneaut Outlet; thence down said channel by its several meanderings till its junction with French Creek, thence up said creek by its several courses and distances to the place of beginning." On the 19th day of June, 1867, the court ordered that a vote should be taken July 18, 1867, by the electors of Vernon Township, the largest portion of the proposed new township coming from Vernon, and by the electors of Greenwood and Fairfield, who resided within the boundaries of the new township. The election resulted: 135 votes for and 74 against the new township.

The township thus formed is irregularly triangular in shape, separated by French Creek on the northeast from Mead and East Fairfield, and from Greenwood and Fairfield on the south and southwest by Conneaut Outlet. The

division line on the northwest between Union and Vernon is very irregular. The New York, Pennsylvania & Ohio Railroad crosses in this portion of the township. The surface in the central part is high and rolling, and recedes in all directions to the borders of the township. Along Conneaut Outlet a marshy waste, with an average width of half a mile, extended, but by dredging much of it has recently been reclaimed to agricultural purposes, and has proved to possess a highly productive soil. The old Beaver Canal passed through the township, along the valley of Conneaut Outlet. Union contains 7,939 acres, valued on the tax duplicate of 1882 at \$174,018. The population in 1870 was 622, and in 1880, 603. It is a purely agricultural region, containing neither village nor hamlet. Dutch Hill Postoffice was established many years ago, but has since been abolished, and the inhabitants for mail facilities rely on adjacent townships.

The Meadville and Linesville Railroad circles through the north part of the

township.

Settlements were made in Union before the suspension of Indian hostili-John Huling, one of the first; and probably the foremost pioneer, came before 1795, and erected his cabin on the banks of French Creek near the southeast corner of the township, on the present farm of William H. Harrington. A temporary fort was built on his farm, in which the few scattering settlers took refuge at night. The tragedy of June, 1795, occurred on his farm. Two young men, James Findlay and Barney McCormick, were splitting rails for Mr. Huling about sixty rods from Conneaut Outlet and a mile from its mouth, on the present farm of H. Woodworth. A band of savages approached, killed and scalped the two men and disappeared before help could arrive. One of the victims fell where he had been at work, the other had retreated to the adjoining thicket and was there overtaken and killed. At Huling's cabin the two shots were heard. The first report was supposed to issue from the rifle of Aaron Wright, a hunter of Fairfield, but when the second was heard the presence of the Indians was suspected. Aaron Wright himself heard the shots, and so keen was his sense of hearing that he knew they came from strange rifles. Mr. Huling died on his farm prior to 1810. His wife, Agnes, survived until 1814, and was buried in Conneaut Cemetery in the northeast corner of Fairfield. Marcus, James and Ceal Huling were their sons.

Robert Wilson settled in the northern part at the mouth of Wilson's Run in 1797, or earlier. He remained here until death, leaving a wife but no

children.

The exact date of David Mumford's arrival is not known, but it was prior to 1797. He was born in New Jersey, and emigrated from Washington County, this State, to the farm in Tract 429, now owned by J. Hannah, near the center of Union, where he remained engaged in clearing the land and tilling the soil until his death in 1816. He had served in the Revolutionary war, was a Methodist, and an intelligent, prominent pioneer. His children were: James, William, Peter, Margaret, wife of John Williams; Sarah, wife of William McFadden, and Martha, wife of Arthur Johnson.

A half dozen Holland land tracts are found along the French Creek. Contracts for their settlement were made as follows: Tract 71, Tunis Elson, 100 acres, August 5, 1799, deed executed June 25, 1804; Tract 72, George Wentzel, 150 acres, August 5, 1799; Tract 73, Peter Elson, 150 acres, August 5, 1799, deed executed July 9, 1804; Tract 74, John McDill, 100 acres, August 5, 1799, deed executed July 9, 1805; Tract 75, William Armstrong, 150 acres, September 26, 1799, deed delivered January 23, 1806; Tract 76, William Armstrong, 150 acres, September 26, 1799, deed executed to Thomas Van Horn,

assignee, December 22, 1810. All the above were settlers on their respective tracts. Tunis Elson was a German and followed farming on his farm until death. Peter Elson was his brother, and remained on the farm of his early settlement through life. Henry Elson was a resident of the township prior to 1798. John and George Elson, the two sons of Peter, afterward died on their father's farm. George Wentzel or Vinsel was a powerful German and had three brothers, David, George and Henry, who were also early settlers. The entire family afterward removed to Ohio. John McDill removed to another part of the county, and the subsequent whereabouts of. William Armstrong are not known. The above settlements were probably all made in 1799.

Other pioneers of the township who came about the opening of the present century were: James Birchfield, Mrs. Nelly Beatty, James and Samuel Davis, John and William Henry, Samuel Kincaid, Andrew Mehaffey, John McFadden, Leonard Smock, Theodore Scowden, Robert Stitt and James Smith. James Birchfield came from the Susquehanna River in 1800, and settled on Tract 427, in the western part of the township. He was a prominent citizen, an Elder in the old Fairfield Township Seceder Church, and an Associate Judge of the county. His children were: James, Samuel, John, Jesse, David, Mary (wife of Arthur Johnson), Sarah (wife of William May), and Mrs. Edward Herrington. Mrs. Nelly Beatty, a widow, resided in the southern part with her sons John, James and Matthew. James and Samuel Davis were The former cleared a farm in the western part of Union, and died there in July, 1819. His son, J. S. Davis, now occupies the old place. Samuel Davis settled on Wilson Run, in the north part of the township, and remained there till death. He was one of a very few pioneers who owned slaves in this county. Samuel Kincaid settled on the farm on Conneaut Creek now owned by N. A. Bligh. He taught singing-school in early times and filled the office of Constable. He removed to Meadville and died there. Andrew Mehaffey was his close neighbor on Conneaut Creek. John McFadden was also one of the earliest in the southern part. Leonard Smock, a native of New Jersey, came from Westmoreland County about 1805, and settled a half Theodore Scowden came from the Susquemile north of Conneaut Creek. hanns in 1800, and became a life-long pioneer of Tract 428. His children were: Samuel, Simeon, John, Theodore, William, David, Mary, wife of Gabriel Davis; Sarah, wife of John Minnis; Elizabeth, wife of Hugh Swaney; Catherine, wife of Samuel Power; and Elsie, wife of David Birchfield. James Smith came from the Stitt was also a pioneer settler of Tract 428. valley of the Tuscarora, in Juniata County, in 1805.

About 1832 a German settlement commenced, which has continued until at present citizens of this nationality own and occupy about two-thirds of the township. Almost without exception they hail from the Palatinate, Bavaria, and the colony received constant accessions until within about ten years. They have purchased whatever land in the township was offered for sale, but are no longer able to provide sufficient land for the rising generation, colonies of whom have been established near Sugar Lake, Wayne Township and in

Missouri

The greater part of this German element adheres to Zion German Reformed Church, which was organized about 1840. Among the first members were John Kebort, Francis and Frederick Stein, Andrew Kahler, William Hubers, Peter Steir, Peter Weber and John Weaver. Rev. Philip Zeiser organized the church and remained its pastor about eighteen years. He resided at New Hamburg, Mercer County, and held services also during this period at Watson's Run, Saegertown and Mosiertown. Rev. D. B. Ernst of Saegertown then

supplied the congregation for a short time followed by Rev. L. D. Leberman, who remained until 1864. Rev. David Klopp then preached one year, and Rev F. Wall, three years; succeeded in 1872 by Rev. D. D. Leberman of Meadville, the present pastor. The first house of worship was a log structure, superseded by the present frame building. It is located on Tract 429, near the center of the township, was repaired in 1879 at a cost of \$500, and has a seating capacity of 300. Services are held once in two weeks and conducted alternately in the English and German languages; the communicant membership is 160.

Mt. Pleasant Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in 1826 with twelve members, by Revs. John Leach and H. Kinsley of Mercer Circuit; meetings were held for many years in cabins and schoolhouses. The present edifice, located in the north part of Tract 72, was erected in 1858, at a cost of \$1,000. The class is a part of Evansburg Circuit, and has a membership of about forty. A Methodist class was organized at the cabin of David Mumford soon after the year 1800. It at first included but three families, those of Mr. Mumford, Andrew McFadden and John Leach, the latter of Mercer County. Meetings were held for many years at the house of David Mumford, and afterward at schoolhouses. The class has been defunct for many years.

James Smith is said to have built the first saw-mill. He was an early Justice and carried on a blacksmith shop. Theodore and Hiram Power kept an early store at the pike crossing of the old Beaver Canal. William Birchfield kept a public house at Dutch Hill. Mr. Wilson erected a small corn-cracker on Wilson's Run, and Gabriel Davis had an early grist and saw-mill in the southern part. The marriage of John Williams to Margaret Mumford in 1802 was one of the earliest in the township.

## CHAPTER XXIX.

## VENANGO TOWNSHIP.

VENANGO TOWNSHIP — ORGANIZATION — BOUNDARIES — PHYSICAL FEATURES—NAME—EARLY SETTLERS—DISTILLERY—MILLS—RELIGIOUS SOCIETIES.

VENANGO TOWNSHIP dates its origin back to July 9, 1800, at which time it was created with the following boundaries: "Beginning at the corner of a tract of land surveyed in the name of John Fries, on the line of a tract surveyed in the name of David Cunningham about sixty perches or thereabouts west of the northeast corner of the same; thence north to the southwest corner of a tract in the name of James West; thence eastwardly to French Creek; thence up the different windings of the same to the northern boundary of Crawford County; thence by the same westwardly to the northeast corner of Cussewago Township; thence southwardly to the northwest corner of a tract of land surveyed in the name of John James; thence east to the place of beginning." As thus constituted Venango embraced besides its present limits the northeast part of Hayfield and the eastern part of Cussewago. Its bound-

pioneers who arrived prior to 1810 were: Isaac and Samuel Bonnell, Nicholas Bailey, who lived on French Creek one and a half miles below Cochranton, Luward Ferry, John Greer, Sr., who lived below Cochranton on French Creek; John Greer, Jr., who dwelt on Tract 1286 two miles southeast of the village; Michael Kightlinger, who lived on the north side of Sugar Lake and afterward moved to Troy Township and died there; Hugh McDill, William Wheeling, Joseph and Lewis Woodworth, the former a millwright and both

residents near French Creek and Jacob Waggoner.

The first improvement near the lake was made about 1804 by Michael Dill, who had previously resided near French Creek. Mr. Dill had a cabin-raising in the wilderness, miles distant from any human habitation, and on that important occasion feasted his helping friends on an abundance of the various game found here. Dill, however, did not settle in this cabin. Edward Ferry, who had with his family crossed the mountains from Lancaster County, and had intended settling on the hill above the lake, was induced by Mr. Dill, in consideration of a cow or two and other emoluments, to occupy the cabin and continue there the labor of improvement. Mr. Ferry took up his abode in the cabin and years afterward bought the land, remaining its occupant until death. He left ten children, several of whom yet survive. Hugh McGill, an Irishman and a Covenanter settled in the extreme eastern part, where he died many years later. Jacob Waggoner was one of the first settlers on Deckard's Run. Other pioneers who arrived somewhat later, after 1810, and settled in the eastern part were: Samuel Beers, David McKnight, Daniel McDaniels, and John Allen, the last named hailing from Ireland. William Record came from Allegheny County in 1824. Jacob Rees, in 1829, emigrated from Philadelphia and settled on the site of Deckardville. It was then covered by a dense forest through which Mr. Rees was obliged to cut a road to his place of settlement.

Holmes & Herriot erected the first grist-mill in the township soon after 1800, on Little Sugar Creek, about a mile east of Cochranton. Several years later they sold it to Isaac Bonnell, who also operated a distillery. It has been an important industry, notably so in pioneer times, and has frequently changed possession and several times rebuilt. It is now owned by Hugh Smith. A powder-mill was built in the southern part and operated in an early day by Henry Heath. Many saw-mills have sprung up in various parts of the town-

ship, and the lumbering interests are still important.

James Douglas taught an early school in the western part on Tract 1288 in a log-cabin. A frame schoolhouse was afterward built at the same place, an later removed to Cochranton, where it was occupied a number of years for its original purpose. The youth of the extreme eastern part of Wayne received their first instruction in Randolph Township several miles away. John Kane taught perhaps the first school in this part of Wayne in a little shanty on the east bank of Sugar Creek Lake. John Moreland, a well-remembered, efficient instructor, afterward taught in the same building,

Wayne is almost exclusively rural in population. Deckardville, the only hamlet or village, lies in the eastern part and contains a store, a blacksmith shop, two churches and six or eight dwellings. Near by is a jelly factory. A third church building is standing, but its owners, the Free-Will Baptists, have disbanded as an organization. The congregation was organized by Elder Chase in September, 1865, and the edifice had been reared the previous year at a cost

of \$1,500.

Wilson's Mills Postoffice is located near the east bank of Sugar Lake.

ment for a while, but as no one proceeded with the work of producing the metal, it soon died away. It is the opinion of many that valuable deposits of lead, and perhaps of the precious metals, will yet be discovered here. It is certain that the Indians procured their lead somewhere in this vicinity, but as they have always been jealous of their mines accident alone has revealed them to the white men. The French were equally anxious to conceal them, as they expected some day to regain possession of the empire which they had lost in America. In proof of this may be cited the various and valuable articles found in the fort at Presque Isle, and the curious iron chest and its contents concealed in the vicinity of Fort Le Boeuf. The French were undoubtedly aware of the existence of the mines, but did not reveal the secret. No nation ever enjoyed the confidence of the Indians so thoroughly as the French, and none used that power so kindly. The traditions of the lead procured by the Indians here, the silver ore known to have been taken from this vicinity by them to Canada and traded to British merchants, and the specimens of ore which have been found, furnish grounds for the belief, more prevalent many years ago than now, that valuable mines lie hidden in the county.

Up to 1819 there were no schools in the township. In that year, it having been decided that a school was necessary, the men of the neighborhood collected, chose a central location, and by their combined efforts completed a primitive little log cabin after two or three days of work. The chimney was built of mud and sticks and was on the outside at one end of the building. The Benn, Armstrong, Luce and Proper children attended it, as well as some from Wayne Township and Venango County. Peggy Johnson, of Randolph Township, was the first teacher in this building, being in charge two terms. The wages of female teachers at that time were from one dollar to one dollar

and twenty-five cents per week and board.

There were nine schools in the township in 1836, with a term of six months' duration. Four hundred and five pupils were in attendance. The teachers were reported as of good character, but their qualifications were considered in need of improvement. Reading, writing, arithmetic and geography were the branches in which instruction was given. In 1896 thirteen schools were in operation, the school year having a length of six months. Four hundred and three scholars were in attendance, at an average cost per month to the township of one dollar and eighty-three cents for each pupil. The total amount of money expended during the year for educational purposes exceeded \$4,000.

Troy Center, situated near the center of the township, is a postoffice, and contains six or eight houses, a store, shop, schoolhouse and church. It was made a postoffice in 1860, John Stratton being the first postmaster. Almon Heath started the first store about 1858.

Fauncetown is a postoffice in the western part of the township, on Sugar

Creek. Newtontown, situated on Oil Creek, is a small settlement which received its name from Edmund C. Newton, who settled there in 1847.

A class of the Methodist Episcopal Church was organized at the cabin of Henry Kinneer, in Venango County, in 1812, and about four years later the place of worship was removed to the cabin of Jonathan Benn, in Troy Township. Here they maintained worship for twenty years, then holding services for some time in the Armstrong schoolhouse, in the southern part of Troy, after which it was removed to Chapmanville, Venango County, thus going outside the bounds of the township. About 1850 a class was organized by Rev. T. Benn, in the Bromley schoolhouse, in the eastern part of the township. In 1874, during the pastorate of Rev. J. K. Adams, a church building was erected.

The Troy Center Methodist Episcopal Church was organized about 1870, and counted among its original members Austin Mills, Hamilton Bunce, William Hays, Joseph Free, Abram Banta, Edgar Melvin, Henry Melvin and George Wright. During the first years of its existence the meetings were held in a schoolhouse, and in 1876 a neat frame structure was erected, at a cost of \$1,500.

## CHAPTER XXVIII.

## UNION TOWNSHIP.

NION is one of the youngest of the townships of Crawford County, having been laid out from portions of Vernon, Greenwood and Fairfield in 1867. Residents of this district applied to the Court of Quarter Sessions for the formation of a new township, and in accordance with this request a board of viewers was appointed, who, after an examination of the circumstances, recommended the formation of a new township, with the following boundaries: "Beginning on the bank of French Creek, on what is known as the southerly of the Kennedy tract; thence by said tract line to the southwest corner thereof, and the northwest corner of D. Hamen; thence south by the division line of land one hundred and ninety-five perches to the southwest corner of Amborger, also the corner of Smith, Kebort and others; thence west by the north line of said Smith to the center of a public road; thence south by said road and the west line of Smith to the northeast corner of James Johnson's heirs; thence west by the division line of land to a point opposite the dividing line between tracts 405 and 406; thence south by said dividing line to the center of the channel of Conneaut Outlet; thence down said channel by its several meanderings to its junction with French Creek; thence up said creek by its several courses and distances to the place of beginning." The question of whether the township should be established was submitted to the voters of Vernon, from which much of the territory was taken, and also to the electors of Greenwood and Fairfield who resided within the boundaries of the proposed new township. The election was decided in the affirmative by a majority of almost two to one, and to the township thus formed by uniting the corners of three former townships, the name of Union was given.

Union is an interior township, lying directly south of the center of the county. It is an irregular triangle in shape, lying on the southern bank of French Creek, which separates it from Mead and East Fairfield. Conneaut Outlet forms its southern boundary, separating it from Fairfield and Greenwood, while on the northwest it is separated from Vernon by a very irregular line. The New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio and the Meadville branch of the Pittsburg, Bessemer and Lake Erie railroads pass through the northern part, but neither has a station within the township. The old Beaver canal also passed through it, following the valley of Conneaut Outlet through the southern part. Union contains 7,939 acres of valuable land.

The surface of the township is rolling, especially in the southern part, the central portion being the most elevated. A strip of marshy land about one-half mile wide formerly existed along the border of Conneaut Outlet, and for years was considered worthless. By means of dredging most of it has been reclaimed, and the land thus drained has been found to possess a highly productive soil. The whole of Union is a purely agricultural region, no village or hamlet existing within its boundaries. A postoffice called Dutch Hill was once established a little north of the center of the township, but was afterward abolished, the inhabitants relying for mail service upon the villages of the surrounding townships, Shaws' Landing in East Fairfield, Calvins' Corners in Fairfield, and Geneva and Custards in Greenwood.

Although Union Township was one of the last to be established, its territory was among the first to be settled. The settlement of Crawford County, commenced in 1789 at Meadville by David Mead and his party, received a severe setback when the Indian war broke out, and for several years the work of colonization was interrupted. And when quiet was again restored to the frontier, by Wayne's treaty with the Indians in 1795, pioneers and speculators flocked from all directions into the territory beyond the Allegheny, and such fertile tracts as the French Creek Valley were soon dotted with settlements.

But even before the suspension of Indian hostilities settlements had been made in Union. One of the first, if not the first, of the stalwart pioneers who pushed into the new country south of Meadville was John Hulings, who boldly erected a cabin on the bank of French Creek, before 1795, in the south-

eastern corner of what is now Union Township. Others settled near him, and a temporary log fort was built on his farm, in which the scattering settlers took refuge at night. In June of 1795 a sad tragedy took place here. Two young men of the neighborhood, James Findlay and Barney McCormick, were engaged in the woods, about a mile from the mouth of Conneaut Outlet, in splitting rails for Mr. Hulings. A band of Indians suddenly appeared from the forest and fired upon them, killing one, who fell where he had been at work. The other was only wounded, and made his escape to an adjoining thicket, but was pursued, overtaken and killed. The Indians scalped their victims and disappeared. When the first shot was heard at Hulings' cabin it was supposed that the report issued from the rifle of Aaron Wright, a well known hunter of Fairfield, but when the second was heard the presence of Indians was suspected. Upon hearing the shots Wright, who was in the neighborhood, knew they came from strange rifles, so keen was his sense of hearing, and upon proceeding to the spot where the young men had been left at work, their mutilated bodies were found. Mr. Hulings lived upon his farm the remainder of his life, and when he died, in 1810, left three sons, Marcus, James and Ceal Hulings.

David Mumford, a native of New Jersey, arrived some time before 1797. He had first settled in Washington County, and from there removed to the land which he took up in Union, near the center of the township. He had been a soldier in the Revolutionary War, and in religion was of the Methodist persuasion. He was one of the most prominent and intelligent of the pioneer settlers, and continued the work of clearing the land and tilling the soil until his death, in 1816. His descendants still reside in the township. Robert Wilson, who came about the same time, settled in the northern part, at the mouth of Wilson's Run.

In 1799 a series of settlements was made upon the land belonging to the Holland Land Company, located along the bank of French Creek. Among them were those made by Tunis, Peter and Henry Elson, who were of German birth, and remained upon their farms throughout life. Four brothers by the name of Wensell also settled here temporarily, but later removed to Ohio.

About the beginning of the present century a steady stream of immigration began to flow in, and continued for several years. James Birchfield came in 1800 from the valley of the Susquehanna and settled in the western part of the township. He was a prominent citizen and held the position of associate judge of the county, and was an elder in the old Fairfield Township Seceder Church. He is still represented in the township by a numerous posterity. Mrs. Nelly Beatty settled in the southern part with her sons John, James and Matthew. James Davis cleared a farm in the western part of Union, upon which he spent the remainder of his life. His brother Samuel

settled upon Wilson's Run, in the northern part of the township, and was a lifelong resident. He was one of the few citizens of Crawford County who owned slaves. Samuel Kincaid, who located a farm on Conneaut Creek, taught singing school during the early days, and also filled the office of constable. John McFadden settled in the southern part of the township. Leonard Smock, who settled about a half mile north of Conneaut Creek, was a native of New Jersey, and removed here from Westmoreland County about 1805.

Theodore Scowden came from the Susquehanna in 1800 and remained a lifelong resident of the township, leaving a numerous family. Robert Stitt settled near him at about the same time. James Smith, who settled in 1805, came from the valley of the Tuscarora, in Juniata County. At this time the Indians were still numerous and wild beasts abundant. The nearest mill was at Peterson's, in Greenwood, and although the distance was not great, they would defer a journey thither until the meal box had been thoroughly scraped out. It was the custom at that time for the miller to keep bread in the mill for his customers to lunch upon. Daniel Holton, a native of Rhode Island, settled at first in Meadville, but in 1815 removed to Union.

About 1832 a number of German settlers came to Union, almost without exception coming from Bavaria, and for thirty years constant accessions were received from the mother country. They soon outnumbered the citizens of other origin, and at present own and occupy about two-thirds of the land in the township. They took up all the unoccupied land as they arrived, and since then have bought up whatever land has been offered for sale. As they increased in numbers, they were no longer able to provide sufficient land for the rising generations, so they have established colonies in various localities, one at Sugar Lake, and one in Missouri. They are sober, industrious farmers, frugal and well-to-do, as is attested by the fine condition of their farms and buildings.

Probably the largest piece of forest still standing in Crawford County is that which covers the elevation known as Dutch Hill. It rises precipitately from the western bank of French Creek, and its irregular outline and heavy growth of timber give it an appearance of wildness and primitive simplicity which makes it a favorite resort for those fond of forest scenery. Until comparatively recent years wildcats were sometimes seen here, while at the present day pheasants, squirrels and other small game attract the sportsmen of the vicinity. The bank facing on French Creek is a favorite camping ground, where, with the creek on one side and the high hill on the other, those who wish to spend a holiday away from the distractions of the outside world find an isolation as complete as could be desired.

There are no villages within the territory of Union Township. The first sawmill is said to have been built by James Smith, who was an early justice of

the peace and also carried on the trade of a blacksmith. Theodore and Hiram Power kept a store, where the old Beaver canal was crossed by the turnpike. A public house was kept at Dutch Hill by William Birchfield. A small corncracker was operated at an early date on Wilson's Run, in the northern part, and Gabriel Davis built a grist and saw mill in the southern part of the township.

The prosperous citizens of Union Township have not been negligent in educational and religious work, and they have founded churches and established schools wherever necessity has required. In 1896 seven schools were in operation within the township, one of which was under independent management. Ninety-eight scholars were enrolled in the six township schools and twenty-eight in the independent, the school year consisting of seven months. During the year more than two thousand dollars was raised and expended in the cause of education.

Soon after the year 1800 a society of Methodists was organized in the cabin of David Mumford. It at first included but three families, those of David Mumford, Andrew McFadden and John Leach, the latter from across the Mercer County line. Meetings were held for many years in Mumford's cabin and afterward in schoolhouses, but it soon went out of existence. It was succeeded in 1826 by the Mount Pleasant Methodist Episcopal Church, which was organized with twelve members by Rev. John Leach and H. Kinsly, of the Mercer circuit. For many years the services were held in cabins and schoolhouses, but about 1858 a church edifice was erected.

The Zion German Reformed Church was organized about 1840 by the Rev. Philip Zeiser, who remained its pastor during eighteen years. It includes in its membership the larger number of the German citizens of the township. Francis and Frederic Stein, Andrew Kahler, John Kebort, William Hubers, Peter Stein, Peter Weber and John Weaver were among the first members. The first church building was a log structure. Services are held in both the English and German languages, and there is a large and flourishing membership.

Peter Elson & Eliz. Sale landed at Phila. J in 1752, "went northwest to Jersey to Pottersown", and were married some years later. Thence they went to Northampton Co., Pa, thence to Penn's Valley "Sentry" Co, thence to Crawford Co., Fairfield Tp., French Creek.

Jacob Elson, son of above, was married to Susanna Leffler, Feb. 12, 1805 at (arrow to French Creek in above paragraph).

Peter, son of Jacob & father of Mike was b. Wed'July 24, 1805; married to Catharine Best 1829, d. of typhoid 1833. Mike b. 1831.

Adam Flson son of Jacob was b 1807, probably in Morgan Co., Ohio, York Tp. where the family had removed & where Peter and his brother were married in 1829.

Adam my grandfather (arrow to 'son of Jacob' above) was more likely b. in Pa. He was 2nd son of Jacob. There were '7 sons, Pet., Ad., Henry, Jno., Mike, Jacob & David. When Peter d. Jacob also d. of same fever & Adam took it but recovered.

Adam married Susannah Smith, 1829 (?). & Jacob my father was b. Oct 1, 1830 in a little house down the hollow near Turkey run below the old well on the Smith farm. Susannah Smith's mother was a Bear whose bro. Geo. was in the Rev. or War of '12. Her father "Grandad" Smith came fr Md. lived in Zanesville about 4 yrs. then "entered" the Smith fame. He shot deer where the market house now stands in Z. & helped to build the court house, 1809.

When my father was 3 wks old his parents took him & went to visit his grandfather Jacob Elson who had moved fr Morgan Co. to Blue rock, Brushcreek Tp Musk. Co. & he died that day- fell fr his shoe bench.

was assured by my father that they were numerous. He dent of the United States. My father married a third and fourth time but had no children by either wife. His third wife was the widow of MR.REECE, spoken of above. After my mother's death, he went west and carried on business in St.Louis, Mo., and went as far up the Mississippi River as Prairie du Chien. After wandering some years he returned to Scioto Tp. and very much astonished us, for we had heard that he was dead, and believed he was. He informed us that he had been dead. He was put into a coffin, and was awaiting burial when he came to. He scared the attendants beyond measure. He was affected with pleurisy in the head and recovered to live some years. After his return, he related the circumstance of his death, as he called it. He says he went to heaven. On the way he was accompanied by 41 other persons. They went in procession, two abreast. When the head of the procession reached a certain point, the two foremost were plunged down a precipice, those immediately behind being conscious of the fall of those before them. So they marched and fell, till 40 were engulfed in the yawning abyss, and he and his companion were about, as they supposed, to follow in the footsteps of their predecessors and shrank from their dreadful fate. Just then the one having charge at the end of the line spoke in kindest words, and assured them that they should not be harmed, when they were transferred across the deep, dark, hideous gulf and transported to the elysian realms beyond. But he was not permitted to remain there long. came to himself, and on complaining of his head the physician determined the disease he was afflicted with. and applied a remedy. He came to life. and his senses, and returned to Scioto Township.

In telling his story, my father often iterated to me that he would yet meet his companion to the elysian fields of glory. And a little while before he met DR. WAITE, who was an entire stranger to him in the flesh, never having met my father before, who explained to him their pleasant experience in the abodes of the blessed. But the doctor was entirely oblivious of the circumstances.

My father died on the 30th day of May. 1848, aged 68 years.

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#### MUSKINGUM COUNTY, RICH HILL TP., EARLY INSTRUCTION

County history intertwines with pioneer individuals as they develop their lives. Consequently, communited related documents are often filed with individuals who were involved with important actions of their times. ABRAM MARNE, Rich Hill Tp., Muskingum Co., was one such person. He was active on various committees involving the growth of his newly developing township. Because WARNE handled certain financial agreements in the neighborhood, the following documents, showing the development of education in the area, were filed in his administration. case #1257, Probate Court Muskingum County Ohio, 1834 (Administration book A p329). Original spelling has been preserved.

"We the subscribers agree with JOHN MOORE to teach a school for the term of three months of which time the said MOORE is to have one half the Saturdays to himself. The said MOORE engages to teach a regular school under the directions of ELIJAH BALL, LEWELLEN PEAIRS & ISAREAL ROBERTSON who is appointed committee for said school. in the branches of Reading, Writing and Arithmetic to the best of his abilities. For which we the subscribers promise to pay the said JOHN MOORE on his order the sum of one dollar and fifty cents per each schoolar in cash on or before the tenth day of March next. The said employers is to find the school in a suitable house with plenty of fire wood chop't at the door.

"For the full and true performance of these presents we have hereunto set out hands this third day of December one thousand eight hundred and ten. [Signed] JOHN MOORE, ELIJAH BALL. NILLIAM HERRON, ABRAM WARNE, LEWIS PEAIRS, ISRAEL ROBERTSON, LEWELLEN PEIRCE, HENRY SHEAMER. October 23th 1836 this day settled."

Education and religion were the sustaining forces in the pioneers' life, just as they are today. Often music was used to express oneself both in the school and in the church.

"Whereas we believe it will be usefull that us and our children be aquainted in Church Music for the purpose of singing praises we therefore covenant and agree with JOHN MOORE to teach us the under named subscribers in that art to the best of his knowledge and for every schollar we agree to pay the said MOORE fifty cents in cash for one quarter or thirteen nights or sixty two and a half cents in trade. We the said schollars ingages to be in subjection to the rules the said MOORE adopts in the school and to behave ourselves in a decent and comly manner. The above named cash or trade to be paid at the expiration of the school. The place of meeting to be at the school house near ABRAM WARNES or some central place where a majority of the schollars may direct the school to commence on the next Thursday night November 28th, 1810. [Signed]

The Elsons landed in Philadelphia in 1752, settling first in Jersey Shore, Potter Township, Northumberland Co., Pa. They then moved to Northampton County, then Penns Valley, Centre Co., and finally to Fairfield Township, Crawford Co. They appeared on the tax rolls in Potter Township, Northumberland Co., 1785-1787, and in Potter Twp., Mifflin Co., 1789-90. It's been a long time since we exchanged information, and George and I have gone on-line. Don Wiggins has not only gone on-line, he has his own web site and a separate site for the "Wiggins Vault". So, I guess it's time to pick up the Wiggins line again.

Also, I'm getting ready for a trip to Salt Lake City for research, so I've been reviewing all my data and correspondence. I came up with a couple of

questions for you while reviewing.

On one of the family group sheets you sent me years ago, there was a reference to a "Bradford notebook". Do you know about this source?

What is your descendancy from George Baker and Mary Wiggins? I've been e-mailing a Larntz cousin, and he sent me some information that 2 of George and Mary's girls were ancestors in that line. The 2 were Adaresta and Susan. I found Jonathan in my database, and 2 children- Minnie and Jesse. Is one of them your parent?

Do you know who the Edward Wiggins was who married Margaret Miller 14

Jan 1836?

One of your earlier questions had to do with the James Pedan family. There is some interesting information on the web with the Pedan-Paden line. They were Quakers, apparently. I don't know if James continued a Quaker, but his speech could very well have contained a lot of thees and thous. Interesting...

Back to Tunis, Betsy, Martha and Christena. Christena was born 1789 or 1790. That would have made her 10-11 years old when Martha Elson was born, and 13-

14 when Elizabeth was born. It's very unlikely she is their mother.

I have seen a Tunis Elson family group with an "Aunt Teeny", identity unknown. Another theory about that; I've seen a Muskingum county document that called Christena "Tina" or "Tena". If she was the sister of Tunis' first wife, that would make her the children's Aunt, right? Maybe that's what they called her... I can't put my hand on the document that called her Tina, but I remember how surprised I was when I saw it...

Martha married John in 1823, and her tombstone says she died in 1842. So, it would seem Martha would be the mother of Jane through Tunis. There has to be another marriage in there for Riley, and everyone says John married a Betsey.

Lets try another Betsey.

Tunis came to Muskingum from Crawford County, PA. I have a copy of a will of a Peter Elson of Crawford County that I will copy and send you. I believe Tunis is the son of this Peter, and that he had younger brothers. At least 2 of these brothers were married and had children. Peter's wife was Elisabeth, and if she was the mother of his sons, it is reasonable to assume the other sons had daughters name Elizabeth as well. Since there is no marriage record of John to Elizabeth or Betsy in Muskingum or Coshocton county, I think it is possible that he either went to Crawford or another Ohio county (the census index shows a couple of Elsons in other Ohio counties who match the names of his brothers, but I haven't checked the marriage records in those counties yet) to marry "Betsey". Wouldn't it be fun to prove this?

The 1835 Index of Ohio Tax Duplicate shows a Jacob Elson in Stark co., a Jacob in Morgan co.; 2 listings for Henry in Stark co.; and 2 listings for John in Stark

co. It looks like Stark county is a great place to go dig.

Another theory. In the 1790 census, Mifflin Co., PA, (German community), you will see a Peter Elson-4 males over 16, 2 females. Tuness (Juness) was enumerated in Allegheny, which later became Crawford. That would have left his 3 brothers and Peter. How about the second female? I think she married John Michael Dill, and had a daughter "Betty" (see Peter Elson will).

I've suspected all along Tunis was not in the Richard Elson line; Tunis is a German surname, and Elisabeth is the German spelling of the name. Also, the Vencils and John Michael Dill were of German stock, and they were in Crawford

County as well.

That's enough theories for now. Hope you have some fun with this.

Allegheny County was formed from Westmoreland 24 September 1788, and in December subdivided into seven townships. Pitt Township encompassed all of Pennsylvania north and west of the Ohio and Allegheny rivers, including the territory that in 1800 became Crawford County. At the end of the original returns for Pitt Township from the 1790 census is a section enumerating "The in habitints att french Creek." This listing of the earliest white settlers in the county, plus the soldiers stationed at Fort Venango [Franklin], is reproduced here verbatim from the microfilmed schedules.

Deaths in Meadville from April 1880 through October 1920 were recorded in an oversize bound volume captioned on each sheet, "Record of Physicians and Undertakers' Returns of Deaths in the City of Meadville, Pennsylvania. The volume is located at the Clerk's Office of City Hall, 984 Water Street Meadville, and apparently has not been filmed. The present article continue the publication of its contents begun in previous issues.<sup>1</sup>

Each sheet in the volume is lined and divided into nineteen columns labelled as follows; data therein has been transcribed verbatim except as noted

NAME. COLOR. SEX [indicated here by \$\sigma\$ for male, \$\frac{9}\$ for female]. MARRIED OR SINGLE. OCCUPATION. DATE OF DEATH. CAUSE OF DEATH [subdivided into PRIMARY and SECONDARY columns, but generally, only a single cause is given]. [Attending] PHYSICIAN. NAME OF PARENTS. BIRTH-PLACE OF DECEASED. AGE [subdivided into columns labelled Y., M., D., rendered here as y -m -d]. RESIDENCE [subdivided into NO., STREET, WARD]. TIME OF RESIDENCE THEREIN [Y., M., D.; here, -y -m -d]. PLACE OF PREVIOUS RESIDENCE PLACE OF INTERMENT. DATE OF INTERMENT. UNDERTAKER OR INFORMANT. WATER USED. No. OF REPORT.

The original order has been maintained, except that the last column—the report number—is listed first "Water used" (city or well) has been omitted. The column entries have been separated by commas, and the words in italics (d. job, Dr., Ward, etc.) added to designate the column headings. Capitalization of the decedent's color and marital status has been disregarded; dates, names of states, "Township," "County," and the like have been uniformly abbreviated.

The absence of countywide death records prior to 1893<sup>2</sup> underscores the volume's significance. Because no entries were made for January 1885, the following six deaths have been taken from newspapers and cemetery registers:

## VILLAGE OF MAGNOLIA

This village is within Rose Township, Carroll County and a part extends over into Stark County.

Magnolia is an incorporated place of long standing. The present officers are John J. Williams, mayor; S. A. Hastings, clerk; G. R. Mackall, treasurer; Robert McDonald, marshal.

A postoffice was established here May 26, 1836, with John W. Smith as first postmaster, then followed in order the following postmasters: Richard Elson until sometime in the '50s; Frederick Winters, W. H. Greer up to 1885; George W. Speaker, during Cleveland's first term of office; N. J. Randall in Harrison's administration; Jacob E. Endlich in Cleveland's second administration; Douglass Gotshall from 1898 to 1914, and W. L. Knotts from 1914 to the present time—January, 1921.

The Pennsylvania Railway Company constructed through this village in 1854 and the Baltimore & Ohio line was built in 1899.

The churches are the Evangelical and United Brethren (Olive branch). The only secret society is the Knights of Pythias.

The village was visited by a big storm or hurricane January 20, 1854; killing frost June 4, 1859; deep snow in April, 1901; floods and high waters, 1884, 1891, 1898, 1912 (September) and 1913.

It should be understood that a portion of this village is within Stark County, but the postoffice is situated in Carroll County. Richard Elson founded the part of the village in Stark County and Mr. Downing the part in Carroll County. His plat was first called Downingsville.

Richard Elson, Sr., established the flouring mills in 1834.

From an old historical account of this village it is gleaned that the village was platted March 22, 1836, ten miles southeast from Canton. In 1880 it had a population of 300 and at present has about 600. The directory of Ohio for 1884 gave this village as having a woolen mill by Chaddock & Son; a flouring and saw mill, A. R. Elson; general merchandise, Clarence Greer; hotel by J. Gregory; grocery, T. Griffith; general store, William M. Griffith; blacksmith, Lewis G. Kemp; hotel, Daniel Kloppman; physician, Dr. L. McIlravy.

#### Morges

This place was laid out August 24, 1831, by Samuel Oswalt and John Waggoner. It never materialized to any business importance. Its chief feature was the fine Catholic church known as St. Mary's, which in 1884 was described as having a chime of bells that could be heard for miles around the village. This church was dedicated in 1858. The population in 1840 was 1,593; in 1880 it was only 1,195, but today it is numbered among the defunct places of the county.

Under this company the plant nost continual operation until December 25, 1917, when in making war material and the fire was thought to have been the result of German propaganda. Immediately after the fire the plant was rebuilt and under the able management of C. W. Ruff, who was superintendent at this time, the plant was again put in operation on February 7, 1917, just six weeks after being destroyed. But like all present building tile manufacturers, at this date, they have been obliged to close down. They are, however, making extensive repairs and additions, and when operations are continued they will have a

more complete and economic plant. October 26, 1911, the Malvern Fire Clay Company was incorporated under the laws of the State of West Virginia. The original stockholders being W. R. Elson, H. C. Downer, I. H. Ross, H. C. Ross, Ella Elson Ross, Mary Elson Downer, E. C. Baxter and O. O. Allison. These all, with the exception of I. H. Ross, deceased, E. C. Baxter and O. O. Allison, withdrawn, remain as stockholders of the company. Ground was broken and erection of the plant commenced April 16, 1912. The first material was manufactured October 12, 1912. This company has engaged in the making of hollow-building tile from the first. The plant has been in continuous operation from date of beginning with one exception of about sixty days, when the plant was destroyed by fire on the morning of July 1, 1919. But by competent management under war conditions, the plant was rebuilt and again put in operation on September 9th of the same year. This company has, by installing more and better machinery, more than doubled their original capacity. Their present daily output is about two hundred and fifty tons of burned ware. They employ about one hundred men. This is considered one of the most complete and upto-the minute plants of the hollow-tile industry.

This company has furnished building tile for many of the largest buildings of our principal cities. During the period of the World war the plant was operated almost exclusively on war material and at the conclusion the company was awarded by the War Department for excellency of material and service.

The officers remain as they were originally chosen. W. R. Elson, president; H. C. Downer, vice-president and general manager; H. C. Ross, secretary and treasurer. These officers with Ella Elson Ross

and Mary Elson Downer compose the directorate.

Could the veil, which hides the future from us mere mortals, have been lifted on that April morning that Mr. Kratz, pick and shovel in hand, went out looking for fireclay. What a wonderful sight would have been his to enjoy! He would have seen a brick paved road, 16 feet wide reaching from the Atlantic to the Pacific, a modern city built of the building material that would be manufactured by the plants that would follow the discovery of fireclay in such a great abundance and of such excellent quality as the following analysis will show:

In 1820 the contract to carry the mail from Steubenville to Canton once a week was re-let to William Barber, Sr., who was required to carry it on horseback. Soon after this a postoffice was established at Centerville (now Carrollton), and Alexander Leslie was appointed first postmaster under President James Monroe. Mr. Leslie kept the office in a two story log house afterward torn away to make room for the house erected by Lewis Roberts on Main street. Mr. Barber put a hack in operation on the route. In 1828 there was a tri-weekly mail route established from Steubenville to Canton and the mail was required to be carried on coaches and Mr. Leslie was retained as postmaster under President John Quincy Adams. Centerville then had a tri-weekly mail service each way and it was carried on coaches drawn by four "bob-tailed bays," the driver announcing his arrival from his seat on top of the coach by the shrill notes of a winding horn; and as the heavy wheels of the coach thundered down Main street all business was suspended for the time being, while men, women and children rushed to their front doors to view this innovation of civilization.

The first number of the Centerville Record, September 15, 1832, by John D. Patton, appeared and a few weeks later a "list of uncalled for letters" was published: Henry Atherton, Thomas Atherton, David Boiler, Thomas Crosier, John Elder, Thomas Eckley, Susan Foutz, Mary Griffin, George Kintner, John Lindsay, Dr. E. McElroy, Anderson McFerren, Jane McCloud, Thomas Patton, Rebecca Peterson, Rev. James Robinson and Jonathan Hart.

Philander Williams was postmaster under President Andrew Jackson for a short time, quit and was followed by Samuel Sterling in 1833, when the new county was organized and Carrollton made the county seat.

In 1840 Thomas Wilson had a small brewery which he turned into a postoffice building. The word "brewery" was painted in large white letters upon the weatherboarding. He was a shoemaker also

#### STAGE RACING

It was in Wilson's administration that the memorable stage race was had from Steubenville to Canton, between a stage coach drawn by four horses and a man named Orwick from Jefferson County, who drove the entire distance of fifty-seven miles with one horse and a sulky, on a wager of \$1,000. At that date the coach fare was five cents a mile, which the man who drove the sulky refused to pay and said he could beat the stage coach with his old blind horse and he won out, too!

#### FIXED BY THE NORTH STAR

In 1868 the true meridian of this vicinity was fixed by R. Raley, Esq., assisted by J. B. Strawn, civil engineer, by placing stone markers for that purpose in the fair grounds, near Carrollton. These stones are each five feet long and two feet square and are set in the earth all but one foot of their length. They were fixed in their position at 2 o'clock in the morning, by the use of the light of the North Star. These posts are of great interest and value to surveyors and others interested in land surveys and civil engineering. The needle of a compass may vary but the Polar star never!

### VILLAGE OF CARROLLTON

The early settlements of land around what is now Carrollton were made by Isaac Dwyer, Richard Baxter. Peter Hoart, Richard Elson, John Caskey, William Ceoxton and others who settled here in 1810, then in Columbiana County. They came mainly from Pennsylvania, Virginia and Maryland, with some Germans and Irish. Mr. Dwyer erected a large log house on what has since been known as the John Caskey farm and later the James Cellars farm, at the west end of Main street. Here he kept what he called upon the sign the "Rising Sun Tavern." The Stark and Columbiana county lines passed through the house and were the lines passing north and south. When the commissioners of Columbiana County (who were Quakers) refused him license to sell strong drinks he moved his bar into the room on the Stark County side of the line and handed down the bottles and mixed drinks "according to law."


Prior to this time the pioneers were more or less annoyed by bears and wolves and an occasional deer was killed for the venison. Elizabeth McClintock, better known after her marriage as Betsy Ebersole, has said that she remembered having seen her father shoot a bear while trying to enter their cabin-door, when they lived on the Dwyer farm west of town. Mr. Dwyer died on the farm afterwards owned by Samuel G. Perry at New Harrisburgh. Richard Baxter settled on the farm since owned by Thomas McCort, where he died.

As late as 1880 there was an old pack-saddle about Mr. Baxter's barn which was used many times in "packing" salt and other household necessities from New Lisbon where the taxes were paid as late as 1833. Peter Bohart, a Pennsylvania German, settled upon the land east of town, part of which is embraced in that portion known as "Park Hill," where he laid out the town of Centreville (now Carrollton) on the 4th of October, 1815.

Doctor Ross was a son of Samuel I. and Angeline (Cross) Ross, and was the youngest of their six children. Samuel I. Ross was a son of Enoch Ross, who came with his family from Pennsylvania to Ohio and settled near Waynesboro, Stark County, in 1812. He and his wife there passed the remainder of their lives. Their son Samuel I. was born in Green County, Pennsylvania, and was two years of age at the time of the family removal to Ohio. He was reared to manhood in Stark County, and the name of his first wife was Stansburg, all of their five children being deceased and the last to survive having been Rev. Jasper S. Ross, a clergyman of the Disciples' or Christian Church. In Carroll County Samuel I. Ross wedded Miss Angeline Cross, who was here born and reared, her parents, John and Margaret Cross, natives of Ireland, having been early settlers in this county. About the year 1842 Samuel I. Ross removed to the village of Malvern, where he opened and conducted one of the first hotels of the place. At Malvern, as a popular and highly honored citizen, he continued to reside until his death, which occurred January 17, 1890, he having there served forty years in the office of justice of the peace. After having availed himself of the advan-

tage of the village schools of Malvern Dr. Enoch C. Ross in 1861 became a student in Hiram College, in which historic old Ohio institution he continued his studies until he felt constrained by patriotic impulses to tender his service in defense of the Union. In May, 1863, he enlisted for a term of 100 days in Company K, One Hundred and Fifty-seventh Ohio National Guard, and upon the expiration of his term he re-enlisted, as a private in Company A, One Hundred and Ninety-seventh Ohio Volunteer Infantry, which was assigned to the Fourth Army Corps of the Army of the Cumberland and with which he continued in active service until the close of the war, with a record of having participated in the various battles and minor engagements in which his regiment was involved. JAMES S. BORDEN has been successfully engaged in the retail grocery business at Carrollton since 1915, and his well appointed establishment occupies quarters 20 by 120 feet in dimensions, the store being distinctly modern in its equipment and service and receiving a sub-

stantial and appreciative patronage. Mr. Borden was born in Columbiana County, Ohio, July 21, 1884, and is a son of John W. and Nancy (Crumbley) Borden, both likewise natives of Columbiana County, where the former was born in 1854 and the latter in 1853. John W. Borden was a son of Robert and Mary Ann Borden, who early became residents of Columbiana County, the father having found employment in coal mines when but ten years old and baving continued his active connection with this line of industrial enterprise for seventy-two years-until his death, at the venerable age of eighty-two years. Both he and his wife were honored pioneer citizens of Columbiana County at the time of their deaths. John W. Borden passed his entire life in his native county, where for many years he was associated with coal-mining industry, and he and his wife were residents of Salineville, that county, at the time of their deaths, he having passed away in 1912 and she having survived until 1915.

James S. Borden received his early education in the public schools of Salineville and began to work in the coal mines in Columbiana County when still a boy. Downs, the leading representative of the family of that name which has so long been prominent in the history and development of Rose Township, Carroll Co., Ohio, was born in Rose Township March S, 1830. His father, Josiah Downs, was a native of Virginia. John Downs, father of Josiah, and grandfather of Josiah E., was born in Maryland, married Sarah Underhill, of the same State, and later settled in Virginia; to this union were born George, William, Josiah,

Theophilus, Mary, Charity and Elizabeth. The family came to Ohio, and were among the earliest settlers of Stark County, where the father entered a farm, on which he and wife passed the remaining days of their life. He was a member of the Episcopalian Church, and in politics was a Democrat.

Josiah Downs, father of our subject, came to Ohio with his parents, and some time afterward entered eighty acres where Josiah E. now resides, and on which he erected a log cabin in 1824. He married Elizabeth Elson, daughter of Henry Elson, and this union was blessed with two children: Sarah A. (deceased) and Josiah E. (our subject). The father died in 1829, and the widow continued to conduct the farm until her second marriage, in 1842, with Levi Williams.

Josiah E. Downs received the usual amount of schooling inculcated in his early days, and at the age of eighteen assumed the management of the home farm, which he has since greatly improved and brought to its present condition of fertility. November 5, 1850, he married Hanuah, daughter of James Miller, who was born in Brooke County, W. Va., January 11, 1801, and w<mark>ho married Rachel Knots</mark>, and soon after came to Ohio. To the marriage of Mr. Miller were born six children, viz.: William, Druscilla and Hannah (twins), Isaac, James and Jonathan. Like his father Mr. Downs has always taken an active part in politics, acting with the Democratic party. While connected with no church, he is yet a liberal supporter of all measures tending to the advancement of the cause of religion in his township and county, and his deeds of charity are unstinted, although not made public.



DR. SAMUEL LEE.

The first resident physician did not come any too soon. He came on horseback from Poultney, Vermont, to Granville in the spring of 1809, in company with Rev. Timothy Harris, a Congregational minister. Two years later, in 1811, just one hundred years ago, he located in Coshocton. For some years he was the only physician. His practice covered the whole county, and, of course, was very laborious.

He lived for many years on the southeast corner of Fourth and Main Streets, and owned nearly all the square bounded by Main, Walnut, Fourth and Fifth Streets. He also owned a large farm east of town. He served for one term as county treasurer, and was in the state senate, 1826–1827. He was one of the charter members of the l'resbyterian Church in 1818, and served as a ruling elder from 1839 to 1874.

When the time came to erect a church building, in 1834, he headed the list with the largest individual subscription, one hundred dollars. He was a lineal descendant of Miles Standish, married Sabra Case of Granville, and his grandchildren and great-grandchildren are still with us. He died March 19, 1874, eighty-nine years of age lacking four days.

ADAM JOHNSTON,

The grandfather of policeman Johnston, was one of the leading citizens in the early days of Coshocton.

He was born in Baltimore in 1773. At the age of twenty-seven he came to Belmont County, Ohio, where he had many relations living. Here he clerked in a store and taught school. In September, 1810, he came to Coshocton. November 12, 1812, he married Sarah, the daughter of Colonel Charles Williams,—the girl who, at the age of twelve years, used at times to ride on horseback to the White Eyes plains to buy a bushel of wheat. The next day she would go with it to Zanesville to have it ground and return with the flour the third day.

Mr. Johnston was a merchant, surveyor, politician, county clerk, county recorder, and successively captain, major, colonel and brigadiergeneral in the State Militia, in the days when all the able-bodied men had to muster once or twice a year.

His clear, beautiful handwriting in the records of the clerk's and recorder's offices will cause him to be favorably remembered as long as our records are preserved. He was a man of force and character, trusted for his integrity, and a leader in public affairs. His grand-daughter, Miss Louella Johnston, says that he planned and helped to build two forts on the Maumee in the War of 1812.

He built the brick house on lot 235 (old number), Water Street, where Jacob Barringer now lives. The one-story frame addition on the south side was built for clerk's and recorder's offices, and so used for years.

He died June 8, 1829, fifty-six years of age, leaving five children.

#### Fowler

The history of the Fowler family in Coshocton begins in 1805. Richard Fowler moved from Brook County Virginia, because of what he deemed its "Tyrannous laws, oppressive to deemed its "Tyrannous laws, oppressive to poor men." A carpenter by trade and finding no work in Zanesville, Ohio, he came to Coshocton and leased land in Lafayette Township from Alexander Elson.

He married Elson's daughter, Jane, on February 5, 1807. After serving in the War of 1812, he moved to Linton Township and settled on Bacon Run. He brought the first sheep into this town-ship, always watching for wolves which were

ship, always watching for wolves which were numerous at that time. He also opened his house as a place of public entertainment known as "Fowler's Stand" from 1830-1850.

He had at least two children, Richard and Elizabeth. Richard was born on July 22, 1818. He married Sarah Wells on July 13, 1842. They had eight children, one of which, John Wells Fowler, married Drucilla Wilden. They in turn had one son, John Richard, born on June 9, 1865, who was a long time resident of Flint Hill Ridge.

John Richard Fowler married Hattie Viola Jennings on July 4, 1889. The Jenninos family were

nings on July 4, 1889. The Jennings family were also among the first families in Coshocton, com-ing from Runmey, Virginia, on horseback. The Fowlers were Scottish people who came to America via Ireland. The founder of the Ohio line was Richard (1784-1866), who came to Coshocton the winter of 1797-8, from Brooke County, Virginia. He roofed three log huts for King Charlie Williams, returned to Virginia; then King Charlie Williams, returned to Virginia; then returned to Coshocton in 1805, soon after marrying Jane Elson (1788-1872), had a son, Richard (1818-1892), who married Sarah Wells (1816-1903). Their eldest son, John Wells Fowler (1844-1929) was my grandfather, the third generation to live at the farmstead on Bacon Run pow identified as 52530 State Route 541 Run now identified as 52530 State Route 541. John W. served in Company A, 194th Ohio Infan-

try.
Grandfather married Elizabeth Jones (1846-1925) in 1869. They lived at what is now 54980 State Route 541 (my birth address) until late 1916 when they retired to Plainfield. Their farm was acquired from Elizabeth's parents, David 1984, and Margaret Hunt Jones (1816-1816-1884) and Margaret Hunt Jones (1816-1896)

1896). My mother's parents were George W. (1845-1911) and Josephine Baker Latham (1849-1925). He was the son of George W. Latham, Sr. (1807-1872) and Lucinda Bonnell Latham (1813-1885). Both were born at Hopewell, Fanquer County, Virginia. They moved from there to Plainfield, Coshocton County, in 1835. Josephine was the daughter of Rev. John (1814-1901) and Betsy Foreman (1810-1891) Baker. Rev. John Baker was a Methodist protestant minister. My parents were active in the Plainfield M.P. Church, and I still subscribe to that faith.

In 1917 my parents erected a new home on 27 acres of land now identified as 18213 State Route 93, one-half mile north of Plainfield. This land was acquired from the heirs of Hiram Duing a Civil War yeters. Eather also surphessed ing, a Civil War veteran. Father also purchased 50 acres west of the 27, which included the site of the cabin where David and Margaret Jones settled when they came here from Wales and England. Later he purchased 65 acres on the east of State Route 93 from Joe and Lucy Dul-

ing.

After I was graduated from Plainfield High School in 1931 (2nd in class; class president), I farmed in partnership with my father until draft-ed into the army in May 1941.

From 1935 until that time I was employed as clerk-treasurer of the Plainfield School District,

during which time a new building was erected.

After basic training at Fort Lee, Virginia, I was transferred to the 327th Ordnance at Fort Devens, Massachusetts, and for the next 13 months moved vehicles over New England and New York. While at Fort Devens I had the distinction of ranking first in my company with the 22 calibre rifle, making 49 bullseyes out of a possible 50.

In March 1943, my company and others were moved by rail to Camp Anza, California, and a few weeks later boarded the Hermitage at Los Angeles. Stops were made at Wellington, New Zealand, Melbourne, Australia, and Bombay, Zealand, Melbourne, Australia, and Bornbay, India. After a short stay at Dealahle, north of Bombay, we returned to that port and boarded a British ship which carried us up the Persian Gulf to Khorramshahr, Iran. The next half year was spent near Ahmaz, 80 miles north where we guarded a large area where tires and ammuni-tion were stored underground. The next year was spent at Andimeshk, 90 miles farther north where we had large warehouses of tools and equipment.

In July 1944 I used leave time to tour the Holy

During the winter of 1944-45 I was on detached service to Headquarters company in Teheran where I and approximately two dozen other men audited lend-lease materials routed to Russia

In early 1945 I was transferred to the 871st Ordnance and my third summer in the desert was at Andimeshk, where I kept records on tools and equipment.

It was late October 1945 when I left Iran from the Abadan Airport. Refueling and layover stops were made at Cairo, Egypt, Tripoli, Libya, Casa-

WILLIAM WIREBAUGH, blacksmith; Waynesburgh; is a son of John and Elizabeth (Bechtel) Wirebaugh, both natives of Stark Co., where they were married and lived their entire lives. He was by trade a

plasterer, and also engaged in teaming to Pittsburgh when the country was new. first wife died when William was quite young, leaving ten children, seven of whom are now living; he subsequently married the widow Whaler. At the time of his death, he was residing upon his farm in Nimishillen Tp.; his death occurred in December, 1877. Our subject was raised upon a farm until the age of seventeen, when he enlisted in Co. I., 19th O. V. I., and was in all the active service that his regiment passed through; this regiment was called the "Boy Regiment," as it was mainly composed of vouths under age. The "Boys," however, passed through the battles of Shiloh, Siege of Corinth, Stone River, Mission Ridge, Chickamauga, Atlanta and many others, leaving an honorable and distinguished record. In the battle before Atlanta, in 1864, William was wounded, and confined to the hospital for a year; upon his recovery, he was transferred to the Veteran Reserve, and sent to Illinois; while there, his company had the honor of guarding, in Springfield, the last resting-place of the illustrious martyr, Abraham Lincoln. They were for many years members of the Methodist Church, and exemplary members of society; his death was in 1846, and his wife's in 1854; thirteen children were in this family -James, died in 1828 upon the old farm; Benjamin living in Osnaburg Tp.; Nancy, deceased; Robert, living in Mapleton; Isaac, died in Wo d Co., O.; Douglas; Osie Elson, wife of John Elson, of Sandy Tp.; Phebe Yohe, living in Osnaburg Tp.; Sarah Kinney, deceased; John, living in Indiana; and two infants deceased. Douglas, Jr., was born in Osnaburg Tp. in 1812, and was a resident and assistant upon the homestead farm until 28 years of age, when he went to Columbiana and commenced the study of medicine with Dr. Silvers, with whom he was under instruction for three years. He then returned to his home and commenced the practice of his profession, and also giving some attention to farming. After his father's death he, with his brother Peter, operated the old homestead until 1865, when he disposed of his interest there, and removed to Sandy Tp., buying the old Brownson farm, where he has since resided. He has 160 acres of land, which he supervises, having given up the practice of medicine, in which for many years he was actively and successfully engaged. THANK YOU FOR THAT FINE INTRODUCTION. IT IS INDEED A PLEASURE FOR ME TO BE HERE TODAY. I AM DELIGHTED TO BE PART OF THIS CEREMONY TO RECOGNIZE A GREAT IOWAN. THIS EVENT HAS A SPECIAL SIGNIFICANCE TO ME FOR YOU SEE THOSE EARLY REGIMENTS WERE THE FOREFATHERS OF OUR PRESENT DAY IOWA ARMY NATIONAL GUARD. AND ALSO VERY SPECIAL TO ME IS THAT MY GREAT-GREAT-GRANDFATHER ENLISTED IN COMPANY B, 15TH IOWA REGIMENT, AND COMMANDED THAT UNIT IN THE LATER DAYS OF THE CIVIL WAR. AS I RESEARCHED THESE TWO REGIMENTS, I FOUND THEY FOUGHT TOGETHER THROUGHOUT THE WAR.

IT IS SO IMPORTANT THAT WE TAKE THIS TIME FROM OUR
BUSY LIVES TO REFLECT AND REMEMBER WHAT SOLDIERS LIKE
FIRST LIEUTENANT SERGEANT JAMES M. ELSON HAVE DONE FOR

I WANT TO CONGRATULATE THESE COMMUNITIES, AND EACH
AND EVERY ONE OF YOU FOR WHAT YOU HAVE DONE TO
COMMEMORATE THE MEMORY OF LIEUTENANT ELSON. YOUR VERY
PRESENCE HERE TODAY SPEAKS SO HIGHLY OF YOU. YOU
SHOULD STAND SO VERY TALL AND PROUD FOR WHAT YOU HAVE
DONE TO COMMEMORATE THE IMPORTANT HISTORY OF OUR PAST.

OF HONOR. THE MEDAL OF HONOR WAS FIRST PRESENTED IN

1863, AS THE HIGHEST MILITARY AWARD FOR BRAVERY THAT

CAN BE GIVEN TO A MEMBER OF THE ARMED SERVICED OF THE

UNITED STATES. THE AWARD IS MADE BY THE PRESIDENT, IN

THE NAME OF CONGRESS, TO AN INDIVIDUAL WHO, WHILE

SERVING IN THE ARMED FORCES, "DISTINGUISHED HIMSELF

CONSPICUOUSLY BY GALLANTRY AND INTREPIDITY AT THE RISK

OF HIS LIFE ABOVE AND BEYOND THE CALL OF DUTY."

EACH OF THE ARMED FORCES HAS SET UP REGULATIONS

WHICH PERMIT NO MARGIN OF DOUBT OR ERROR IN RECOMMENDING

A PERSON FOR THE MEDAL. THE DEED MUST BE PROVEN BY THE

INCONTESTABLE EVIDENCE OF A LEAST TWO EYEWITNESSES; IT

MUST BE SO OUTSTANDING THAT IT CLEARLY DISTINGUISHES
HIS GALLANTRY; IT MUST INVOLVE THE RISK OF HIS LIFE;
AND IT MUST BE THE TYPE OF A DEED WHICH, IF HE HAD NOT
DONE IT, HE WOULD NOT BE SUBJECT TO ANY JUSTIFIED
CRITICISM.

SO YOU SEE THE MEDAL WASN'T JUST GIVEN TO EVERYONE.

ONCE HOSTILITIES HAD STARTED IN THE CIVIL WAR,

OFFICIAL WASHINGTON QUARTERS BEGAN TO WONDER AND TO

TALK ABOUT RECOGNIZING THE HEROICS AND DEEDS OF

AMERICAN SOLDIERS, SAILORS, AND MARINES WHO WERE

DISTINGUISHING THEMSELVES IN THE FIGHTING. SEEKING A

PRECEDENT FOR HONORING SERVICEMEN, IT WAS FOUND THAT A

"CERTIFICATE OF MERIT" HAD BEEN AUTHORIZED FOR SOLDIERS
IN 1847.

EARLIER IN OUR HISTORY, GEORGE WASHINGTON HAD

CREATED THE PURPLE HEART AS A DECORATION FOR "SINGULAR

MERITORIOUS ACTION". BUT IT DIDN'T HAVE THE

SIGNIFICANCE OF THE MEDAL OF HONOR.

SENATOR JAMES W. GRIMES, OF IOWA, RECOGNIZED IN

1861, THE NEED FOR AN APPROPRIATE MEDAL. HE CREATED A

BILL FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE MEDAL OF HONOR, WHICH CONGRESS PASSED AND PRESIDENT LINCOLN SIGNED ON DECEMBER 21, 1861. THIS LEGISLATION CREATED A MEDAL OF HONOR FOR A MEDAL OF HONOR FOR ENLISTED MEN OF THE NAVY AND MARINES.

SIX MONTHS LATER A MEDAL OF HONOR WAS APPROVED FOR

THE ARMY. ALL OF THE MEDALS WERE EXTENDED LATER TO

INCLUDE OFFICERS AND ALL ACTIONS DURING THE CIVIL WAR.

TWENTY-NINE OF THE ONE THOUSAND, SEVEN HUNDRED

AND FOURTEEN MEDALS OF HONOR THAT WERE PRESENTED DURING

THE CIVIL WAR WERE PRESENTED TO IOWANS.

ONE OF THOSE HEROES OF OUR PAST, FIRST LIEUTENANT

JAMES M. ELSON, LIES HERE IN THIS BEAUTIFUL LITTLE

CEMETERY UNDER A BRONZE MARKER THAT WILL ALWAYS

IDENTIFY HIM AS A CIVIL WAR VETERAN AND A HOLDER OF OUR

NATION'S HIGHEST MILITARY HONOR THE MEDAL OF HONOR.

IF YOU GO TO THE ROTUNDA OF OUR BEAUTIFUL STATE

CAPITOL IN DES MOINES YOU WILL SEE DISPLAYED THE

REGIMENTAL COLORS OF THE 9TH INFANTRY. THOSE VERY

COLORS WERE CARRIED BY LIEUTENANT ELSON IN HIS OWN TWO

HANDS.

AND IF THE BATTLE STREAMERS WERE ATTACHED TO THOSE

COLORS OF THE 9TH REGIMENT, YOU WOULD SEE THE BATTLES

OF PEA RIDGE, CHICKASAW BAYOU, VICKSBURG, JACKSON,

CHATTANOOGA, MISSIONARY RIDGE, RINGGOLD, ATLANTA,

JONESBORO, AND NORTH AND SOUTH CAROLINA. OUR IOWA

REGIMENTS WERE INVOLVED IN EVERY MAJOR BATTLE IN THE

WESTERN FRONT DURING THAT GREAT WAR BETWEEN THE NORTH

AND SOUTH.

THE 9TH IOWA WAS CERTAINLY ONE OF THE PREMIER

REGIMENTS THAT FOUGHT IN THAT GREAT WAR ONE HUNDRED

AND THIRTY TWO YEARS AGO. A WAR WHICH CHARTED THE

COURSE OF HISTORY AS WE KNOW IT TODAY.

WHEREVER GRANT AND SHERMAN LED, THEY FOLLOWED, AND TO VICTORY.

IT WAS MEN LIKE FIRST LIEUTENANT JAMES ELSON OF
SHELLSBURG, IOWA, WHO ANSWERED THEIR NATION'S CALL, AND
WENT IN HARM'S WAY TO FIGHT FOR WHAT THEY CERTAINLY
THOUGHT WAS RIGHT, AND WHAT THESE GREAT UNITED STATES
OF AMERICA WERE FOUNDED ON SOME TWO-HUNDRED AND TWENTY

YEARS AGO. IDEALS WHICH WE STILL STAND FOR TODAY. AND WITH THE GRACE OF HEAVENLY FATHER WILL FOR MANY MANY MORE YEARS TO COME.

IN 1961, THE SECRETARY OF WAR IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

SENT A TELEGRAM TO GOVERNOR KIRKWOOD, THE GOVERNOR OF

IOWA AND REQUESTED THAT IOWA PROVIDE ONE REGIMENT OF

INFANTRY TO THE NORTHERN CAUSE.

WE, IOWANS, ANSWERED THAT CALL. OH, DID WE EVER.

FOR YOU SEE, WHEN THE CALL WENT OUT FOR VOLUNTEERS,

IOWA RESPONDED WITH FORTY-EIGHT INFANTRY REGIMENTS, ONE

COLOURED REGIMENT, NINE CAVALRY REGIMENTS, AND FOUR

BATTERIES OF ARTILLERY. SEVENTY-EIGHT THOUSAND IOWA

MEN AND BOYS MARCHED OFF TO WAR AND DID US VERY, VERY

PROUD. THEY WERE ELEVEN PERCENT OF OUR ENTIRE STATE

POPULATION.

THE 9TH INFANTRY MUSTERED FOR DUTY AT DUBUQUE ON
SEPTEMBER 24, 1861, WITH TEN COMPANIES AND A TOTAL
STRENGTH NINE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-SEVEN OFFICERS AND
ENLISTED MEN FROM NORTHEAST IOWA. FROM DUBUQUE THEY
BOARDED STEAMSHIPS AND WERE TRANSPORTED TO SAINT LOUIS.

FROM THERE FOUGHT PROUDLY AND WITH VALOR THROUGH THE SOUTH.

THE REGIMENT WAS MUSTERED OUT OF ACTIVE DUTY ON JULY 18, 1865, AT LOUISVILLE, KENTUCKY.

I'M CERTAIN THAT WHEN PRIVATE JAMES M. ELSON LEFT
THIS LITTLE COMMUNITY OF SHELLSBURG HE HAD ABSOLUTELY
NO IDEA THAT HE WOULD BE A HERO, OR THAT HE WOULD EARN
THE MEDAL OF HONOR.

BY NOW PROMOTED TO SERGEANT, HE EARNED HIS MEDAL OF HONOR FOR ACTIONS HE TOOK IN THE BATTLE OF VICKSBURG, MISSISSIPPI. THE PART OF HIS CITATION THAT I COULD LOCATE READS, ".... CARRIED THE COLORS IN ADVANCE OF HIS REGIMENT AND WAS SHOT DOWN WHILE ATTEMPTING TO PLANT THEM ON THE ENEMY'S WORKS."

INDEED HE WAS SEVERELY WOUNDED IN THE THIGH ON MAY

22, 1863, AT VICKSBURG, MISSISSIPPI. BUT FOR WHAT HE

HAD DONE, HE EARNED OUR NATION'S HIGHEST HONOR.

SOME WOULD SAY THAT THE MEDAL OF HONOR IS A

TERRIBLY HIGH AWARD TO PRESENT TO A SOLDIER WHO MERELY

CARRIED THE COLORS. OH, BUT IT WAS MUCH MORE THAN

THAT. THOSE REGIMENTS DIDN'T HAVE THE HIGH TECHNOLOGY
COMMUNICATIONS EQUIPMENT THAT OUR UNITS DO TODAY.

THE REGIMENTAL COLOR WAS A VERY KEY PIECE OF EQUIPMENT
TO THE REGIMENTS. IT DID MORE THAN JUST IDENTIFY THE
9TH IOWA. IT WAS THE PRIMARY MEANS OF COMMUNICATIONS
FOR THE COMMANDER. SO YOU CAN UNDERSTAND ITS
IMPORTANCE AND THE HIGH PRICE COMMANDERS PLACED ON IT.
AND MAYBE IT WAS EVEN MORE. MAYBE IT WAS ANOTHER
EXAMPLE OF WHAT MADE OUR IOWANS STAND ABOVE OTHERS.
SERGEANT ELSON CONTINUED IN MILITARY SERVICE AFTER

SERGEANT ELSON CONTINUED IN MILITARY SERVICE AFTER
BEING WOUNDED AT VICKSBURG. HE MARCHED ON TO THE EAST
THROUGH OTHER BATTLES BEFORE HE WAS AGAIN SHOT AND
SEVERELY WOUNDED IN THE BREAST DURING THE BATTLE OF
ATLANTA. HE WAS PROMOTED TO FIRST LIEUTENANT ON AUGUST
25, 1864, AND CONTINUED TO SERVE UNTIL THE END OF
THE WAR WHEN HE WAS MUSTERED OUT OF ACTIVE SERVICE ON
APRIL 6, 1865, AT GOLDSBORO, NORTH CAROLINA.

TODAY, THE LEGENDS AND HERITAGE OF THOSE EARLY IOWA
REGIMENTS REMAIN TODAY IN THE IOWA NATIONAL GUARD. AND
EVEN THOUGH WE'RE ORGANIZED AND EQUIPPED MUCH

THE SAME THING AS THOSE MEN WHO MUSTERED FOR SERVICE TO THEIR COUNTRY DURING THE CIVIL WAR. AND THAT IS TO SUPPORT AND DEFEND THE CONSTITUTION OF THIS GREAT NATION OF WHICH YOU AND I ARE SO BLESSED TO LIVE IN.

WE SHOULD ALL BE PROUD OF THOSE SOLDIERS OF OUR

IOWA REGIMENTS WHO MARCHED IN THAT GREAT PARADE IN

WASHINGTON, D.C., ON MAY 25, 1865, TO REJOICE THE

RETURNING SOLDIERS WHOSE VALOR HAD SAVED THE UNION.

SUSPENDED OVER PENNSYLVANIA AVENUE WAS A LARGE BANNER

BEARING THESE WORDS, "THE ONLY DEBT WHICH THE COUNTRY

CANNOT PAY IS THE DEBT WHICH SHE OWES HER SOLDIERS."

FIRST LIEUTENANT ELSON RETURNED TO SHELLSBURG AND
BECAME A MANY TERM POSTMASTER. IN 1893, HE WAS ELECTED
SHERIFF OF BENTON COUNTY. HE DIED ON MARCH 26, 1894,
AS THE RESULT OF THE REBEL BULLET HE HAD CARRIED SINCE
THE BATTLE OF VICKSBURG.

DOESN'T IT MAKE YOU PROUD TO LIVE IN THIS COUNTRY
AND TO BE AN AMERICAN?

ALL OF THE CHANGES ON THE INTERNATIONAL SCENE AND

OUR FEDERAL BUDGET CONSTRAINTS HAVE PROMPTED A HUGE CRY
TO CUT THE MILITARY BACK SO THAT WE CAN REALIZE THE
PEACE DIVIDEND. I BELIEVE THAT OUR PEACE DIVIDEND IS
NOT HAVING A WORLD WAR SINCE 1945.

ON 11 JANUARY 1879, GENERAL-IN-CHIEF WILLIAM T.

SHERMAN IS QUOTED," THE PEOPLE WERE SO GRATEFUL IN

1865 FOR MILITARY SERVICE, NOW THEY BEGRUDGE US EVERY

CENT OF PAY AND EVERY OUNCE OF BREAD WE EAT."

ADMITTEDLY, OUR MILITARY CAN BE STREAMLINED, AND

CAN AND IS GROWING SMALLER, BUT WE MUST NOT ALLOW IT TO

GROW TOO SMALL.

THE MILITARY OF THE FUTURE WILL BE MUCH DIFFERENT
THAN WHAT WE HAVE SEEN IN THE PAST. WE ARE CURRENTLY
RIGHT IN THE MIDST OF A VERY DYNAMIC CHANGING TIME IN
THE MILITARY.

THE DOWNSIZING AND RESTRUCTURING OF THE MILITARY

ARE IN REACTION TO THE ALSO DYNAMIC CHANGES IN OUR

WORLD.

THE WORLD ORDER CHANGES BEGAN ON 7 DECEMBER 1987
WHEN THE INF TREATY WAS SIGNED. SINCE THEN THE

HUNGARIAN PARLIMENT VOTED FOR FREE ASSEMBLY, THE BERLIN WALL CAME DOWN, WE'VE SEEN THE GERMANIES UNIFIED,

DEMOCRACY HAS TAKEN HOLD IN EUROPE AND GROWN STRONGER
IN LATIN AMERICA, AN INTERNATIONAL COALITION REVERSED
AN IRAQI AGGRESSION, AND THE SOVIET UNION HAS CEASED TO

EXIST, AND COMMUNISM HAS COLLAPSED AS AN IDEOLOGY AND A
WAY OF LIFE.

BUT THIS HAS CAUSED SOME PROBLEMS FOR WE IN THE
MILITARY, BECAUSE WHILE WE KNOW THERE IS A THREAT, IT
IS EXTREMELY DIFFICULT TO DETERMINE EXACTLY WHAT IT IS
AND WHAT TYPE OF FORCE IS NEEDED TO DEFEND THE IDEALS
OF OUR COUNTRY.

TODAY AS WE SPEAK, THERE ARE NO LESS THAN TWENTY
ON-GOING WARS. THERE ARE OVER 27,000 NUCLEAR WEAPONS
OUT THERE. SOME WE DON'T EVEN KNOW WHO HAS THEM OR
WHAT THEIR INTENTIONS FOR THEM ARE.

OUR MILITARY IS BEING CUT AS WE SPEAK BY INCREDIBLE

NUMBERS. THIS MAY EASILY CHANGE AS THE WORLD ORDER AND

STATE OF AFFAIRS CHANGE. I ONLY HOPE WE DON'T CUT THE

MILITARY TOO FAR TOO FAST, AND NOT HAVE THE TRAINED,

READY FORCES WHEN WE NEED THEM.

I MAKE THE POINT WITH THIS STORY.

IF YOU TRAVEL TO WASHINGTON, D.C., AND CLIMB THAT

GREAT MONUMENT DEDICATED TO THE FATHER OF OUR COUNTRY,

YOU WOULD SEE THAT PLACED INSIDE OF THAT MONUMENT, AS

YOU CLIMB THOSE STEPS, THAT THERE ARE STONES TAKEN FROM

EVERY STATE PLACED IN THOSE WALLS.

THERE IS ONE THERE FROM IOWA. AS YOU GET NEAR THE TOP OF THE MONUMENT, AT THE 520 FOOT LEVEL, AT THE STAIRWELL PLATFORM, YOU WILL FIND A BEAUTIFUL WHITE STONE.

IT DOES NOT COME FROM AMERICA. IT COMES FROM THE ANCIENT CITY-STATE OF CARTHAGE THAT ONCE FLOURISHED ON THE SHORES OF THE MEDITERRANEAN SEA.

CARTHAGE WAS, IN ITS TIME, THE RICHEST, THE MOST

PROSPEROUS NATION IN THE WORLD. IT BECAME AN OBJECT OF

HATE AND VENGEANCE TO THE ROMAN SENATOR NAMED CATO, AND

EVERY SPEECH THAT CATO MADE IN THE ROMAN SENATE, HE

ALWAYS ENDED WITH THESE WORDS, "DELANDA EST CARTHAGE."

-- "CARTHAGE MUST BE DESTROYED."

BUT YOU KNOW, THE PEOPLE OF CARTHAGE COULD NEVER
BRING THEMSELVES TO BELIEVE THAT CATO REALLY MEANT WHAT
HE SAID, BECAUSE CARTHAGE WANTED PEACE WITH ROME.

THEY WERE VERY SECURE IN THEIR MATERIAL WEALTH AND IN THEIR PROGRESS, AND SO THEY BEGAN TO NEGLECT THEIR MILITARY CAPABILITY. WHEN THE INVASION OF CARTHAGE OCCURRED, THEY RALLIED, BUT IT WAS TOO LATE. IT WAS WAY TOO LATE.

CARTHAGE WAS CRUSHED BY ROME. THE ROMAN LEGIONS

DEFEATED THEM IN 146 B.C. THEY DESTROYED THE CITY AND

THEY SOWED THE FIELDS OF CARTHAGE WITH SALT.

THERE IS NO CARTHAGE TODAY --- THERE ARE NO PEOPLE

KNOWN AS CARTHAGENIANS. IN FACT WHAT HAS HAPPENED, IS

THAT OUR FOREFATHERS HAVE PLACED THAT STONE IN OUR MOST

SACRED MONUMENT TO INSURE, THAT WE AS AMERICANS, DO NOT

BECOME SO OBSESSED WITH WEALTH AND MATERIAL ITEMS TO

THE EXTENT THAT WE NEGLECT A STRONG DEFENSE MILITARY

CAPABILITY. WE MUST ALWAYS BE SO CONFIDENT IN OUR

MILITARY, THAT OUR FREEDOMS ARE NEVER SACRIFICED. WE

MUST INSURE THAT THERE NEVER EXISTS A TIME WHEN

AMERICANS DO NOT EXIST ON THIS EARTH.

LET US NOT EVER ALLOW US TO LOOSE WHAT MEN LIKE
JAMES ELSON FOUGHT SO VALIANTLY FOR.

I WILL CLOSE WITH A POEM BY AN UNKNOWN AUTHOR.

DESPITE THE TITLE, IT APPLIES TO EVERY AMERICAN MAN AND WOMAN WHO HAS EVER SERVED IN THE UNITED STATES

MILITARY. IT MAKES NO DIFFERENCE WHETHER THEY ARE

MALE OR FEMALE, OFFICER OR ENLISTED, OR IN THE ARMY,

NAVY, AIR FORCE, MARINES, COAST GUARD, OR RESERVES.

PLEASE ALLOW ME TODAY TO DEDICATE IT TO THE MEMORY OF FIRST LIEUTENANT JAMES M. ELSON.





Going through my Elson notebook I found John R. Williams who mar. Ellizabeth Fowler on 27 Nov 1828 Coshocton Co., OH. Elizabeth b.29 Feb 1808 to Richard & Jane Elson Fowler. They had 7 children - John F., Richard, James, Marion, Sevilla, William & Warren. Several of these children went west.

John F. mar. a Licking Co., OH woman and had 3 ch. One girl married and went west. One son lived on farm near Hanover, OH. One girl mar. J. Frank Powell and had 1 dau. who never married.

Richard mar. and went west.

James mar. twice - sisters. First wife had George, Charles, & Ida. Second wife - no ch. (in Cosh. Co. Marriages - James F. Williams mar. Margaret E. Johnson 11 Nov 1857 and James F. Williams mar. Sarah M. Johnston 9 Apr 1868. {Last name spelled differently, maybe error in recording.}).Note I'm assuming this is the correct James Williams. Ida Williams mar. Alexander B. Walker.

Marion H. Williams mar. Mary J. Weatherwax (sister to Sevilla's husband of Spring Mtn.) 6 Oct 1865 Cosh. Co.,OH. They had I boy and 1 girl.

Sevilla mar. John A. Weatherwax 5 Oct 1864 Cosh. Co.,OH and had at least 2 sons. These sons went to CA for their health after their mother's death.

Warren C. Williams mar. 1st Mary J. Green 29 Oct 1871. No ch. He mar. 2nd Frances Shook/Shucks 23 Mar 1875 Cosh. -Co., OH. Had 1 ch. It was raised by Billy Miller of Coshocton, OH after Warren's death.

Thank you very much for the information you sent in your letters of January 9th and 12th. I'll try and answer some of your questions concerning different lines. I do not know the decendants of Mary Jane Elson and John Railsback. I have tried for several years to trace the Elson lines down but the Railsbacks and Elsons still living around here have little interest in the family history.

My Isaac Zane Williams did not have a sister named Martha. However she could be some sort of relation. Interestingly I have been in touch, over the years, with a Byron Williams a decendant of Earl Zane Williams. Earls Grandfather was Orloff Alexis Wiiliams his cousin was Edward Zane Williams(my Great Great Grandfather). They both served in "Sherman's March to the Sea".

Just because Charles Baker served as the Executor of the Estate of Esais Bakers is it for sure that he is a son? When Susannah"Susan Baker Williams died in 1857 the executor of her estate was Colonel Richard McClain(Her Brother-in-law) not her Husband Isaac Zane Williams! Isaac remarried and moved first to Indiana the Iowa. Their children were placed in the care of Richard and Catherine Elson McClain. The older ones ran away. When they refused to return the younger ones were shipped off to join their father who was living in Indiana at the time.

Isaac and Susan's 2nd son was Edward Zane Williams. In Iowa he married Julia Ann Harger. She was the daughter of George Washington Harger and Eliza Jane Jones. Thank you for the information you sent with your letter of September 7th. I have sent along the following information: Family Group sheets for Edward Baker, sonin-law Isaac Zane Williams and his three wives and FGS for the Elson family.

First off you might be interested to know that Isaac Zane Williams is the Grandson of Jonathan Zane and Hannah Mills of Wheeling. The Zanes founded Zanesville, Zanesfield and Zanes Trace in Ohio.

Concerning the FGS you sent on Isaia Baker. Susannah''Susan''Baker is the daughter of Edward and Sarah Baker. When Isaac and Susannah registered their marriage at the Coshocton County Court House, she used the name''Susan''. In the 1850 Coshocton County census she again uses the name''Susan''. In Sarah Bakers Petition against her children she is listed as Isaac Z.Williams wife Susannah. She is listed the same way as an heir to Edwards estate. It is also note worthy that her children refer to her by both names in family histories. Isaac's sister, Rebecca, married Charles Merritt. The Baker and Williams families farms were next to each other.

About Isaac and Susan's daughter, Mary Elizabeth Williams. She was born four years before they were married, however she is listed as a legal heir in the estates of both Isaac and Susan? Have you seen any thing on Her?

Concerning Charity Wiggins; I do not have any information on the Wiggins family. I just happen to have the Wiggins listed as wives of brothers of my decendants. Their names came up during my research but I did not pursue their lines, as I don't believe I have any connection.

I would like to have the children and spouses of William Addy and Eleanor Clark of Mary Warden Coshocton County, If you might have it.

Did any of our Baker ancestors serve in the War of 1812 or Revolutionary War?

Is there any reference in Coshocton Counties History about Isaias Baker?— sent FGS + estate



On a recent geneology-business trip east I found your ancestor chart filed at the Tuscarawas County Library. MY mother was an Elson from Buchanan Michigan who lived in Jackson, Michigan until her death a few years ago. The branch of the Elsons came through Indiana and probably from Conshocton, Ohio.

I have a few questions of mutual interest:



Dear Mr. Hesse,

The Rose Hill Cemetery sexton's book lists the burial of Rebecca Elson, who died on May 6, 1891. The entry states that she died in Buchanan, Michigan, of cancer of the stomach, and that she was born in Ohio. Her age and parents' names are not listed. She is buried in grave no. 2, lot 4. Unfortunately, the death returns for Buchanan in 1891 are missing. You might be able to get a copy of her death certificate from the Berrien County Clerk, Berrien County Courthouse, St. Joseph, MI 49085.

The Berrien Springs Era newspaper of Wednesday, May 13, 1891, reported: "Mrs. T.C. Elson, of Buchanan, died last week and her remains were brought to the cemetery at this place and buried beside her child that died while she lived here. Particulars of her life and illness are not at hand." I checked the next two issues of the paper, but it did not follow up the story.

A store built by Tuttill C. Elson still stands in Berrien Springs. The following is a brief story I wrote for the Journal-Era newspaper about a year ago:

The T.C. Elson Block originated in the spring of 1884, when hardware store owner Tuttill C. Elson announced plans to build a new brick block in Berrien Springs. In the 1880s, a "block" meant a building with retail offices on the first floor and apartments or offices in the floors above. People then took a keen interest and pride in a brick building, since they considered wooden structures old-fashioned and unattractive. Tuttle in fact built two stores, which shared a single inner wall.

Work on the new building began in late July or early August 1884. The Berrien Springs Era newspaper followed the work with weekly reports on its progress. When the new Elson Block was completed in September 1884, it boasted a tin roof and a cast iron store front — one of the finest stores in the village. The Bapist Ladies Society served refreshments in the new building during the county agricultural fair in September. That October, the same group made a quilt and held a spelling bee in the store, awarding the quilt as a prize to the best speller.

The Elson Block went through several ownership changes in the past century. In the 1960s, owners made an unfortuate attempt to "modernize" the building with a false aluminum storefront that obscured the original detailing. The current restoration stripped off the aluminum to reveal the still-intact cast iron and brick facade. The east half of the Elson Block retains its 1960s storefront, a jarring contrast with the original facade restored as The Fabric Shoppe.


The Rose Hill Cemetery sexton's book lists a Winnie Elson, male, died on September 14,
1883 at age ten years. The book notes that he died in Berrien Springs, was born in Indiana
and lists his parents as T. C. & This is confirmed by the death returns for Oronoko
Township, which give the addition information that Winnie Elson died of diptheria. The
death returns list his parents as T.C. Elson and Elson.


Dear Doris,

Our letters almost crossed in the mail. I'm glad I was a little slow in following up on Gwen Hubbard's lead. My Elson line is that of Archibald Elson who was born Abt 1754 in Montomery Co. Maryland (married Hannah Roberts in 1782) and moved to the Brooke Co., WVA/Washington Co., PA area in the 1770's to1780's. His father is reported to be John Elson. Archibald then moved to Coshocton Ohio by the early 1800's and died there in 1824? I am still working on his siblings and children. I have many leads but am still sorting them out. So far, I have found the following spelling variations of the name Elson: Elsin, Ellison, Allison, Ellson and Alson. Although I have'nt been looking for the name Peter in the Elson's I have researched, I have come across the name Tunis. Is the Tunis Elson that lives in Coshocton (presently) a relative of yours? I know that there have been several generations of Tunis' there.

You don't mention which Fowlers you are interested in? Are you related to the Elizabeth Baker b.1798 who married Richard Fowler in Brooke? My Fowler line is that of Richard Fowler who was born Abt 1784 in WV (Brooke Co. probably), left in the early 1800's and married Archibald Elson's daughter Jane in 1807 in Coshocton. Richard's parents, supposed to be a Richard or John married to a Christiana Hopkins, have proved elusive. As a result, I am tracking all of the Brooke/Hancock Fowler's trying to put them together with their parents who first settled the various Virginia land grants. If you can be more specific perhaps we can help each other. I am looking forward to hearing from you.



She had determined to bury it there whether dead or alive, no promise of favors were made her nor no threats and she does not believe she supposed herself to be under any obligation to confess it and was in her full senses. Mary further told her she had not provided any clothes for it as she had not expected to have it so soon. She (Massey) saw the child as it was buried, the hand were grasped full of straw and appeared to have been in full life and to have come at its full time and was a fine child - a child born dead is white, but born alive and dying they have the color of another corpse." William Foster's deposition: William said "the prisoner spun at my house three days and the night of the third day was taken sick, some time in the night he heard the voice of a young child and does not know but it was one of his own. He heard no more till next morning when going out to bring in firewood he discovered some blood in some straw at the back of his hen house - came and told his wife and went to examine his creatures. In the meantime, his wife discovered the child. He came as she called him and they so far uncovered it as to discover what it was and leaving it in

I'm Afraid I can't provide any real help in tieing your Titus Elson to Richard Elsons family. My ancestor hunting is pretty well limited to trying to trace the parentage of Richards father, John - and with no more luck than you are having in your Elson efforts, Happily other hard working Elsons have stored the results of their efforts in computors and occassionally send me a printout. I have scanned the largest of these with an excellent listing of the children and grandchildren of Richard Elson but no Titus. I am enclosing for what it's worth a listing of one of John Harris Elsons sons only because he was married to a Baker and one his children was named "Tortullas". The name and address of this computor whiz:

I'm also enclosing my Family Group Sheet on the original John Elson. Sarah and John apparently had no issue. William who was murdered in 1770, apparently had only one son, Joseph P. There just isn't any Titus in the family tree.

Finally, I"m enclosing a page from a very complete genealogy on the Baxter family of Maryland which I found in the Library of Congress and had copied. The Elsons and the Baxters started in Maryland and moved on to what is now West Virginia. There they were joined by the Wiggins and there waq much intermarriage among the families for quite a few generations, The data indicates that John Wiggins wife was Margaret Baxter and their daughter was unmarried (Mary)

I'm sorry to be so negative, but you're just going to have to find another Elson family. The Mormon Church Family History Library is only a couple of blocks from my condo so I checked to see if they had any other Elsons in their Pennsylvania files but couldn't find any for that period.

#### RICHARD ELSON -- MARY TURNER

NOTES

on sheek

Earlier family records show Richard Elson marrying Mary Turner in 1765 in Hanover Parish, King George Co Virginia. Her parents were listed as Thomas Turner and Martha Tallifero Turner of King George Co. However in the Maryland Archives - Ann Arundel Co. - Testamentary Papers-1769 - Box 77 Folder 25 are the original papers relative the estate of Thomas Turner, late of Ann Arundal- but previously Prince George. Named Administrators were Richard Elson, husband of Mary Turner daughter, and Ann Turner - presumably the second wife of Thomas Turner. His original will, signed in 1758, left his entire estate for life or widowhood to his wife Mary, remainder over to his daughter Mary. His wife Mary died soon after and he subsequently remarried and left issue by his second wife. He died in 1768, but the case was not settled until 1775, when the Prerogative Court ruled the original will voided by the remarriage. He in effect died intestate - One third to the widow and the remainder to his children in equal shares. I have been unable to locate any record in Maryland relative to the actual marriage. When the bundle of King George Co marriage records for the years 1760-70 was opened for indexing in 1830 the paper had been completely destroyed by worms. The family records for time and place are thus the best we have.

Maryland Gazette - In 1755 mentions Thomas Turner plantation near Queene
Anne in Prince Geirges Co. In 1759 and again in 1760 notes a Richard Elson
as overseer at Mr. hepburns plantation near Rock Creek Bridge in Frederick Co.
Richard Elson wasin Charles Co. in 1775 when Thos. Turner estate was settled.

Richard Elson is listed in the DAR Patriots Index, as is Edward Wiggins, father in law of John Harris Elson.

In 1776 Yohogania County, Va. was formed from Augusta Co.In the Minute Book for the First Virginia Court 23-12-1776 Richard Elson was appointedd Constable. On 24-8-1778 Richard Elson was commissioned an Ensign in the Virginia Militia by the Governor. Other relatives mentioned in these Yohogania court records - Edw. & William Baxter, Edward Wiggins and Peter Brandon of the Town of Pittsburgh. In 1786 much of the county was ceded to Pennsylvania but the Elson property near Cross Creek remained in Virginia and became Brooke Co. West Virginia. By patent dated 23-3-1784 Richard Elson acquired 400 acres of land on Cross Creek which he settled on in 1772. Land was next to Edmund Baxter 400 acre patent.

In 1800, St Johns Church in Brooke Co. listed members, Richard Elson, Richard T. Elson, Archibald Elson and John Harris Elson. A deed recorded in 1803 indicated that Richard Elson was High Sheriff of Brooke Co. St. Johns Episcopal Church was organized in 1792. located 3 miles East of Follensbee on the Fllonsbee- Elderville Rd. Adjacent cemetery has a number of Elson and Baxter grave markers. The earliest appears to be Archibald henson Elson died 1831.

The Elson and Baxter families have heavily intermarried over the years. Both started in Maryland and moved on to West Virginia. A very complete Baxter genealogy is available in the Library of Congree, and I have made a copy.

Brook Cty, VA., too.



Then I ran across a list of some marriage records - Archibald Elson married Emily Hains Jan 17, 1822 (I assume these are Darah's parents) then on May 5, 1831 he married Darah Jones. Domewhere in my

mind I have it that her father & step mother came to Down when she lost her husband early - he was 31 - she was left with two little boup (the two Parkers) ages 1 and 2.





# Siver Threads Esther Elson

If a woman is ever chosen as Boss Cowman, Esther Elson would be a prime candidate. Widowed at age 48 and with only \$62 in the bank, Esther decided to stay on the farm, raise her three young children, and become active on the local, state and national level with organizations vital to the cattle and sheep industry.

Elson, 84, was raised on a farm in rural Harding County, the fourth of five children born to Matthias and Karen Hetland. Both her parents were Norwegian immigrants. Matthias came to the United States when he was 19 and earned his citizenships papers after serving in the Spanish-American War. "When we grew up we heard all those (war) stories. He was in the Phillipines and ate candied grasshoppers and fried snakes," she grimaced.

Karen, whose family moved to a farm near Valley City, ND, when she was four, met Matthias after he returned from the war. He was a blacksmith and she was a dress and hat maker.

Esther went to Vesey Consolidated School for one year and finished her high school education at Gascoyne. In 1930 she took the U.S. Census for Harding County.

When she was 20 years old she traveled by train to Wallace, ID, where she lived with her aunt and uncle. For several years she worked in the kitchen of a county home for poor people.

She then traveled to Bremerton, WA, where she cared for a naval officer's wife and child. When they relocated to Long Beach, CA, she went with them.

She moved to San Diego where once again she worked at a county home. Always on the move Esther went to Murray, ID, where she worked at a post office and in the summer mined gold when it sold for \$35 an ounce.

Esther was working at a post office in Valleo, CA, when World War II was declared. It was at Valleo where she met her husband Kenneth, who was a shippard welder. They met through a mutual friend who brought Ken with him to dinner one night at Esther's apartment. "I had made a banana cream pie and Kenneth said, 'well anybody who can make banana cream pie like that isn't going to get away from me," she chuckled.

Esther got a job at the roulette wheel in Reno, NV, before she returned to Valleo and married Ken irr For the next four and a half years she drove ambulance for the Red Cross. "Was I ever busy," she exclaimed. "We drove day and night and we were on call all the time. We had to go to school to learn how to drive during a blackout, and to be a mechanic. We were trained in first aid and learned how to shoot on the police firing range.

"We took patients up and down the coast and took USO entertainers all over. I knew San Francisco like a book."

She clearly recalled an incident when they were transferring a young soldier in the ambulance. He had flown numerous missions with World War II flying ace and former state governor Joe Foss. He returned to the states despondent and tried to commit suicide by slashing his wrists. "We were driving over the Oakland Bay Bridge on our way to the military hospital when I looked in the rearview mirror." Esther said. "This guy was going out the back door. I quickly stopped the ambulance and told my partner to grab him.

"He was trying to jump off the bridge when we grabbed him. He fought us furiously and just about knocked us out. I used a billy club to temporarily knock him out." After leaving him at the hospital Esther never saw him again and never knew his name. "I often wish I had gouten his name," she sighed. After the war she received a plaque from President Truman in appreciation for her service with the Red Cross.

In 1944 Esther and Ken returned to South Dakota to attend her fa-

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didn't know if I was coming or going," she smiled. "Kenneth said we had to move to South Dakota so he could keep me home."

After her father had died, her mother moved to Scranton so Esther and Ken took over the home place. "He had wanted to take over ranching but I didn't," she noted. "I knew what life was like out here on a ranch. We had nothing but hardship and no one ever had any

ther's funeral. "Kenneth fell in love with this country," Esther said.

"After we went back to California that's all he could think about. So in 1946 we came back to Harding County to my mother's homesteal."

Kenneth grew up on a ranch in Wyoming and did not like life in California. "I loved it out there," Esther noted. "Because I was busy all the time." In addition to driving ambulance Esther had driven a bakery truck and an ice cream truck. She also did darkroom work for a

money. It was a good life and I enjoyed it but I didn't want to go back to it."

One year after moving back to South Dakota their first child, Karen, was born. Sixteen months later Curtis James came along. They needed more room for livestock and bought Jim Olson's place at Meadow. Their youngest child, Rhonda was born in 1950. Now at age 84, she is the proud grandmother of six grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Esther said that after they moved

after another. We had hard luck." A young man visiting from Wisconsin got in a wreck with their pickup and sued them. Their daughter Karen was attacked by a pig when she was two years old. "She had picked up a baby pig and the mother bit Karen in the face," Esther recalled. "A tooth almost went into her eye. The pig would have killed her if I hadn't been there."

Ken wanted to stick with it. "He thought it was the nicest ranch in the world in the nicest country in the world," Esther said.

In March 1958 tragedy struck again, this time ending in death. "We were just starting to lamb and one day Ken said he didn't feel good," Esther remembered. "I took him to Dr. Totten but he said there was nothing wrong with him and gave him some nerve medicine and sent him home.

"It was about 1 a.m. and I had been checking sheep. I was just getting into bed and Ken said he felt so awful. I got up and said I was going to get the car and take him to the hospital. Just about that time he gave a gasp and was gone." At age 43 he died of a blood clot to the heart.

Esther was 48 and they would have been married 16 years in August. Karen had just turned 11 years old the day before, Curt was eight

\$62 in the bank. For the next three weeks neighbors helped her finish lambing and later put in all the crops in a day and a half. "There are the most wonderful farmers down there," Esther smiled. "They all brought their tractors and said all I had to do was get the seed and fuel. We had 650 acres of grain to put in."

Esther said she had thought about selling the place but her children wanted them to stay. She did not have any trouble managing the business because she had worked closely with Ken, but she didn't know how to run the machinery.

"I got out and taught myself;" she smiled. "It got so I really liked it." Each year combiners would harvest the big crop. In 1972 they had a poor crop, so Karen and Esther joined the combiners. From July until Thanksgiving they combined in Kansas, Nebraska, both Dakotas and into Saskatchewan. "It was a great experience," she said. "I like anything with wheels under it."

No grass grew under her feet. From January through March for two years, 1972-1974, Esther lived in Honolulu, HA, and cooked for a millionaire rancher.

As a member of the Wool Growers Association Esther traveled to several foreign countries as an ambassador for sheep. In 1979 she went to Australia, New Zealand and Figi. The next year they traveled all over South America. In 1981 they went to South Africa. The following year they went to Spain, Portugal and Morocco.

Since 1980 Esther has lived alone on her homestead. The operation was reduced to one cow and calf pair, and 350 head of sheep. "Little by little I've been cutting down," she said. "If I get all the sheep sold I'll still live there." She looks forward to staying on the move by traveling. Every year she attends the Wool Growers Convention in Washington, DC, and would someday like to return to California.

Since 1950 she has been a member of the Wool Growers Association and is a former member of the Stockgrowers Association. She also is a member of the South Dakota Wheat Growers and the Farm Bureau. She is a former 4-H leader and in 1992 she was named Master Lamb Producer.

Esther said she would have considered remarrying, "but like I always said it would have to be somebody interested in sheep. So I guess it's a case of love me, love

tion Vermont. Few, save squatters, were on the lands, and the region seemed destined to be unimproved, whom Charles Marquand and Stephen Starkey petitioned Congress during 1818ts19 to reduce the price from four dollars per acre to two dollars and twenty-five cents, and the quantity from one hundred and sixty to eighty acres. The appeal was heeded and the changes made, then population came in from every quarter and the township was under full headway to settlement.

To some, the varying area of townships excites interest to know the reason. In this case an organization was requisite on account of inconvenience in working the roads, and Adams Township was formed in 1824, from Monroe and Madison, and given its name in honor of John Quincy Adams, then a candidate for President, at the suggestion of Caleb Jordan, Esq. The first justices of the new township were Anthony Slater, a settler of 1818, and Caleb Jordan. The first road ran from Cambridge to the salt-works, and was little more than a deer-trail till 1818, when it was opened for teams. A second road, from Mechanicsville to Marquan's cabin, was marked out in 1821, by Jonathan and Stephen Starkey, and its length estimated at three times the number of hours occupied in walking over it. While large families were the rule in pioneer days, still, it was noteworthy that Asa Brown, a settler on the old Stewart farm, had a family of eighteen children.

Edwards, Barrett, Wagoner, and others joined to build a log school-house at the old forks of the road, on the form of M. Edwards, and James Hayworth was installed as the first teacher. In 1835, the first hewed log meeting-house was built near the grave of James Stewart, who arted this life in 1826. The Fairview Church, a neat frame building, was creeted in 1855. first and only water-mill for sawing was built by Brelsford, on the run which bears his due; in 1835. The township is exclusively agricultural.

#### MONROE TOWNSHIP.

To him who, traveling the various roads of the township, finds those radiating from the village of Otsego, a place centrally situated and laid out by Moses Abbott and Francis Wires, in 1838, along the valley of White Eyes Creek, or striking upward along the ridges, the scenery is full of interest and not devoid of pleasure. Not distant from a populous city, and in the midst of a highly-civilized region, here is met a loneliness which carries the mind back to the time when the first settler erecting his log cabin was alone with nature, and when farther back the crumbling rocks were destitute of foliage, of tree, and shrub, and the earth was fresh from the hand of its Maker. The township is seen to be the extreme northeast part of the County. The various creeks which drain its surface flow towards the centre at Otsego, thence united, traverse the township northeastwardly, and heave the County at Section 1. The region is strictly postural and agricultural. The old sottlers have passed away, and their children, taking each a share of the old farm, till the same fields alone which as boys they aided their fathers in clearing. Southward are the McCalls, the Venucls, and the Berkers; eastward, the Morrows, the Wilsons, and the Duffs; northward, the Cowdens and Starkeys; and westward, the Rosses, Thrashes, and Brannons. Away to the northwest, on a bend of Wills' Creek, Peter Marquand had built a flouring-mill, and William McCall is reported to have been the proprietor of a pioneer mill. Church and cometery are seen together at various points. To the northwest is the Methodist; southeast of Otsego is the Presbyterian; and on the creek, to the northeast, is the Methodist Protestant Church. Otsego's first storekeeper was Thomas McCall; Alexander Delmater was its first resident physician; and not until recently was there a tavern-stand, which want was supplied by Joseph C. Simmons.

#### LICKING TOWNSHIP.

These recollections of Licking Township, from Daniel Van Voorhis, are full of interest to the resident; he feels that it is of his father, his farm, and his village these lines are descriptive, and statements are made of which his own experience has knowledge. Long before the actual settlement of the township a hardy race of hunters and squatters had built their cabins and made improvements about the site of the present villages of Irville and Nashport. Among these men were David Devore, John Thrapp, Henry Barrickman, Aaron Claypool, and Joseph and Ephraim Baker.

Among the first to enter lands as actual settlers were Jonathan and Solomon Wood and families, from Virginia, Leonard Stump, Jacob Victor, David Vandenback, and Nathan eming. These settlers, prior to 1808, are of the dead, and their children have grown aged ipon the old lands. Of those who moved into the township before 1812 who were permanent inhabitants, we give the names of John Irvin, John Van Voorhis, Richard Ayers, and John R. Roger, son-in-law of Stump.

It is related of Enos Devore that he came west with his father, John Devore, in 1801, bringing with them two cows and an ox, on which they packed all their goods. John Davore soon returned to Virginia, where he is thought to have died. Enos Devore settled at what is now called Nashport. At this time, 1801, there were two habitations in the place, -one owned by David Devore, the other by Samuel Jones. Probably the first tavern-keeper in Licking was for their Wood whose bouse at Vashport, a hewed log building, was the favorite resort of the

on the run to which he gave his name, in 1810. The mill was in a rough log building, and bolting was done by hand. Several other nulls for sawing were built above and below at a later date. Firman Spencer was the original tunner, and Michael Hahn started the first of several rude stills. Dutten Lame, son of Richard, kept the pioneer tavern on the Dresden Road as early as 1816. Senton may have been a tavern-keeper prior to Lane. Frederick Woodford built the first blacksmith-shop on land owned by Ebenezer Ryan, now owned by John McLane, Esq. The first school-house was built in 1807, east of Shannon. Of early teachers the names are preserved of John Elliott, Sanford Rainy, Archy McCann, and an energetic teacher named Phelps, one of the best of the olden time. The Baxter meetinghouse, located on a lot donated by Samuel Baxter, and erected about 1816, was the first church built. The house was owned by the Baptists, and dedicated by Rev. Amos Meeks. The church organization dates back to 1808. The first bridge constructed over Devore's Run was known as Bland's Bridge. Silas Bland is named as the oldest native of the township. The first saltwell was bored by Colonel Jackson, in 1814, near the Muskingum. The township is claimed as the equal in healthfulness to any in Ohio. The surface is a pleasant blending of hill and valley. Products of early years were corn, wheat, and grass; later, attention is given to woolgrowing. The settlers were mainly from Maryland, Virginia, and Pennsylvania. In politics the voters were formerly a Whig majority, but of late years Democratic.

#### SALEM TOWNSHIP.

The township of Salem was organized about 1819, and the first election was held at the house of Jesse Williams. The first settler was Gordon Dennison, who, about the year 1800, entered a large tract of land about one mile south of the present town of Adamsville. In 1801 the settlement was increased by the arrival of Jacob Swiger, Starkey, Jesse Williams, brother, in-law to Dennison, Amos Vernon and others, from Pennsylvania. Swiger settled in the east, and the remainder in the southeast of the township. In 1806, Rev. Spencer moved in, and became the first resident minister. Daniel Gormer, Philip Shroyer, and Peter Wertz were of the pioneer settlers. Mr. Dennison built the first frame known in the township. Jacob Gormer and Abner Wade were neighborhood blacksmiths, who combined farming with repairs to gans and shocing of horses. The first saw-mill was the work of Amos Vernon, and stood for many years. Later, a grist-mill was attached; it stood on the Prairie Fock of Salt Creek, in the southwest part of Salem, where now J. Keiffer has a saw- and grist-mill. Along in 1832, Jared Cone was connected with a fannery, which stood southwest of Adamsville. A saw mill, now a wreck, was built on the creek north of the village, by Jacob Sturtz, in 1835. A small distillery was started, in 1822, by George Stoner, and this place became a favorite resort for the fun-loving settlers. Parties of them sometimes came to the still-house when the stock of liquors was low, and drank the beverage as fast as it could be manufactured.

Adamsville, located in the northwest portion of the township, was laid out by M. Adams in 1832, and an addition made in 1835 by A. H. Wheeler. It is cleven miles from Zancsville, and has a population of about five hundred. The first storekeeper was Gipson Collins, whose stock was valued at about two hundred dollars. Daniel Ross put up a building, and opened it for the entertainment of the public as the primal taverir, in 1838. The first meeting-house was the enterprise of Latherans, erected in 1814, and dedicated by A. Henkle. The next house for worship was built by Baptists in 1820, and consecrated by Rev. Spencer. A third church was reared in 1836 by Methodists. The first physician, and a well-known practitioner, was Dr. Reasoner, who settled in Adamsville in 1834, and there resided lifteen years. The first school was located on the Starkey farm, about one mile east of Adamsville. A pedagogue named Colvin, from Connecticut, was the initial teacher in 1819, followed in 1820 by Amy Wade. The oldest graveyard is at the Lutheran Church; the first burial therein was of the remains of Mrs Gormer, in 1814. In 1815, Joseph Stiers was elected Justice of the Peace for Salem Township. The surface is moderately hilly; the soil, mixed sand and clay. The staple was wheat and is grass, and stock-raising is a pursuit. The people love their homes, and are content to live upon their possessions in quiet and comfort.

#### HIGHLAND TOWNSHIP.

Among the pioneer names of Highland Township are found those of James Guthrie, Thomas Ramsey, Thomas McCall, John and Ross McNeal, John Buchanan, J. K. McCune, and Peter and John Bradford. The first stone house constructed in the township was by James Hunter. Robert Duff and Hugh Simms are recalled as the builders of saw-mills on White Eyes Creek. Where now the village of Bloomfield is, William Mason kept a pioneer store for years. Those who needed the services of a blacksmith called on Robert Baxter, on the Adamsville Road. The first church was built in Bloomfield by the "Seceders;" Rev. Daniel McLean was their first preacher. Edward Meany taught the primal school in the house of Ramsey. One of the oldest school-houses still stands on Section 14, by the roadside, and is worth observing. It is hexagonal, and a piece of log cut from each of the six sides shows where the greased paper had made the windows. Standing there alone, it vividly recalls the past, and strikingly reminds one of the rude block-houses erected as a retreat from savage incursions.

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Jacob Victor was a hammerman at the forge at Dillon's Iron-Works, and later was a settler upon a farm which he had previously bought and let to a tenant to chear up. John Irvin employed part of his time at carpenter-work, and the remainder at farming, as was usual with tradesmen of the day. John Sidle was the owner of the pioneer corn-cracker mill, and in time gave it in charge to his boys to hoist the gates and draw the toll. John Fleming and David Vandenbark are reputed to have planted the earliest orchards of the apple and the peach some time prior to 1812. Game at that time was numerous, as regards deer and trukey, but hear and wolf were becoming rare. Bounties paid for wolf-scalps made their pursuit an

ect; and bear meat for food, and the skins for use, besides the excitement of the chase, led uin a hard run for life. Deer were killed in Licking Township as late as the fall of 1835, and turkeys until recently. The honey-bee preceded the settler, and the old pioneers would line a bee to the tree and glean the long-stored sweets, and sometimes take home the swarm to the cabins. Round-log houses were succeeded by the hewed, and, in time, the first frame building in the township was erected at Irville, and dedicated as a house of worship by the Presbyterians, under charge of resident pastor, Rev. Smith. The first road running east and west through the township was the old stage route between Columbus and Zanesville; along this lighway the four-horse coaches ran daily prior to the construction of the National Road. The old stage-drivers are of past times, and even their names are lost, save that of John Wilson, who married Polly Sheppard, of Irville. The only grist-mill in the township was built in 1832, and is known as Claypool's Mills, and is the property of one of the heaviest land-owners in Licking. The township has two villages: Irville, laid out in 1814 by Richard Ayers and Joyn Irvine; and Nashport, by Captain T. Nash, in 1827. Possibly the first attempt at merchandising in the township was made at the former place by Francis Cassady, in a two-story frame, part of which was used as a dwelling. The first postmaster was Jared Brush, of Irville. The medical services of Elmus Wheaton, of this village, were long required over a field on which there was no rival to dispute his rights. Near Nashport of the present was erected the old log school-house of the period; on its puncheoned floor the boys and girls of 1815 formed in line, and here instruction and discipline were given by Dougherty and his successor, Edward Rogers. One Dickinson was the first white man buried in the old Indian burying-ground, on land now owned by Levi Claypool. Early settlers were Virginians. The present population are to the manner born. #### MUSKINGUM TOWNSHIP.

The organization of this township occurred during the war of 1812, and its territory originally formed a part of Licking Township. Elections were held at John Bland's, near the centre of the township. Henry Butter was the first justice elected in the new township. This portion of Muskingum was of very early settlement. James Black was the first settler on land now owned by James Stift, and obtained from his brother-in-law, Mr. Biggs. The Cullem and Prior families settled near the river, Bichard Lane and John Bland located near the centre of the township. The settlers in the northwest part of Muskingum were Samuel Guest, of Maryland, John Dorsey, on the next section cast of Guest, and Joseph Spencer, a Revolutionary soldier, and the pioneer settler of the neighborhood. Samuel McCann, Levi Cooper, and George Welsh were settlers before 1808.

William Blunt was an early resident on Section 3, on the head-waters of Devore's Run, in the northern part of the township. Lands were not then in market, and the improvements the pioneers of 1800, were uncertain tenures, but ultimately most bought their farms and freen passed their lives. Captain James Taylor, Henry Butler, and Baxter were heads of prominent families which had become settled in the township by 1811. The oblest orchard in the township was raised by Mr. Blunt, who had bearing trees in 1811. Kear the middle of the township, Captain Taylor built the first house which was weather-boarded and plastered. Erected in 1815, it still stands, a monument of the builders of a half-century in the past. The first brick houses were creeted in 1825, by Forman Spencer and William Wells. That of Spencer is still standing. The first road laid out was from Falls of Licking to Owl Creek, and was known as the Griffin Road. David Devore built the first mill in Muskingum Township.

#### HIGHLAND TOWNSHIP

Among the power names of Highland Township are found those of James Guthrie, Thomas Ramsey, Thomas McCall, John and Ross McNed, John Buchman, J. K. McCune, and Pater and John Brackford. The first stone house constructed in the township was by James Hunter. Robert Duff and High Simus are recalled as the builders of saw-unds on White Eyes Creek, Where now the village of Bloomfield is, William Mason kept a pioneer store for years. Those who needed the services of a blacksmith called on Robert Baxter, on the Adamsvilla Road. The first church was built in Bloomfield by the "Seceders;" Rev. Daniel McLoan was their first proacher. Edward Meany faught the primal school in the house of Ramsey. One of the oldest school-houses still stands on Section 14, by the roadside, and is worth observing. It is hexagonal, and a piece of log cut from each of the six sides shows where the greased paper had made the windows. Standing there alone, it vividly recalls the past, and strikingly reminds one of the rude block-houses erected as a retreat from saxage incursions.

To the northeast is Bloomfield, the seat of McCorkle College. This institution had a humble origin. In 1862, Rev. William Ballantine, of the Associate Presbyterian Church, induced several young men to prepare for the ministry, and himself heard recitations in his study. Numbers increasing, the meeting-house was offered and used, and the name of Bloomfield High School bestowed. For years it continued an individual enterprise, until the first students were ready to enter the senior class. In 1868 the Synod passed an act appointing Messrs. Robert Atcheson, John Bell, William Finney, Samuel McKee, Robert Hyslop, Robert Brown, A. McCterry, J. H. Johnson, and John Baird a Board of Trustees. In 1869 the Bloomfield Academy was incorporated, and a house purchased. A college building became a necessity; and J. Bell, president of the Board, being appointed general financial agent, sufficient funds were raised; a foundation was hid in the fall of 1872, and the spring term of 1873 was held in the basement. A college charter was obtained on February 12, 1873, and the school became clothed with full university powers. Rev. W. Ballantine, A.M., was elected President, James Hindman, A.B., Vice-President, and R. C. Kerr, A.B., Professor of Languages. The college proper began existence April 3, 1873. It has an endowment of eight thousand dollars, and, including values in building, a capital of twenty thousand dollars. Its present prospects are flattering, and show an unexpected prosperity.

#### HOPEWELL TOWNSHIP.

Hopewell Township lies west of Springfield and Falls Townships, and is in part bounded on the north by Licking County, and on the south by Perry. The Central Ohio Railroad forms its northeast boundary line, and the National Road traverses the lower central portion on its westward course. Along this road, at a mile's interval, is the village of Hopewell, laid out by John and James Rickey in 1829, and the town of Mount Starling, laid out during the same year by Nathan Wilson, who the following year laid out an addition. Farther on the road is the town of Gratiot, partly in the adjoining county of Licking. Kent's Run heads near the middle of the township, and flows southward into Perry County. Poverty Run traverses the northern portion. The McBrides, Bonifields, Tanners, and Priors are familiar names in the township. The manufacture of stone-ware is extensively carried on, and potteries are found in various parts of the township. Various religious denominations have churches at convenient points. In the extreme northwest is Cottage Hill Post-Office; here the Baptists and Christians have houses of worship. Southward is the United Brethren Church, and east of Starling the Baptists have a second church. The surface is uneven. Roads meander, and many houses are quite a distance from them. As the old settler resolutely advanced deep into the interminable wood, cutting a road for his wagon, his thoughts were bent on securing a home, and little reckoned he of the cities yet to be. Roads were surveyed to which he made a farm road; and the present farmer, tilling lands, has much the same disregard for sight of passing travel and frequent visitors as his father before him.

#### FALLS TOWNSHIP.

William Camp and Frederick Geyer were pioneer settlers in Falls. The latter is known to have planted out the first orchard in the township. One Bartlett was an early resident upon the run which bears his name. Golonel David Chambers, John Vandenbark, John Roberts, and Jennings were early inhabitants of this part of the County. South of Licking were the Tanners, whose descrudants still reside upon ancestral domains. Two men located long ago upon Joe's Run, and their names are recollected as John Buckingham and John Will. The pioneer grist-taills, in the order of their construction, were those of Dillon and Jackson. There were two saw-mills built on Bartlett's Run, one standing, the other crumbled away. A saw-mill at the Falls of Licking was probably the first one creeted. The furnace and ironworks of Dillon and the creetion of the early church are events noted in County history. The Falls of Licking once bid fair to rival Zanesville as a commercial and manufacturing centre. Here Dillon had a store in connection with his works; here Henry Dick began blacksmithing; and here Wm. Baker was of the early tavern-keepers. Near where the bridge crosses the Licking on a ledge of rocks stood a severely plain log building, which bore the name of school-loose. Here, during the winter of 1816, Mr. Stephens taught the children of the pioneer.

Few people in Coshocton are not familiar with the face of John D. Elson, now past the alloted three score and ten and living in a modest home on Locust Street. A portion of his army life was reviewed in The Age office Monday evening by his comrade laptain E. H. Allison, who is to make an address tonight at the opera house under the suspices of the W. R. C. (Women's Relief Corp.)


The two aged veterans were boys in the Tenth Ohio cavalry together during the livil war. Mr. Allison has been in service for forty years, during thirty-seven of which he has been employed as a government scout, and interpreter in the U. S. courts. It is speaks the Sioux tongue better than the English, and tells very interestingly of the experiences he has passed through along the western border.


In speaking of Mr. Elson, he said: "He was one of the bravest men in battle I ever saw. He was cool in action yet the most dare devil fellow in the whole regiment, with perhaps one exception. That was Griffin, our chief of scouts."

The he related the following story in which Elson played a part:

"Chief Griffin was born in the south and was a nephew of Floyd, a member of Jeff Davis' cabinet. He was commissioned a lieutenant in the rebel army, but at heart ne was a union man. At last he cleverly escaped to the north and was employed by 'ilpatrick as chief of scouts, with authority to employ his men. Only those were selected who bore a reputation for courage. Among the number was our friend Elson.

"At Aiken, South Carolina, in 1865, a hundred picked men were detailed to charge upon a remnant of Hood's army. Elson was there, cutting his way through with the rest. "Ye crossed at Sister's Ferry. Kilpatrick said, 'Boys, this is South Carolina. They wanted war. Now give it to them.' The rebels had some supplies in transit and a letachment from our cavalry was sent down to capture them.'


